



Seventy-two per cent of active-duty military personnel and 61 per cent of Air Force retirees participate in SURE-PAY, Air Force Accounting and Finance Center officials said.

SURE-PAY makes it simpler for Air Force members to deposit their paychecks to banks, credit unions and savings and loan offices. It also saves the taxpayers more than \$3 million in postal charges and other processing costs each year.

Still not convinced? Then talk to any of the officers at Kelly AFB, Tex. All 803 of them have signed up for SURE-PAY, making Kelly the first stateside base to have 100 per cent of its officers participate in the program.

Here's how SURE-PAY works:

— The Air Force Accounting and Finance Center computes the payroll near the end of the pay period.

— The center takes a computer tape with the pay credits and identifying data to the Denver branch of the Federal Reserve Bank.

— The bank transfers the pay data to other regional centers.

— The branch offices then transfer the funds to individual financial institutions.

— On payday the AFAFC deposits a check to cover the full payroll to the Denver Federal Reserve Bank.

Tale of consumer woe illustrates legal rights

(Editors note: The objective of the Air Force Preventive Law Program is to teach people how to avoid legal problems. Many problems arise because people are not aware of their rights and obligations under the law. Common sense tells us that it is more difficult to solve a problem then to avoid it in the first place. This preventive law problem will help you understand one of the rights you have as a consumer and may save you money, worry and trouble.)

Airman Avery works swings at Reese. His wife, LuAnn Avery, sits at home every evening. Since she is not an avid reader, she has only the television for company.

One Wednesday evening shortly after the dinner hour, a salesman comes to the door and asks to come in and demonstrate a Magic Vacuum

Cleaner. Being bored, LuAnn lets him in.

The salesman spends over two hours demonstrating that this vacuum can do anything from shampooing the furniture to walking the dog — and all for only pennies a day. LuAnn is just fascinated and thinks about all the things she could do around the house with it. Naturally she signs on the dotted line. The vacuum cleaner is to be shipped from New York in 15 days.

Airman Avery comes dragging in at midnight. LuAnn immediately starts telling him about the wondrous machine that does everything for only pennies a day. But when Airman Avery looks at the contract, he nearly faints because the total cost of the Magic Vacuum Cleaner was \$550.68. To make matters worse LuAnn used the \$50 they had saved for their car repair bill as a down payment on the vacuum cleaner.

On the salary of an E-3 he just can't afford it. LuAnn realizes that she made a mistake but thinks it is too late to correct it. What should she do?




B. Cancel the order.

ANSWER: Cancel the order. On certain door to door sales of \$25 or more, a Federal Trade Commission rule gives her the right to cancel the contract. Written notice of cancellation must be sent to the seller within three business days of the sale. The seller is obligated to refund her downpayment within 10 days.

For more complete information on this subject contact the Legal Office. Some sales are not covered by this rule. Also, a buyer has an obligation under this rule such as having the goods available for pickup by the seller in the same condition as delivered.



60 first-term airmen apply for early outs

As of Monday, approximately 40 per cent of Reese's first-term airmen eligible for the Air Force's newest early out program have applied for separation.

Base personnel officials said Monday that 60 airmen have applied for the early out program. There are 149 bluesuiters eligible for separation here in August.

"It is to early to tell what affect the early outs may have on mission accomplishment," said Lt. Col. Ivan R. Jenkins, director of Personnel, "but we will be keeping an eye on applications in each Air Force Specialty Code (AFSC) to make sure that manning levels don't get too low."

All but about 29 of those eligible for the program have been interviewed by personnel officials. Units most likely to be affected by the program here are Organizational Maintenance and the Civil Engineers. If all eligibles apply and receive approval for separation by the Military Personnel Center, OMS could lose 55 airmen and CE could lose 16. so far, 27 have applied for separation in OMS and 11 have applied in CE.

Airmen in 80 AFSCs may apply for early separation to be effective in August under the fiscal year 1978 airman voluntary early separation

Air Force personnel officials say that the program is designed to enable the Air Force to meet mandated end-of-year enlisted strength.

