

# DoD announces FY 1978 budget details

WASHINGTON (AFNS) - Former President Ford's fiscal year 1978 budget will provide real increases in funds for deferred force modernization and continued improvement in readiness of U.S. forces, according to details announced by Secretary of Defense Donald Rumsfeld.

The Department of Defense (DOD) announcement placed total fiscal year 1978 obligational authority at \$123.1 billion, an increase of nearly \$13 billion in the baseline program.

According to DOD officials, defense-related outlays are

estimated at \$110.1 billion. At this level, defense represents 25 per cent of the total federal budget and 5.4 per cent of the gross national product.

The budget has reduced or eliminated programs which DOD says contribute marginally to defense objectives and has placed a number of restraints in some estimates in order to offset cost of essential improvements.

Total defense manpower (civilian and military) has been held below the fiscal year 1977 level and the military construction program has been partially halted pending a

review of long-term facilities and base-structure needs.

Highlights of the budget of particular interest to Air Force personnel are as follows:

#### Forces

- Strategic missile force levels will remain constant in fiscal year 1978. By the end of fiscal year 1978, the force will consist of 450 Minuteman II missiles, 550 Minuteman III missiles, 54 Titan II missiles, 10 Polaris submarines and 32 Poseidon submarines.

- The number of B-52 and FB-111 squadrons will remain at 24.

- The Air Force will continue with plans to bring the 26 tactical fighter wings currently in the active force structure up to strength. During the period fiscal year 1977 to the end of fiscal year 1978, one F-4, two A-7 and one F-105 squadrons will be replaced by three F-15 and two A-10 squadrons.

#### Manpower

- Military manpower will increase by 2,000 in fiscal year 1978. This is primarily related to an overall increase in nuclear security forces, partially offset by decreases in other support activities.

- Civilian manpower will decrease by 5,000 in fiscal year 1978.

#### Major Budget Changes

- Real increased investment is programmed for F-16, F-15, and F-14 fighter aircraft, the B-1 bomber and the advanced tanker/cargo aircraft.

- There will be program growth of \$9 billion in research, with major effort being applied to the Navy air combat fighter (F-18), the Air Force and Navy cruise missiles, vertical/short takeoff and landing technology and programs, the Army attack helicopter, Air Force M-X missile, the Air Force space shuttle and research and exploratory development for all the military services.

- In real terms, the total obligational authority for military personnel will decline by \$100 million. This represents an increase of \$145 million for the reserve components and a decrease of \$245 million for the active forces.

The reduction in active-forces monies reflects a further reduction in the proportion of officer to enlisted personnel and a decline in permanent-change-of-station costs.

## Credits for PME may be forthcoming

Randolph AFB, Tex. (ATCPS) - Air Training Command (ATC) Professional Military Education (PME) Program has been accepted as a candidate for accreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS) Commission on Occupational Education Institutions (COEI). As an institution, the program includes PME centers at 13 command bases.

As a candidate for accreditation, ATC PME will undergo an evaluation to determine if it meets not only the needs of students, community, and employers, but also the standards of quality of the occupational commission.

The evaluation process includes self-study by the assistant for Professional Military Education, deputy chief of staff for Personnel, Headquarters ATC, Randolph AFB, Tex. The evaluation process also requires review by a visiting team of professional educators representing the SACS member occupational institutions.

Because of the numbers and geo-

graphical separation of the ATC base PME centers, the self-study process may not be completed until mid-1978. However, earlier completion is a goal.

Beginning this month (January), graduates of ATC PME phase III will be given college credits by the Community College of the Air Force. The credits will be given also to approximately 6,000 NCOs who have already completed the ATC PME program.

Founded in 1895, the Southern Association is a voluntary, non-governmental agency composed of more than 10,000 colleges and universities, occupational institutions, and secondary and elementary schools. It is one of six regional accrediting associations in the United States and encompasses 11 southern states from Virginia to Texas.

The purpose of regional accreditation is to improve the quality of education. Each member institution must carry on a continuing program of improvement and undergo periodic reevaluations.

