## Bobcats Score Late To Take 13-12 Victory Over Lockett

Newcastle's Bobcats scored first but then had to come from behind to take a 13-12 decision over the Lockett Panthers in district play Friday night.

The Bobcats will travel to Turkey for their final game of the season Friday night.

Preston Pitts burst off right tackle in the first quarter against the Panthers and romped 55 yards for the score. The extra point try failed and with 6:33 left in the quarter the Bobcats led 6-0.

Lockett bounced back and scored on a 26 yard run around right end by Jimmy Karcher with 1:17 left in the quarter. The extra point was no good and the score was tied at 6-6.

Late in the first half, Lockett took the ball on their own 10 after halting a 75 yard drive by the Bobcats. They marched the distance for a score on 17 plays. Mack Lewis crashed off right guard for the score with 42 seconds left in the half. The extra point try again failed.

Newcastle moved quickly into scoring position after the second half kickoff but were halted on downs at the five yard line. The Bobcats mounted their scoring drive late in the game with John Bullock keeping for the score. The extra point kick was good and Newcastle took the game 13-12 over highly favored Lockett.

## Battle Monument Is Restored

Twelve interested Olney area citizens spent last Saturday at the site of the Little Salt Creek Indian Fight restoring the monument erected in July 1896.

The monument was dedicated to the heroic men, three of whom were killed, by Dr. W. M. Terrell of Newcastle. The name of the men who fought a band of roving Comanches at the site include Capt. Ira E. Graves, J. L. Woody and Henry Harrison. Also listed as having been wounded were George Lemley, J. W. Gray, W. C. Kutch, Jason McClain,

Rueben Segress and Negro Dick. Listed as having been killed were William Crow, John Lemley and C. L. Carter.

The fight took place on May 16, 1869.

Site of the monument is on the old Eichelberger ranch in what is now a pasture. The ranch is presently owned by Mr. and Mrs. Floy V. Hinson of Graham.

The group of local citizens is interested in the history of this area and in restoring as many old historical markers as possible.

Club members noted how color was used in trees, shrubs and plants, with focal points of berries, foliage and bloom. They also observed the four points used in judging gardens which are suitability, utility, economy and beauty.

Gardens must be suitable in terms of the whole family and satisfactory from the standpoint of usefulness.

The garden must be economical in terms of money, labor, time and space, and it must be beautiful and appealing at all seasons of the year.

## Rate Increases Told By Hospital

Certain rate changes were made at Hamilton Hospital this week by the board of trustees according to R. G. Higginbotham, hospital administrator.

In making the announcement of the rate changes Higginbotham said, "Just as everyone in our community is effected by rising cost, additional services, equipment and products, our hospital has experienced these same factors. Price increases have played a vital part in the operation of Hamilton Hospital in the past several months.

"The Medicare Program pays to Hamilton Hospital only cost, not inclusive of allowances for bad debts and charity discounts thus we are only drawing 80 per cent of our billed charges on all Medicare patients, with the remaining 20 per cent being discounted or assumed by Hamilton Hospital, according to Public Law 89-97 (Medicare). At this time Medicare patients represent approximately half of our patient census. With the advent of Medicare, we have found demands made on Hamilton Hospital to change certain parts of our service and operation, each of which has proven to be expensive, in terms of personnel and equipment.

"For the first time, the hospital industry will soon come under the wage and hour regulations, unemployment taxation and additional social security legislation that will have a direct bearing upon the cash expenditures of our institution. Coupled with these is the necessity of vast salary increases, prompted both by wage and hour regulations and by professional group demands for higher salaries and wages. We are proud to elevate our wage scale, not only as it is beneficial to our employees, but as an increased economic asset to Olney. Our wage scale will now be comparable to the hospital industry throughout our state.

"Because it is our desire to maintain our present quality of patient care and to give our patients the best possible treatment, with all our charges based upon our actual cost, it has become necessary that we re-evaluate our present pricing structure and make certain adjustments and charges as these demands are made on our hospital."

