

Candidates Learn Fate Saturday

Candidates for precinct, county, district and state offices will learn their future Saturday in the first two-party election in the history of the state.

Democratic primary polls will be open from 8:00 a. m. until 7:00 p. m. in precinct one at the Bob Burgess garage, in precinct two in the basement of the Spurlock Chapel, in precinct three in the Texhoma, Texas school building, and in precinct four at the court house in Stratford.

Republican primary polls will be open from 8:00 p. m. until 7:00 p. m. in precinct one at the Lantz elevator, and in precinct four for voters of precincts two, three and four in the County Exhibit Building in Stratford.

Candidates Face Dual Campaigns

Candidates for county offices could easily find themselves the nominee of both Democratic and Republican parties in the general election as the result of the two-party primaries. Or they might defeat an opponent in the Democratic Primary and find themselves facing the same opponent as a nominee of the Republican party in the general election. Or they might win the Democratic party nomination and find themselves facing an unannounced opponent as the nominee of the Republican party in the general election.

The State Chairman of the Republican party has ruled that Republicans may vote for Democratic candidates on the Republican ballot. In the event they win a plurality, they will be the nominee of the Republican party in the general election. Or it could be possible write-in votes in the Republican primary would involve the party in a second primary to determine the nominee of the party.

Democratic precinct conventions will be held in the same locations of the polling places at 2:30 p. m. Saturday.

The Republican precinct convention will be held in the County Exhibit Building at 8:00 p. m. Saturday, one hour after the polls close.

The precinct conventions are held for the purpose of electing delegates to the county conventions and adopting their instructions. County conventions will be held Saturday, May 12.

The poll tax of each voter will be stamped Democrat or Republican at the polling place where they vote. This marked poll tax restricts the voter to the precinct conventions of their chosen party where they have a right to voice a vote, and prevents the possibility of a person voting in both primaries or both party conventions.

The restriction of party affiliation ends at the close of the second primary elections.

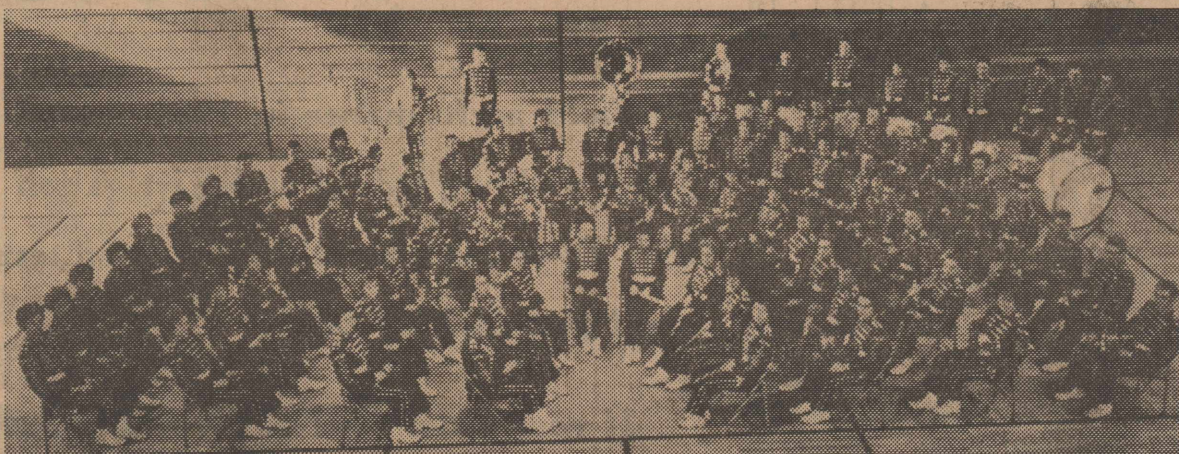
Although a party pledge appears on each ballot, there is no law which prevents a Republican or Democrat from voting for nominees of the opposite party in the general election.

A voter may cast his vote on the Republican ballot one year and vote as a Democrat the following year. Restricted party affiliation expires with the close of the party primaries.

