After talking with Fish and Wildlife officials at the regional office in San Antonio, Winnat said that the only other options available (moving the nest or taking the fledgling to a zoo) were too risky for the Federally protected birds.

"Since the kites aren't in a critical area, such as a residential section," explained Winnat, "the best thing to do is just try to avoid confrontation with the birds until the chick is old enough to fly. The entire band should migrate south in September or October."

## Regulations change for CB radio sales

Surely you are aware that CB radio transmissions have been interfering with television, AM radio, and RM radio. Well, you are not the only one.

The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) has found out, too. In response to this problem the FCC has established new regulations which forbid the sale of CB radios,

after Jan. 1, 1978, which do meet certain technical standards. These standards are designed to eliminate, or significantly reduce, CB radio interference with television, radio, et cetera.

The new FCC regulations affect the following CB, or CB-related equipment: (a) all current 23 channel CB radios; (b) all CBs with less than 23 channels approved by the FCC before Sept. 6,

1976; (c) any receiver or transceiver which has a separate band to receive CB signals, and which has not been approved by the FCC; (d) most CB converters, i.e., devices used to change an AM radio into a CB receiver; and (e) hand-held CBs, i.e., Walkie-Talkies.



## Chaplain's comment

Jesus said, "and you shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free." (John 8:32). It was this truth that, in the beginning of the movement, liberated our pioneers from the bondage of division and sectarianism. There was a commitment to Christ, "the truth" (John 4:6), and wherever that truth was revealed they responded in positive obedience. Truth had made them free indeed.

Is truth only truth when found in certain places, under certain prescribed conditions and through certain channels? Or is truth only truth when spoken through a person of a particular race or of certain academic abilities? Is truth only truth when preached — or can truth be proclaimed through great music, poetry, and other means of witness? The tendency of some to reject truth because it is spoken or written by someone other than their own people precludes the divine revelation of God. Scripture, our source of revealed truth, clearly states that God gave gifts "just as he wills" (I Cor. 12:11). Therefore God has chosen to use different places at different times to reveal his truth. The names of reformers like Luther, Zwingli, Armenius, Knox, Wesley, or

Warner remind us that God has used a variety of personalities to proclaim his truth.

Truth is greater than individual personalities; it transcends all of the limitations that we would impose upon it, and it continues to be heard around the world. Truth is greater than particular groups of people, denominations, or movements, and will not be possessed nor captured by us, no matter how pure our intentions may be. Truth is free! It



frees us from limited, narrow sectarian spirits but it must always be measured by the Spirit and the Word. These two bear witness to the truth as revealed in Christ Jesus our Lord.

Our uniqueness as a movement is that we are open to revealed truth, no matter who the revelator God may use. We are committed to Christ, "the truth," not merely to those who speak in the context of our concept of the truth. My concern is not for the transmitter but for the truth being transmitted. ## Command annually trains thousands of technicians

(Editor's Note: This is the second part in a series outlining the 1978 Air Training Command report to stockholders. This week the Roundup focuses on technical training.)

#### **Technical Training**

ATC continuously plans, develops, conducts and monitors training for tens of thousands of students, not only for the Air Force, other branches of service and allied nations, but for other government agencies which use equipment or skills similar to those used by Air Force personnel.

During 1977, more than 78,000 students received their basic military training in the command, while 152,000 graduates completed some 2,600 resident or non-resident technical training courses.

ATC's 58 field training detachments and 27 operating locations deployed worldwide trained more than 126,000 Air Force people in approximately 800 courses, many of these in direct support of new weapons system acquisitions or to upgrade and improve existing skills.

The Interservice Training Review Organization of the Department of Defense has as its objective cost-effective cation within the military services. Air Force participation has resulted in several major training programs being consolidated at ATC installations, including audiovisual, precision measuring equipment and weather training for Army and Navy personnel. Continued review of consolidation opportunities is expected to save the Department of Defense several million dollars annually in training costs.

