

County Red Cross Drive Will Be Opened March 1

The annual Sherman County Red Cross fund raising drive will open under the direction of R. J. Hill, fund campaign chairman. A goal of \$690.00 has been set for the county. This would provide the local chapter with \$250.00 to use in emergencies.

Last year the local Red Cross Chapter spent \$241.80 in caring for destitute families. Some of the funds were used in caring for local families but most of the amount was used to aid needy families who were stranded in Stratford.

In the fund raising campaign last year, Sherman County residents contributed \$681.90 to the Red Cross fund.

Leon Guthrie is the county chairman of the local Red Cross chapter. Mrs. Ray McNeal serves the organization as secretary and treasurer. Mrs. Dale Knight is the Red Cross county service officer.

Funds for the Red Cross drive will be raised chiefly by a personal canvass of the county.

School Board Election To Fill Two Vacancies

An election will be held Saturday, April 7, to fill two vacancies on the Stratford School Board. The deadline for candidates to file for their names to appear on the ballot is March 7.

The terms of office of B. L. Smith and Kenneth Kendrick are expiring. Mr. Smith and Mr. Kendrick have indicated they will not be candidates for re-election. B. L. Smith was appointed to fill out the unexpired term of Earl Riffe and then elected to a three year term of office, and has served as a member of the school board for the last five years. Kenneth Kendrick is completing his second three year term on the board and has served as president of the board for several years.

Candidates desiring to file for a place on the ballot should contact C. L. Guthrie, secretary of the board. A change has been made in the filing procedure this year as the Stratford Schools have well over 500 scholastics. When schools have less than 500 scholastics, school board candidates file with the county judge.

The Stratford Schools had 504 scholastics during the 1960-61 term and have increased to 545 during the current term. Since both figures are over the 500 figure the change in filing is being announced to prevent confusion.

The election this year will be held at the school building since the Sherman County courthouse is closed on Saturdays.

Sponsors attending the party were Mr. and Mrs. Duard Lamb, and the guest sponsors were Mr. and Mrs. Conrad Riffe.

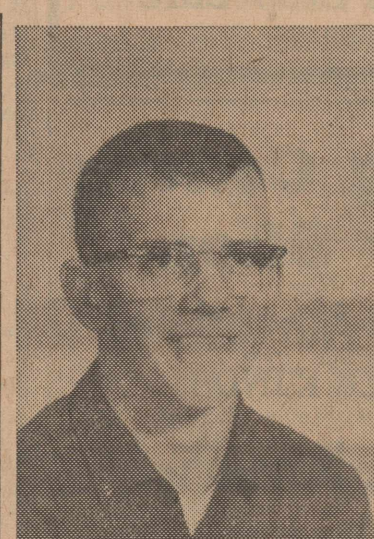
Fire Department Rolls Trucks To Extinguish Fires

Turman Opens Campaign For Lt. Governor

James A. (Jimmy) Turman of Fannin County, speaker of the Texas House of Representatives, has begun his active campaign for Lieutenant Governor.

Speaker Turman said his decision to run for Lieutenant Governor was "based on the sincere belief that my record as a legislator and as presiding officer of the House qualifies me for the duties required of the Lieutenant Governor — to preside over the State Senate in a fair, effective and democratic manner and to help preserve the God-given personal and political rights and liberties of all our citizens."

"I will announce my platform in the very near future. Let me say at this time, however, I believe that the only legitimate forces in State government are the wills and rights of all our citizens deciding the issues through their elected state officials, and not through the 'Big Lobbyists' in Austin."

"I want the support of all Texas citizens in establishing fiscal responsibility in State government, and, at the same time, support in providing the protection and services our people have a right to expect from our prosperous State with an ever-expanding economy."

"I want and need every Texan's support, from business and industry, labor, education, the professions, government, farming and ranching, and all other segments of our social and economic life."

Speaker Turman added, "I will meet and visit personally with as many people as time, between now and the primary, will permit. I pledge diligence to duty, integrity of purpose, and honorable service with fairness to all if elected Lieutenant Governor."

Turman worked his way through East Texas State College as a bus boy, dish washer and waiter, drug store clerk and bookkeeper, receiving the B. S. and M. S. degrees in Business Administration. He earned a Doctor's Degree in Education from the University of Texas. He has been a teacher and administrator in the public schools and two state colleges.

