

Jackson gains Best in Command Award

Best in command says the certificate awarded to SMSgt. Tommie L. Jackson Tuesday.

The presentation was in honor of Sergeant Jackson receiving the Outstanding Air Training Command (ATC) Transportation Noncommissioned Officer of the Year Award. Sergeant Jackson will now compete against other command winners for the Air Force award.

Sergeant Jackson arrived at Reese in June 1976 to find transportation facilities in poor condition, equipment missing or broken, mechanics not properly trained and vehicles in poor condition.

Work begins

After establishing priorities and developing a plan, Sergeant Jackson started

work to correct all discrepancies.

Although facilities were old, Sergeant Jackson did what he could to improve working conditions for his employees. Buildings were painted, light fixtures repaired and improved and safety hazards eliminated.

Not only were the physical properties of the maintenance buildings improved, but layout was also changed to improve work flow and span of control. This resulted in noticeable vehicle improvements which were observed by wing supervisors and ATC personnel.

Acquires needed equipment

Improving the condition of equipment was the next task undertaken by Sergeant Jackson. Spending more than \$54,000 he

had old equipment repaired and newer equipment ordered.

This led to another problem. Most of the mechanics didn't know how to properly use the new equipment and tools. Sergeant Jackson solved this problem by establishing weekly training classes for the mechanics. He developed lesson plans, obtained qualified instructors, and personally supervised the overall training program.

The benefits were immediately realized by the increased Vehicle In Commission (VIC) rated and decreased quality control rejects.

Sergeant Jackson also arranged for mechanics to attend technical schools to become specialized mechanics. A Field Training Detachment course from

Chanute AFB, Ill. was also established here.

Plan works

His plan was working. Facilities and working conditions were improved, proper tools and equipment were available, and mechanics were properly trained. Soon the VIC rate began to climb. The Air Force standard VIC rate is 90 per cent. Reese has maintained a 93 per cent VIC rate for the past nine months.

Reese had another man selected as best in command. Maj. James J. Schweitzer won the Outstanding ATC Officer of the Year Award.

Major Schweitzer was commander of the Transportation Division from June 1976-June 1977.

'Rivet Save' chops 600 missile crew positions

WASHINGTON (AFNS) — The Strategic Air Command (SAC) has begun a program to reduce Minuteman intercontinental ballistic missile crew requirements by about one-third by April 1978.

Nicknamed Rivet Save, the program is expected to cut about 600 crewmember authorizations and produce annual savings of more than \$14 million. The manpower reductions and the savings are made possible through changes in launch control equipment.

Under Rivet Save, missile crews cannot take launch actions until they receive a launch directive with a special code. In addition, a two-

officer crew cannot launch a missile without cooperative launch actions by another crew in a separate launch facility.

The changes eliminate the requirement for two missile crews to be on duty at the same time. Air Force officials say similar reductions are not being planned for Titan II missile crews.

Minuteman sites are located at Malmstrom AFB, Mont.; Ellsworth AFB, S.D.; Whiteman AFB, Mo.; F.E. Warren AFB, Wyo.; and Grand Forks and Minot AFBs, N.D.

Personnel no longer required for crew duty at those sites may retrain into other career fields or move into

missile staff officer positions.

Before Rivet Save, SAC Minuteman crews stood a 36- or 40-hour tour of duty. While one two-man crew was on alert in the underground launch control center, another two-man crew rested in an above-ground alert building. The crews would change places about every 12 hours.

Under the new system, one crew will spend a 24-hour duty period in the underground center. One crewmember will be allowed to rest in the center during portions of the alert tour.

Alert crews will be relieved by personnel reporting directly from main operating bases.

Human Relations Council meets

Members research problems in barracks, entertainment

Agenda items covered in the July 7 meeting of the Human Relations Council (HRC) were occupant space in the dormitories, the need for more outside entertainment and HRC members speaking in Commander's Calls.

Amn Kandy Jennings, 64th ABGP, will act as coordinator on the occupant space problem in the dormitories. First Lt. Kathleen Foy, 64th Supply and Sgt. Ronald Boone, 64th Student Squadron will assist her in researching the existing regulation and its implementation here. They will study complaints by residents, compile suggestions to the problem and the effects these suggestions would have on the base if implemented.