## Black honored as NCO of Quarter

TSgt. Leander Black of the 64th Organizational Maintenance Squadron (OMS) has been selected as NCO of the Quarter.

Sergeant Black is a 13 year veteran of the Air Force and is presently acting as assistant NCO In Charge of the Inspection Branch of OMS. 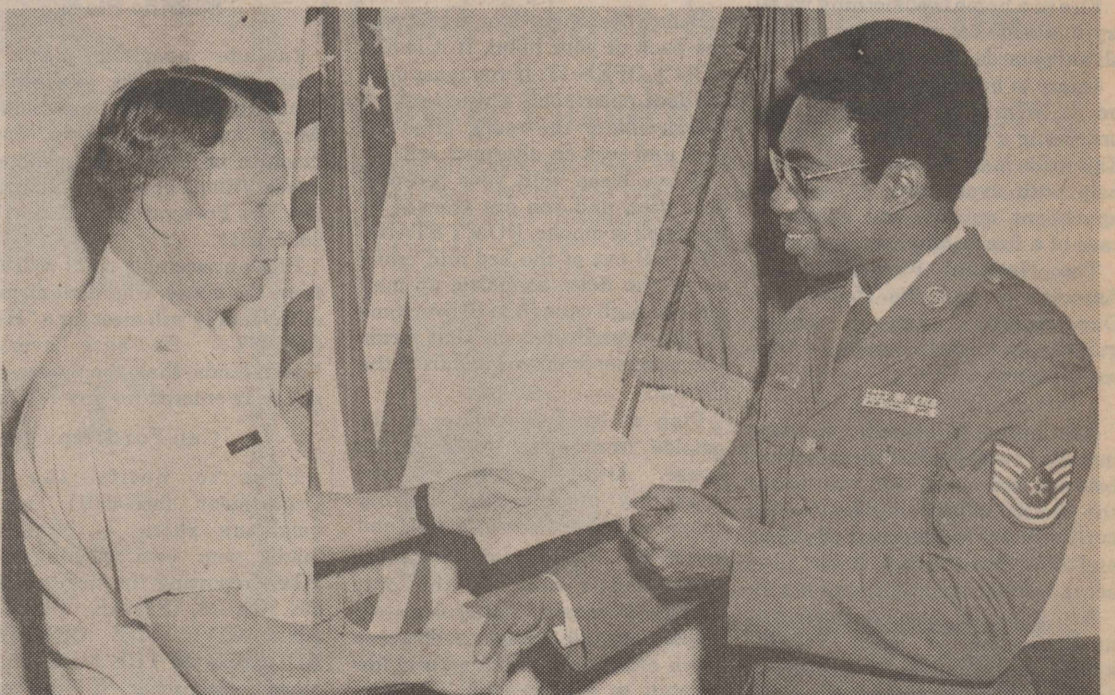
In addition to his regular duties, Sergeant Black is the Branch Precision Measurement Equipment Laboratory (PMEL) and Vehicle

One of our biggest problems is communications. I've said it before and, unfortunately, it's still true. There should be a continuous flow of ideas throughout the base concerning current policies, programs, and our mutual problems. This flow must be two-way, and the communications process must be complete so that information is not lost in the process. While we would hope that the chain of command would work so well that all communications requirements would be satisfied, unfortunately, that is not the case. As a result, we have a number of additional channels for working out our problems, such as the Complaints System, the IG, and the Human Relations Council (HRC). Today, I'm going to talk about the HRC.

This council is one of the most

productive groups on this base. Membership of the HRC provides a cross section of all of our people, and is composed of at least 50% in the grades of E-4 and below. At least one-third of the representatives are women and minority people. Each representative is nominated for appointment to the HRC by Social Actions, approved by me, and then receives special training from our Social Actions people. The duties of the HRC are to discuss problems and irritants that have base-wide impact; to circulate among work areas to identify such problems; to discuss and work out tentative solutions; and to brief me, our unit commanders, and other base people on council activities and recommendations.

