

## Summerour Crushed By Self-Guiding Tractor

Jimmy Summerour, 31, was seriously injured Tuesday morning while deep plowing in a field belonging to his father, J. E. Summerour.

Summerour apparently stumbled and fell in the path of a self-guiding tractor. He sustained a fractured leg, hip, and other injuries as the tractor passed over him and lay helpless in its path as it circled the field and returned to the location where he lay.

As the tractor and plow neared Summerour, the guiding mechanism apparently jumped its furrow and the tractor ran into a pickup parked in the field.

Summerour underwent surgery in Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo at 8:30 p. m. Tuesday. His condition was described as serious.

The injured man was discovered by two neighbors. He was rushed to Coon Memorial Hospital in Dalhart and later transferred to the Amarillo hospital.

## Cars Wrecked In Traffic Accidents

Arthur Milton escaped serious injury when his car collided with livestock on U. S. Highway 287 about 5 miles south of Stratford Wednesday night of last week. The car struck five calves. Three were killed and two were crippled. Fortunately, the calves went over the car instead of under it, preventing a more serious accident.

Emory D. Roper, Dwayne Lavake and Wayne Lavake were able to walk away from a car wreck about two miles northeast of Stratford on U. S. Highway 54 Saturday morning. The two cars in which they were riding were demolished.

Both cars were driving toward Stratford. The Lavake boys were driving at a moderate rate of speed. Roper, driving in the same direction, had just passed a truck. According to his statement, shortly after he passed the truck and pulled back on his side of the road, the driver of the truck raised his lights back on bright. He adjusted his rear view mirror to prevent the reflection of the lights in his eyes. When he looked back at the road, the Lavake car was directly in front of him. He swerved to the left, the right front side of his car striking the left rear corner of the Lavake car.

## Let Contract For Improving Highway 54

A contract for 13.5 miles of construction on U. S. 54 in Sherman and FM-289 in Hartley counties has been awarded to an Amarillo, firm, it was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission.

Cooper & Woodruff, Inc., submitted the low bid of \$435,519.00 on the project. Grading, structure widening, flexible base, a two course surface treatment and asphalt concrete pavement from Stratford to the Dallam County line, and from Stratford 6.6 miles east, and the work in Hartley County is expected to take 175 working days. Plans include the widening of the bridge west of Stratford.

Charles W. Smith, district highway engineer of Amarillo, and H. L. Gallegly, resident engineer of Dalhart, will be in active charge of the project while it is under construction.

## Good Roads Ass'n. Offers Scholarships

High school seniors are eligible to enter a \$400 scholarship essay contest which is being sponsored by the Texas Good Roads Association. First prize will be a \$250 scholarship to the college or university of the student's choice, plus an expense-paid trip to Austin for the winner and parent or guardian to receive the award. The second prize will be a \$100 scholarship and the third prize will be a \$50 scholarship.

Funds for the scholarship prizes are on deposit in an Austin bank.

All contestants will use "What better highways mean to my community" as the title of their entry. Essays will be limited to 500 words or less, typewritten or in clearly legible and neat handwriting in ink. Each entry must contain the following information: student's name, name of high school, name of city or town, student's residence address. Entries must be submitted on 8 1/2 x 11 inch white paper.

Originality of thought and quality of writing will be the prime considerations of the judges. Entries will be judged by: Callan Gramma, executive-president of the Texas Good Roads Association; Dr. DeWitt C. Reddick, director of the School of Journalism at the University of Texas; and D. C. Cree, State Highway Engineer.

Entries must be mailed to the Texas Good Roads Association, Suite One, Perry-Brooks Building, Austin, Texas. All entries must be postmarked before the deadline of midnight, April 30, 1962. Winners will be announced before or during National Highway Week, May 20-26, 1962.

### Venezuela Asks For 50 Americans

"Venezuela has asked for fifty Americans with agriculture or home economics experience to help establish rural youth clubs in their country," says E. Goule.

Peace Corps applicants who are accepted for this assignment will work principally with youth under twenty years of age. Volunteers will work in groups of two at Extension agencies with Venezuela agriculturalists.

Qualifications for this Peace Corps project calls for a farm background; 4-H or similar youth organization experience; minimum of eighteen years of age; and the equivalent of a high school education.

E. Goule says, "Married couples are eligible if both qualify and they have no dependents under eighteen years of age."

Peace Corps Volunteers receive a living allowance which covers food, clothing, housing, and medical care. In addition, they accumulate \$75 a month which amounts to \$1800 after two years of service.

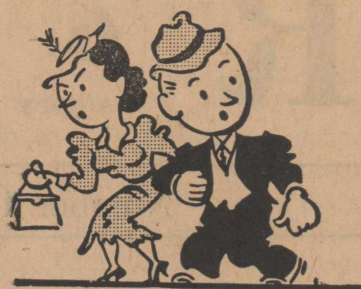

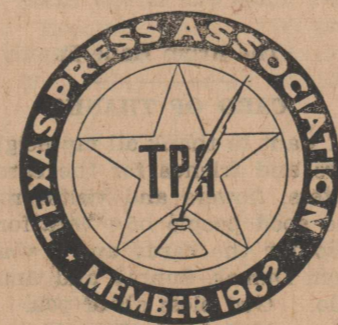

## Year-End Nears For 1961 Wool Program

The 1961 wool program incentive payments, to be made this summer, will cover only wool and unshorn lambs which are marketed on or before March 31, 1962. This is the closing date for the 1961 program, which extends from April 1, 1961, through March 31, 1962. Growers will have 30 days after the closing date in which to file their applications for payments.

Payments to producers for the 1961 marketing year will follow the same methods used in previous years. Shorn wool payments will be equal to a percentage of each producer's cash returns from wool sales. The percentage, to be announced later, will be that required to raise the national average price received by all producers for shorn wool during the marketing year up to the incentive price of 62 cents per pound.

Lamb payments will be made to each producer who sells lambs that have never been shorn. The payments will be