Entertainment studied

In the area of base entertainment, it was suggested by some of the

members to have more outside activities such as the sidewalk dance held during the July 4th weekend. This form of entertainment was very popular as evidenced by the large number of people attending. The council will look into this subject to see if more outside entertainment is feasible and worthwhile.

The council members are giving themselves publicity by speaking during their Commander's Calls, telling squadron personnel what the HRC is and what it is trying to do for Reese personnel. Nearly all the members have spoken at these sessions and have been received favorably.

The HRC works for you, the people of Reese, in bringing to light problem areas on Reese or in the local community and acts as a sounding board for irritants and problems that have a basewide impact. They address the major

areas of education and training, utilization and sustainment of all base personnel. If you know of or have a problem or irritant with a basewide impact, help yourself by contacting your local HRC representative.

AF expands training for women

WASHINGTON (AFNS) — The Air Force will expand its test program for women in undergraduate pilot training. Applications are due at the Air Force Military Personnel Center by Sept. 30 for the nine training positions scheduled to be selected in October.

The women will be selected from active duty women officers, commissioned Air Force Reserve Officers Training Corps graduates waiting entry on active duty and women in the reserve forces.

Training is tentatively scheduled to begin in February 1978.

The women must be less than 27½ years old as of the October selection date, meet medical standards outlined in Air Force Manual 160-1 and be medically certified for flying training.

One Air National Guard, one Air Force Reserve and 18 Air Force women were selected last year for the test program. The first women are scheduled to complete undergraduate pilot training in September 1977.

CONSERVATION

Conservation is the cornerstone of President Carter's proposed national energy plan for dealing with "the greatest domestic challenge this Nation will face in our lifetime." The President's plan calls for individual citizens to participate actively in reducing energy waste and inefficiency by cutting gas consumption in automobiles, insulating homes, and using electrical appliances only as necessary.

SMALLER CARS

Americans are being asked to buy small cars that use less gas, and President Carter has warned that "Those citizens who insist on driving large, unnecessarily powerful cars must expect to pay more for that luxury." A tax penalty/

rebate system would provide increased incentive. For example, if a person buys a 1978 car that gets 12.0 but less than 12.5 miles per gallon of gasoline, an excise tax of \$449 would be imposed on that "gas guzzler" for the first year, with a gradual increase each year through 1985, remaining constant thereafter. However, if a new auto buyer selects a car which gets 27.0 miles per gallon, there would be a rebate of \$299.00.

HOME INSULATION

Home insulation may be the most significant, single investment a homeowner will make in terms of saving energy and money. Under the President's program, individuals who take the initiative to weatherize their

homes will be eligible for a tax credit of 25 per cent of the first \$800 invested in insulation and 15 per cent of the next \$1,400. Whether insulating on their own or taking advantage of a weatherization service, homeowners would find that the cost of insulation would soon be offset by the savings on both heating and cooling utility bills.

APPLIANCES

The proposed National Energy Plan asks household appliance users to play an important role in energy conservation. Since the benefits that modern appliances offer must be paid for in energy, avoid convenience electrical gadgets which offer little more than an increase in energy consumption and utility bills.

Be conservation conscious; turn off electric lights, TV, radio, etc., when they are not needed.

Most utility companies suggest that consumers avoid prolonged use of heavy appliances, such as clothes dryers, dishwashers, ovens, etc., during peak-load times, generally in the early morning, late afternoon and early evening hours. Every kilowatt hour not used is energy and money saved.

All citizens—military and civilian—must share the responsibility of guiding the United States into an energy-secure 21st century. Undertaking voluntary conservation efforts now will ensure that future generations of Americans have the energy necessary for survival.

The Department of Mass Communications at Texas Tech University will offer courses for advanced training in the practice and theory of public relations at Reese next fall.

The graduate classes will be open to the public as well as Air Force personnel.

The courses will be taught from 6:30 to 9:30 p.m., Tuesdays and Thursdays. Those enrolling can apply work toward a master's degree in mass communications. Registrants who have undergraduate degrees in fields

other than mass communications will be offered six hours of leveling work.

