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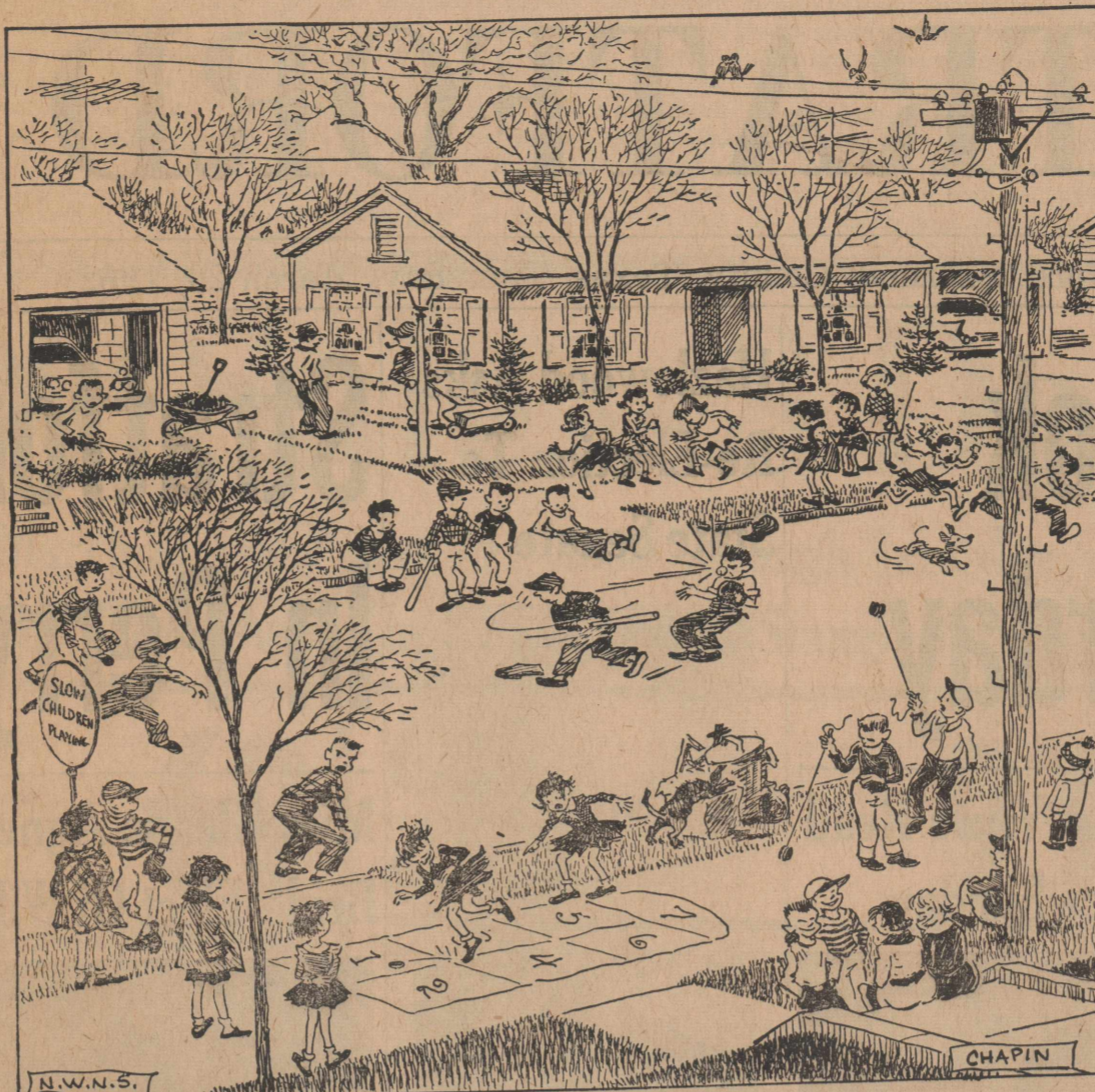

# TWIN BAMES GIRLS AMUSE AND CONFUSE STUDENTS

Two freshman girls, Norveta and Nanfreda Bammes, are helping to confuse the teachers and other students at Amarillo College. The reason is simple: the girls are twins.

