Campaign to help others begins

Now is the time of the year when we are asked to do our part toward helping others. The Combined Federal Campaign (CFC) officially starts Tuesday and runs through Oct. 31.

Your unit project officer or keyworker already has the forms to assist you with your contribution. Take a minute to seriously consider what your dollars do for others less fortunate than you and for you and your family.

Agencies helped

The CFC supports 52 local, national and international agencies. It also provides aid and services to millions of people each year. A few of the agencies who receive a portion of your "fair share" may be familiar; Red Cross, Mental Health Association, March of Dimes for Birth Defects, American Cancer Society, United Services Organization (USO), CARE, Reese Dependent Youth Activities, Save the Children Foundation, Well Baby Clinic, Heart Association, Lubbock Day Nurseries, Rape Crisis Center, Boy Scouts of America, Girl Scouts, Salvation Army, Young Women's Christian Association (YWCA), plus many more.

These organizations assist homeless children, help persons afflicted with crippling diseases, provide youth with a healthy environment, assist the old, and aid us all in the time of disaster or emergency.

CFC is the ONE opportunity you have during the year to make a meaningful contribution to help cure disease and make the world a better place to live for us all.

Reese's goal

Reese's goal this year is \$60,000, but we hope to exceed this. The only way we can do this is for everyone, military and civilian, no matter what your rank or grade, to be generous. Unit project officers can tell you what your "fair share" should be.

This year, as in the past, there will be two methods of donating to the CFC. The easiest method is the payroll withholding. Each month a selected amount is withheld from your paycheck and sent directly to CFC. The withholding would begin with the first check in January. Postal service

I have two questions. First, I would like to know why the Post Office is not open on Saturdays and why it is closed for more than half the day. Some people have to work odd hours and can't get to the Post Office. Other bases I have been at keep the Post Office open 24 hours a day and put mail up on Saturdays.

Secondly, I went to check on a letter that might have come registered. There was no slip in my box and when I asked the lady to check for me, she said if there isn't a slip in the box, there is no letter. I asked if they could make a mistake and if she could check. She said they were perfect and would not check.

I feel we deserve better postal service than this.

The Base Post Office is operated by a civilian contract that is negotiated by the U.S. Postal Service. This contract does not provide for Saturday service at Reese because the Postal Service does not provide mail delivery to the base on Saturday. Consequently, there is no mail for our military postal personnel to distribute on that day.

The lobby of the Post Office is, however, open every Saturday from 9 a.m.-3 p.m. for access to mail boxes. We would very much like to resume leaving the building open 24 hours a day, but our past experience of vandalism and malicious destruction advises against it.

The civilian contract Postal Service receives and controls all registered mail delivered to the base; the volume of which is very small. On the day of your inquiry, there was no registered mail on hand. The postal contractor knew this and it seemed pointless to look into an empty box. I believe, however, that the procedure by which customers are notified when they receive accountable mail was explained to you.

In all fairness, Charles and Dorothy Pendergrass (the contractor), have continually gone beyond the scope of their contract to provide additional service to our community, such as money orders, copy service, assistance to stamp collectors, and advise on domestic and foreign mail.

I might add that their reimbursement will never make them millionaires and frankly, this is the first complaint I've seen that reflects on their service.

Is there a club

Would it be possible to start an archery club on base? Is there a Rod and Gun Club here? I heard that there is but I called around and cannot seem to find it. Is there

a president or any way to get in contact with them? My last question is if there is going to be a skeet range put on base.

Reese people can also take pride in joining our surrounding communities in a very rewarding Muscular Dystrophy Telethon. It was one of the most successful ever. Now it is time to pick up the challenge to chard into our Combined Federal Campaign (CFC).

CFC - A need - A challenge

Tuesday begins our annual Combined Federal Campaign which runs until Oct. 31. Our goal for the base this year is \$60,000 - a part of the overall Lubbock United Way goal of \$1.46 million.

Each year, we ask for your financial support of the agencies under the United Way umbrella, as well as the National Health Agencies and the International Services Agencies. In addition to the benefits to people in the Reese/Lubbock area, there are many benefits that come directly to the base.

Reese youth activities are direct beneficiaries of the campaign. The base Youth Center, alone, will receive \$9,250 to provide activities for dependent children.

The Lubbock Boy Scout Council will receive \$123,711 to support their programs which include our Reese troop and our Reese people in downtown troops. The Boy Scouts' requirements are again included in the United Way goal this year, so there will not be a separate Boy Scout fund drive. The girls are not neglected either, as area Girl Scouts will receive some \$70,098 to support their programs. You may recall the recent article in *The Roundup* which showed the daily activities of the Reese Red Cross providing emergency leave and financial aid for military people in need of help. In addition to the on-base activities, last year the downtown Red Cross provided emergency assistance to an additional 912 military people, including grants and interest-free loans of more than \$8,588. So, as you can see, a big part of that \$60,000 goal goes directly to our people, on base and downtown.