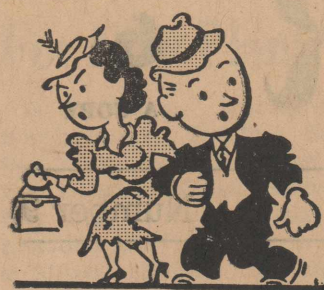

Every Effective Anti-Communist Should Know The Answers To These Questions

1. When did the Communist Party start in the United States?

According to J. Edgar Hoover the Communist Party, USA, first started in Chicago, Illinois in 1919. In the beginning it seemed little more than a freak. Yet in the years that have followed that freak has grown into a powerful monster that is endangering every one of us. The 1919 communist were a motley group, but today have emerged into a highly efficient operating party; and it is doubtful if most of us really realize how efficient. Today it is controlled by a very few and from the Kremlin.

J. Edgar Hoover and his staff can take care of the spies and saboteurs, if the politicians will let him. But Mr. Hoover has not proposed to the public that it should become disinterested in the problem of Communism.

2. Define a Republic: Authority is derived through the election by the people of public officials best fitted to represent them.

Attitude toward property is respect for laws and individual rights, and sensible economic procedure.

Attitude toward law is the administration of justice in accord with the fixed principle and established evidence, with strict regard to consequences; a greater number of citizens and extent of territory may be brought within its compass; Avoids too dangerous extreme of either tyranny or mobocracy; Results in statesmanship, liberty, reason, justice, contentment and progress; is the "standard form" of government throughout the world.

3. Define a Democracy:

A government of masses Authority divided through mass meeting or any other form of "direct" expression; results in mobocracy; attitude toward property is communisticnegating property rights; attitude toward law is that the will of the majority shall regulate, whether it be based on deliveration or governed passion, prejudice, and impulse, without restraint or regard to consequences; results in demagogism, license, agitation, discontent and anarchy.

4. Who heads the Communist Party in America?

Gus Hall, whose real name is Halberg, (a Jew).

To The Residents

OF STRATFORD AND SHERMAN COUNTY

Recently the equipment of the Fire Department has been blocked from attending fires by spectators following the fire trucks too close and getting in the way. Section 100 of the Traffic Code of the State of Texas provides "The driver of any vehicle other than one on official business shall not follow any fire apparatus traveling in response to a fire alarm closer than 500 feet, or drive in to or park such vehicle within the block where the fire apparatus has stopped to answer a fire alarm". Section 101 of the Traffic Code provides "No driver of a vehicle shall drive over an unprotected hose of a Fire Department when laid down on any street, private driveway or alley, to be used at any fire or alarm of fire, without the consent of the Fire Department Official in command." This includes Motor Scooters, bicycles, etc.

These provisions are punishable by fine of not to exceed \$200.00 and cost of prosecution.

It is also contrary to ordinances of the City of Stratford and the PEOPLE ARE WARNED THAT THESE PROVISIONS WILL BE STRICTLY ENFORCED, COMPLAINT MADE AGAINST VIOLATORS AND FINES ASSESSED.

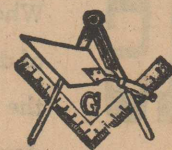

Farm Labor Meetings Set

"The Farm Labor Days inaugurated January 1 by the Texas Employment Commission, have been successful in bringing many farmers and farm workers together," according to a statement made by Charlie Warner, manager of the Borger office.

USDA Announces Details Of Feed Grain Programs

The U. S. Department of Agriculture announces dates and other details of the price-support operation for the 1962-crop feed grains (corn, barley, grain sorghum, oats and rye).

Corn, barley and grain sorghum producers who participate in the 1962 feed grain program by diverting acreage to conserving uses will be eligible for price support on these crops. The required reduction does not apply to qualified malting barley producers.

Corn and grain sorghum producers will be eligible for support on these crops if they reduce their corn and grain sorghum acreage by a minimum of 20 per cent and do not exceed their base acreage (1959-60 average) of barley. Barley producers will be eligible for barley support if they reduce their barley by the minimum 20 per cent and do not exceed their base acreage of corn and grain sorghum.

Based on a review of an earlier determination, participation in the 1962 feed grain program will not be a condition of eligibility for 1962-crop oats and rye price support. This is also a change from the 1961 program when participation in the 1961 feed grain program for corn and grain sorghum was required to be eligible for 1961 support on oats and rye.

