

President favors Civil Service plan

The President has asked Congress to approve a civil service reform act which would lead to reorganizing the federal civil service.

He also sent Congress an advance copy of a civil service reorganization plan to be officially provided later according to committee work schedules.

Civil service officials said the major thrust of the reforms proposed in March is to give managers adequate authority to manage, while protecting employees against arbitrary management decisions and preventing merit system abuse.

Among the recommendations are major proposals to:

- Relate the pay of managers and supervisors to performance.
- Simplify the procedures for removing workers whose performance is unacceptable.
- Create a corps of well trained and highly motivated senior executives.
- Modify veterans preference by strengthening programs for disabled and Vietnam-era veterans while ending the lifetime nature of preference for nondisabled veterans.
- Protect employees who report violations.
- Improve the organizational structure for personnel administration.

Revisions in the federal labor-management relations program per se were not included in the reform act when submitted. However, an independent federal labor relations authority is contained in the reorganization plan and legislative proposals are being developed in this area. (Watch for special "insight" feature about the proposed change in next week's Roundup.)

Reese settles deposit complaints

Several Reese personnel have recently registered complaints to the Social Actions Office concerning the policies and procedures of Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. Most of these complaints centered around the deposit required by

the phone company prior to installation of a telephone.

Social Actions has met with Southwestern Bell officials and the following standard policies regarding deposits are offered for your information:

All applicants for telephone service must show some evidence of good credit. The following will suffice for

individuals to prove that they are a good credit risk:

- Telephone service during the past year which lasted at least 12 months and in which you displayed good financial responsibility.
- Some tangible evidence of at least 12 months of good "paying habits". This could be references from a credit card

company or a finance company to whom you have made regular payments for at least 12 months. (It is the applicant's responsibility to furnish enough information to Southwestern Bell for them to verify the account.)

- A deposit equal in amount to two month's charges of your phone service.

- A co-signer who is willing to be responsible to the phone company for an amount equal to two month's charges of your phone service.

In the event you choose to pay a deposit, you will be asked how many long distance calls you plan to make a month and to where. From this info, the telephone company representative will calculate a typical month's bill, double it and ask you for that sum as a deposit. (CAUTION: Do not understate your potential charges in order to minimize your deposit. If you use your phone more than you

predicted, the phone company will have to ask you for more deposit later on.) At the end of 12 months, if you have established a good paying record, your deposit plus six percent interest will be returned to you.

The above policies are standard guidelines for areas serviced by Southwestern Bell only. If you feel that you have special circumstances warranting special consideration or if you feel that you have been treated unfairly by the telephone company in any way, please contact me at Social Actions, ext. 3763.

By virtue of an agreement with Southwestern Bell officials, Social Actions will act as a liaison with the business office manager in an attempt to resolve some of the problems between Reese personnel and Southwestern Bell.

Local clubs explain rules

Recently, several local clubs have been accused of employing policies which discriminate against Blacks and Hispanics.

Specifically, these clubs have allegedly refused entrance to minorities because the individuals did not possess a Texas Tech identification card. The Social Actions office has

received several similar complaints and has, under the wing commander's direction, attempted to resolve the problems.

Owners of each club concerned were contacted and met with Equal Opportunity and Treatment (EOT) personnel on Reese. The owners denied any intention of discriminating and signed written statements agreeing to render fair

treatment to all military personnel. In an effort to prevent further problems, the owners presented Social Actions with a list of applicable dress codes and entrance requirements along with a list of club managers to contact if a problem arises at the clubs.

Colonel Bishop opens Walk to Work program

A "walk to work" program will start here Monday as part of the '78 Spring Clean-up Campaign.

Col. Charles Bishop, wing commander, announced late last week that he is requesting people living in Reese Village and the on-base dormitories to consider walking to work on Mondays. He also suggested that people riding to work with someone else be dropped off at the gate and join those on-base residents in a sweep of the base.

The idea is for people to pick up litter along the way to their work sections. Plastic trash bags will be available at the main gate.

The wing commander said

that he would like to see the walk-to-work program become a regular Monday activity here. He also encouraged section supervisors to promote the program, allowing personnel participating 15 extra minutes to get to work.

"Reese is our home and I fully anticipate that each resident will want to cooperate in this program," stressed the colonel. "For people driving to work, I would like to see everyone walk to lunch and appointments the rest of the day — gathering litter as you go!

The Spring Clean-up Campaign is scheduled to get into full swing on April 24.

