





THE WEEK'S LETTER: "I am well dressed, not exactly ugly, but the boys at school do not like me. I am not popular and I wish the boys would look at me. I try acting smart, I try joining popular games, but the boys look at the other girls, never at me. I let the boys know I like them and their answer is 'a big laugh'. How can I be popular?"

OUR ANSWER: Sometimes we can try so hard to achieve a certain goal that we greatly jeopardize our chances of ever attaining it. Often, when we try to make people like us, we let ourselves

step out of character and thus our actions seem insincere or forward.

An individual's personal attributes (or 'looks') is far from the most important factor where popularity is concerned. True, the pretty girl and the handsome boy have something to be thankful for, but what if "looks" is all they can boast? If they have no personality, should they be mean, self-centered, even dishonest—will "looks" alone bring friendships and the respect of other people? Not at all.

Why do people like people? We like certain people because they are friendly; because they are good, and kind; because they have a pleasing personality; we enjoy their company; and we respect them for what they are, not what they may have.

We do not like people who are not friendly; who are unkind, who poke "fun" at others less fortunate than themselves; who pretend to be that which they are not; who are dishonest in any way.

When one feels unpopular, it is easy to strive too hard to attain popularity; to act "smart" without stopping to think that no one likes "smart-alecks." The much better way to popularity is through development of a kind and friendly attitude toward the entire world . . . and we can develop this attitude much better if we stop worrying about being unpopular and realize that sooner or later people will learn to like us because we are likable.

A constitutional amendment (H.J.R. #4) is being considered whereby Texans will be given an opportunity to legalize horse race betting in Dallas, Tarrant, Harris, Galveston, Bexar, Midland, Hidalgo, Cameron and Webb Counties, subject to approval by LOCAL OPTION.
H.J.R. #4 provides for distribution, ANNUALLY, among all counties that do not have race tracks, one-half of the STATE TAX REVENUE obtained from horse racing. Each county would receive approximately \$1.00 per capita population the first year. Counties where the tracks are located would receive 2% of parimutuel handle. The state's tax income from horse racing alone would run close to \$12,000,000 the very first year—possibly more—besides all the income tourists would bring to Texas—which would amount to millions of dollars, plus a great ad valorem tax on race tracks, breeding farms and many valuable race horses.

Try Super-Special Seasonings:
A can or package of cooked green beans will have gourmet appeal when it's seasoned with a 1/4 cup of commercially-soured cream to which has been added 1/4 teaspoon caraway seeds.

Gingerbread takes on a glamorous topping when you use powdered sugar with a bit of butter, orange juice enough to moisten, some grated rind for zest and a few diced almonds for crunchiness.

Helen's Favorite:
ORIENTAL CHOCOLATE
(Serves 6)
1 1/2 quarts chocolate milk
1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
1/4 teaspoon ground cloves
Whipped cream or marshmallows
Heat chocolate milk to piping hot. Stir in spices. Pour into mugs and top with whipped cream or marshmallows.

Have you ever mixed pitted dates with grated carrots for salad? They're wonderful, particularly if you mold these in lemon-flavored gelatin.

Canned consommé with some instant minced onion and a package of mixed frozen vegetables simmered until the vegetables are tender makes a nice "homemade" type of soup in a jiffy.

Good punch with popcorn: heat apricot whole fruit nectar with dash of ginger and lemon juice and serve in mugs.

Colorful, and tasty salad uses julienne strips of carrots, beets and whole green beans placed in a mound over shredded lettuce. Serve with chef's dressing which has been mixed with sieved hard-cooked egg.

Preparing Records For New Grain Program

The new feed grain farm program before Congress is expected to become law with perhaps a few minor revisions. Data must be furnished to the county ASC office by March 14 relative to the crops planted and harvested on each farm during 1959 and 1960.

It is understood that under the new program, farmers must reduce their harvested acreage of corn, grain sorghum, oats and barley by 20% to obtain a loan under the price support program. There is a possibility that a further reduction of an additional 20% will earn added benefits for the farmer.

The bill before Congress provides for a volunteer reduction of the feed grain acreage. It is the purpose of the Secretary of Agriculture to control production in this manner rather than through allotments.

Vernon Bullard, office manager, said the ASC committee is extremely anxious that records of each farm operation be correct and complete so that they will be in a position to furnish each operator with the acreage of the feed grains which may be planted on the farm for the grain to be eligible for the loan and price support program.

State and Washington offices have asked that this survey be completed in about nine work days. This means that the ASC office staff will have to fill in certain data on the survey forms in their office, and then discuss with each farmer in the county the acreage of each crop planted or harvested, and the use for which the crop was planted.

Regulations require that the Sherman County Committee estimate the acreage of feed grain crops on each farm during 1959 and 1960 unless producers supply the information. This could complicate the determination as to the producers' eligibility to participate in the feed grain program and prevent full benefits. The county committee would prefer that the information be supplied by the producers so that the figures may be compiled accurately, Bullard said.



THE WEEK'S LETTER: "I am well dressed, not exactly ugly, but the boys at school do not like me. I am not popular and I wish the boys would look at me. I try acting smart, I try joining popular games, but the boys look at the other girls, never at me. I let the boys know I like them and their answer is 'a big laugh'. How can I be popular?"

OUR ANSWER: Sometimes we can try so hard to achieve a certain goal that we greatly jeopardize our chances of ever attaining it. Often, when we try to make people like us, we let ourselves

step out of character and thus our actions seem insincere or forward.

An individual's personal attributes (or 'looks') is far from the most important factor where popularity is concerned. True, the pretty girl and the handsome boy have something to be thankful for, but what if 'looks' is all they can boast? If they have no personality, should they be mean, self-centered, even dishonest—will "looks" alone bring friendships and the respect of other people? Not at all.

Why do people like people? We like certain people because they are friendly; because they are good, and kind; because they have a pleasing personality; we enjoy their company; and we respect them for what they are, not what they may have.

We do not like people who are not friendly; who are unkind, who poke "fun" at others less fortunate than themselves; who pretend to be that which they are not; who are dishonest in any way.