Completed applications must be turned into CBPOs no later than July 7. After submission, applications cannot be withdrawn except in cases of undue hardship.

Eligibles include first-term airmen with dates of separation (DOS) from Sept. 1, 1978 - Sept. 30, 1979, who are based in the continental United States. First termers who are residents of Alaska, Hawaii or U.S. territories and currently serving in their home of record are also eligible if they meet the DOS and Air Force specialty code criteria.

Air Force Military Personnel Center officials said that application approval isn't automatic. Applications will be evaluated based on manning and mission requirements.

Where possible, priority consideration will be given airmen having the least service retainability to DOS within each AFSC.

Personnel assigned to Reese must have a valid reason for not having their vehicle registered on base prior to being authorized to enter the installation.



Vietnam veterans urged to use GI Bill benefits

The Veterans Administration Bill opportunity because he has announced a drive to encourage Vietnam-era Veteran to use their GI Bill education benefits while they are still available.

The campaign, called "Operation Boost," will focus on areas where fewer than 50 per cent of the eligible veterans have taken some GI Bill training.

"Time is important, for veterans must use this benefit within 10 years from the date they are discharged from military service," said Max Cleland, administrator of Veterans Affairs.

"Of course, the decision to pursue education and training has to be made by each veteran," Mr. Cleland said. "I just want to be sure no veteran fails to take advantage of the GI

The VA now pays a monthly allowance of \$311 to a single veteran going to school fulltime; \$370 to a veteran with one dependent; \$422 to a veteran with two dependents; and an extra \$26 for each additional dependent.

Persons with active-duty service between Feb. 1, 1955, and Dec. 31, 1976, may receive VA educational assistance at the rate of 11/2 months of schooling for each month of active duty. Forty-five months of educational assistance is the maximum entitlement.

For courses taken while on active duty, the VA will pay the cost of tuition up to \$311 per

The award for the groundbased electro-optical deep space surveillance system (GEODSS), was announced by the Electronic Systems Division of the Air Force Systems Command. The contract is for Beach, Calif.

A belt of monitoring stations will gird the earth at spaced intervals to insure worldwide coverage.

Coins fascinate sergeant

A love of history and a knack for collecting things have lead SSgt. Gary M. Huber to become a coin collector and then a coin

His father got him started collecting coins when he was only seven. With the help of his grandfather, who started collecting in 1917, Sergeant Huber built up a large collection by the time he entered high school.

"I was interested in world history, particulary from A.D.

1000 and on," said Sergeant Huber, a member of the Weather Complex of the 1958th Comm. Sq. at Reese AFB, Tex. "This is the area I deal in now though I do buy and sell United States coins. My specialty is European crowns and thalers.'

Thalers are silver dollar size coins that were made from the late 1400s into the 20th century. The word dollar comes from the Dutch word for thaler, Daller. It was in common use in New Amsterdam (New York) during the early days of our country.


Sergeant Huber's oldest coin

is a Persian silver Siglos from about 500 BC. "I'm often asked that question. People think the older the coin, the more valuable it is. This is almost never the case. My most valuable coins are all 20th century issues. This is due more to demand than rarity."

Sergeant Huber travels to coin shows over a five or six state area. Dealers rent space at these shows and sell to collectors as well as between themselves. "Much of my business is through the mail. My material is very specialized and there are few collectors for it in the local area."

Recently there has been legislation pending in Congress to outlaw the illicit importation, buying, selling, and trading of antiquities with an age of 500 years or older. When asked how this would affect his dealing in coins he replied, "It is going to ban the importation of illegally acquired material. This legality will be determined by the country involved and proof of ownership will rest upon the collector. The United States is the only major power Free World subscriber to this UNESCO Resolution.

"Both Great Britain and France have refused to adopt the UNESCO Resolution on the grounds that the proof of ownership should not be placed upon the collector but rather on the country making a complaint of pillaging of national treasures. Most of the coins can not be concerned national treasures."
