

Brucellosis Meeting Feb. 13th

Dr. Richard M. Zirkle, U.S.D.-A. sanitary livestock commissioner, will be the principal speaker at the brucellosis meeting to be held Tuesday, February 13, at 7:30 p. m. in the County Exhibit Building.

Dr. Zirkle will speak on animal disease eradication and discuss the brucellosis control program. Two years ago Sherman County livestock men studied the brucellosis control program and decided to wait until this year before taking action.

Dr. Zirkle will give a report on the progress made in the eradication of brucellosis among livestock in the state, and explain how this county can become a modified certified brucellosis free area. He will discuss some of the problems which livestock men can expect if the county is certified as a brucellosis free area.

It will be up to the livestock men to decide what they want done about handling the situation in the county. Five steps are necessary to get the balance of the county accredited as a certified brucellosis free area.

A petition must be submitted to the Texas Animal Health Commission requesting that the county be declared a type two brucellosis control area.

The petition will require the signature of over fifty percent of the cattlemen owning at least seventy-five percent of the cattle in the territory.

After the effective day of the proclamation declaring this area as a type two brucellosis control area, a hearing will be held.

All mature cattle in dairy and beef cattle herds and twenty percent or more of the mature cattle in commercial herds will have to be tested.

If the positive reactors among cows over three years of age does not exceed over one percent of the livestock population over six months of age, and five percent of the herds in the county, the territory may be certified as a brucellosis free area.

Cattlemen will be given information at the meeting which should enable them to decide what they want to do about the brucellosis control program in Sherman County.

Dallam and Hartley Counties and a small area along the west side of Sherman County have operated for over a year as a modified brucellosis free area. Experiences of these livestock men should aid other producers in deciding the issue.

The brucellosis control educational meeting is being sponsored by the Sherman County Farm Bureau, and they encourage livestock men to attend. Details of the latest research information and how effective the control program has been in Texas, will be revealed by Dr. Zirkle.

Information revealed at the meeting is expected to place livestock producers in a position to make a decision as to what they want to do about putting the program into effect in Sherman County.

County Has Larger Voting Strength

Sherman County voters may poll the largest number of votes in the history of the county in the elections this year. Records in the office of tax collector John Kidwell, reveal that 875 paid poll taxes and 38 exemptions were issued on or before January 31. An estimate of 200 or 300 people in the county over 60 years of age may vote without paying a poll tax or securing an exemption. This will easily swell the voting strength of the county to more than 1,000 if all the qualified voters cast their ballots in the coming elections.