The command continued to pioneer in innovative training concepts through the introduction of computer-managed instruction, centralization of crew chief fundamentals training and practical application of electronics principles to equipment maintenance training. Productivity in terms of shortened training time, reduced academic failure and better job knowledge has been measurably enhanced.

Air Force-developed courses. suitable for high school, college and industrial applications, are now being made available to these institutions through the National Laboratory for the Advancement of Education. To date, 12 technical training courses have been released to civilian institutions for their use at minimal cost, providing substantial economic benefit as reduction of training dupli- a "bonus" over and above the national defense investment of the tax dollars involved.

## Palace Chase regulations change

There has been a recent change to the Palace Chase Regulation, AFR 35-46.

If a member wishes to withdraw an application for Palace Chase, it must done through the Separations Section, in Personnel. The Separations Section will handle the processing of the withdrawal through the Air Force Manpower and Personnel disapproved. Members should

realize that once they have are disapproved cannot reapply made application for Palace Chase, they may have no choice but to accept if approved.

A future mailing address must be listed on the application. Members must live within, normally, 50 to 100 miles of the approving unit. Generally, the CBPO Separations Unit will establish the Center (AFMPC) where it will date of separation unless be reviewed and approved or otherwise directed by AFMPC. Members whose applications

about the birds, but; most players are taking the inconvenience in stride. "It's become one of the things to talk about in the clubhouse," says Hutchins. We have about 35 golfers playing here each day and in two weeks we only know of one that has actually been hit by a kite, and he wasn't hurt."

Winnat's advise for local duffers is to wear a hat or cap while on the links and to play it cool when the kites fly overhead. "The more they're (the kites) aggravated the more hostile they get," he warns. "The best thing to do is just walk off and let them settle down. In a few minutes golfers should be able to continue their game."

Another good idea is for golfers to stay in pairs. While one hits the ball the other can ward off diving kites.

The Mississippi Kite, a cousin of the falcon, seems to be attracted to the lush living conditions on golf courses. "The Meadowbrook Municipal Golf Course had problems with kites the past few years," noted Winnat, "and reports from Oklahoma and other areas indicate that the birds are drawn to the bountiful supply of insects and water on the courses."

Winnat went on to say that the Lubbock course ended it's kite troubles this year by getting federal permission to destroy the nests before the birds migrated north. The same thing will probably be done here next year to avoid a repeat of the problem.



A maintenance and inspection team succeeded in producing a "zero-discrepancy" aircraft last week, a feat that hasn't been pulled off here in at least one year.

1st. Lt. Bob Griswell, the 64th Organizational Maintenance Inspection Branch OIC, commented "This type of thing happens maybe once a year and it hasn't occurred since I was assigned to Reese nine months ago." The team from Dock 1, 64th OMS, received the zero discrepancy rating after thoroughly inspecting and repairing a T-38A in a routine check

The Quality Control inspectors who reveiwed the team's work failed to find a single discrepency for which the team was responsible. The feat is rare because each team must inspect and repair 10,000 systems, components and mechanisms which can take anywhere from 400 to 1,000 manhours to complete.

With the number of items inspected, it is difficult to get an aircraft through an inspection and not have a few minor discrepencies noted.



## Lessons learned in morning help avert tragedy that night

On the morning of July 12, A1C Larry E. Petkus received Cardiac Pulmanary Resuscitation (CPR) training. That night the training helped prevent a family tragedy.

Airmen Petkus and 19 other Security Policemen were given the CPR treatment that morning as part of the routine training program for newly assigned personnel. The sky cops were taught basic lifesaving techniques such as how to restart the heartbeat, clearing a blocked airway and artificial respiration.

It was about 10:30 that night when the screams of Airman Petkus's wife woke him. She stood over the bed holding their infant daughter and crying, "Something is wrong with Amanda."

The child's face was covered with blood. Airman Petkus laid the baby on the bed and looked for external cuts on her face.




