

MSgt. Sandra L. Cullipher, NCOIC of Travel, said people departing their local duty area departing and returning on on regular nonduty days will not be charged for leave for that day. When return from leave is on a nonduty day, that day will count as chargeable leave.

One had a delivery date of June 14, no delivery. The second date was June 21, no delivery, the new delivery date is June 30. They have no furniture so they are sleeping on the floors and have to eat out every night. His wife can't get a job because their clothing isn't here for interviews. The second one was supposed to get his furniture on June 19. The new due date is now June 30. He is worried about the July 4th weekend about putting his belongings in storage because of the

four-day weekend coming up. His main gripe is that the moving company said that they called his parents and said it was alright for the June 30th delivery, but his parents stated that it was not true, they were never called.

The third one left Provo, Utah on June 1. The first due date was June 12, then it passed and he heard they said that they would get a new carrier, which he couldn't understand, and new delivery date of June 20 and about the 18th they still had not left Hill AFB, Utah with his shipment. On the 20th TMO said they thought it was in Colorado somewhere. TMO said they don't know where specifically it is at. Then on June 23 he showed me the letter, it said that the new due date is now June 30.

All three people are greatly inconvenienced and it makes is super hard as pilot school is hard enough for them to try to study and learn everything required without chairs to sit on, a table to eat at, or clothes for his wife to wear. The names of the carriers weren't given to me but we are wondering if there was some way that they could get recompensation from the mover because of the great inconvenience that they are going through at the present time. Also TMO called me on a Friday and said I had two hours to either get home and get my goods or it would go into storage for three days. It seems if TMO could let you know a day in advance that they are coming it would be much easier and much more convenient for TMO and persons involved if they could give notice one day in advance of stuff coming in. It would be easier to make arrangements for somebody to receive

We regret the inconvenience and discomfort that the students have experienced due to the late arrival of household goods shipments. A review of each shipment by the Traffic Management Office (TMO) has been accomplished and, as of this writing, each shipment has been delivered.

Procedures within the Traffic Management Office include suspensing incoming shipments by required delivery dates (RDDs) which are established by the member at the time of application for shipment at the point of origin. The RDD is the date the commercial carrier has agreed to have the property at the destination. When a shipment of household goods is not received by the RDD, the commercial carrier for the shipment will be contacted by TMO to identify the location of the property. The carrier has 24 hours in which to answer this query. If

the carrier is experiencing difficulty in moving the shipment, a notification must be in writing to the destination TMO explaining briefly the reasons for the delay in the shipment.

If a shipment is unduly delayed and a member suffers inconvenience or hardship from the delay, most reputable household goods carriers will recognize a claim for inconvenience due to late arrival for household goods. This claim should be supported by factual receipts for lodging, food, clothes and other miscellaneous expenses due to the delay of household goods. If receipts are not available, a notorized statement listing all expenses is acceptable. Carriers are not obligated to honor inconvenience claims; however, those carriers involved with the referenced shipments have agreed to accept claims from the three students. The TMO will assist in the preparation of the claim at the member's request.

The Carrier Evaluation and Reporting System (CERS) is one of the tools the TMO uses to penalize household goods carriers who fail to meet the RDD. Many factors are considered under this program but two of the most important considerations are the RDDs and customers' satisfaction. When carrier performance in these areas is unsatisfactory, the carrier will fall below the established standard and punitive action, such as suspensions, can be applied. Suspensions prevent the carrier from receiving government business for specified periods of time. In the case of Smyth Van Lines, which handled one shipment, a suspension of 120 days has been imposed. In another shipment, the carrier, United Intermode, has been declared ineligible for any further government sponsored household goods moves.

In each of the three referenced household goods shipments, the local TMO began follow-up action when the shipments were not received on the appropriate RDD. The times, dates and the nature of the queries made on each shipment are on file with the local TMO and have been made a matter of record. The students are invited to the TMO to review the specifics of the follow-up actions at their convenience.

While the TMO has established procedures and guidelines to follow in the tracing of shipments, it would be wise for all readers of this care line to note that unusually long delays should be brought to the attention of the NCOIC of the Traffic Management Office to insure that management attention is given where appropriate.

Difficulties pass, but our reaction to them does not. As William James has suggested, there may be a God in heaven who forgives our sins, but human nature does not. They are memorized in our minds, muscles, fibers and brain cells.

Each reaction, mature or immature, lingers on in us as the beginning of a habit. Repeated mature reactions tend to produce the formed habits of maturity which define us. Repeated immature reactions dig their own grooves.

The Christian must always accept himself in his present, pilgrim and human condition, which will inevitably involve failure. Ideals must always be introduced to the test of actual experience, and in this introduction our ideals, which very often sound beautiful, become a struggle, a battle for self-control, a willingness to start again in the wake of failure, a lucid acceptance of the mystery of the Cross.

The process of maturing as a Christian and as a human being will always be marked by failures, but the only real failure is to quit. When the situation gets tough, the Christian must get tougher. He must become bigger than his problems. In the end, such determination to love will bring him to the feet of Love itself, which is this eternal victory in the victorious Christ

## Several states slate September primaries

Primary elections will be held in 20 states, Guam, the Virgin Islands and the District of Columbia during September.