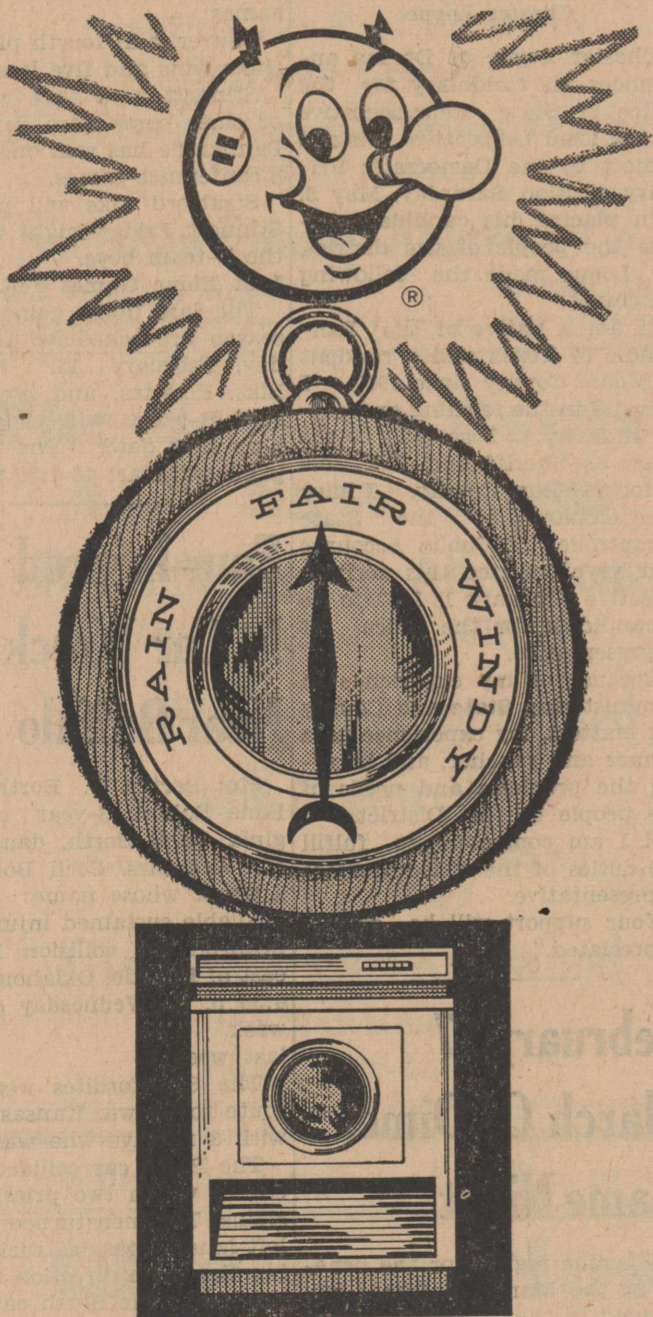

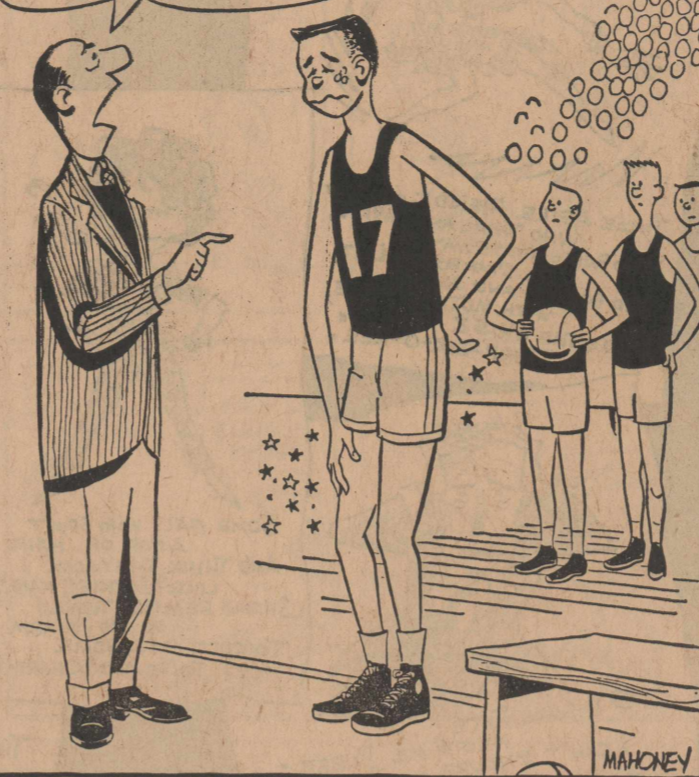

Operation of the program, the chairman explained, will be sim-

by farmers who produce these feed grain crops is required if they want to be eligible for price support in their feed grain crops, including oats and rye. Mrs. Buckles said that for corn and grain sorghum, there must be a minimum reduction of 20 per cent from the farm's 1959-60 average acreage of these crops and the producer must not exceed the farm's barley base. Producers of oats and rye will be eligible for 1962-crop price support if they comply with either the corn-grain sorghum program or the barley program.

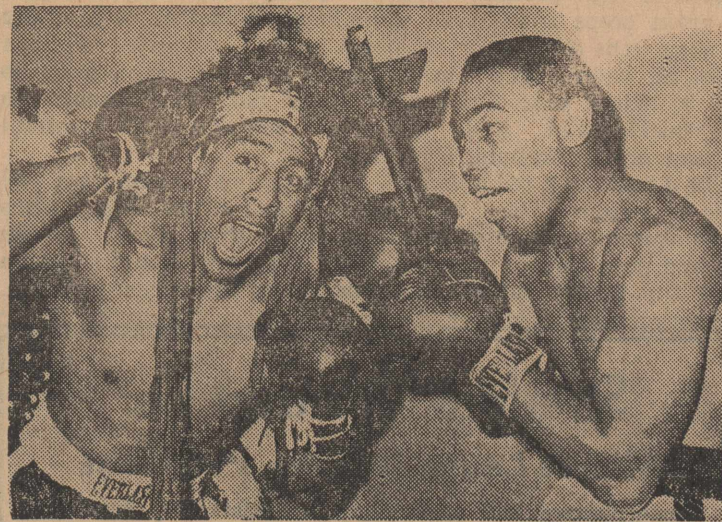

result. The soil test is the best known guide for planning a sound program of fertilizer use and now is a good time to collect samples to be sent in for a chemical analysis. E. Goule, states that information on how to collect and mail samples is available through his office. The new laboratory operated by the Extension Service at the Agricultural Experiment Station in Lubbock has excellent facilities for soil testing and is now entering its second year of operation.