Change for the better!

A great portion of our mission is to continuously strive to improve base appearance as well as to provide better services for our base community. Sometimes things appear to go against that philosophy.

For example, we recently graded a considerable part of the base park area which created a situation that will not be too conducive to picnicking during the upcoming months. However, after this summer and for many years in the future, we will have a much better park area since the water will drain in a manner to dry out the area faster.

As some of you are aware, we maintain a Base Master Plan which includes all newly planned facilities and accompanying landscaping. This plan is continuously referred to in developing the base in order that we can make it a much nicer place to live - to work and play. The base park project was part of this plan.

Within the next year, the large warehouse (bldg. 535), just north of the existing Commissary, will be converted into a new Commissary store. After the new Commissary is finished, a new AAFES store will be constructed on the site of the present

Commissary. The four warehouses just west of the large warehouse (bldg. 535) and the existing Commissary will be removed; a parking lot for the Commissary/AAFES facilities will be located in that area. In later years, all the warehouses and other buildings on the south side of Fifth Street between C and E streets will be removed and this entire area will be a community complex.

I'm sure that many of you have been frustrated from time to time by the shortfall in inventory items the AAFES can stock. The reason is that AAFES has a shortage of floor space and cannot expand their inventory; this should be alleviated with the construction of the new AAFES. In the interim, AAFES has offered to expand their stock if we can provide them with an adequate facility containing additional floor space. We have the base Party House located near the park area which is infrequently used. We plan to give this facility to AAFES on a temporary basis so that it can be renovated and the Four Seasons and Toyland will be moved into it. After the new AAFES store is finished, the Party House will be turned back to the base. It will then be converted into a

package store. This will permanently locate all of our shopping facilities in the community complex area — another step toward improving things for the better.

The loss of the Party House should not be considered as an irritant. In the long run the move better serves the needs of most of our people — and that's what we are all striving to accomplish!

AFA works for you

Over the past few years the traditional concept of military service has been eroded. More people who enter the service are looking at their tours as a job rather than a service. The Association feels the many causes for this erosion are not at issue, but would rather concentrate its attention and efforts on programs and policies under consideration within the military to reverse the trend.

If we expect our service people to accept military services as a calling, and not just as a job, then we must stand behind them once they put on the uniform. The service life is unique in many ways but one of the most demanding differences for the member is the amount and degree of sacrifices he must make; from numerous, uncompensated overtime hours to the ever possible risk of life in the defense of the nation.

There are many aspects of the "people program" that concern all in the Air Force family. Personnel policies, compensation, specific benefits, and veteran issues are some of the targets at which the Association has aimed its efforts. Listed are a few of the programs the AFA supports under its "Policy Paper on Defense Manpower Issues":

Enactment of the Defense Officer Personnel Management Act (DOPMA), continuation of current military leave policies for federal employees who are members of the Reserve components, a fully government funded Airmen Education and Commissioning Program, direct commissioning of qualified enlisted people and continued graduate

education for officers, and more efficient use of these graduates.

Others are the same tax advantages for federal employees who sell their homes when assigned to overseas duty as that provided military personnel, adequate housing for all ranks or suitable reimbursement for the lack thereof, travel reimbursement for dependents of junior enlisted people, per diem allowances for enlisted people comparable to that for officers, cost-of-living supplement for military and civilian people assigned to areas with higher than average cost of living and dental care for dependents of active and retired personnel. The AFA opposes any proposal that would limit employment opportunities for retired military people, the great majority of whom are enlisted or that would force them to forfeit any portion of their earned retirement income.

It feels that any new nondisability retirement plan must guarantee no reduction in benefits for military and federal employees serving at the time of enactment, and such a plan should not be incorporated with any Social Security retirement program. The AFA supports expanded, more effective government program to encourage training and employment of Vietnam - era veterans.

The AFA seeks to ensure fair and honest treatment of all members of the Air Force family - military and civilian. The Association has success when its strength and support is high. It gets this strength from its members.


