Greenbug Situation Is Improving

The greenbug situation in Sherman County looks better this week. A rapid buildup in the ladybug beetles which prey on the greenbugs, is credited with bringing the threat under control. The greenbug infestation apparently did not increase the past week and actually decreased in some wheat fields which were under observation.

The wheat is at a stage of development where yields will not be reduced much by greenbugs with a population of 200 to 400 per running foot, according to entomologists visiting the area from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Agricultural Experiment Stations.

Spraying of fields in the county which were heavily infested, has apparently resulted in good kills. The sprayed area should keep the greenbug population under control for at least three weeks.

Farmers are advised to continue to make regular inspections of their wheat fields for the possibility of a greenbug increase until the cool moist weather period is over. The period of danger from damage from greenbugs to wheat yields (Continued on page 4)

Nine school students, Ted Bouldin, Brenda Bouldin, Bobby Pendleton, Tommy Pendleton, Peggy Calcote, Linda Reynolds, Wanda Weller, Mary Lou Vigil and Gloria Vigil, escaped serious injury when their school bus was turned over on its right side as it was rammed by a pickup pulling a loaded trailer Wednesday evening. The accident happened on U. S. Highway 54 about 7 miles southwest of Stratford as the school bus neared the cattle guard to drive to the home of Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Pendleton.

Hollis Harrington was driving the school bus. Harrington had checked his speed to make a left turn from the highway. A car was approaching from the opposite direction and the school bus came almost to a stop before making the left turn.

The bus turned left and had just passed over the center stripe when it was struck by a 1959 Chevrolet pickup truck driven by Gayle Joe Holcomb of Hugoton, Kansas. Bob Overton of Hugoton was a passenger. Overton sustained lacerations about the head and was treated in the Stratford Clinic.

The pickup was attempting to pass the school bus in the left lane and struck the bus just in front of the rear wheels. The impact turned the bus on its right side.

Other than for a few minor bruises, little 7-year old Linda Reynolds, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Reynolds and a student in the second grade, was the only person injured. She sustained a broken arm. X-rays were made in the Stratford Clinic where she was given first aid before being taken to specialists in Amarillo. At 8:00 p. m. Superintendent R. W. Standerfer Jr. was informed that Linda's arm had been set and that she was getting along nicely in St. Anthony's Hospital. Her parents stated that she had never shed a tear as a result of the experience.

The tandem trailer pulled by the pickup was loaded with a mare and colt. Estimates of the damage had not been completed Wednesday night.

The County Better Bake Show for 4-H Girls will be held in the County Exhibit Building Saturday. Judging will begin promptly at 9:30 a. m.

Products to be entered are: plain muffins and cinnamon rolls.

Miss Janet Vines, Dallam home demonstration agent, and Miss Sally Fields, Hartley demonstration agent, will judge the entries.

A general meeting will be held at 1:00 p. m. when the winners will be announced and the awards presented.

Either one or both products may be entered but the winners must enter both muffins and cinnamon rolls with their records.

Stratford is tightening traffic law enforcement as a public safety measure. City Marshal Walter E. Briles has been given instruction by the City Council to issue tickets for traffic violations which in most cases result from carelessness or thoughtlessness.

"U turns" in the center of the block, failure to stop at stop signs and speeding are the violations which must be stopped if Stratford is to maintain its "no death traffic record".

Fines for such violations may not amount to any larger amount of money but may result in a rapid increase in liability insurance premiums. All moving traffic violations are considered an increased traffic liability for the insurance companies, and the rates for the insurance rise accordingly.

Members of the council said, "It is our opinion that more attention should be given to traffic violations, such as speeding, running stop signs, parking in the middle of the street, and turning in the middle of the block. We believe a majority of the citizens want traffic laws enforced and ask your cooperation."

Race officials were: Dale Schriber, starter; N. W. Hudson, Don Jacobs and Bill Keener, judges.