Following the analysis a report is returned to the farmer giving fertilizer recommendations designed to properly balance the plant food elements for the particular crop being planned. The \$2.00 fee for a soil analysis might well be the best investment you could make in the beginning of a crop year Mr. Valentine concluded.

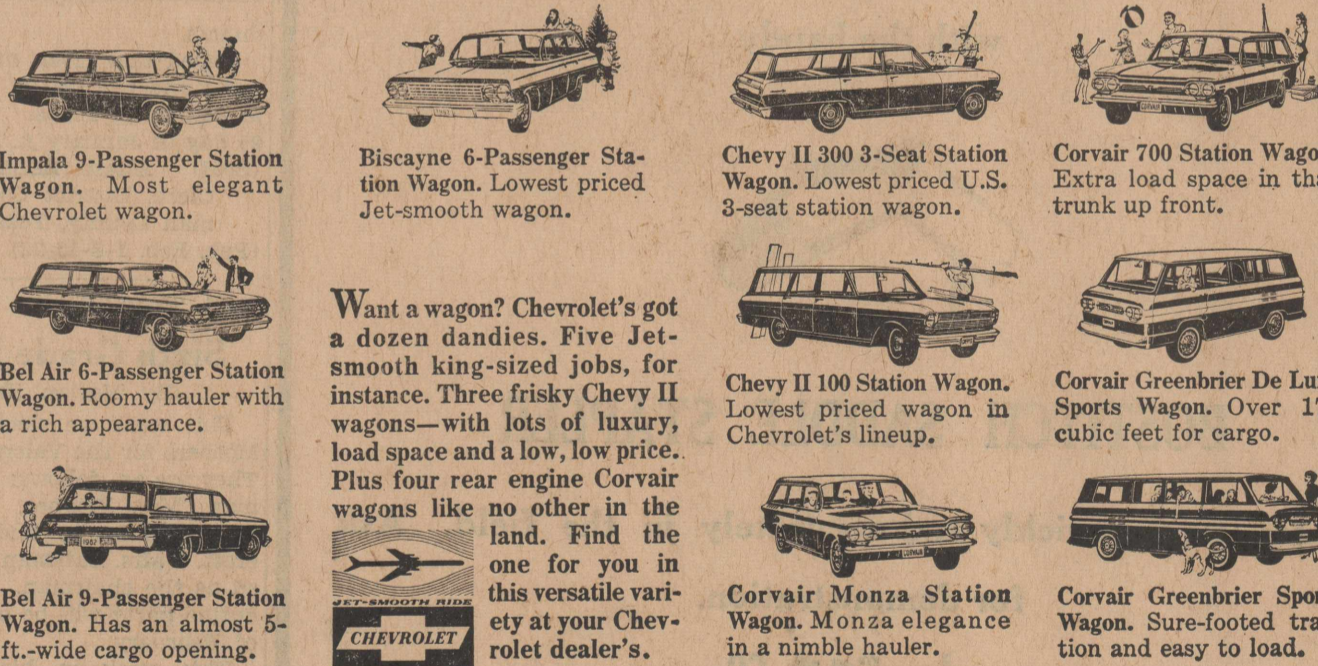

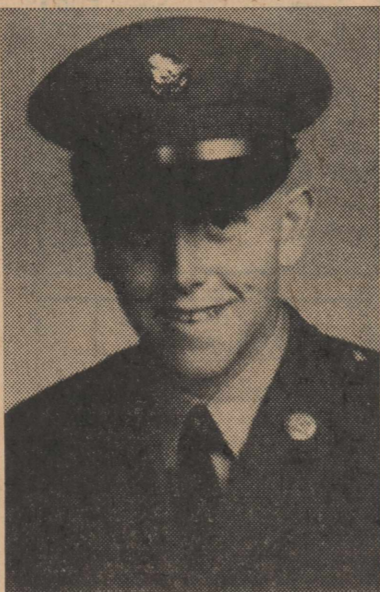

baton student.

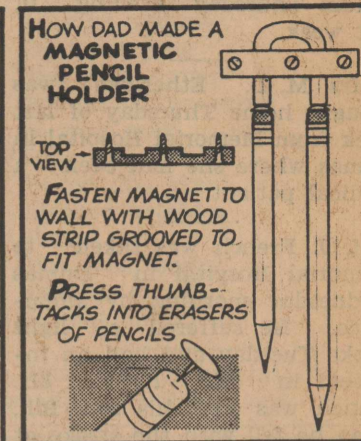
Besides the many floral memorials, a fund has been established by friends as a memorial to the short and beautiful life of Patty Green.
