Is Available

Many Sherman County farmers and ranchers could improve their grasslands, and also their bank account, by overseeding a lot of the "go back" land which has been allowed to revegetate itself with poor producing grasses such as sand dropseed and threeawns.

The cost of overseeding a large area could be relatively small to the farmer if he uses the Great Plains Conservation Program to receive cost share assistance. Under this program, the farmer pays only approximately 20% of the overseeding cost and has the privilege of continuing to graze the land after the better gasses are established. This program can also be used to seed grass into sorghum almum to conservation reserve land that has come out from under contract. Further information may be obtained by writing the Soil Conservation Service in Spearman or by inquiring at the ASCS office in Stratford.

Carefully screen the movies that your children see; knowing that we have a moral obligation to our youth to insist upon movies that provide entertainment and information on subjects that show a responsible standard and morality and decency.
