Wheat Samples Will Win Good Prize Money

Prize winning wheat samples will pay exhibitors for their efforts in showing them at the Sherman County Fair. Three prizes for adults are \$7.50, \$5.00 and \$4.00. Five prizes of \$7.50, \$5.00, \$4.00, \$3.00 and \$2.50 will be paid to youth exhibitors.

Barley and oats offer prizes of 75 cents, 50 cents and 25 cents.

\$300 Offered In Jamboree Parade Prizes

Prizes totaling \$300.00 are offered for winning floats in the Stratford Jamboree parade to be held at 1:30 a. m. Saturday, September 9.

Five prizes are being offered for organization floats. They are \$50, \$40, \$30, \$25 and \$20.

Three commercial float prizes will be presented for the amounts of \$40, \$30 and \$20.

Six prizes will be awarded to kiddies winning recognition in the parade. The prizes are for the amounts of \$7.50, \$6.00, \$4.00, \$2.50, \$2.50 and \$2.50.

Prizes of \$5.00 each will be presented to the best cowboy and best cowgirl riding their mounts in the parade. Prizes of \$5.00 each will also be awarded to the junior cowgirl and cowboy, children 12 years of age and under.

Trustees Approve 1961-1962 Term School Budget

The Stratford Independent School District will operate on a total budget for 1961-62 of \$386,000. Local maintenance operation will be in the amount of \$316,800, and debt service will be \$69,200.

Due to the new state salary schedule approved recently by the Legislature, local classroom teachers, will average \$680 per teacher more than a year ago. The state approved an \$810 raise but local teachers will average \$680 of this amount due to adjustments between the old Stratford schedule and the new state schedule. The new starting salary for a beginning teacher with a bachelors degree in the Stratford system will be \$4824.00.

Cafeteria meal costs per pupil will remain at 25¢ for this year. However, cafeteria costs will have to be re-appraised after this year.

School bus routes were approved and slight adjustments will be made if necessary.

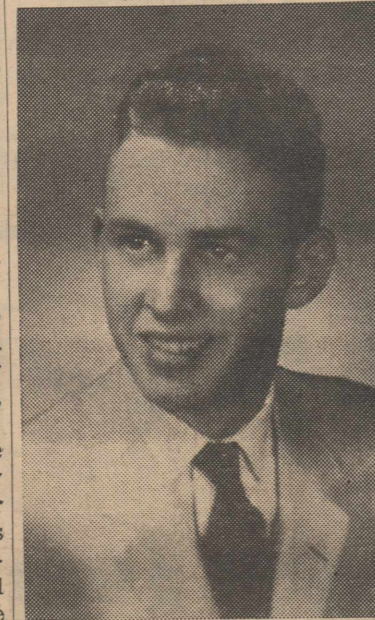
The child died Tuesday night in John Sealy Hospital in Galveston. She underwent major surgery last week and for a time it seemed as though she might recover.

Harry Schultz Is Seminar Trial Judge

District Judge Harry Schultz has been selected as one of the trial judges of courts of general jurisdiction of Arkansas, Colorado, Kansas, Louisiana, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Texas to participate in a Seminar of State Trial Judges to be conducted at the School of Law of the University of Texas, in conjunction with the National Conference of State Trial Judges and a special committee of the American Bar Association.

The Seminar will begin Wednesday at noon, November 29, and last until Saturday noon, December 2, at the Law School in Austin.

The theme of the Seminar will be leadership in judicial administration by the trial bench. It will be composed of trial judges and will serve as a "trading post" for ideas and practices.

In making the announcement, District Judge J. H. Starley of Pecos, Texas, who is the chairman of the National Conference of State Trial Judges, said, "It has been possible to include only a limited number of the trial judges in the area which have been prorated by states. You have been selected because of your continued interest in the improvement of the administration of justice and your leadership among the trial judges of your state. This, of course, means no reflection on our brethren of the bench not attending. If this "Pilot project" is as successful as we hope, future seminars will be held to reach all trial judges in the courts of equivalent jurisdiction in the area."

Judge Schultz has accepted the invitation and will attend the seminar.

The commencement address, "Ideas Are Weapons," was given by Dr. Albert H. Rosenthal, regional director, U. S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare. Degrees were conferred upon 745 candidates, 49 candidates for the doctor of education degree, 3 for specialist in education, 438 for master of arts degree, 244 for the bachelor of arts (teacher preparation) and 1 for the bachelor of arts in liberal arts.

Miss Newman received her master of arts degree in English. She also has received her bachelor of arts degree from Colorado State College. She has taught in Hobbs, New Mexico. This fall she will return to Raton, New Mexico where she will teach English.

She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Rollo Newman of Stratford and a graduate of Stratford high school.

