

The kind of soil influences soil temperature principally by reasons of color and texture. Black soils warm more quickly, sandy soils are "early" or warm soils. Soil cover can be obtained by leaving crop stubble on the surface or planting winter cover crops. Cover is beneficial in many other ways, reduces water loss and controls erosion. The amount of cover necessary to have the greatest advantage will differ with soils. Guidance as to the amount of cover best for your situation can be obtained from the Soil Conservation Service assisting your local Soil Conservation District.

Expect 25 To Die On Texas Highways

The director of the Texas Department of Public Safety announced today previous holiday experience in Texas indicates 25 persons will meet violent death on the Fourth of July, 1961.

Col. Homer Garrison Jr. said the release of this official prediction "is intended to serve as a challenge to all Texans to prove our estimate is too high". In announcing the grim forecast, Garrison said the DPS will place in effect "Operation Deathwatch" effective from 12:01 a. m. to 11:59 p. m. on July 4, during which traffic deaths, homicides and suicides, and fatal accidents other than traffic will be tabulated against the prediction.

The department's Statistical Services Manager, N. K. Woerner, estimates that 11 persons will be killed in traffic accidents during the 24-hour period, that







Louisiana: I remember the days near a small town in the coal fields of Central Illinois. Our town was alive with community interest and seldom failed to stage Fourth of July picnics, Labor Day parades, free fish-fries, and barbecues, in a beautiful grove adjacent to town.

Immigrants were coming to America, to seek a new life. Mining operations, and the labor force in our community were composed of Polish and Italian immigrants. The town and mine owners prepared lavishly for the 4th of July. Three dance floors were laid off in the shady sections of the grove. The mine provided cases of lemons, sugar, new wooden barrels-free lemonade for all. Local youngsters occupied one dance "floor"; the Polish workers another; the Italians the third.

Young Americans, to the fiddle and guitar, danced the waltz, two step, and country square dance, some old timer doing the calling. Among the Polish and Italian groups, this was a big family affair, young girls, matrons and grandmothers, dressed sometimes in the styles and colors of their native lands. production. and carryover stocks of wheat would be affected about as follows:

1. With a modest increase in wheat price supports, this program could be expected to result in an increase of about 10 per cent in net farm income to our nation's wheat farmers;

2. Harvested acreage of wheat would be reduced by at least 5 million acres by the reduction in the acreage allotment, and by at least an additional 5 million acres if response to the voluntary part of the wheat program were similar to the response to he 1961 feed grain program

3. Production of wheat would be reduced to about 1.1 billion
