Elkettes And White Deer In District 1-A Cage Tie

Stratford Elkettes and White Deer girls are in a tie for first place in the District 1-A basketball contests, it was revealed this week by R. W. Standefer Jr., district chairman. Should the trend continue it appears White Deer and the Stratford Elkettes will end in a tie with a play-off necessary. Each team has won five games and lost one. Each team must win their remaining four conference games to continue the tie.

Girls District Ratings

Stratford and White Deer are tied for first place, each team having won five of six games. Gruver is in third place with a record of winning four of six games. Sunray has fourth place with winning two of six games. Panhandle and Stinnett girls are in the lower part of the bracket with a record of each having won one of six games.

Boys District Ratings

White Deer has won all six games they have played. Sunray has won four of six games. Stratford has won three and lost three games. Gruver is in a tie with the Stratford Elks with the same record of three wins and three losses. Panhandle and Stinnett are in the lower part of the bracket with each team having won one of the six games they have played.

In the boys race it appears that the White Deer boys have an inside track to the district crown. They are undefeated in conference play and have only had two close calls. These games being a 57 to 54 win over Stratford and a 56 to 53 overtime win over Sunray.

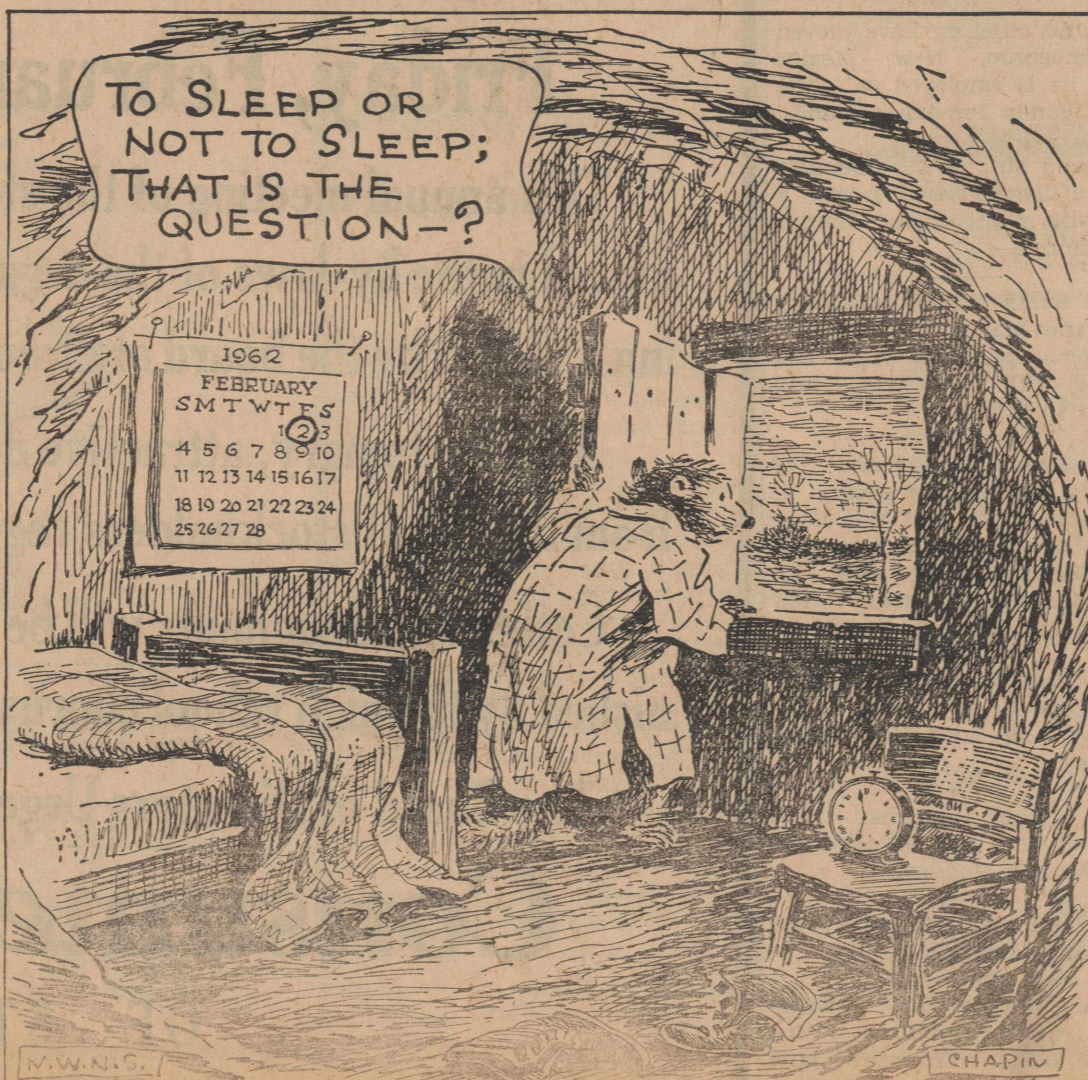

The real answer to the problem of indecent literature can be found in the local community. The following steps are suggested to each parent:

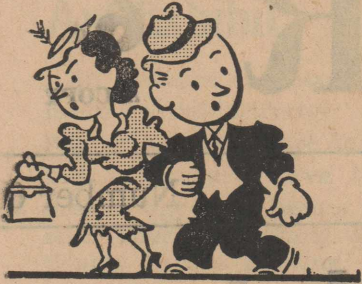
1. In our own home, check carefully our family magazines, books, paperbacks, comic-books. Promote good reading habits by subscribing for good literature.

Though Texas grain sorghum producers set an all-time high of 45 bushels or 2,520 pounds an acre in 1961, they still have a long ways to go to match the 9,383.9 pounds an acre produced by Bill Cole, a Deaf Smith 4-H boy. His yield made with irrigation topped all participants in the 1961 Texas Hybrid Grain Sorghum Production program. He plants RS 610.

Overseeding Aid Is Available

Many Sherman County farmers and ranchers could improve their grasslands, and also their bank account, by overseeding a lot of the "go back" land which has been allowed to revegetate itself with poor producing grasses such as sand dropseed and threawns.

The cost of overseeding a large area could be relatively small to the farmer if he uses the Great Plains Conservation Program to receive cost share assistance. Under this program, the farmer pays only approximately 20% of the overseeding cost and has the privilege of continuing to graze the land after the better grasses are established. This program can also be used to seed grass into sorghum alnum to conservation reserve land that has come out from under contract.

4. If you or any member of your family receive pornographic, obscene or objectionable mail, promptly place it in the hands of Mrs. McAdams at the Post Office. Be careful to save all materials including the covering envelope.

5. Teach our children the facts of life, the sacredness of the human body which God has given to us, and train our precious young minds that "godliness is great gain." The writer Paul, said, "Keep thyself pure." This is still the best rule. Normal appetites, desires, and passions are to be regarded as God-given urges to be used in the right way and for the right purpose.