Two courses will be offered each long semester and two for each of the summer terms.

In addition to public relations theories, cases and practices, the student seeking the master's degree will take courses in journalism, advertising, mass communications theory, research methods, telecommunications and public opinion and propaganda.

The first courses to be offered will deal with advanced journalism problems and with public opinion and propaganda.

"The courses offered at Reese will be the same as those taught on campus," according to Dr. Billy I. Ross, chairperson of Mass Communications.

"We will be rotating the courses, so that those enrolling at Reese will have opportunity to take any offered in the public relations concentration, but so will persons

who prefer to enroll for classes on campus."

The objective, he said, is to educate competent public relations practitioners and managers.

Although the courses will be taught here, students will be enrolled in the Texas Tech University Graduate School.

CHAMPUS names contractor

California firm begins dental claim processing

WASHINGTON (AFNS) — Beginning Aug. 1, 1977, Blue Shield of California will process claims for adjunctive dental care received in most parts of the world by beneficiaries of the Civilian Health and Medical Program of the Uniformed Services (CHAMPUS). The Office of CHAMPUS, Europe (OCHAMPUSEUR) will continue to process claims for adjunctive dental care received in Europe, Africa and the Middle East.

DoD officials have asked affected beneficiaries to begin submitting claims for adjunctive dental care to the new contractor after July 31, 1977, even if the care was received before that date. The address is: Blue Shield of California, P.O. Box 85035, San Diego, Calif. 92138.

Under the law governing CHAMPUS, dental benefits are limited to adjunctive dental care — care that is medically necessary in treating a medical or surgical problem covered by CHAMPUS, is an integral part of such treatment, and is essential for controlling the medical or surgical problem.

The program cannot share the cost of dental care provided solely for dental purposes. Emergency dental care is not covered unless it otherwise qualifies as adjunctive dental care. Orthodontia (straightening of teeth) is not covered except where directly related, and an integral part of, surgical correction of cleft palate.

Examples of adjunctive dental care are:

- Elimination of nonlocal infection such as an infection of a tissue (cellulitis) or infection of a bone (osteitis) that is causing problems related to a medical condition being treated.

- Removal of a tooth or tooth fragments to repair a facial injury.

Except in emergency medical situations, adjunctive dental care must be authorized by CHAMPUS before it is received — it must be preauthorized. The same organizations that process dental claims also process requests for preauthorization.

Some local moves need Base Commanders okay

Making a local area move from base housing, except in conjunction with separation, retirement or PCS orders, requires special permission from the Base Commander.

For example, personnel planning to purchase a home and terminate government quarters should write a letter (in four copies) requesting permission to vacate their base quarters and coordinate it through their squadron commander before presenting it at the housing office. The housing office indorses the letter and sends it to the Base Commander for approval. It is best to be sure approval will be granted before signing any contracts!

Local area moves for other reasons must be coordinated in the same manner.

Once a permissive move has been approved, the requestor must:

- Process through the Housing Referral Office.

- Give at least 40 days notice to the housing office and schedule a pre-final inspection.

- Schedule a final inspection at least 15 days in advance. Basic allowance for quarters will be started as of the date the final inspection is passed.

Permissive moves are made at no expense to the government.

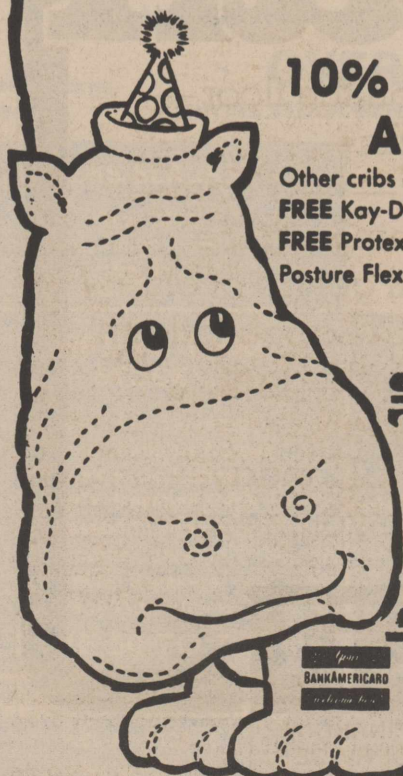
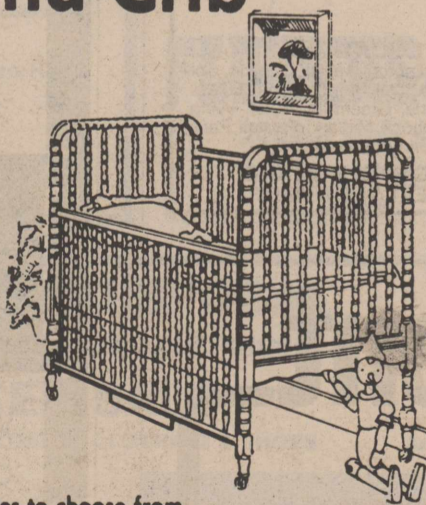