Dates for the elections are: Sept. 2—Guam; Sept. 5—Alabama, North Dakota, Virgin Islands; Sept. 9—Delaware; Sept. 12—Arizona, Colorado, Connecticut, District of Columbia, Florida, Maryland, Minnesota, Nevada, New Hampshire, New York, Rhode Island, Utah, Vermont, Wisconsin and Wyoming.

Primaries are also scheduled for Sept. 16 in Louisiana, and Sept. 19 in Massachusetts and Washington. Runoffs have been scheduled for Sept. 26 in Alabama, if necessary.

Military personnel, eligible dependents and overseas civilians who are residents of these areas should file a Federal Post Card Application (FPCA) for absentee ballot. Air Force officials said the applications should be filed immediately so they can be received in time to allow voting officials time to return the ballots.







## ATC creates special office to bolster officer retention

Air Training Command has soliciting comments and created a special office in potential solutions to the response to growing concern retention problem from officers over officer retention especially among Air Force

In a letter sent last week to all ATC center and wing commanders, General John W. Roberts, ATC commander, announced the formation of the Special Projects Office (CCSP) to handle the problem. Five command bases (Reese is not written or typed, signed or among them) will be visited by two lieutenants from the CCSP,

at those bases.

In addition, the general is encouraging officers at all command units to write open letters outlining complaints and possible solutions. "We need feedback directly from the 'grass roots' level," said General Roberts.

Letters may be either hand anonymous - and should be addressed to: HQ ATC/CCSP,

Randolph AFB, Tex. 78148. Local personnel officials indicated that the retention problem seems to be the most severe among captains. "Although we have had about the same number of captains apply for separation recently as we normally have," said one local spokesman, "in the past the captains were applying for special programs - now they are just getting out."

Five captains have applied for separation here during the past six months.

## **Commissaries delay** NAF bagger change

Reese Commissary shoppers will still be tipping baggers and carryout workers — at least until the end of September.

The Air Force had planned to have only non appropriated fund (NAF) personnel working as baggers the start of August. However, a sixty-day delay has been imposed on the move, giving Congress time to complete action on a legislative proposal that would exempt the Fair Labor Standards Act of 1938, as amended.

Earlier this year, Commiswere covered by the act and that they would no longer receive tips but would work for hourly wages as NAF employees. A two-per cent surcharge was to have been added to the patron's bill in order to cover the costs of making baggers Air Force employees. Customers were to

the surcharge or going through a special line and bagging their own groceries.

At least one of the baggers working at the Reese Commissary is happy about the 60-day delay. "I'm going to South Plains College this fall," said 18-year old Beverly McNeese, "and I had planned on working here part time all year. If Congress votes against the exemption I'll have to find baggers from coverage under another job. If the exemption goes through I can working here on my own schedule." McNeese says she sary officials announced that has been averaging about \$30 baggers and carryout workers per day from tips this summer.

John Foster, Commissary Services chief here, said that, at least until the end of September, all baggers and carryout workers will continue to be compensated solely by tipping. What will happen after that is uncertain, but, Reese personnel will be notified of any changes have had an option of paying in operation before they occur.



that evening will not be charged leave for that day. If less than three-fourths the duty day is worked, leave will be charged. The same leave accounting criteria will apply for people returning from leave on a duty

For example, an Air Force member who departs on Friday (with his supervisor's permission) after working six hours of a regular eight-hour duty day and returns in time to work six hours of an eight-hour duty day the following Friday will be charged for leave Saturday through Thursday.

Until Sept. 1, the policy days.

remains to charge leave for nonduty day departures and returns unless the member's supervisor determined the member was available for duty in the local area on those days.

Sergeant Cullipher added that leave accounting procedures are being changed because some Air Force members are not being properly charged for leave. Officials said the change is partly the result of misunderstanding of the proper methods of charging leave, and partly because of a general reluctance to charge for periods normally considered off-duty

## AFOSI starts 31st year of investigations

For nearly 30 years, Air Force Office of Special Investigations (AFOSI) special agents have worked on such diverse investigations as fraud, child abuse, homicides and larceny.

Purposely removed from command channels to ensure its integrity and independence, AFOSI began operations Aug. 1, 1948, from its Washington, D.C., headquarters. In 1972, AFOSI became a separate operating agency under the staff supervision of the Inspector General.

Locally AFOSI Detachment 1117 is headed by John L. Colquitt. The two-man office handles about 150 investigations each year. In addition to servicing on base investigations the unit is responsible for Air Force related investigations in a 22-county area around Lubbock.

The AFOSI is also the sole Air Force organization responsible for investigating criminal, fraud and counterintelligence matters. Primary investigative missions are carried out by more than 1,900 special agents and administrative support personnel assigned to OSI headquarters, 29 district offices and 114 detachments and operating locations and worldwide.

AFOSI recruits and selects its special agents from the most highly qualified Air Force






