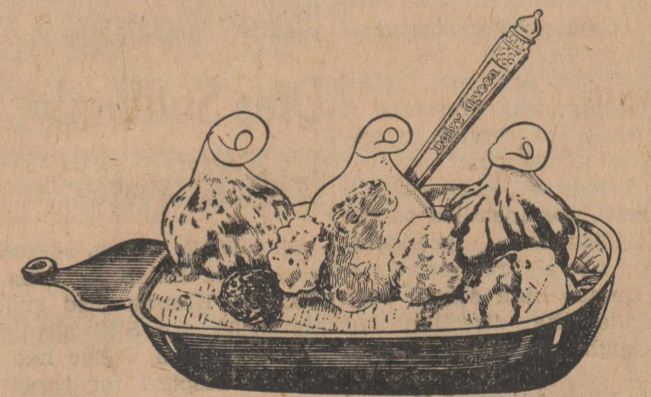

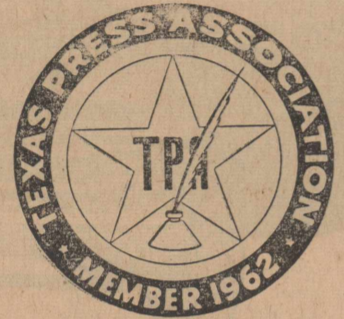

A brief social period of coffee and doughnuts will be enjoyed from 10:00 a. m. until 10:15 a. m. The 30-minute morning service will follow the coffee.

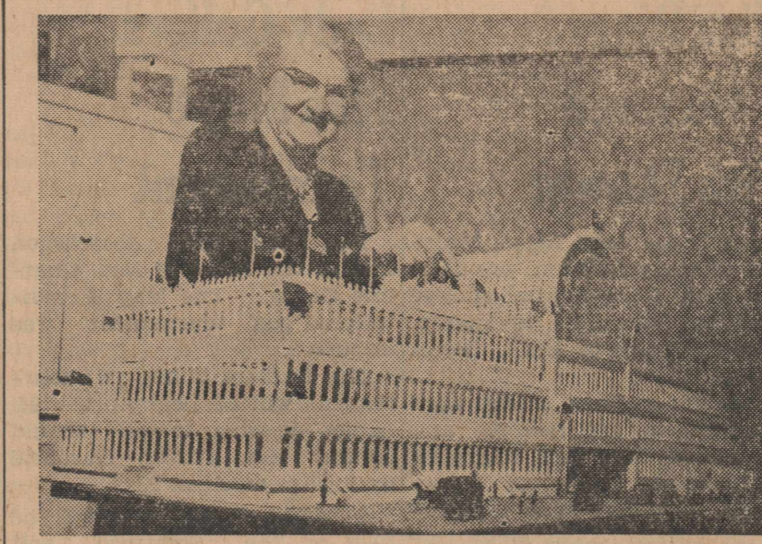
An invitation to attend the services is being extended to the public by the members of the church.

Commissioners Secure Air Raid Sirene

A 500 pound air raid sirene has been secured by the Commissioners' Court to be used in civil defense work. Its chief use in this area will probably be for storm warnings, it was announced this week by County Judge F. M. Keener.

The sirene will be installed on the courthouse square, and will be tested at prearranged times. The tests will be made to acquaint citizens with the difference in its sound from the fire sirene, and to distinguish the two tones of the county sirene.

An alert is sounded with a high pitch continuous dual tone in blasts of 3 to 5 minutes. The take cover alarm is a warbling

tone of 3 minute blasts. The sirene was bought by the county to avoid the delay and the red tape which would have been required if it had been acquired through federal grant.

With sheriff's department and fire department vehicles, equipped with short wave radios, stationed outside the city limits on all four highways, it will be possible to sound an alert in a few minutes in the event of an approaching tornado, Keener said. An auxiliary electric plant has been installed at the courthouse to serve the building and sirene in the event power lines fail during a storm.

AMONG the members of the weasel family, the mink is a very versatile fellow. He may not do some things as well as the otter, the badger or the skunk, but he possesses a combination of talents which make him a worthy opponent for natural enemies, as well as man, who prizes his pelt.

The mink can swim, climb a tree, or dig a hole, as the occasion demands. His menu is varied: mice, chicken, fish, muskrats.

The male is a gad-about. When he chooses a mate, he seldom lingers long and he considers the task of caring for young strictly a female's job.

Sometimes seen during the day, mink are most active at night. The male may cover a wide range, but the female never wanders far from the burrow or hole that she considers "home."

The owl, bobcat, fox and, of course, man, are all enemies where the mink is concerned. Alerted to danger, the mink may swim, climb or dart into a hole. He is capable of speed and has the elusive movements of an All-American halfback. Backed into a corner, he becomes a vicious fighter and will battle furiously so long as there is a breath of life in his body.

The unsocial mink is not an easy mark for the average trapper. Generally, traps set in water are most productive. With this method, the trapper wades the stream to set and run his traps (which are set under water) and thus the telltale odor of man is not left to warn the wary mink.