Wills help solve estate problems

A question often asked of an attorney is, "Do I need a will?"

Some persons emphasize that all they own are some of the following: a home, a car, some life insurance, a few shares of stock, a bank account.

As a matter of fact, every adult person should have a properly prepared will. If they have other properties than that mentioned above, then they may have even greater reason to make a will.

Most people realize that a will determines who receives their property at death, can save death tax expense, and can solve or avoid many problems created by death without a will; however, they are not exactly sure what happens if they should die without a will.

Texas is a community property state. If a person whose legal

residence is Texas dies without a will and leaves only community property he should anticipate the following consequences:

- If he has children his wife (or husband) inherits nothing. He or she already owns one-half of the community estate.
- Children take the entire one-half of the community property.
- A wife may have to go to work because her half may not be enough to support her (and she may still have the legal obligation to support the children).
- An administration may be necessary.
- A guardianship may be necessary for the estate of minor children.

Why an administration

An obvious question is, "Why an administration?" Basically, creditors insist on it. Heirs must allege and prove that there is no necessity for an administration to

sue and recover property or damages belonging to a decedent's estate.

An administration is supervised by the probate court and the administrator is whoever the court appoints. A bond is required, and the administration can be a costly procedure; however, such a court-supervised administration can be avoided by a properly drawn will.

A will can avoid probate expense by providing for an independent administration whereby an executor of your choice serves without bond and winds up your estate. At the probate court your executor need only prove up your will and file an inventory, an appraisal, and a list of claims and there is no further court administration. Such independent administration is not possible in all states, but fortunately, Texas probate laws allow for the minimum possible expense when there is a properly drawn will.

A guardianship is necessary if there are minor children and there is no will, for the following reasons:

- To protect the property and rights of the minors.
- To sell their interest in a home or car or stocks.
- To handle the children's money.
- Social Security, Veterans

Administration, and many others require it before they will pay certain benefits.

The probate court appoints the guardian and supervises the appointed guardian. The guardian is required to post a bond, and this bond is an added expense to the estate. This expense also can be avoided by a properly drawn will, and a guardian of the testator's choosing is more likely to be appointed by the probate court.

Nearly 40 per cent drink

National survey shows increase in high school student drinkers

Nearly 40 per cent of junior and senior high school students drink some alcoholic beverage, particularly beer, at least once a week, according to a recent nationwide survey of 13,000 students conducted for the National

Institute on Alcohol and Alcoholism.

Although no other comparable national study of youthful drinking practices has ever been undertaken, comparisons with regional and local studies indicate that this represents a noticeable increase in teenage drinking.

Meanwhile, marijuana is the only illegal drug that continued to show a definite upward use trend from 1975 to 1976, according to a study sponsored by the National Institute on Drug Abuse, and Mental Health Administration.

Use of marijuana by high school seniors during that year's time increased by five per cent, with one-third considering themselves users in 1976 and more than one-half saying they had experimented with marijuana.

The rate of other illegal drug use showed some improvement in 1976. "Although drug abuse continues to be widespread in every region of the country, we are seeing slight downward trends for amphetamines, LSD and

barbiturates," said Dr. Robert DuPont, director of the National Institute on Drug Abuse.