Stratford Elks Will Invade Vega Friday To Open Football Season

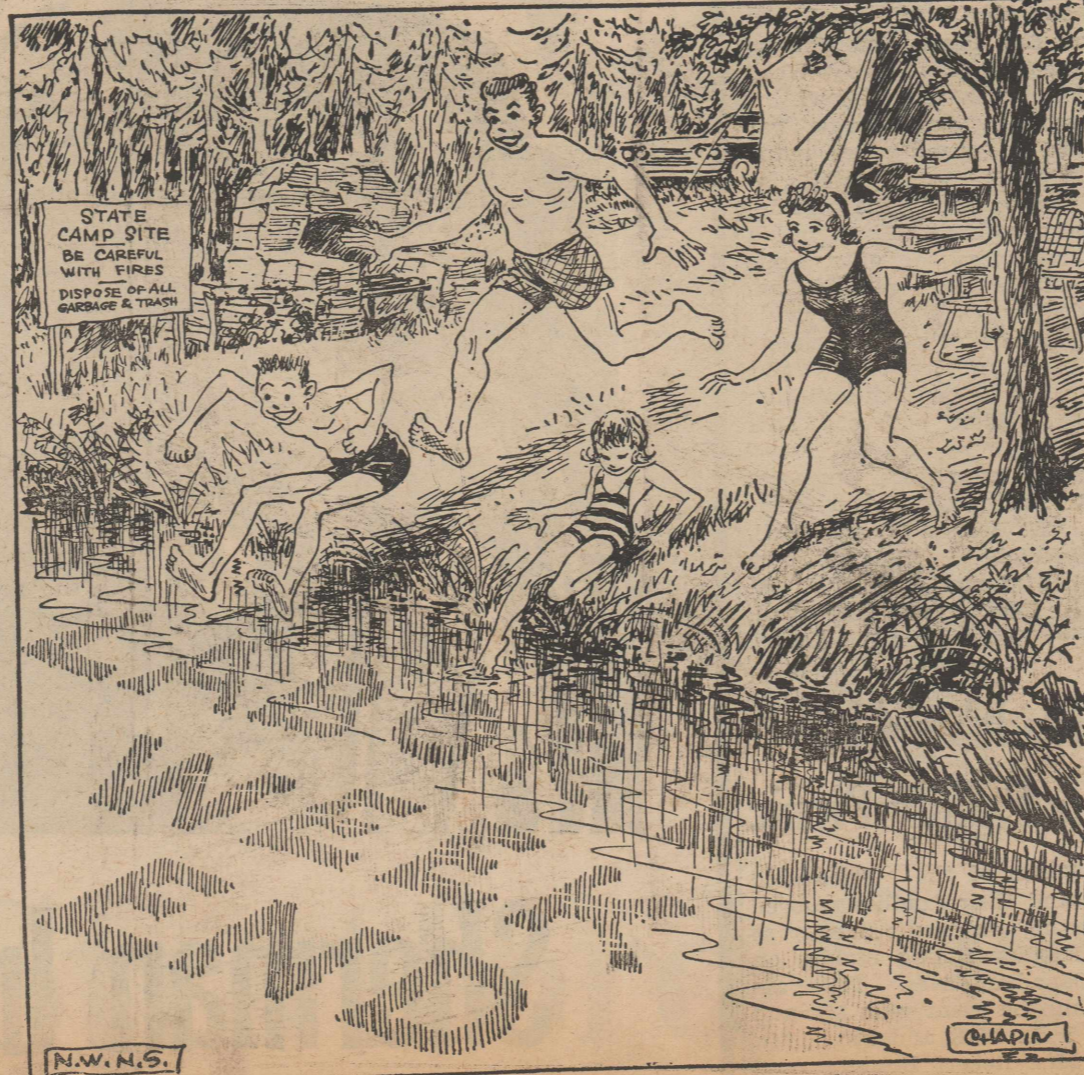
An improved Stratford Elk football team will tangle with the Vega Longhorns Friday night on the Vega gridiron in their first game of the season.