Referendums for party platforms on three proposed constitutional amendments appear across the lower part of each party ballot. The Republican referendums concern establishing the legality of pari-mutuel wagering on horse racing and the establishment of a state park on Padre Island. Democratic party referendums concern the legalizing of pari-mutuel wagering on horse racing and the abolition of the poll tax as a prerequisite for voting.

Pilot Killed As Spray Plane Falls In Field

Wood E. Johnson Jr., 37, of Lamesa, was killed instantly at 7:25 a. m. Saturday when his crop-spraying plane fell 1½ miles north of Stratford in a field farmed by Leslie Dodson and J. J. Willey.

Eye-witnesses said Johnson was making a turn at the end of the field when the plane fell to the ground on its left wing.

Gerald Parsons, flying with Johnson at the time, had sprayed his swath over the field and was waiting for Johnson to complete his run before turning to approach the field. He looked back and saw Johnson's plane had fallen in the field. He landed immediately in an attempt to aid his fellow pilot. Johnson was first thought to have been killed by the force of the impact.

Bert Steffens, Stratford, and Fred Cleere of Lamesa, the flag man on the field, witnessed the plane crash. They estimated the plane was flying at an altitude of 60 to 100 feet.

Gerald Parsons said he could not give any explanation of the crash. The planes were kept in perfect mechanical condition. Johnson and Parsons were both careful to wear respirators to protect them from the deadly chemicals used to destroy insects. Neither did Parsons know of Johnson being subject to any form of illness.

Fritz Long and Albert Wisener, Federal Aviation men of Amarillo, and Peter E. Pomperti of the Civil Air Board of Fort Worth, viewed the wreckage. They were unable to disclose any mechanical defects which might have contributed to the plane crash. They believed it was possible the pilot may have died before the plane fell. This theory could have been established only by an autopsy.

Wood E. Johnson Jr. is survived by his wife and three daughters of Lamesa, and two brothers and his father, living at Brownfield.

Johnson had 15 years of experience as a pilot. He had managed the Johnson Spraying Service for five years, and had worked as a crop spraying pilot for about three years.

Mystified over the tragedy of Johnson's death, Parsons said, "There was no reason for the accident as there was no air turbulence Saturday morning."

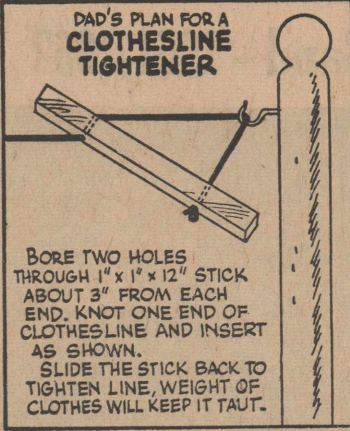

Car Insurance Mess

The Insurance Board Order (car insurance Merit Rating Plan) was entered October 1, 1959 without notice to a single person of the 181 member Legislature. (Minutes Jan. 16, 1960 Hearing.)

Senator Hazlewood requested two statewide hearings urging the Insurance Board to change the order. Senator Hazlewood is the only member of the entire 181 man Legislature, House or Senate, who introduced any corrective legislation to change the order. Senator Hazlewood asked the governor to submit the subject at the last special session.

One Insurance Board member resigned six days later and went to work for the same companies who wrote the order. A second member now working for the National Insurance Agents Association. The third resigned in apparent disgust because of the failure to revise the order.

Senator Hazlewood introduced three different bills to amend the order. REMEMBER . . . SENATOR HAZLEWOOD WAS THE ONLY MEMBER OF THE LEGISLATURE TO SUBMIT LEGISLATION TO CORRECT OR REVISE THE INJUSTICES OF THE "MERIT RATING CAR INSURANCE PLAN."

Statements implying Senator Hazlewood introduced the "Merit Rating" plan are false and can be attributed to the casualty insurance companies who are fighting his efforts to convert the plan.
