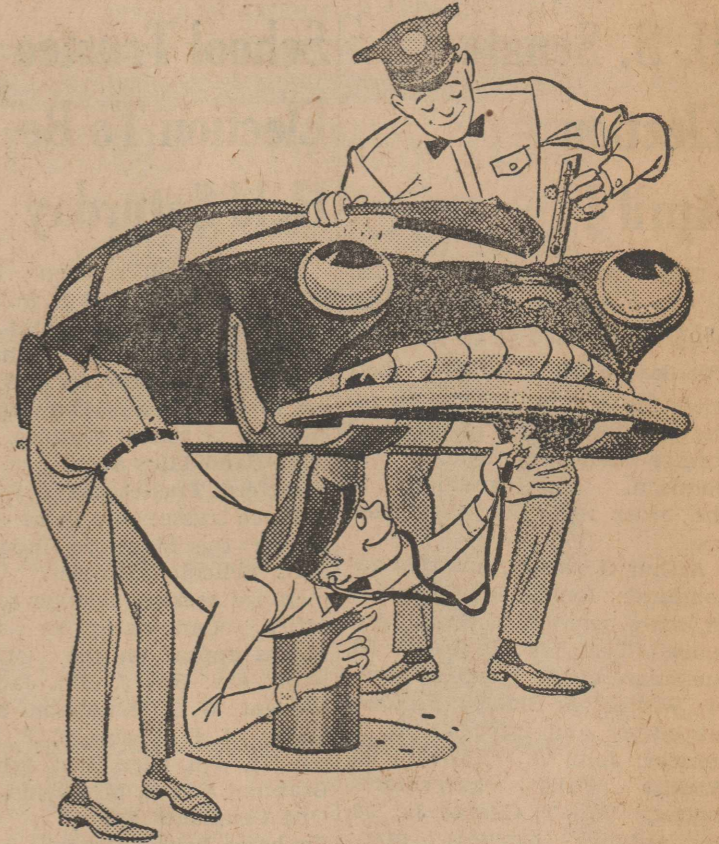

(Continued from Page 1) of their Swedish friends to run some cattle on the shares on a thousand acres on Beaver Creek. Their first cattle dealings were successful, and the friend continued to furnish credit for their operations until they accumulated a little capital and ideas of buying land in the Panhandle.

It was in 1904 that they paid \$3,000 for four sections of land near Stratford and brought in their first registered Hereford heifers. In 1908 they bought some Guggell and Simpson stock from Col. R. E. Edmondson of Claude and later they brought the first Beau Blanchard bull to Texas.

The Pronger land holdings grew as the quality of the Pronger herd became famed throughout the cattle industry. In 1916, Pronger Bros. were among the first cattlemen to consign stock to the original Panhandle Hereford Breeders sale.

Mr. Pronger lived on his ranch southwest of Stratford until 1947 when he moved to town.

Throughout the years, the Prongers supported the Amarillo Fat Stock Show, and the cattle show held in connection with the Tri-State Fair. For many years they have given the Pronger Bros. Junior Herdsman Award to winners in a contest for 4-H and FFA boys at the stock show.

Mr. Pronger was married in Henrietta in 1905.

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Good Friday Pageant at 6:00 p. m. (CST) Friday, March 31, timed to end as the sun darkens behind the broken hill and canyon terrain adjacent to towering Black Mesa a few miles away. The Good Friday service delves into some of the events surrounding the Paschal Feast, or "Feast of the Passover." This phase of the story deals largely with the last days of Christ's life, continuing from the Paschal Feast as Jesus enters the Garden of Gethsemane and concluding with the crucified figures of Christ and the two thieves silhouetted in a picture of unspeakable loneliness as day darkens into night.

The Saturday evening service, also beginning at 6:00 o'clock, on April 1st, brings the eleven faithful but bewildered disciples

back to the Upper Room where they contemplate their dark and dismal futures.

The ever-inspiring story of the Resurrection is displayed in the Sunday morning pageant beginning at 6:00 o'clock a. m. April 2nd and ending shortly after sunrise. Perhaps the most impressive of all three presentations, the Easter Sunrise Service opens with announcement to its Biblical participants "who knew not that an event had taken place that would change the course of history." As the two Marys and Salome make their way to the sepulchre, bringing the spices which they had prepared to commemorate the passing of the Master, the morning night lends its first rays of hope as Christ makes His Resurrec-

tion known to the women followers. Succeeding scenes portray the Master's great commission to the eleven disciples, and the Sunday morning portrayal ends on a note of hope with the words of promise: "And if I go to prepare a place for you, I will come again and receive you unto Myself; that

where I am, there may ye be also."

Then the West Texas legislator called on Blakley to congratulate him on the campaign and his record in the Senate.

Senator Blakley favors retaining and strengthening the Connally Amendment. He opposes turning over U. S. affairs to jurisdiction of a world court.

Strong indications that Texas Democrats are "closing ranks behind Bill Blakley" were reported as Senator Blakley prepared to wind up his elective-term campaign with appearances in East Texas and Houston.

James H. Blundell, Blakley's state campaign manager, declares: "A tremendous swing to Blakley is taking place throughout the state. Democrats are uniting behind Senator Blakley and when Texas Democrats do that they are unbeatable."

In Austin, Governor Price Daniel congratulated Blakley on the race he is making and declared himself highly pleased with his performance as U. S. Senator. Blakley paid courtesy visits to both Governor Daniel and former Governor Allan Shivers, each of whom appointed Blakley to Senate tenures — Shivers in 1957 and Daniel in January, 1961.

Blakley emphasized legislation he has introduced to finance Texas schools without federal interference and to raise the ceilings on earnings of Social Security recipients. Under a Blakley bill, individuals could earn a maximum of \$1,800 a year without suffering deductions from their benefits.

Blakley also requested Senate committee hearings on a Texas request for additional sugar beet acreage — a request that was quickly approved by Chairman Harry F. Byrd of the Senate Finance Committee. If the acreage were increased, Blakley said a valuable new industry could be established in the High Plains area.
