### FINANCE COMMITTEE

#### Report and Recommend Plan to Increase Working Fund.

Haskell, Texas, Oct. 23, '07  
We the committee appointed by the Haskell 10,000 Club for the purpose of providing ways and means to improve the financial condition of the club, wish to submit the following report to the club and citizens in general.

After consulting as many of the business men as time would admit, and thinking over the matter from every standpoint, we came to the conclusion that the best plan we could adopt, would be for each business firm in the town to join the club with the understanding that they pay according to the business they represent. And that individuals or those not engaged in business could pay the regular dues they have been paying, or more, if they so desire.

The Committee thinks that this would be the better plan for the following reasons to-wit:

1st. Take firm for instance, of five members, each paying \$1.00 per month for an illustration. The Secretary in collecting the amount of \$5.00 would have to see five people, which would probably take two hours time, while on the other hand if the firm would sign for the same amount of \$5.00, any member of the firm could settle with the secretary in fifteen minutes and thereby dispense with so much loss of time.

2nd. Working on the plan each member has to pay so many individual people to collect from, it is impossible for the secretary to see them all, and thereby loses quite a sum of money.

3rd. We find that on the present basis it is impossible for us to have sufficient finances to do efficient work.

4th. We have therefore equalized the different businesses as best we could and have handed the secretary a list to present to the business firms of the town for their consideration.

5th. We would recommend that each business firm agree to pay these amounts; by doing so it will prevent so many petitions for money and will place the club on a financial basis that will enable them to do some good work in the way of public improvement and at the same time the present membership would not be out any more money than they have heretofore donated to the various subscriptions.

### FARMERS' UNION DEP'T.

Principles and Purposes of the Farmers' Union.

Mr. O. P. Pyle, a prominent leader of the Farmers Educational and Co-operative Union, gives the following statement of the principles and objects of that organization:

The basic principles of the Farmers Union are justice, equity and the Golden Rule. The spirit of its motto is to "Live and Let Live." It has no enmity for, nor antagonism toward any legitimate or honest business under the sun, proposing to simply pursue the even tenor of its way, letting all other classes, business and undertakings that do not clash with or antagonize its interests—do the same. As stated, an imperious necessity brought it into existence and it has come solely by mutual effort and cooperation to enable its membership to control the prices of the commodities they may have to sell, to price their own property and not to permit other people longer to do this for them.

The plan they have adopted to accomplish their ends, the new trade system, if you please, is by "controlled marketing." The means by which the union proposes to control the markets is through warehouses, in which to store and hold their cotton for the agreed minimum price. Elevators to hold their grain, cold storages to preserve their perishable products. The farmers in the northwest, especially in Iowa, are demonstrating the practicability and feasibility of the elevator plan, for by building and owning co-operative elevators they have driven the Grain Dealers' Associations that have so long robbed them to cover. In the South the warehouse system is longer an experiment. More than 1,500 in the Cotton States, and they are full of union cotton. These are local warehouses owned by union members. In addition there are thousands of bales in cotton yards and stored under cover on the farms. Every bale of this cotton is being held for the minimum price and will be sold for that price.

The bugaboo cry of "supply and demand" has ceased to frighten cotton raisers. They know there is not cotton land enough in cultivation to meet the needs of the world—needs that are continually increasing, and furthermore, they are preparing to hold themselves the surplus, if there should accidentally be one.

As stated, three times the union has fixed and obtained the price for cotton. Each time this price, 10c, 11c and 11c, was but a just, fair price, based upon the cost of production and the size of the crop. The consequence is that union farmers are better able each year to hold their cotton than they were the year before. The mortgage iniquity is dying a natural death. Farmers are paying as they go. Many of them, that they may ultimately win the tremendous struggle in which they are engaged against greed and graft, have been denying themselves of many things. The "distressed products" the local unions are largely taking care of, helping their brother members to hold for the just prices. And the warehouses are advancing money where needed, so you see the cotton raiser is fast getting into position to control absolutely the market for his products and the same glorious realization is speedily being effected among the grain growers.

The National union meets annually and specifies the minimum price for which the various farm products can be sold at a fair, living profit. The national union does not do this arbitrarily and at haphazard. The delegates being from every section of every

State where the union forces have a foothold, the cost of production is minutely obtained, with the apparent and reasonable volume of yields and, upon this basis, the prices are specified, only on a just and fair margin of profit being provided for.

In a word, the middleman must go. He is an entirely useless factor who has never served any purpose except to rob the farmer by bearing the market and then robbing the manufacturer, or the consumer, as the case may be, by buying it. The Farmers Union believes and teaches that the farmer should sell direct to the manufacturer the raw material of the farm that enters into manufactures and to the consumer such as do not, and this is another means by which it hopes to enable its members to control the markets.

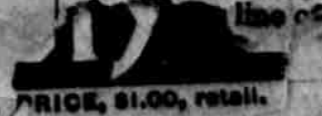

PREACHING AND FARMING.  
A Haskell County Man Makes a Success of Both.

Rev. L. N. Alvis, who resides about seven miles west of town, was in the city Wednesday. Rev. Alvis, with the assistance of his boys, is combining farming and preaching. As a preacher he is able and eloquent and his sermons are always interesting, instructive and full of vim. And from what we have heard of his farming operations we conclude that he and his boys are putting plenty of vim into them and making as great a success in that line as he has made in his preaching. Asked about his cotton crop the other day he said he and the boys had 135 acres in the fleecy staple besides their other crops and that they were picking away at it to beat the band but needed help on that part of the proposition. He said that when they commenced picking several weeks ago he estimated that they would get about a quarter of a bale per acre, but after going over it once and seeing the quantity of new cotton opened he raised his estimate to a third of a bale. He has now raised his estimate again, as more cotton is opening behind the second picking and there are many green bolls that will mature and make a fine crop. It does not come early this year.
