





Fine hair should never be thinned; it should be cut blunt to hold its body. More pin curls are needed for fine hair than thick, so each hair does more to make the hair look full.

Coarse hair should be cut blunt, then shaped so it is molded to the head. Thinning the hair helps to mold it to the head.

greased cookie sheet, wide

apart. Bake in a slow (300°F.)

oven until lightly browned.