The council is made up of people who are interested in the welfare of our base teens and pre-teens. We try to coordinate a variety of programs that will mean productive learning experiences for our youth.



retain it in your wallet or purse for reference. What these rules indicate is that you must be presentably dressed to gain entrance to the clubs. In addition, your behavior must be appropriate. The owner or manager has the right to refuse entrance to anyone inappropriately dressed or behaving improperly (loud, drunk, or disorderly). The owners involved have assured Social Actions that they do not intend any discrimination by race, color or national origin. Social Actions will closely monitor how well these intentions are carried out. In the event you feel that you are being treated unfairly or that the standards set are not being applied properly, do two things. First, ask to speak with the club manager or owner to try to resolve the problem on the spot. Second, on the very next duty day, contact the Social Actions Office to inform us of the problem you encountered and whether or not it was resolved to your satisfaction by the management. If arbitrary discrimination is being practiced, the owner is legally responsible and will be held accountable for the actions taken. Questions may be addressed to TSgt. There is usually a \$2 cover charge for men which decreases to \$1 cover charge after 10 p.m. Dress — neat and clean attire is required. No tennis shoes, collarless shirts or faded jeans are permitted.

Applause — owner, Elias Masso; manager, James Darkhshan. Entrance — Military identification is acceptable. Depending on daily specials, there may be a cover charge. Dress — Same as for Applause.

Freeman's — owner, Roger Freeman; manager Mike Harp. Entrance — Military identifica-

tion is acceptable. Usually a cover charge is required. Dress — Neat appearance is required. Specific prohibitions will be posted at the entrance.

AF revises ADSC

The active duty service commitment (ADSC) for people entering undergraduate pilot training (UPT) and undergraduate helicopter training (UHT) will soon be increased.

Capt. Frederick Weller, chief of personnel, said Monday that Air Force officers attending UPT or UHT after June 14 will be required to serve six years of active duty service instead of the present five-year commitment.

He also noted that off-duty education with tuition assistance will result in two years of ADSC when the course

terminates. And, there will also be a two-year ADSC for officers (17XX) attending airborne warning and control system training.

A two-year ADSC will also be required for each year of funded Legal Education Program participation and for officers in the research associates program or the ASTRA program. The latter two becoming effective in October.

A change made in February requires officer's undergoing requalification or special crew qualification in an aircraft in which formal training has

already been received, now receive an ADSC for the new training. For example, a pilot moving up to aircraft commander or a navigator becoming a radar-navigator would have to serve a certain ADSC for that training.

Under the ADSC revision, permanent change of station to schools for functional category L (students) no longer draws a one-year ADSC.

Captain Weller added that anyone having specific questions about the changes contact base Personnel officials for information.

