Friday Is Last Day To Sign Wheat Contracts

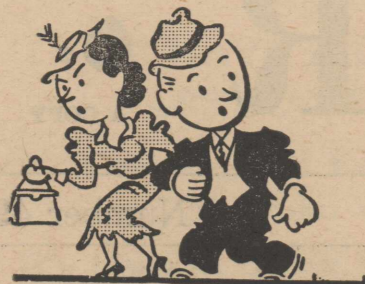
December 1 is the deadline and final date to sign up for participation in the Wheat Stabilization program. It is important that producers sign and file form ASCS-654 in the county office by this date if they want to be eligible for 1962 wheat price support payments. Under the provisions of the program you must plant within your 1962 farm wheat allotment and must designate and divert to conserving uses an acreage equal to 11.11 percent of the allotment. You have the option of diverting more than this amount if you do desire. The acreage you divert from wheat to conserving uses must be in addition to the normal conserving acreage on the farm.
