## Newcastle Schools Schedule To Begin Monday Morning

### Drivers, Students - Play Safe

School starts Monday, and the daily morning drag toward school and afternoon race away from school will begin. Many of Newcastle's school children will be on foot, and the foot and bicycle traffic will be heavier than usual.

Every child is every motorist's responsibility. We adults should be looking out for little ones who are careless because they are late, or because they are in a hurry, or simply, because they are little.

On the other hand, it is every parent's responsibility to make sure his child knows the rules of walking, or riding a bike.

Bicycle riders present their own problems. Because they are mobile, and because they often need to ride in the streets, they are a particular hazard to themselves.

Remind your bike rider of these general rules, for his own

safety and for your peace of mind.

1. Obey all traffic regulations, such as red and green lights, stop signs and hand signals.

2. Give pedestrians the right of way.

3. Try to ride in a straight line.

4. Look out for cars at crossings, in pulling out of driveways, in opening of auto doors on the traffic side.

5. Never hitch on to cars or trucks and never race in traffic. Never weave in and out of traffic.

Never carry another person on the rider's handlebars, which makes vision poor and balancing and steering difficult.

7. Always dismount and walk your bike across heavily travelled streets and intersections.

8. Ride single file on narrow or busy streets. Never ride more than two abreast.

9. Keep your bike in good condition. Always be certain that your brakes and horn are in good working order, and be sure that your rear reflector and front headlight are working.

10. Always ride carefully and

always be considerate of others.

Authorities agree that the bicycle is a training ground for drivers. A good bike rider will be a good driver. So, lessons learned in safety and care now will pay big dividends when your grade schooler is a teenager and is driving his own automobile.

School bells will ring in the 1966-67 school year bright and early Monday morning sounding the end of a three-month summer vacation for the school age children in Newcastle.

Other faculty members include Roland Rose, social studies; Jerry Howard, English; Ward Pendleton, agriculture, Charles Hibbits, science and coach; Mrs. Donna Hales, elementary and library; Mrs. Ima Pullis, elementary; Mrs. Barbara Hibbits, elementary; Mrs. Sybil Moreland, primary; J. W. Murphree, principal.

Employed under Titles I and II of the government are Mrs. Josie Rose and Mrs. LuAnn Pendleton. Other school staff members include Mrs. Dorothy Myatt, tax assessor-collector; Mrs. Roberta Smith and Mrs. Barnett Pitts, lunchroom; J. O. Musgraves, custodian; and Wiley Whitely and George Clark bus drivers.

Hales said there will be three students employed for full student work under the National Youth Corps Act and five students for full summer work. These students will be announced later.

### Workshop Is Scheduled For Small Museums

The first official Texas Institute of Small Museums workshop will be held Sept. 30, through Oct. 2 in Woodville, Tex. The Institute is sponsored by the Texas State Historical Survey Committee and the Texas Historical Foundation.

## County Agent's Corner

The value of shade or ornamental trees damaged by high winds, tornadoes or other acts of nature is deductible from income taxes. This information comes from Bill Smitt, Texas A&M University Extension forester.

The value can be determined by the assessed value of the real estate or by a formula based on tree size. The formula applies to many trees grown in Texas. This list includes redbud, blackwalnut, American and Chinese elm, cottonwood, red and white oaks, maples, and others. "A \$5.00 per square inch of trunk at breast height has been the value determined by the National Shade Tree Conference Committee on shade tree evaluation. Based on diameter at breast height or measurement at 4 1/2 feet above the ground. The basic value of a 4-inch diameter tree would be about \$63.00. A 20 inch diameter tree at breast height is valued at over \$1500."

Small trees, under 4 inches in diameter, are valued at replacement cost, plus expense of planting with the same size tree. Property owners should measure the trunk of damaged trees before removal and keep this measurement for tax record.

Once an ornamental plant becomes badly diseased, it is almost impossible to nurse it back to health.

Homeowners will do well to remember this rule.

"It's difficult, if not impossible, to eradicate organisms from a badly diseased plant." "For this reason, every effort should be made to prevent introduction of disease-causing organisms on plant material or in soil."

Mild disease conditions are not always easy to detect when buying ornamentals. Dealing with reputable nurserymen is the best insurance against getting puny plants.

Plants in poor growth condition are usually more susceptible to disease. Use of adapted plants along with good horticultural practices will help prevent trouble.

All diseased branches should be removed as soon as seen. Pruning wounds should be treated with a specially prepared material (available at garden stores) to stop entrance of wood decaying organisms.

But even good cultural and sanitation practices might fall short at times. This is the time to use specially formulated chemicals, which are safe when applied according to directions.

Fungicide applications should begin when disease development first appears and should continue at 7-14 day intervals as long as weather conditions are favorable for the disease. Addition of a household detergent at the rate of one teaspoonful per gallon will help get more uniform covering of the chemical on the plant. Those that may have experienced trouble with disease this year should consider the above suggestions next spring and summer or this winter when new plants may be purchased.

Agricultural scientists are finding young bull beef is just as "eatable as meat from steers or heifers.

And what's more, say researchers at Texas A&M University, bull beef is leaner and has less fat trim - both qualities demanded by consumers.

With beef consumption at an all-time high, cattlemen are looking for more effective beef production practices to meet the predicted 25 percent increases needed by 1980.

Researchers at A&M did mechanical tenderness tests on bull, steer, and heifer beef. The machine scored steers slightly over bulls and heifers in tenderness. But all three were above average and entirely satisfactory, the article points out.

The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station has done several tests comparing the feeding of bulls, steers, and heifers. In all tests, bull calves were superior to steer and heifer calves in weaning weights; bulls gained more economically and faster than steers or heifers; bulls had larger ribeyes; and little difference was noted in tenderness.