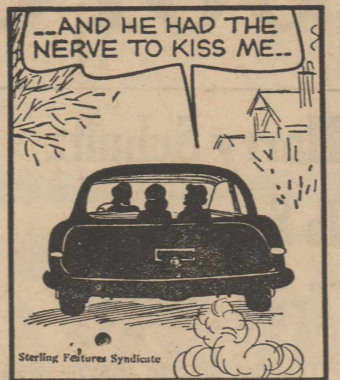

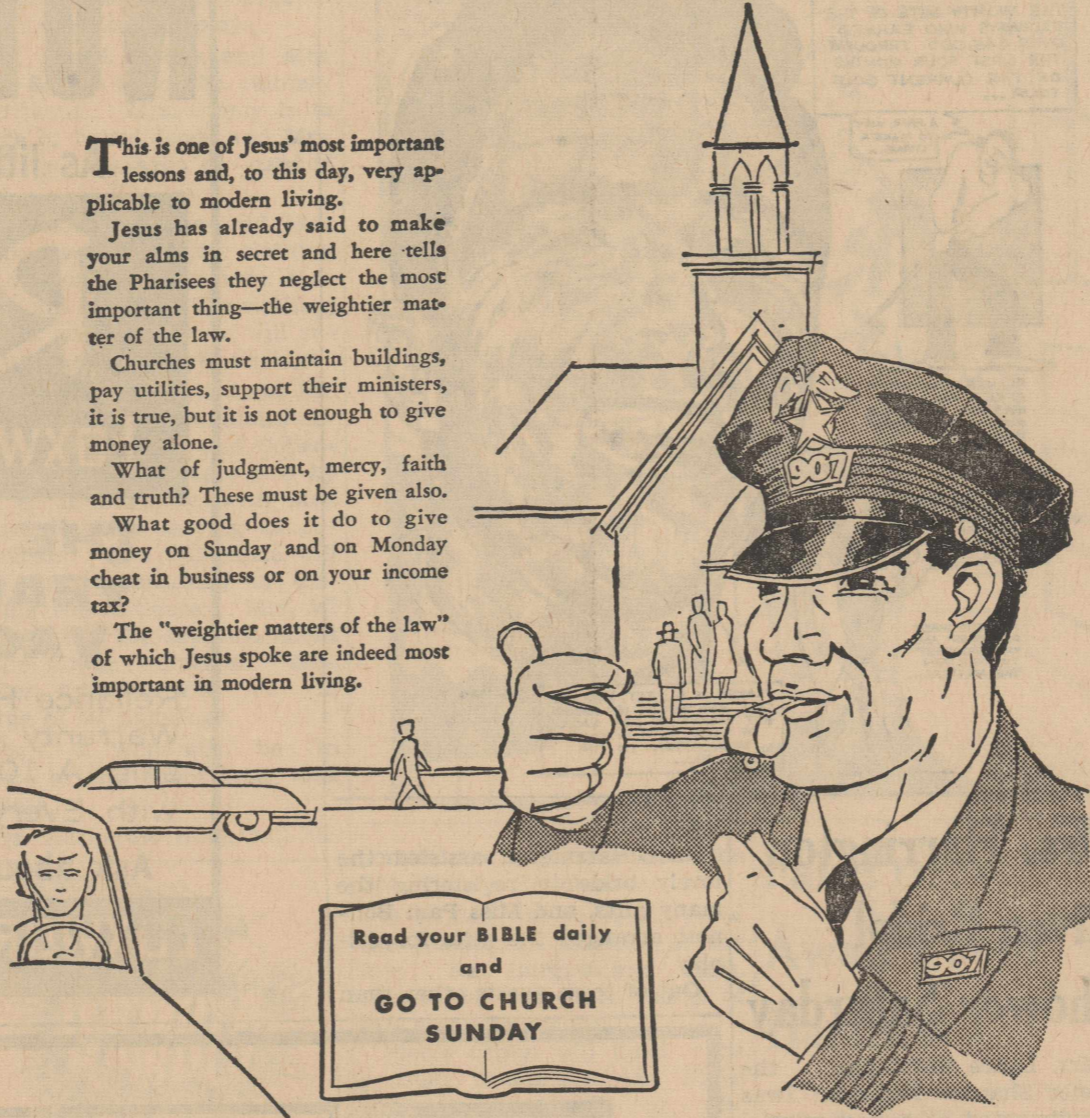
Jesus has already said to make your alms in secret and here tells the Pharisees they neglect the most important thing—the weightier matter of the law.

Little Tips Make Life Easier

One good use for foil is in lining pans for baking roasts, since pans won't then get crusted with meat juices.

Do you budget your money to make it go further? Sit down and make a time budget if your time doesn't extend far enough.

When greasing casseroles, tear a piece of paper toweling and use this for the job, keeping the fingers clean.

When eggs are stored in the refrigerator, keep the pointed ends down so the yolk will be perfectly centered when it's broken. This is very helpful for fried, baked or poached eggs.

(Makes 1 cup)
3 cans deviled ham
¼ teaspoon dry mustard
¼ teaspoon prepared horseradish
¼ cup chopped stuffed olives
2 to 4 tablespoons mayonnaise
Combine all ingredients in a bowl, blending well. Spread on buttered bread.

It saves time in dishwashing if you'll soak pots, pans and cooking utensils as soon as food is removed from them for serving.

Keep a small jar of butter outside the refrigerator at all times so you'll have soft butter for spreading breakfast toast, sandwiches or vegetables.

When making cinnamon toast, replace white sugar with brown as it's easier spreading and less refined than the other sugar, and causes less spilling.

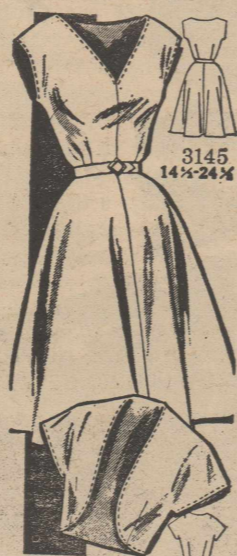
To All Patriotic Americans:
