The greenbug situation in Sherman County looks better this week. A rapid buildup in field and Mrs. Allen. on the greenbugs, is credited with bringing the threat under control. The greenbug infestation apparently did not increase the past week and actually decreased in some wheat fields which were under observation.

The wheat is at a stage of development where yields will not be reduced much by greenbugs with a population of 200 to 400 per running foot, according to entomologists visiting the area from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Agricultural Experiment
