Cooper And Woodruff Awarded Precinct Four Paving Contract

Cooper and Woodruff of Amarillo were awarded the Precinct Four paving contract at a meeting of the Commissioners' Court Monday when they submitted the low bid of \$289,944.38. The paving contract was for 12.75 miles of paving, and a 24-foot paving slab in the center of the streets through approximately 63 blocks of the city of Stratford. Cooper and Woodruff had a slight advantage in submitting their bid due to the fact that they have their equipment and a crew in Sherman County. They were waiting for warm weather to complete a paving project in precinct one.

Don Baker of Borger submitted a bid of \$303,179.87 and Gildden-Terrell of Amarillo bid \$318,858.95 on the paving job.

The paving program will include black topping for approximately 63 blocks of streets in Stratford in addition to Fifth Street north to the city limits, approximately 1.25 miles of road on the north side of Stratford, approximately 1/2 mile of paving from the Gruver Highway to U. S. 287 on the south side of Stratford, and about 11 miles of paving from U. S. Highway 54 in Stratford north on the Beaver Road to the Oklahoma line.

City streets are to be paved with a 24-foot width of pavement in the center of the street with bond issue money. Under existing prices when the bond issue was approved in June of last year, it was possible for each individual with property along the street being paved, to secure a concrete curb and gutter, and an extension of the pavement to the curbing along the property line for about \$2.50

March Of Dimes Seeks Cure For Arthritis

The 1961 New March of Dimes will bring new hope for millions of Americans afflicted with one of mankind's oldest enemies, arthritis.

This was the prediction of C. C. Plunk, Sherman County director for the fund-raising campaign being held throughout the month of January.

"The cause and cure of arthritis and similar diseases are still unknown, but some of the answers may be forthcoming as the result of the March of Dimes-supported program of The National Foundation," he said.

"Answers are being searched for at the four arthritis clinical study centers located in New York City, Dallas, San Francisco and Rochester, New York, which are receiving March of Dimes funds.

"Valuable new knowledge leading to the prevention of crippling arthritis may even now be just on the horizon at any one of the laboratories where scientists are working on projects supported by March of Dimes research grants," Plunk pointed out.

"A number of National Foundation chapters with sufficient funds after meeting their polio obligations are also paying for patient aid to children under 19 who are afflicted with rheumatoid arthritis or with certain crippling birth defects," he added.

"The National Foundation will be able to do even more in its fight to prevent crippling diseases if public contributions to the 1961 New March of Dimes are generous enough to permit further expansion of its programs of research, patient aid and professional education.

Prices Favor Higher Grade Beef Cattle

The estimated 1961 meat production will provide consumers of the U. S. with the largest supply of meat in history, both in total and per person. If the estimates prove correct, Lloyd Bergsma, extension livestock marketing specialist, says consumption of red and poultry meats would exceed 200 pounds per person for the first time in history.

Bergsma says livestock producers will be faced with a generally downward trending market during 1961. Prices during the first half of the new year will not feel the effect of increasing supplies as strongly as those for the last half. He expects slaughter cattle to average near 1960 levels during the earlier months of 1961, but increasing supplies of grass cattle and more competition from expanded hog production are expected to have their effect by late summer. The greatest price drops are forecast in the lower grades of cattle.

The specialist expects a continuation of the herd build-up which started in 1958. But, he adds, weather conditions can play a mighty important role. Cattlemen can be expected to react quickly to changes in crop and pasture conditions since cattle numbers on the farms and ranches of the nation are now at an all time high.

On the brighter side, Bergsma says consumers have, partially at the expense of other meats, increased their consumption of beef and he sees a continuation of this strong demand. This trend should help ease the (Continued on Page 6)

Sugar Beet Growers To Organize

Irrigation farmers will hold a meeting in the County Exhibit Building in Stratford at 7:00 p. m. Friday, January 20, for the purpose of organizing a Sherman County Sugar Growers Association. The meeting for the purpose of organizing sugar beet producers is being sponsored by the Sherman County Development Association as the result of interest shown by local producers after the agricultural tax meeting held in Stratford Friday afternoon.

J. H. Sears of the First National Bank of Hereford will be the principal speaker at the meeting. Mr. Sears has devoted much of his time to the study of the sugar beet situation, and is one of the men giving his time to secure a sugar beet processing plant in the Texas Panhandle.

There are no allotments for the planting of sugar beets at the present time. Producers must however, secure contracts with a processing plant in order to have a market for their sugar beets.