"With the exception of marijuana, the public, including youth, has negative attitudes today toward the use of illicit drugs," Dr. DuPont stated on the basis of the studies.

Drug and alcohol experimentation does not necessarily mean that a youth has a psychological problem and "needs help." Most adolescents do not continue to be regular users. But, for some youths, early alcohol or drug abuse may set a serious pattern for the future.

Unquestionably, the greatest parental influence comes in the example they set. Parents, and all adults, have an opportunity to discourage the use of all drugs—in both words and actions—and to help their children find alternative avenues to excitement and fulfillment. (ADAMHA)

CHAMPUS eligibility extended

Persons under age 65 who were facing a loss of their Civilian Health and Medical Program of the Uniformed Services (CHAMPUS) medical health benefits under a new change to that medical program will now temporarily retain their benefits, the Defense Department has announced.

The people involved include those under age 65 entitled to Medicare hospital insurance — and widowers and husbands who can enroll in Medicare because of their wives employment covered by Social Security.

Under a new CHAMPUS regulation medical benefits would have ended when an individual (other than the dependent of an active duty member) became eligible for the Medicare program's hospital insurance.

Prior to June 1, 1977 persons under age 65 could have both Medicare hospital insurance and keep their CHAMPUS benefit. Their Medicare hospital insurance was free if they were entitled to 25 consecutive months disability benefits, or suffered from chronic renal disease.

However, many of them did not enroll in Medicare's Part B program because it required a monthly payment — and CHAMPUS gave them about the same protection for physician services, outpatient services, etc.

Unfortunately, Medicare regulations state that a person who failed to enroll for Part B at his first chance could then only enroll between January 1 and March 31 of each year. Coverage would follow

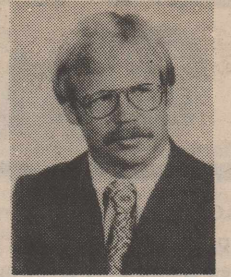
three months later on July 1.

So when the new CHAMPUS regulation took place June 1 of this year people not enrolled in Medicare's Part B program were inadvertently left without medical coverage. They didn't have CHAMPUS coverage — and couldn't enroll in Part B until July 1, 1978.

Now the Defense Department is working with Medicare officials for a special enrollment period for these people. CHAMPUS coverage will continue until the end of this enrollment period, whose dates have not yet been determined.

CHAMPUS eligibility will not be extended or reinstated for anyone else presently over 65 (except for active duty dependents). The special

enrollment period will not be available to them and they will have to wait until Medicare's next regular open enrollment season to arrange for Part B coverage.

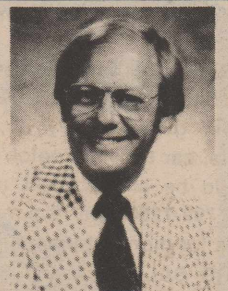

Besides the Mariners, the Lubbock and Big Spring Young Mens Christian Association's competed.