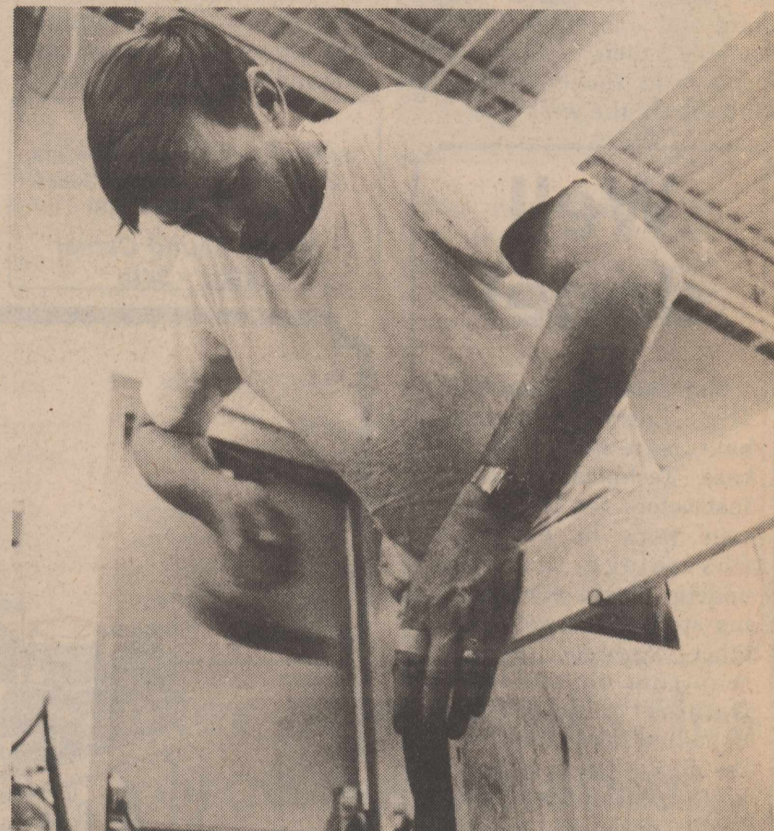

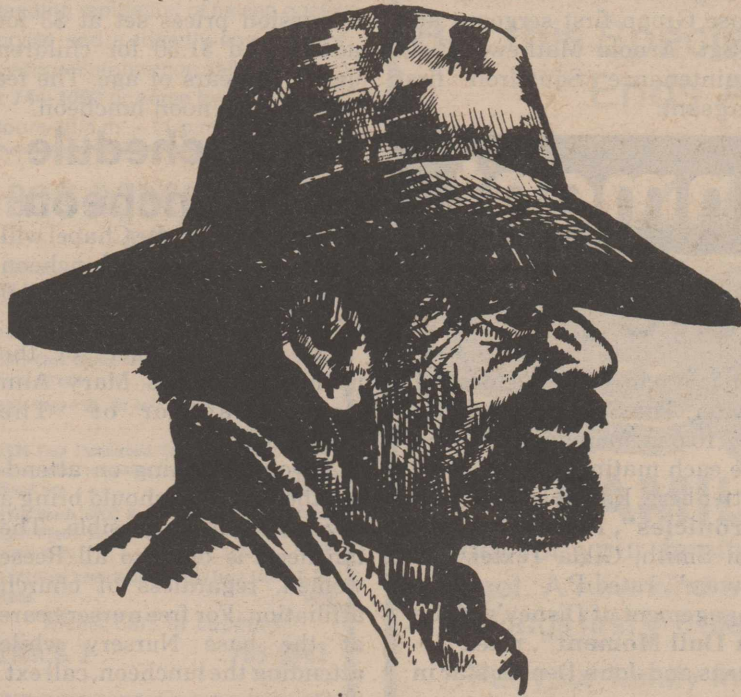

'Tornado Alley'

Infamous strip includes Reese

Anchored in the southwestern block of a strip called "Tornado Alley," the South Plains welcomes spring with a wary eye on the sky.

According to reports from the National Weather Service, between 200 and 300 Tornadoes are sighted annually in Tornado Alley. The windy strip ranges from the South Plains through central Oklahoma and into Kansas.

Although tornadoes rarely approach Reese (a few funnel clouds passed within 3 miles of the base last year), the spinning walls of destruction have pounded the South Plains before and have earned the full attention of "Hub City" residents.

On May 11, 1972 a tornado terrified Lubbock. The storm spawned vortex leveled a section of north-central Lubbock and left the city mourning for the 28 who were killed.

The National Weather Service (162.4 mhz), local television and radio stations provide the area with detailed weather information while on-base residents enjoy the insurance of the Reese Tornado Alert System.

The base weather detachment provides round-the-clock weather observation and triggers a tornado

watch during severe storms and a "warning" when an approaching tornado is spotted within 15-miles of the base. The "take-shelter" siren is activated once a tornado is within six miles of Reese.

All work sections on base should have specific tornado instructions (VA 355-1). The main thing to remember is to stay inside. Three-hundred mile-per-hour winds turn flying debris into lethal weapons. Keep clear of windows and stay in the center of the building.