The HRC is generally not an

action agency but works to identify base-wide problems which are out of the purview of the unit commanders. In the formal open meetings with the HRC, we discuss problems that they have identified, and examine the roots of the problem to determine possible solutions. While the HRC is not intended as an action agency, from time to time I have asked them to work specific people problems both on and off base.

All commanders need feed-back concerning their operation. In this instance, the HRC provides me with feed-back about problems of general application concerning our base climate for human growth and development. They do much more than that however, in that they provide positive recommendations to effect solutions to the problems that

they have identified. I have stated before, and do so again, I am very pleased with their track record. I believe that they have identified and we have resolved a number of the worse irritants to the people of Reese. They provide a welcomed means of communications, one that I'm very pleased to have, one that gives you another avenue for resolving your problems where they have common application.

Word to Wives

Colds: most frequent childhood sickness

Probably the most frightening incident of any parent's life is to have a sick child. One of the most frequently found illnesses at this time of year is the common cold.

Take this typical case as an example of what happens and what you should do when your infant has a cold.

Usually your baby's first symptom will be a low-grade temperature, 100.06 degrees to 102.6 degrees rectally, for two days. There is only one way to know how high it gets. Use a thermometer. You can't be accurate by just feeling the baby.

The baby then becomes fussy, eats poorly and coughs when lying face up. The nose is at first stuffy and

after 24 to 48 hours drains clear mucus which later becomes white and then yellowish or greenish white.

If your baby runs a rectal temperature above 101 degrees for more than 24 hours, consult your pediatrician. Otherwise, the following procedure will prove helpful in treating colds or respiratory infections in an infant under one year of age.

First, remove nasal secretions with an infant-sized ear bulb syringe before feedings, naptime, bedtime and during the night, if needed.

Then, put into each nostril six to eight drops of a solution of one teaspoon of salt and one pint of boiled water that has cooled.

Also, keep the baby on its

abdomen most of the time, in order for the secretions to drain out of the chest. Elevate the head of the mattress at a slight angle to aid in drainage.

If coughing is severe, a cool mist humidifier can be used or, if easier, steam the baby 10 minutes every four hours by turning the shower on hot in the bathroom, getting the room steamy and holding the baby in your lap in the room during the steaming period.

During the first fussy, feverish 48 hours, Tylenol or aspirin can be given at the following dosages: Tylenol, one half dropperfull every four to six hours for two- to six-month-old children; or one dropperfull every four to six hours for six months to one year olds. For those one to three years old, two

dropperfulls every four to six hours.

Also, one grain of baby aspirin for children 10 years and under. For a child more than one year old, the above suggestions, plus an increase in the amount of water and fruit juices, should be tried. If these prove ineffective, you should pick up the

child's medical records and see a doctor for some decongestant.

Keep in mind that a cold is caused by a virus infection that cannot be cured by any known antibiotic. The average cold in an infant under one year of age lasts six to eight days. In an older child, it sometimes will linger a little longer.

Practicing a fire escape plan can prevent injury to family

Fire in a home is something we all try to avoid. Yet sometimes despite all safeguards fire erupts.

Injury to household members can be minimized by regularly practicing a family fire escape plan. Exit drills in the home (EDITH) can help with evacuating a home or apartment quickly and safely in case of a fire or other emergency.

The National Fire Protection Association and the Reese Fire Department suggest these guidelines to help set-up a fire escape plan.

An approved smoke detector installed outside of a bedroom door, between bedrooms, and the rest of the house offers occupants the earliest possible detection of smoke and fire. Most lethal home fires occur between midnight and 6 a.m.

As part of the programmed modernization of Reese Village, smoke detectors will be installed in each residence by the Air Force. In addition, having some simple signal device (like a police-type whistle) at each persons' bedside will help

arouse everyone if a fire is suspected before the smoke detector sounds an alarm.

Before opening a door, feel it with the back of your hand. If it is hot, DON'T OPEN IT. If you must open the door, open it only an inch or so. If smoke enters the room, close the door and seek an alternate exit.