Following lunch, each attending chapter gave a skit demonstrating their chapter's program of work for the year.

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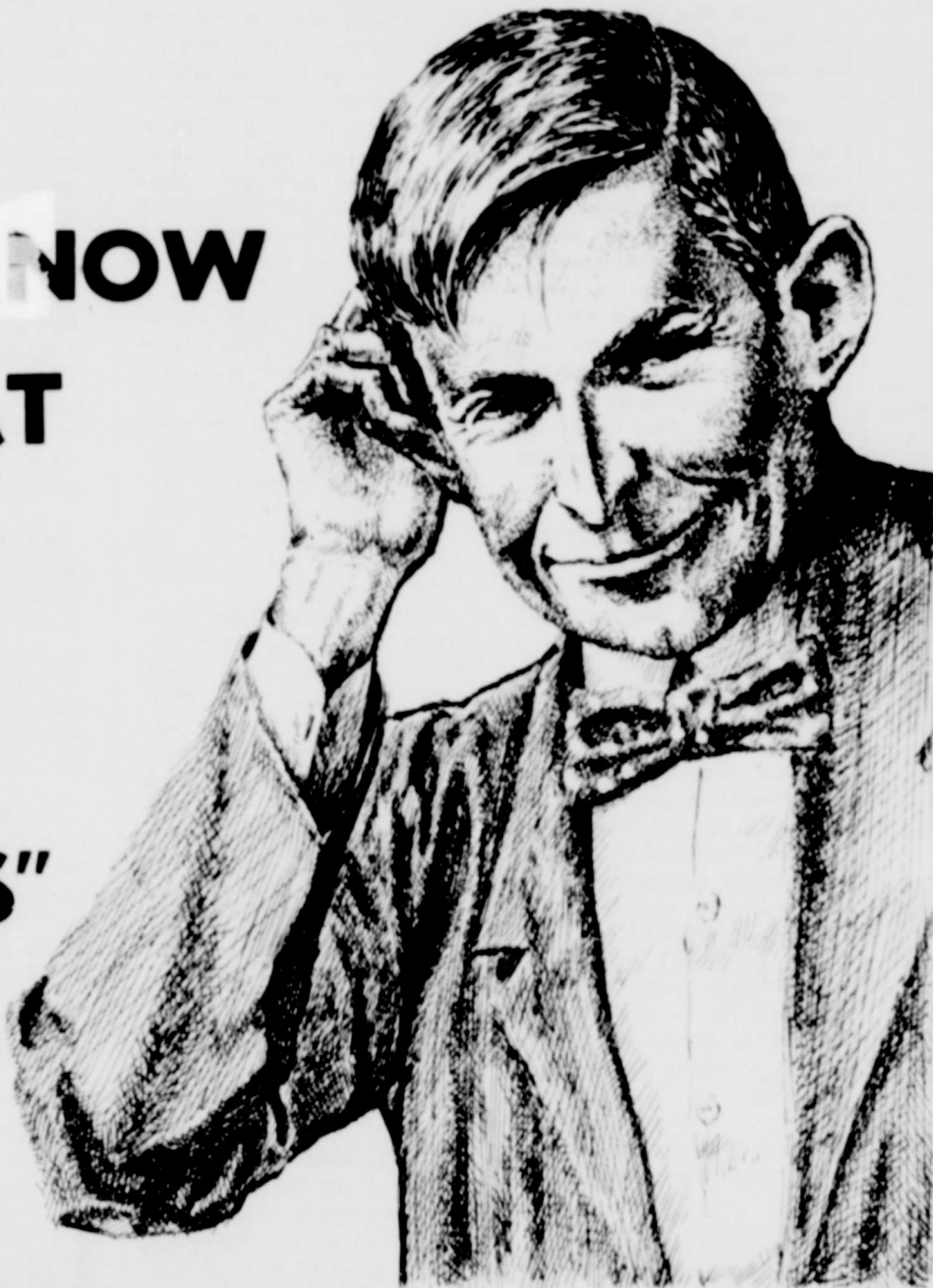