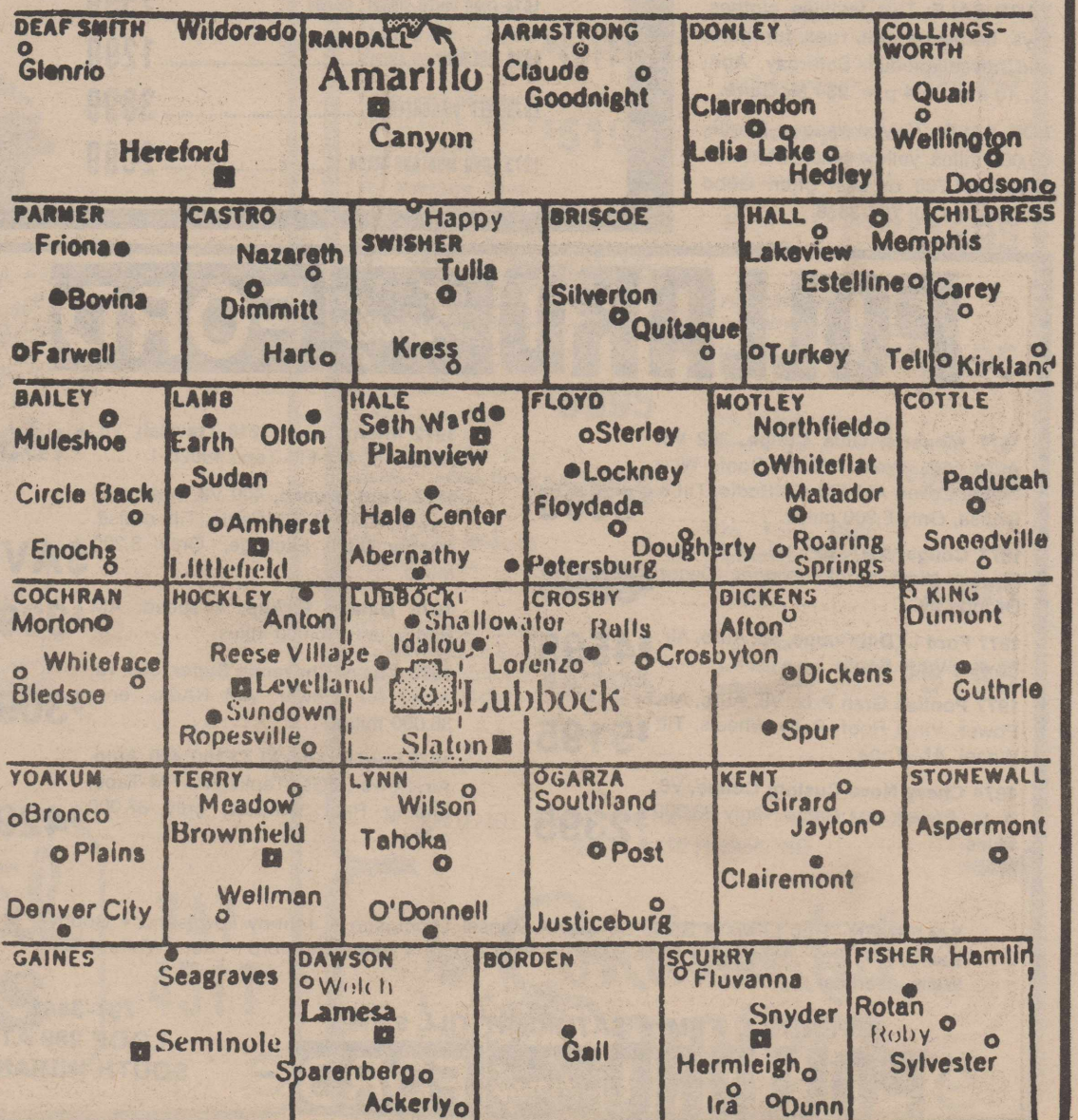
It's a good idea to have a few things stashed around the house and office in case of an emergency. Must items are: battery operated radio, flashlight with extra batteries and container of fresh water.

During severe weather watches and warnings stay tuned to local radio or television stations. Do not call the weather service for information. In fact, it's a smart idea to limit all telephone use to "emergency only" during a tornado alert.

The map below should be cut out and placed somewhere near a radio or television set. It will help people track a storm's progress as reported by area stations.

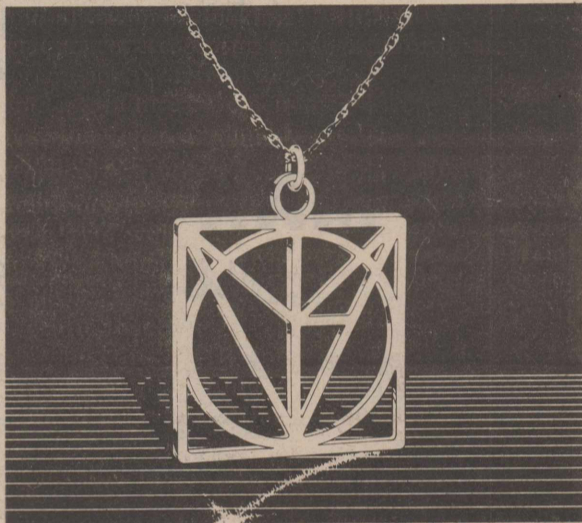

Fourteen teams, including a teenage squad, will open pursuit of six playoff berths when the

