



Appplications being filed at this time are to show all sales of wool and unshorn lambs during the period between April 1 1960, and March 31, 1961. For a sale to be considered completed during that period. title must have passed to the buyer, the wool must have been delivered, and the last of the factors needed to determine the net sales proceeds must be available.

Mr. Buckles urges growers to be particularly careful in reporting purchases of unshorn lambs on their applications. Inaccuracy on this point is the most troublesome problem in administering the wool payment program, he said.

Under the wool program, payments are made to growers as an incentive to increase wool production. The payment rate is the percentage necessary to bring the national average price received by growers up to the incentive level of 62 cents a pound. 