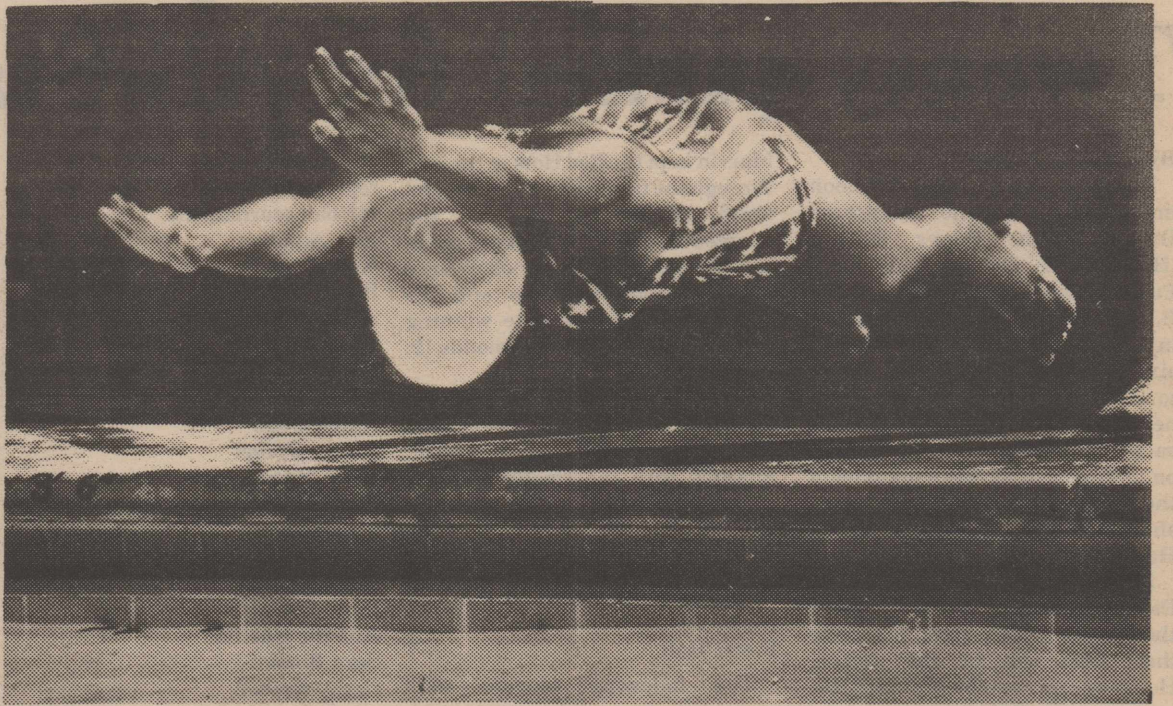
Among the 22 members of the Mariners swimming (listed in last week's ROUNDUP) were Mark Adams, Chris Adams and Marty Fox.

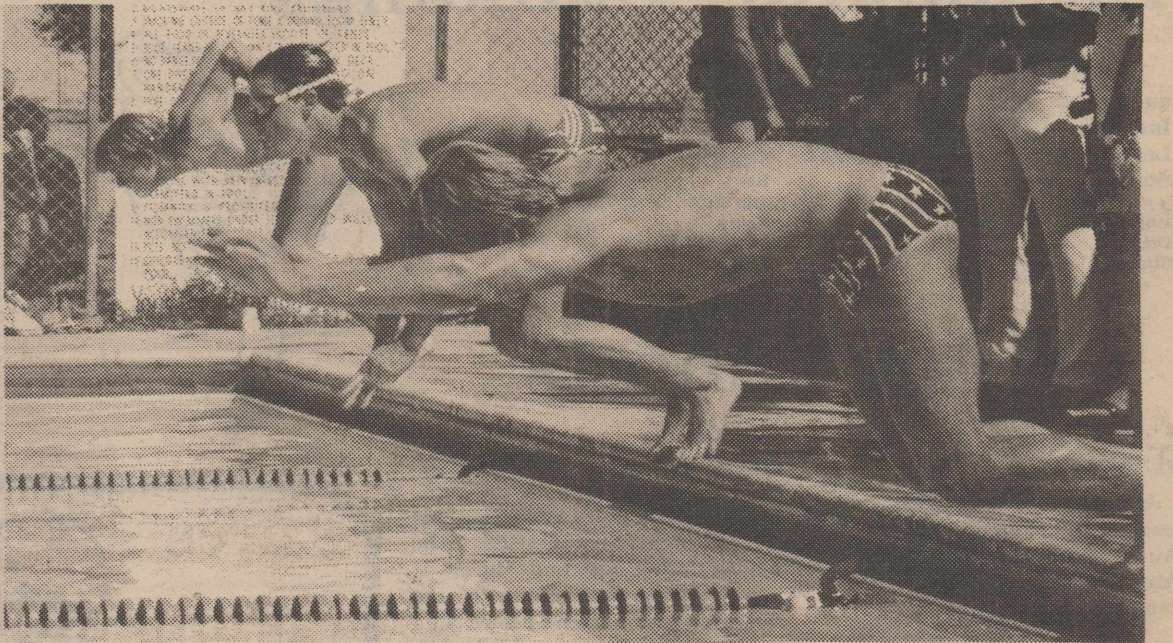
The Mariners next stop is at the AAU Regionals tomorrow in Amarillo where seven of the members will be swimming against teams from all over the South Plains and West Texas area.