Norveta and Nanfreda are fraternal twins born September 10, 1942, in Stratford, Texas. The girls maintained high scholastic averages throughout their grade and high school education. Norveta had a 90+ average, and Nanfreda, an 85 average. The girls are both attending AC on Beta Sigma Phi scholarships, and Norveta has an additional scholarship from the Study Club at Stratford. Since the girls are not identical, they decided to dress differently in college, and thus make a stress on individuality. The girls both share the same vocation, that of nursing.

Norveta and Nanfreda are presently enrolled in the Northwest Texas Hospital School of Nursing. After two years at AC and Northwest, the girls will have completed their pre-nursing training. A three year training period will follow, and on its completion the twins will have achieved their degrees in nursing. A year plus nine weeks of special instruction at Texas University completes the program, and these girls will be ready to care for the sick.

The twins' favorite sport is basketball. They are both active members of the Northwest Texas Hospital intramural squad. (This is the team that annually challenges the doctors to a tournament. The score this year was tied.) Score any points? The twins answered, "No, we aren't forwards."

The girls are taking 16 hours each, and have all their classes together. Norveta said that this is often a little confusing to the instructors, but that the students seem to know the difference. Nanfreda cited as an example one of their math classes. She worked two problems on the board, one as Norveta, and the other as Nanfreda. The class was amused, but Freda said she hated to make a fuss about working the problems. After all, they were sisters.

Another advantage of twinship was not discovered until the girls arrived at Northwest. The girls at NWTH are allowed a certain amount of time at the telephone. Twins get extra time by insisting that the other one was on the phone. And then visa-versa. If you're confused, just think of how the dorm superintendent must feel! Freda said that this is one time she likes to make a fuss. All the girls like to tease the "dorm Mother."

The twins study very much together, partly from habit, and partly because they enjoy each other's company. Still, they feel they want to be apart. The girls share their pleasure with Amarillo and Amarillo College. They like the students, instructors and general campus at the college, and the "friendly city" of Amarillo.

The girls are long line Demo-

crats, and said that no matter who was running, they would vote a straight Democratic ticket. The only exception mentioned was in the college's elections, where there are no parties (political).

When asked about boys, the girls smiled and said, "We think we'd better evade that question for our own health. Amid smiles and laughter, the fraternal twins answered that the best part about AC was campusology.

The people who I am directing this article to are really missing out on a lot. Not that they will enjoy what they would learn and see, but these people would realize and open their (Continued on Page 6)

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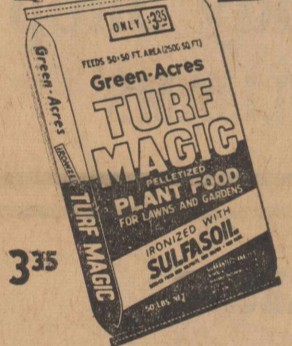
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## John Pilch Given Gift By Camera Fans

The WAC recruiter informed the girls of the senior class of the opportunities offered in her branch of the service.

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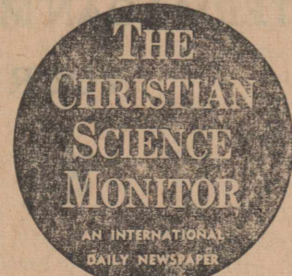


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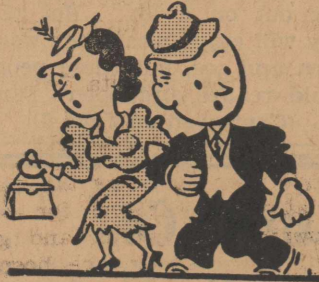

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# Snow Falls

Moisture laden snow which started falling at 8:00 a. m. Saturday, began breaking down telephone lines, telegraph lines and electric power lines shortly after 11:00 a. m.

Although the highways were never closed and the trains ran on schedule, Stratford had no other means of communication with the outside world.

Stratford was about in the center of the snow storm which extended from 35 to 40 miles in all directions. In Stratford the official reading was .61 of an inch of moisture. The official estimated depth of the snow was turned in as four inches.

At Conlen Jesse Davis, read the moisture at 1.40 of an inch. Other outlying sections reported up to 1.25 of an inch of moisture from the rain and snow.

Many television antennas and towers buckled under the weight of the snow, which piled up inches deep on any stationary object.