A six-member taste panel gave beef the final test. They rated it acceptable in all categories; tenderness, juiciness, flavor and overall satisfaction.

If the demand for beef is increasing - and it is; if bulls can be produced more efficiently - and they can; it seems evident that consumers will be seeing more and more bull beef in the meat cases at supermarkets, and who knows, a new trend may be in the making.

## PUBLIC NOTICE

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THIRTEEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 69 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section, Section 63, to Article III; authorizing the Legislature to provide by statute for the accomplishment of governmental functions within any county having one million, two hundred thousand (1,200,000) or more inhabitants by the consolidation of the functions of government or by contract between any political subdivision(s) located within the county and any other political subdivision(s) located within the county or with the county; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section in Article III, to be known as Section 63, reading as follows:

"Section 63

"(1) The Legislature may by statute provide for the consolidation of some functions of government of any one or more political subdivisions comprising or located within any county in this State having one million, two hundred thousand (1,200,000) or more inhabitants. Any such statute shall require an election to be held within the political subdivisions affected thereby with approval by a majority of the voters in each of these political subdivisions, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may require.

"(2) The county government, or any political subdivision(s) comprising or located therein, may contract one with another for the performance of governmental functions re-

quired or authorized by this Constitution or the Laws of this State, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may prescribe. The term 'governmental functions,' as it relates to counties, includes all duties, activities and operations of state-wide importance in which the county acts for the State, as well as of local importance, whether required or authorized by this Constitution or the Laws of this State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which time the ballot shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing the Legislature to provide by statute for any county having one million, two hundred thousand (1,200,000) or more inhabitants to consolidate the functions of government and for such counties or any political subdivision(s) located therein to contract for the performance of functions of government.

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing the Legislature to provide by statute for any county having one million, two hundred thousand (1,200,000) or more inhabitants to consolidate the functions of government and for such counties or any political subdivision(s) located therein to contract for the performance of functions of government."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 39 proposing an amendment to Section 18, Article VII, Constitution of the State of Texas, to withdraw Arlington State College from participation in the Permanent University Fund.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 18, Article VII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 18. For the purpose of constructing, equipping, or acquiring buildings or other permanent improvements for the Texas A & M University System, including Texas A & M University, Prairie View Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas at Prairie View, Tarleton State College at Stephenville, Texas Agricultural Experiment Stations, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas Engineering Experiment Station at College Station, Texas Engineering Extension Service at College Station, and the Texas Forest Service, the Board of Directors is hereby authorized to issue negotiable bonds or notes not to exceed a total amount of one-third (1/3) of twenty per cent (20%) of the value of the Permanent University Fund exclusive of real estate at the time of any issuance thereof; provided, however, no building or other permanent improvement shall be acquired or constructed hereunder for use by any part of the Texas A & M University System, except at and for the use of the general academic institutions of said System, namely, The Main University and Texas Western College, without the prior approval of the Legislature or of such agency as may be authorized by the Legislature to grant such approval. Any bonds or notes issued hereunder shall be payable solely out of the income from the Permanent University Fund. Bonds or notes so issued shall mature serially or otherwise not more than thirty (30) years from their respective dates.

"The Texas A & M University System and all of the institutions constituting such System as hereinabove enumerated, and The University of Texas System, and all of the institutions constituting such System as hereinabove enumerated, shall not receive any General Revenue funds for the acquiring or constructing of buildings or other permanent improvements, except in case of fire, flood, storm, or earthquake occurring at any such institution, in which case

Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute at Houston, The University of Texas Postgraduate School of Medicine, The University of Texas School of Public Health, McDonald Observatory at Mount Locke, and the Marine Science Institute at Port Aransas, the Board of Regents of The University of Texas is hereby authorized to issue negotiable bonds and notes not to exceed a total amount of two-thirds (2/3) of twenty per cent (20%) of the value of the Permanent University Fund exclusive of real estate at the time of any issuance thereof; provided, however, no building or other permanent improvement shall be acquired or constructed hereunder for use by any institution of The University of Texas System, except at and for the use of the general academic institutions of said System, namely, The Main University and Texas Western College, without the prior approval of the Legislature or of such agency as may be authorized by the Legislature to grant such approval. Any bonds or notes issued hereunder shall be payable solely out of the income from the Permanent University Fund. Bonds or notes so issued shall mature serially or otherwise not more than thirty (30) years from their respective dates.

"The Texas A & M University System and all of the institutions constituting such System as hereinabove enumerated, and The University of Texas System, and all of the institutions constituting such System as hereinabove enumerated, shall not receive any General Revenue funds for the acquiring or constructing of buildings or other permanent improvements, except in case of fire, flood, storm, or earthquake occurring at any such institution, in which case

an appropriation in an amount sufficient to replace the uninsured loss so incurred may be made by the Legislature out of General Revenue funds.

"Said Boards are severally authorized to pledge the whole or any part of the respective interests of Texas A & M University and of The University of Texas in the income from the Permanent University Fund, as such interests are now apportioned by Chapter 42 of the Acts of the Regular Session of the 42nd Legislature of the State of Texas, for the purpose of securing the payment of the principal and interest of such bonds or notes. The Permanent University Fund may be invested in such bonds or notes.

"All bonds or notes issued pursuant hereto shall be approved by the Attorney General of Texas and when so approved shall be incontestable. This Amendment shall be self-enacting provided, however, that nothing herein shall be construed as impairing any obligation heretofore created by the issuance of any outstanding notes or bonds under this Section by the respective Boards prior to the adoption of this Amendment but any such outstanding notes or bonds shall be paid in full, both principal and interest, in accordance with the terms of such contracts."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment withdrawing Arlington State College from participation in the Permanent University Fund."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment withdrawing Arlington State College from participation in the Permanent University Fund."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the constitution and laws of this state.