Mid-Continent Geophysical Co. Locates Here

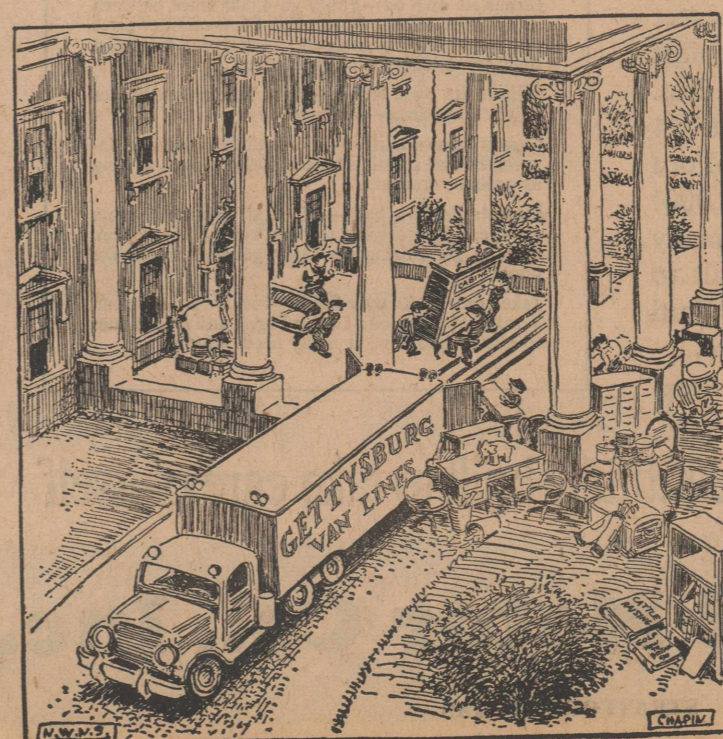

Snapshots: 'As Far As the Eye Can See'

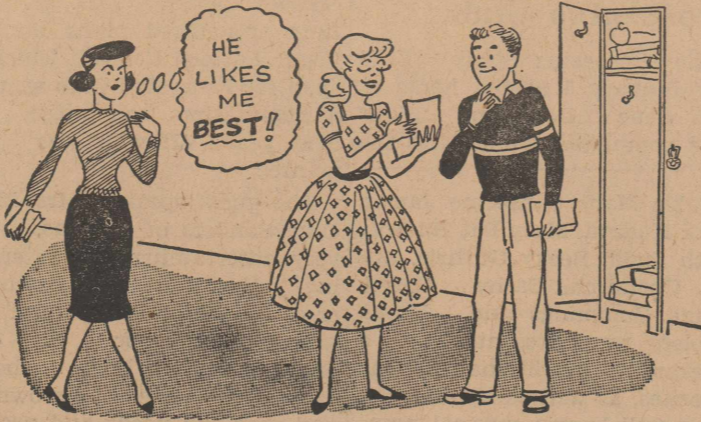

How difficult life would be, at a very early age in life, we had to choose this one individual and shut out all others around us.

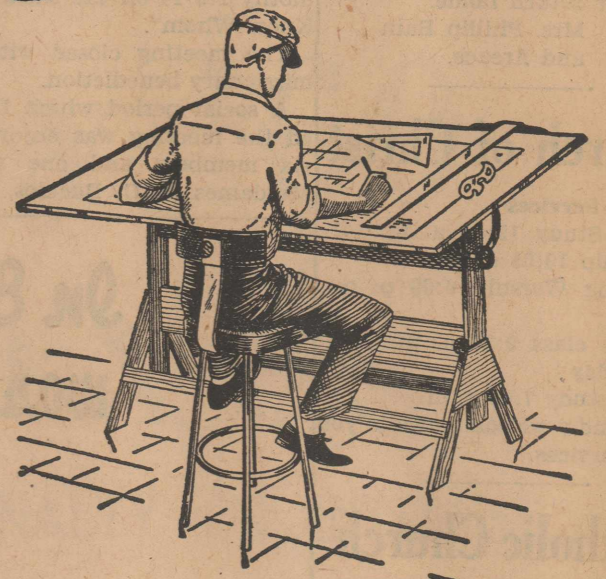

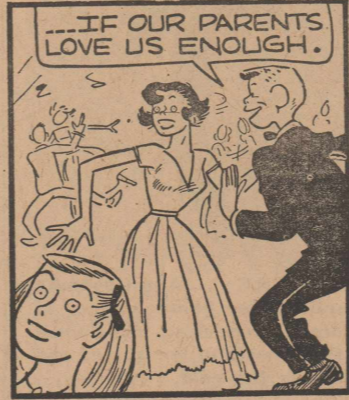