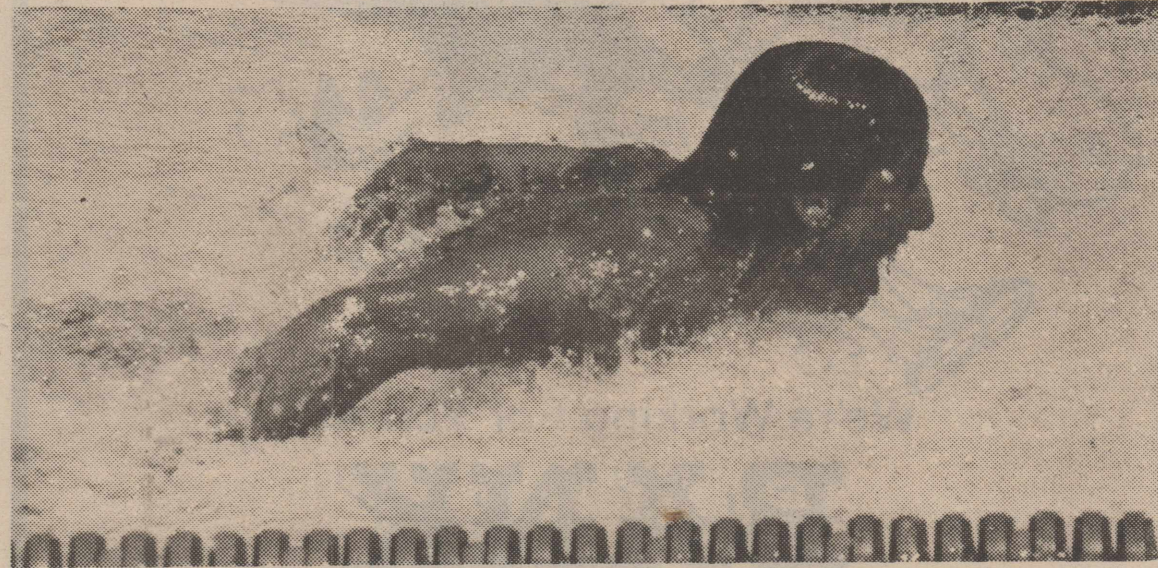

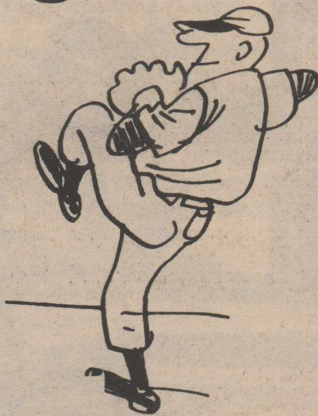

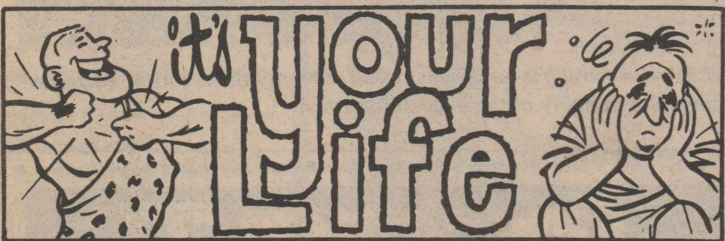

Deep breathing may be fine for some folks as a part of sitting-up exercises, but it's dangerous and may be fatal as a preliminary to swimming.

Too much deep breathing can cause hyperventilation and unconsciousness, says the Red Cross. Hyperventilation stems from an excessive rate and depth of breathing which leads to abnormal loss of carbon dioxide in the blood.

When you hyperventilate, you increase your breath-holding time by blowing off carbon dioxide in your blood. When the carbon dioxide content is lowered,

the stimulus for taking a breath is decreased.

When you try to swim underwater for a long time after hyperventilating, the oxygen content of your body may decline to a point where you will lose consciousness before the carbon dioxide builds up enough to stimulate the breathing action. Unless someone is around to help you to the surface, you will drown.

The Red Cross warns especially against competition among children or even adults to see how long they can hold their breath and stay under water.