If you sleep with your bedroom door open and you are aroused by the smell of smoke, DON'T STAND UP. Roll out of the bed and crawl along the floor. Standing up may put you high enough to be overcome by the superheated air that forms and progresses downward from the ceiling.

Plan at least two routes to the outside from every room in the house. Always allow for the possibility of fire and choking smoke and fumes blocking halls and stairways.

A window may be the only alternate escape route from an upper-floor. Be sure exit windows work easily and are large and low enough to get through. Use any available porch, shed, or garage roof to reach safety. If needed, install an escape ladder. If possible, assign

children to bedrooms which offer easy rooftop or ladder escape routes.

Specific Plans

Include specific plans for evacuating infants, disabled, or invalid members of a household who would need special help. Totally disabled or bedridden members in Reese Village should be reported to the Fire Prevention Section at Ext. 2868/2311.

Pick an assembly point well away from the house, where all members of the family will meet for a "HEAD COUNT." Be sure everyone understands that the house must not be re-entered for any reason.

Call For Help

Plan to notify the Fire Department (885-4501) from a neighbors phone — NOT from inside your own burning home. When reporting the fire by phone, BE CALM, SPEAK CLEARLY AND GIVE THE COMPLETE ADDRESS OF THE FIRE. Tell the alarm dispatcher if all family members are accounted for. In duplex homes, notify neighbors of the presence of fire.

# Credit Cards help clubs stall cash flow problems

Editors Note: This is the second article of a series on the use of Credit Cards in the Open Messes, Package Store and Child Care Center. This article further explains the system and answers questions that have been called in concerning the system.

How does the credit card system benefit the clubs? The primary benefit would be the increase in the cash flow. A good example to explain this cash flow problem would be merchandise bought and charged at the package store.

A customer purchases goods worth \$50.00 from the store in the first week of December and charges it to his club bill. The sale ticket eventually ends up on the 3rd floor of Bldg. 800 in the accounts receivable section and is added to the buyers club bill. The bills are sent by mail to the individual or are available at the clubs by the end of December. The individual who made the purchase may not pay for the charges that occurred on Dec. 5 until approximately Jan. 15. The cost of the goods bought for \$50.00 was absorbed by the package store for 40 days, which is a very poor cash flow.

Under the new system, the cost of the merchandise that was charged on Dec. 5 can be redeemed by the package store through Bank Americard within 3 days from time of purchase. The result is a far better

cash flow which can be utilized for payments and savings.

An added benefit to the member would be the amount of payments due when the bill is received. Presently, if a member charged the sum of \$100.00 during a billing period, he would have to pay the full amount due upon receipt of the bill. Under the credit card system, the member would have the choice of paying in full, paying 10 per cent of the total or \$10.00 which ever is higher. Interest will be charged only on accounts which are not paid in full within 25 days following billing date.

The following questions were called in the past week:

If I already have a Bank Americard, will I have to apply for another one?

No, the individuals who already have a current Bank Americard will only be required to put their current card number on the application form. The charges and club bill will be included on their monthly bill.

If I am TDY or on leave, how will I be able to prove that I am a club member if the Bank Americard has no distinguishing features from any other Bank Americard?

This is a problem and the present solution is for the clubs to issue a separate card that can be shown upon request at you local club or other club. The issuing bank for Bank Americard is not permitted to put any additional information on the card such as Reese Open Mess and etc.

## Foundation offers contest for ROTC

WASHINGTON, D.C., January 12 - The Aerospace Education Foundation has announced its fifth annual Air Force Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (ROTC) contest on "The Imperatives of National Readiness."

Students enrolled in junior ROTC programs in high schools throughout the country will compete for the first prize \$4,000 scholarship.

Foundation President Dr. William Ramsey said key defense leaders consider national readiness critical to America's deterrent strength. "Not only should young people be aware of this concept, but all Americans should understand it," he said. "National readiness combines many elements all relating to America's ability to respond to threats. Equipment, manpower, natural resources and national will are among them," he noted.