Besides the direct benefit to our children through on-base programs, the immunization programs carried out by the Well Baby Clinic downtown have

proven a key factor in precluding any epidemics of diseases developing locally. We can all be thankful for that. There are a host of agencies which provide services to people in need, and many of these affect us and our families.

There is also an indirect benefit from the money spent on research and funds to be available if tragedies should affect our families. When a natural disaster hits, the entire community can be affected; the Red Cross becomes immediately involved in the provision of food, clothing, shelter, and medical assistance. The tornado that hit Lubbock in 1970 is a good example of how close to home a natural catastrophe can strike. The Red Cross spent \$750,000 on that one disaster alone.

We have set an ambitious, but obtainable, goal this year. Everyone should join in our Combined Federal Campaign to show that "we care" and that we want to help people throughout our community. Don't assume that someone else will do your part in this campaign; participate, contribute, give a fair share, be an active part of helping people. Any of us could need assistance in the future. All of us share a responsibility to be ready to provide help when and where it is needed.

Although our Combined Federal Campaign runs until Oct. 31, I would like us to accept a challenge to reach our goal one week from Tuesday — that is, by Sept. 20. If we do not procrastinate and do make our commitment early through a generous payroll deduction pledge, we can meet this challenge and set an example of which we can be proud. Please respond quickly to your Project Officers, and help put Reese "over the top"!

- Lt. Gen. (Ret.) Elwood R. Quesada, the highest-ranking Hispanic American to have service in the Air Force.
- Maj. Gen. (Ret.) Salvador E. Felices, a U.S. Military Academy graduate and former commander of 16th Air Force.
- Brig. Gen. Bernard Ardisana, former vice commander of the Air Force Security Service and presently assistant deputy director for operations of the National Security Agency at Ft. Meade, Md.
- Brig. Gen. Belisario D. J. Flores, assistant adjutant of the

Texas Air National Guard.

- Maj. (Ret.) Manuel J. Fernandez, one of the leading jet aces of the Korean War with 14 victories over MiG-15s.
- CMSgt. Abel Araiza, a military assistant to the President.
- MSgt. Ricardo Inzunza, an Air Force Headquarters social actions superintendent and one of the Air Force's 12 Outstanding Airmen for 1976.
- SSgt. Ralph J. Gallegos Jr., a personnel technician at the Air Reserve Personnel Center, Denver, and one of the 12 Outstanding Airmen for 1977.
- Sgt. Sabina F. Coronado, an aerospace ground equipment operator at Edwards AFB, Calif.; and one of the 12 Outstanding Airmen for 1977.

These people are just a few of the many Hispanic American men and women who have made and continue making significant contributions to the Air Force.

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Chaplains Corner

I don't think I'll ever forget the feeling I had one day early in my Air Force career when I was in pilot training. I had climbed into the back seat of the T-28 trainer that day to start training in instrument flying.

Full of confidence in my own abilities to be able to do anything asked of me by the instructor pilot that day I flew the aircraft in a series of smooth climbing turns to an altitude where he directed me to level-off. He then took control of the aircraft and advised me that it was time for me to experience what he called "unusual attitudes" in flight, and further, that I was to return the airplane to "straight and level flight".

The first few maneuvers were gentle and easy . . . but they became progressively more difficult . . . until suddenly, I was in a steep, roaring, ear-splitting dive. The engine was howling as the airspeed increased . . . and the wind rushing past the canopy was booming in intensity.

When I realized what was happening I pulled back abruptly on the control stick and discovered another sensation that was new to me. My vision was blurred, and I could barely see the instrument panel that would indicate whether I was still upside-down or right-side-up. Pilots call it a variety of names . . .

blacking-out, graying-out, or gun-barrel vision. My body felt like it weighed a ton as the nose of the airplane came up through the horizon.

As my head cleared, I suddenly realized that the instructor's hand was gently but firmly on the control in the front seat. I remember now how thankful I was that he was there because he wouldn't have let me go completely out of control. That assurance helped to renew my own confidence, and we continued through several more unusual attitude maneuvers and recoveries.

You may not have experienced such a fright in your own life, but then maybe you have in a different way. There are moments when everything around us seems to be out-of-place, out-of-control, and destruction seems to be imminent. I have felt that way too, wondering how I was going to survive.

