Dr. Perry E. Gresham, a leading minister of the church and president of Bethany College, one of the oldest Christian Church Colleges, will be president of the convention.

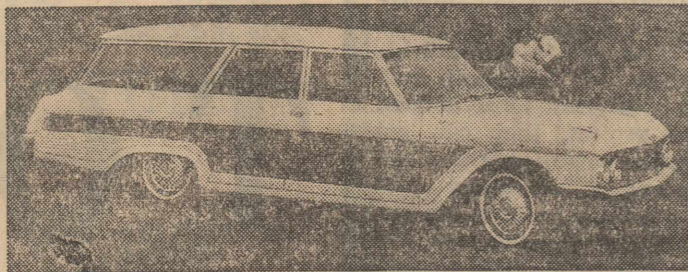
WT Homecoming October 14

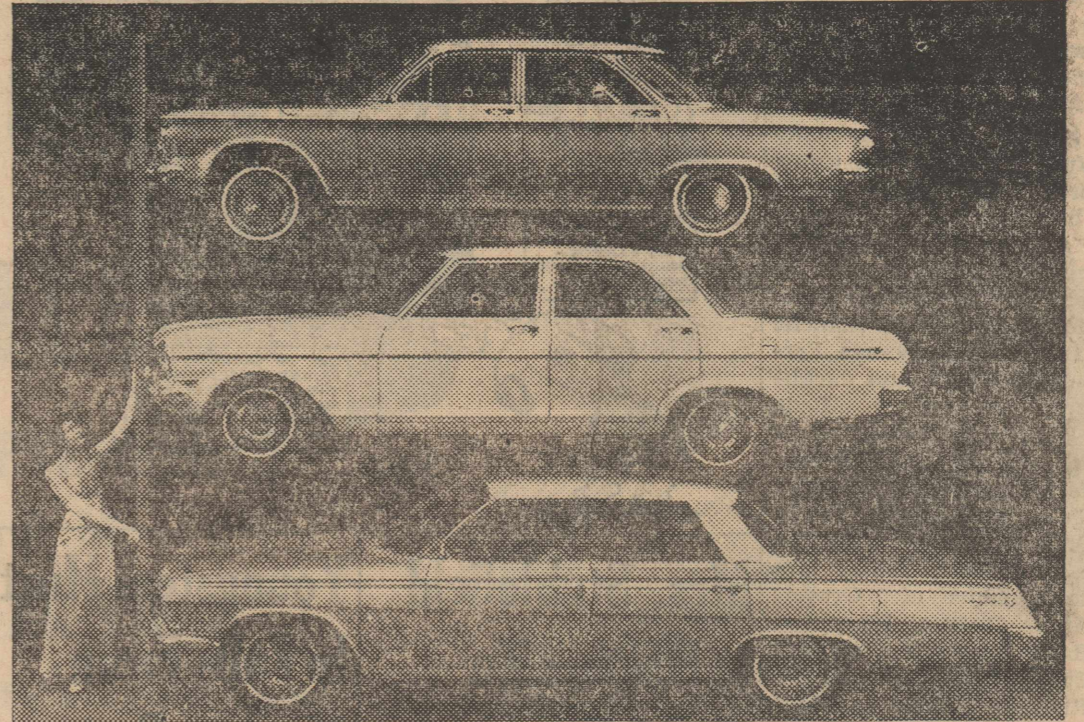
Mrs. Blanck To Show Pictures At Spurlock

R. C. Buckles was re-elected chairman of the Sherman County A. S. C. Committees at the county convention held in the ASC office Monday morning.