According to Dr. Ramsey, students may use any format to explain to the public any element of the theme or a combination. "The topic is too broad for comprehensive treatment, so we're encouraging students to be selective. What they choose to explore will be weighed by the judges," Dr. Ramsey said.

Contest rules allow a variety of formats including essays, scripts, playlets, audio presentations, video-

tapes and sound-slide productions.

To help students with the topic, the Foundation forwarded to all AFJROTC units a speech by Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. David C. Jones and has forwarded the Air Force Association's 1977 Policy Statement and Policy Paper on Force Modernization and Readiness along with other reference materials.

To date, 142 schools have entered the contest. Entries are due at the Foundation's Washington headquarters by March 5, 1977.

Judging will take place in April by nationally-known experts in fields relating to the subject. Of five runners-up, a national winner will be chosen according to certain criteria laid down in the contest announcement. The winning unit will receive a \$4,000 scholarship to a post-secondary school and the scholarship may be awarded to one person or divided among a maximum of four chosen by the unit.

The school also will receive a distinctive plaque, and its winning entry will be shown at the Association's Aerospace Briefings and Displays scheduled in Washington next September.

Four runners-up will receive plaques and 20 honorable mentions will receive certificates.

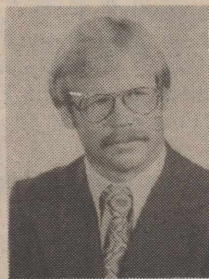
## Head Start begins Tues. in two Lubbock locations



# Supply AA unit responsible for organizational equipment

The Allowance and Authorization Unit (A and A), a division of the Equipment Management Branch is run by Mrs. Erlene Stolk, the A&A Unit Supervisor. A&A is a very import division within the entire supply complex, because it is through this unit that all organizational equipment custodians must

come to order equipment type items.

Mrs. Stolk, who serves in the grade of GS-7, is assisted by SSgt. Leslie Stramel, the NCOIC of A&A, and A1C Calvin Shelby, the A&A Clerk, in performing such tasks as authorizing custodian requests in accordance with the Tables of Allowance (TA's) which are

applicable to the specific requesting activities. This job involves comparing the paperwork submitted by the custodian with the TA for that particular organization to be sure that the organization is indeed authorized to have the equipment requested.

If the custodian's request is authorized, it is then processed by the A&A Unit into the 1050-II computer system. Based on urgency of need for an equipment item, a custodian can be authorized a priority request which the supply depot will consider before other routine requests. In this way, the custodian is able to coordinate with the A&A Unit in order to insure timely delivery of mission essential equipment.

The A&A Unit is vital to the overall supply operation. By monitoring organization requests, this unit insures that each organization is fully equipped to perform its mission without being overequipped, resulting in excesses and unnecessary expenditure of government funds.



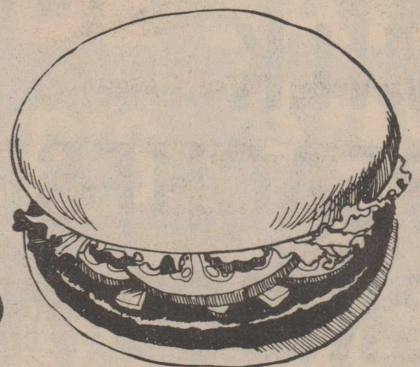

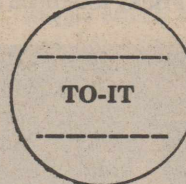
**54th gets around to it**

**MAINTENANCE CORNER**

**Tips T'ops**  
 We thought it would be worthwhile to pass on to all concerned some often overlooked fact about tachometers and gyros. It seems that after a tach has sat overnight and a low temperature drop occurs, the lubricant on the small bearing becomes thicker (or tacky, if you'll forgive me) and on engine start will cause the pointer to fluctuate. Many times, continuing to operate the engine will allow the lubricant to warm up and the fluctuations will cease.

The same thing happens to gyros. If the attitude gyros don't completely erect on a cold morning, give the system another chance by actuating the fact erection switch. If this sort of thing should happen on the T-38 HSI or the T-37 J-2 compass systems, indicating a heading error, actuate the fast slave switch. Many times these actions will clear up the problem and save a few deviations.