Fortunately, just as I felt the hand of the instructor on the controls of that aircraft years ago, the hand of God has moved in to take control of my life. It's not that I don't get in some unusual attitudes now, but it's comforting to know that He's there to help me regain control again. It's comforting to know that He has said to us that He will never let us be tempted beyond our ability to endure . . . to know that we are not alone."

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Week honors Hispanic heritage

National Hispanic Heritage Week will be observed Sunday-Sept. 17 throughout the United States and at U.S. military installations overseas. A 1968 law calls for the President to set aside the week, including Sept. 15 and 16, for the occasion.

Those particular dates are significant because five Central American countries (Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras and Nicaragua) received independence on Sept. 15 and Mexico received its independence on the 16th.

There are more than 15,000 Air Force members of Hispanic origin. They comprise 2.7 per cent of the total Air Force population (1 per cent of the officers and 3 per cent of the enlisted personnel).

Almost 900 of the Air Force's Hispanic members are women. This figure represents 2.3 per cent of the women in the Air Force.

Hispanics comprise more than 5 per cent of the U.S. population. Air Force officials say encouraging signs include a consistently higher reenlistment rate for Hispanics than for the total Air Force population.

In addition, Hispanic participation at the Air Force Academy is increasing. The Class of 1977 commissioned 26 Hispanic officers and there are currently 174 Hispanic cadets enrolled. Nine of these are women.

The number of Hispanic cadets in Air Force Reserve Officers Training Corps (ROTC) programs is also increasing. During the past school year, there were 491 Hispanics enrolled in ROTC, including 110 women.

The Air Force recognizes Hispanics have unique cultural needs and has placed special

emphasis in the last few years on meeting these needs.

Examples of that emphasis include improving the quality and quantity of Hispanic records in base exchanges, showing first-run Hispanic movies at base theaters and providing more Hispanic unique products in base exchanges.

In addition, the Air Force has developed collections of Hispanic-oriented books and periodicals in base libraries and encouraged the formation of Hispanic and Latin American clubs.

National Hispanic Heritage Week will include numerous special activities at Reese. All Air Force members can take advantage of this opportunity to learn of a culture and heritage that have enriched the quality of American life.

Base plans numerous events in honor of Hispanic Week

Activities for National Hispanic Heritage Week begin Sunday at Reese. A schedule of events is listed below:

Sunday

Protestant Service at the Chapel with Spanish singing group at 11 a.m. Catholic Mass begins at 12:15 p.m. with the same Spanish group. Refreshments will be available after both services.

Monday

State Representative Froy Salinas will speak on Hispanic contributions in America beginning at 7 p.m. in the Simler Theater. A Spanish movie, "El Golfo" starring Rafael will be shown following Mr. Salinas's address. The movie is rated PG and admission is \$1 for adults and 50 cents for children.

Tuesday

The Caprock House will have a "Coffee Break Time" featuring free samples of Mexican dishes and pastry. A Mexican breakfast and lunch will also be served to "Mariache Music."

Thursday

The Wing Dining Hall will serve Mexican food in addition to other entrees. Only authorized personnel may attend. Military members with meal cards may have guests with prior approval from the Food Services Office. Those on separate rations are not authorized to bring guests.

Sept. 16

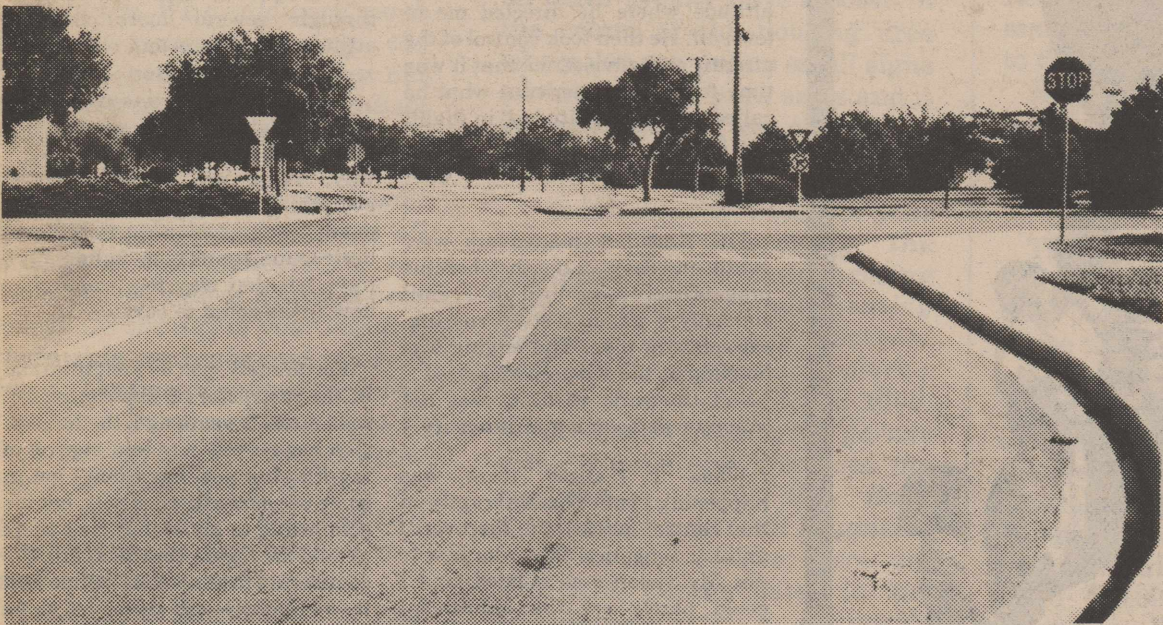
The Base Honor Guard and a float decorated by the Mexican-American