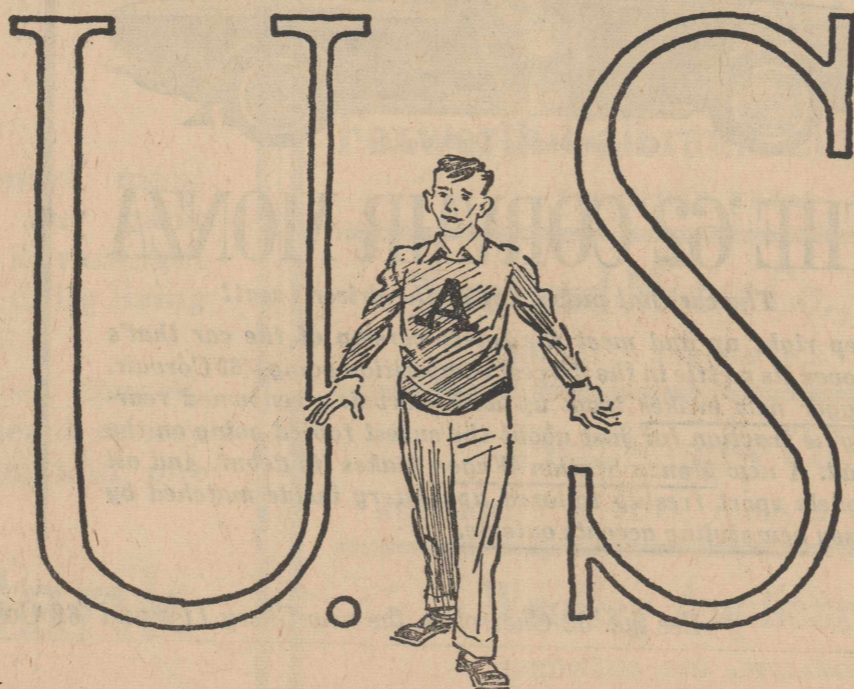

Fight Against Brucellosis Is Lagging

(Dr. C. M. Patterson)

Is Texas' drive against brucellosis bogging down? There are many indications that this is or has already happened. How soon the drive gets back into high gear will have a lot to do with the profits of thousands of cattle owners and swine producers this year and for a number of years to come.

To the individual farmer living in an area where the disease is still not under control, the cost of brucellosis can continue to be very heavy. It can cause a milk loss of up to 25 percent through alternation of the normal lactation periods. It can result in a high abortion rate, and can cause temporary or even permanent infertility.

And, brucellosis strikes the swine producer, too. In swine it causes abortions, posterior paralysis, lameness, swollen joints and infertility.

For the farmer who owns swine or cattle, or both, one of the baffling things about brucellosis is that it can resemble several other disease. This applies to abortions in cattle or swine. It applies also to such symptoms as infertility in cattle and swine, and swollen joints in swine. If problems of this kind develop, it is usually best to have a veterinarian check the herd to determine ex-

actly which condition is causing the trouble. Then proper protective measures can be taken.

Livestock men who want to get something done about brucellosis of cattle will do well to get behind an "area control" program. This plan has proved best to date in getting results. Under an area control plan, the stockmen of an area unite in a common effort to clean up the disease. Veterinarians make periodic tests of all cattle in the area and those cattle which react are eliminated. Thus, all reactors are gradually weeded out. When this plan is coupled with a program of calfhood vaccination, excellent results are usually obtained. The ultimate profit difference to the stockmen of the area can be very great.

For the livestock producer who wants to stop brucellosis losses in his herd, the important thing to remember is that "brucellosis control is always local." It starts on the individual farm and in the individual locality. If farmers in each locality will push hard enough on this project, they can get their area-control program underway and begin reaping the benefits from it. They are our best hope for putting new life and vigor into the drive to stop this costly disease.

