"bounty hunter" disap peared in the Old West many years ago. Today, as we learn more and more about wildlife and nature's own way of taking care of things, the bounty hunter is fast disappearing from the world outdoors.

The coyote, rattlesnake, mountain lion, fox, jackrabbit have all been the target of money-hunters who killed them in great numbers to collect the "reward"-a few cents or a few dollars-offered by county or state wildlife authorities who thought the bounty system the best way to eliminate a particular species, or to reduce the population of some group which might be getting out of hand

While the bounty may have merits in some special cases, many enlightened wildlife authorities have long argued that its faults by far outweigh its benefits. Let us assume that one county, or one state pays bounties for coyotes, while a neighboring state or county does not. Obviously, the county or state that pays cannot determine that every animal presented for payment of the bounty was killed within its borders and not taken many, many miles away

Another argument against the system is that bounty hunters, for the most part, take the old, weak, diseased animals that would die anyway or fall prey to some other animal. In short, they get the animals that nature would take care of in her own way.

The life cycle for wildlife, both birds and animals is usually well regulated by nature in that a corresponding number of old, weak and diseased of each species die off each year as new ones are born.







#### than the dove. His speed is deceptive and his flight pattern is erratic. He seems to be ambling along in straight flight until you bring up your gun sights and then he darts from side to side with amazing rapidity Dove shoots, traditional in the

South, are a boon to ammunition manufacturers. A dozen or so hunters will scatter about a field where doves are likely to feed creating an apparently impenetrable gauntlet for even the speediest dove. And yet it happens: a dove will fly over the field, accelerate his flight with the first gun blast and zoom clear across the field untouched. As many as ten hunt ers may have fired at him. Of course, many doves don't get away Shooting over a good field. in good dove territory. ten hunters may each get their limit. Usually, however, they expend plenty of

ammunition in the process This is true, as we said, because the dove is a tricky fellow. given to quick bursts of speed which make him a difficult target.