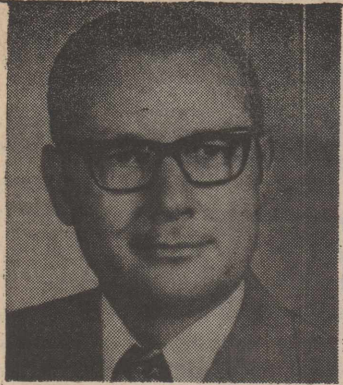

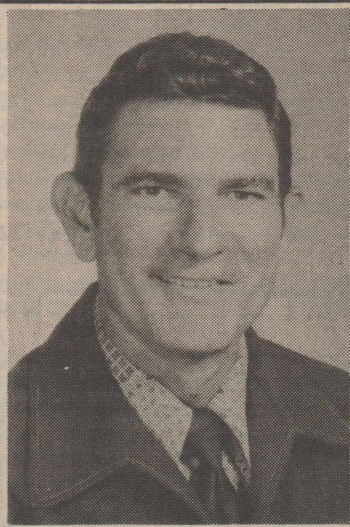

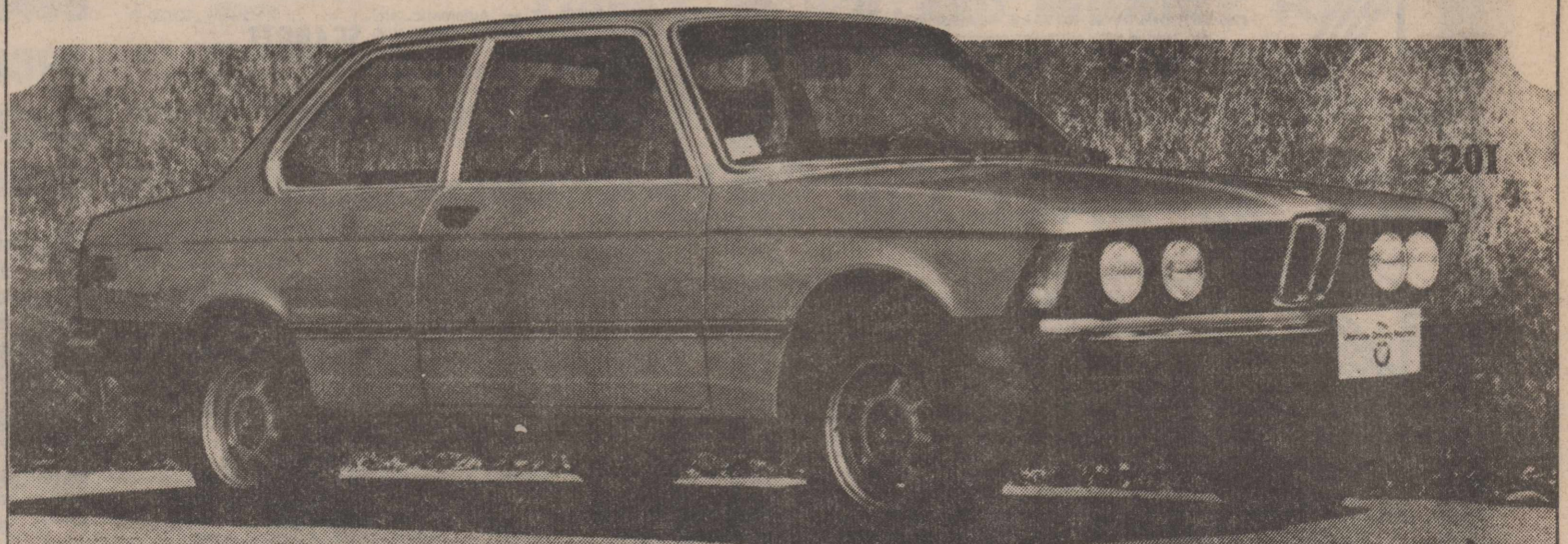