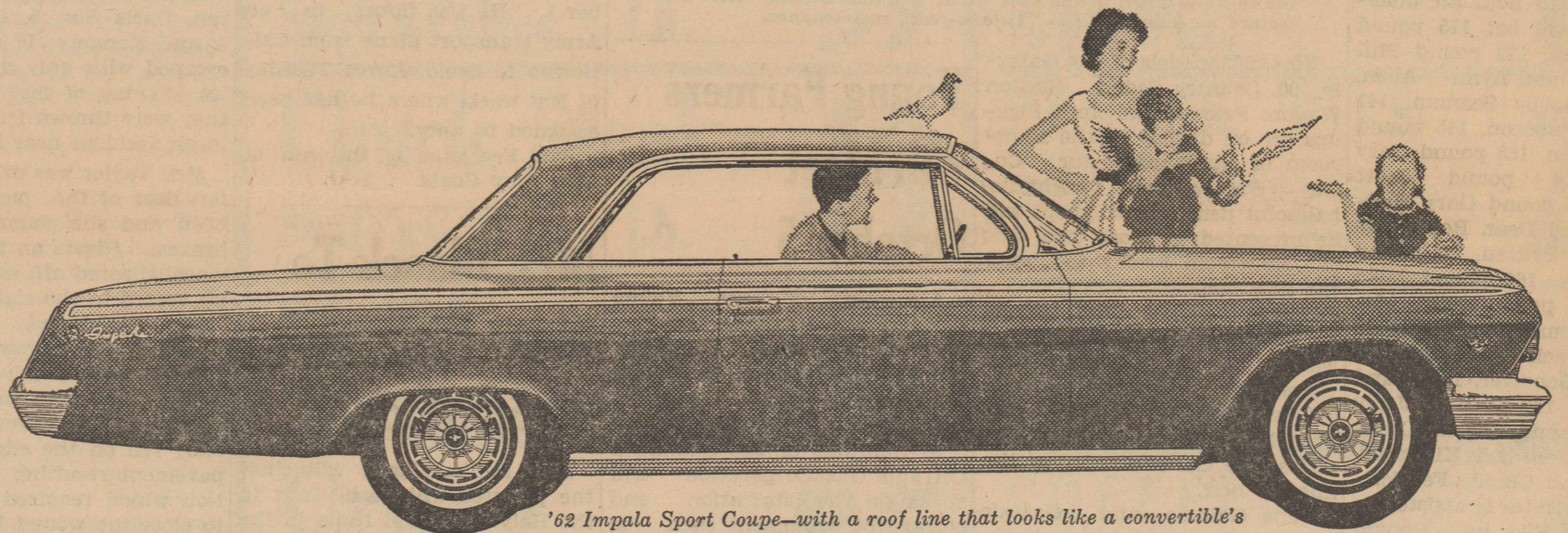

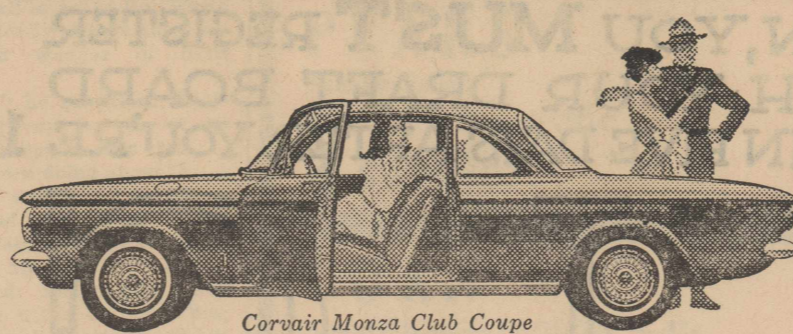

Analyze Texas Tax Dollars

The Texas Legislative Council has taken a new look at where the state's tax dollar comes from and where it goes.

Study reveals that 52 per cent of it is derived from the several types of sales taxes levied in the state, including 15.8 percent from the new 2 percent limited sales tax.

Oil and gas production and severance taxes account for 19.1 percent, business taxes 11.4 percent, vehicle registration fees 9.5 percent, state property taxes 4.1 percent, inheritance tax 1.3 percent, other 2.6 percent.

ing the motor fuel tax at 21.4 percent, the sales tax at 3 percent, and registration fees at 9.5 percent. Nine per cent comes from tobacco taxes and 2.2 percent from alcoholic levies.

The free public school system is taking 33.9 percent of the tax dollar. Highways and roads are next at 26.8 percent. Public welfare gets 15.8 percent. Higher education comes in for 9.6 percent, while health, hospitals and special schools account for 4.5 percent.

U. S. Warned Flu Outbreak Is Likely

An upswing in the influenza cycle is likely to hit the U. S. during the fall and winter, reported Luther L. Terry, MD, surgeon general of the Public Health Service.
Dr. Terry recommended immediate vaccinations for people in the three groups which accounted for most of the 86,000 flu-triggered deaths between September 1957, and March 1960. The groups are: People with heart disease, pulmonary disease, diabetes, and other chronic illnesses; people over 65; and pregnant women.
"We are probably due for some Asian flu outbreaks, since they come in two and three year cycles, and we are overdue for

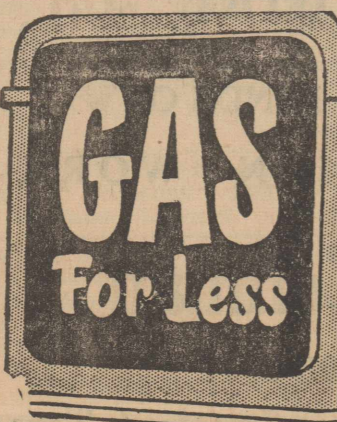

Scout Council President Gives Building Report

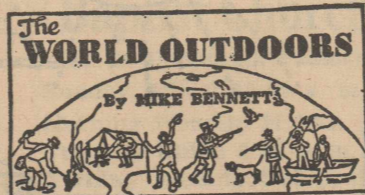
Farris C. Oden, president of the Llano Estacado Council of the Boy Scouts, gives a report of the building program at Camp Don Harrington.