Electric power which was off all afternoon in Stratford was restored about 10:40 p. m. Saturday.

High temperatures Sunday melted practically all of the snow before sundown. Wheat grew rapidly in the 82 degree weather Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday.

REA lines are down over most of the county. Those depending on electric water pumps are being forced to visit away from

home or haul water. The Rita Blanca Cooperative servicing the area, reports over 700 poles were down in the eastern two-thirds of its system.

High winds Saturday afternoon damaged telephone lines in the Keyes, Boise City, Stratford and Dalhart area. In the Keyes area, the Boise City-Keyes toll circuits were broken for a distance of approximately six miles between Boise City and Keyes. Work was started Sunday morning to repair the damage, with extra help being called in from other districts. Long distance service was not restored in Keyes until Monday.

Between Stratford and Dalhart approximately 25 poles were broken, wire broken and otherwise damaged for a distance of 25 miles between the two points. One circuit was opened for emergency telephone calls Tuesday.

# Buy Your 1962 Motor Vehicle License

BEFORE APRIL FIRST

Your License Plates may be put on at the time of purchase. Farmers may register Truck-Tractors as Farm Trucks.

Cars with out-of-state license must have 1961 Texas tags before 1962 tags may be sold for the cars, if the cars are registered any time before April 1.

All vehicles must bear 1962 tags by midnight of April 1, 1962.

To avoid delay and confusion bring your certificate of title and last year's registration receipt.

Your County Tax Collector is Required under the Law to Examine the Title and License Receipt before he can renew the registration of your vehicle.

### Students Visit Cactus Plant

Chemistry and physics students of Stratford High School recently toured the Phillips 66 Chemical Company's Cactus Plant.

Anhydrous ammonia, nitric acid, and ammonium nitrate are the principal products of the plant. The ammonia and ammonium nitrate are used mainly for fertilizers while the nitric acid is usually used to make ammonium nitrate.

The 460 people now employed at the Cactus Plant maintain the safest of working conditions. Safety equipment, goals, and awards are used to encourage safety. Hard hats and safety glasses are worn in many parts of the plant. The students wore hard hats on all parts of their tour.

Ammonia is produced at the plant by a modification of the Haber process in which hydrogen and nitrogen are combined directly. This ammonia is shipped from Cactus in railroad tank cars or tank trucks. Nitric acid is produced by the Ostwald process. Ammonium nitrate is made by the combination of anhydrous ammonia and nitric acid. This solution is sprayed through a prilling tower where it crystallizes into the white prills that are used as fertilizer. It is then packaged in paper bags.

Before touring the plant, the students were shown slides and literature to explain what they saw. Guides then pointed out and explained the various steps. The students were especially interested in the laboratories. It was a very enjoyable and educational trip for everyone.

the Sub and Free Conference Committees on appropriations in 1961, and my Senate subcommittee 'lopped' off \$24,000,000 from the spending bill pass-

ed by the House." "I voted against the general, all-purpose appropriations bills at two different regular sessions, 1957 and 1959, in protest of some of this 'frill' spending, and because they were definitely discriminatory to the Panhandle. During the last six years, I have voted for only one spending bill out of the four that passed".

Legislation I Have Opposed "I believe in cooperation, but I have not been, nor will I ever be a member of any 'follow-the-leader' — play-on-the-team' group to push through legislation favorable to the political careers of some of our ambitious leaders. I opposed efforts to put a 1¢ a gallon tax on gasoline; a 10% increase in irrigation gas; a double the tuition

hike on college students and many others. I personally assumed the lead in killing a House-passed insecticide and 2-4D spraying bill which would have compelled every farmer or other user to set up miniature observation stations, fill out blank forms as long as automobile mortgages, putting the time of day spraying was performed, the direction and speed of the

wind, etc., and then sign and mail those reports to an Austin bureau. I also took the lead in defeating a House-passed bill by members from El Paso and Harlingen which put all underground water in the hands of still another Austin bureau — compelling farmers to file applications to drill irrigation wells. But the prize provision of that bill was that which com-

pelled irrigation farmers to make proof before this Austin bureau that his underground water supply was being replenished as fast as he was using it. Only water for household and livestock use was exempt under its terms. I repeat — I intend fighting legislation like this which is adverse to the interests of the people of my district — I don't care who is pushing it."