How do you get your ideas, thoughts, and voice heard at a local or national level? You join 140,000-plus people who have the same goals.

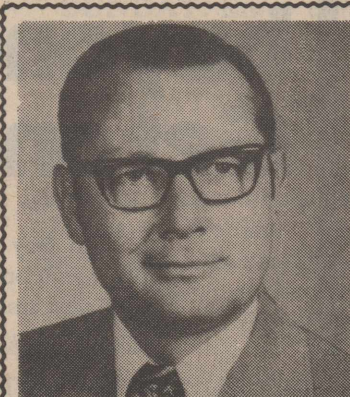

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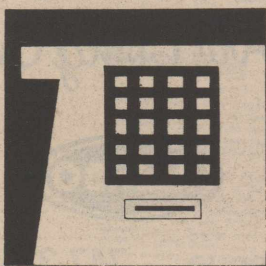

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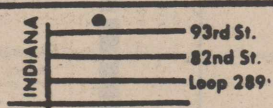
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Genealogy course begins

Beginning lessons in ancestral searching and family tracing will begin Thursday 7-9 p.m. at Lubbock City-County Library, 1306 9th Street.

The informal course offered by the Library will be taught by members of the South Plains Genealogical Society. Four sessions are planned to run Thursday, Sept. 22, 29, and Oct. 6, each lasting from 7-9 p.m. The course is designed to give persons interested in genealogy, but lacking any knowledge of basic skills and information, a background for beginning research. The sessions will each deal with

different aspects of genealogical research.

Members of the South Plains Genealogical Society who will be instructors for the course include Dr. John M. Anderson, Eugenia Toland and Marleta Childs. Each is a specialist in a different skill in genealogical research. "Lubbock is particularly fortunate to have the South Plains Genealogical Society and their very knowledgeable members," Harp said. "The very best thing about this organization is that their members are quite willing to share their knowledge with other individuals; they are really intent about what they do."

Aspects covered in the sessions will include basic knowledge needed for searching, researching census records, wills, deeds, church records and probate records and organizational aspects of continued searching. Library tools and aids will be utilized heavily.

The sessions are open to the general public. There is no admission charge. Those interested in signing up for the course should preregister with the Library by calling 762-6411 Ext. 373. Those attending must provide materials for taking notes during the sessions. Instructors will also be available for individual aid.

Playing golf

Making the grip work

(Editor's Note: Following is the fourth in a series of articles to help improve your golf game. The author has been billed as the "World's Greatest Trick Shot Golfer" and has written numerous articles for golf magazines.)

The grip on the club is an individual matter. Basically there are three grips. The Vardon overlapping, the inter-locking and the baseball grip.

I can't tell you which one is best for you without seeing you swing. Experiment, until you have the grip you want. You will generally know what grip suits you best.

As a general rule golfers with small hands use either an interlocking or the baseball grip. Those of us with large paws use the overlapping grip.

Now that you have practiced last week's tip of using the left leg to get your swing started properly (if you haven't hit at least 1,000 easy nine irons, half shots, etc., forget it, because your going no-where without practice) then start thinking about and "pulling the club into the ball with your left hand." You see, since you are right-handed (the opposite applies if you're left handed) and you already

have the strong grip in your right hand, you can't keep the right hand out of the shot. Thus, we must learn to pull the club into the shot with our left hand, getting it out of the way so the right hand, the power hand can apply energy to the club-head giving us our maximum distance. Otherwise, the right hand must carry the left hand through the shot, usually causing us to hit behind the ball, blading it and a half dozen other things making us want to throw our clubs in the lake then jump in after them and drown with them.