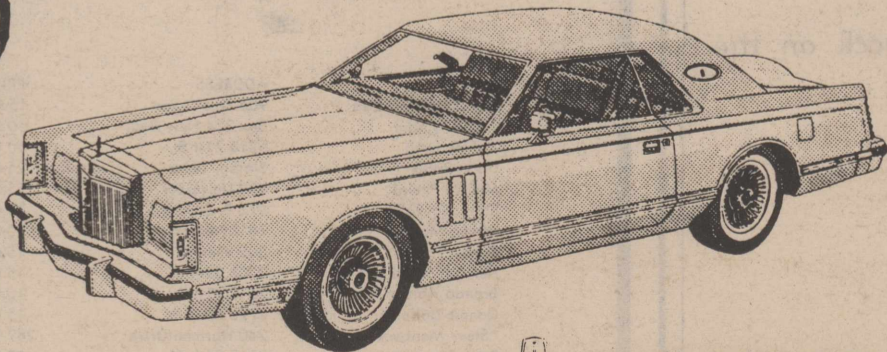


intramural slow-pitch softball league starts play here on Monday.

General Jones has been the Chief of Staff since July 1, 1974. He has recently been serving as acting JCS Chairman for Gen.

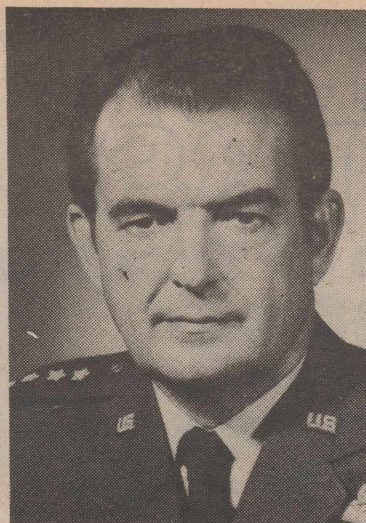
George S. Brown, whose term ends June 30.

Stetson swears in Hewitt

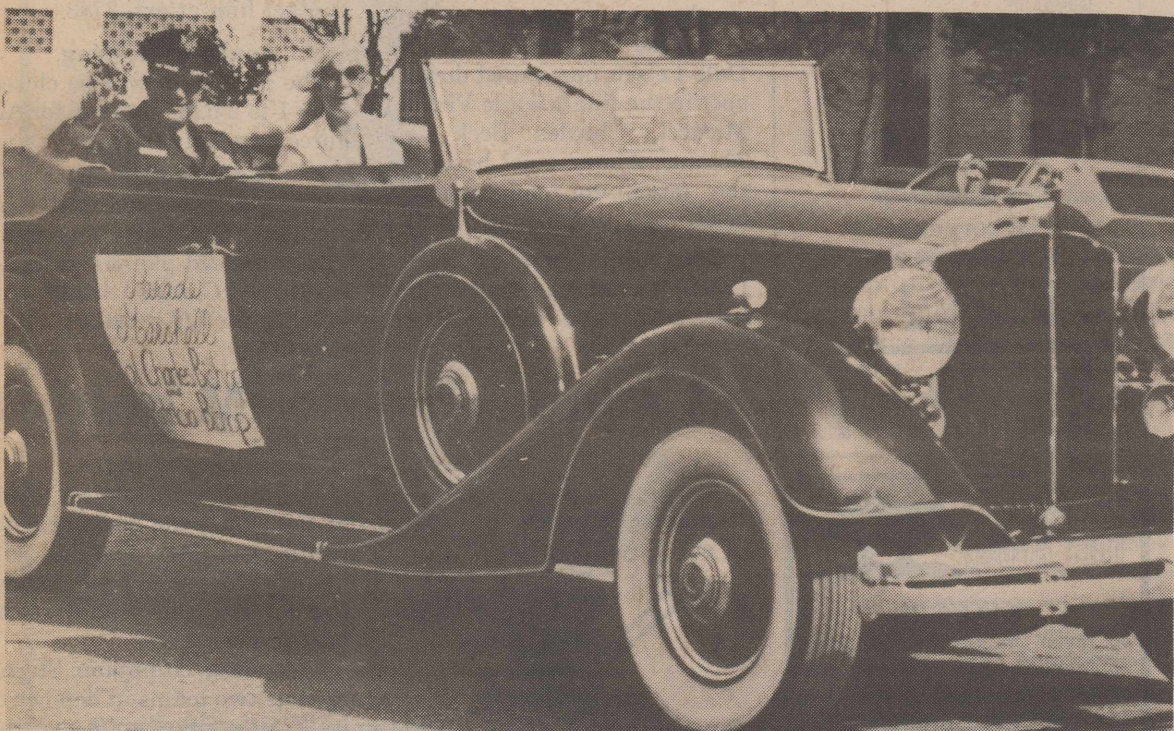