Under legislation authorizing the feed grain program, there will be a quantitative limitation on 1962 production of corn, grain sorghum and barley that can be put under support from eligible farms. The eligible quantity will be that equal to the farm's 1959-60 average per acre yield times the corn, grain sorghum or barley planted acreage as determined by the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee. There will be no limits on the quantities of oats and rye put under support.

As in the past, price support on the five feed grains will be carried out through farm and warehouse-stored loans and purchase agreements. These will be available through county ASCS offices. To be eligible for price support, the grains

must be in adequate storage.

Price support on barley, grain sorghum, oats, and rye will be available from harvest time through January 31, 1963, and on corn through May 31, 1963, in most areas.

Loans in most States will mature on March 31, 1963, for grain sorghum; on April 30, 1963, for barley, oats and rye; and on July 31, 1963, for corn. Earlier maturity dates may be set for some areas because of storage conditions or early harvests.

To be eligible for support, these crops must have been produced in 1962. Corn must grade No. 3 or better, except that corn grading No. 4 because of test weight only will also be eligible. Corn must meet certain moisture requirements.

Minimum eligibility requirements for other feed grains are: Grade No. 4 or better, or No. 4 garlicky or better for barley; grade No. 4 or better, grade No. 4 smutty or better, or grade No. 4 discolored or better, and containing not more than 13 per cent moisture, for grain sorghum; grade No. 3 or better, or No. 3 garlicky or better, for oats; and grade No. 2 or better, or grade No. 3 because of test weight only, and containing not more than 1 per cent ergot, for rye.

County support rates with premiums and discounts for quality will be announced later. In addition, terminal rates will be set for barley, grain sorghum, and rye and will also be announced later.

Under the feed grain program, payments will be made to farmers who divert corn, grain sorghum, and barley acreage to conserving uses. The payments will maintain farmers' incomes, and the acreage reduction will

continue the trend started with last year's program to bring about a better balance between

feed grain production and needs. As was done last year, about (Continued on Page 6)

Public Service Lets Contract For New Plant

A. R. Watson, president of Southwestern Public Service Company, has announced that the Missouri Valley Constructors, Inc., of Amarillo, has been awarded the contract to build a 210,000 kilowatt turbine-generator unit at the company's Plant X, located 7 miles north of Amherst, Texas.

Construction will begin this week, with completion scheduled for June 1964.

The new unit, manufactured by the General Electric Company, is the largest single turbine-generator ever installed in the area served by Southwestern Public Service Company.

In making the announcement, Watson stated that the new addition represents an investment of \$15,000,000 and is dramatic evidence that this region continues to be one of the fastest growing sections of the country.

This will be the fourth generating unit at Plant X, and will bring the capability up to 487,000 kilowatts, and the total for all 12 of Southwestern's plants, to more than 1,200,000 kilowatts.

The electrical construction will be handled by Service Electric Company, Carlsbad, New Mexico.

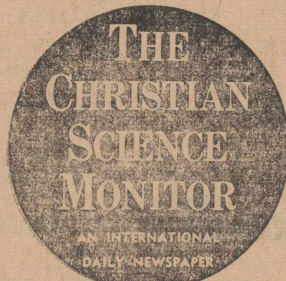

from Commodity Credit Corporation stocks of feed grains. However, producers may receive the cash equivalent of the in-kind payment and ask the CCC to act as their agents in marketing the grain. Provision is also made for producers to obtain grains directly from CCC stocks, if stocks are available locally,

as payment or to use the payment in purchasing grain that they have under price-support loan.

As announced, support rates for 1962 feed grains are as follows:

Corn — \$1.20 per bushel average for all grades.
 Barley — 93 cents per bushel

for grade No. 2 or better.

Grain sorghum — \$1.93 per hundredweight for grade No. 2 or better.

Oats — .62 cents per bushel for grade No. 3.

Rye — \$1.02 per bushel for grade No. 2 or better, or grading; No. 3 on test weight only. The 1962 support prices an-

nounced February 2 reflect approximately 74 per cent of January 1962 parity prices of \$1.62 per bushel for corn, \$1.25 for barley and 84.3 cents for oats; 69 per cent of the rye parity of \$1.48, and about 78 per cent of grain sorghum parity of \$2.48 per hundredweight. The support prices for 1961

crops were set at \$1.20 per bushel for corn, 93 cents per bushel for barley, 62 cents per bushel for oats, all reflecting about 74 per cent of parity; \$1.02 per bushel for rye reflecting 69 per cent of parity, and \$1.93 per hundredweight for grain sorghum, reflecting 78 per cent of parity.
