The Republican precinct convention will be held in the County Exhibit Building at 8:00 p. m. Saturday, one hour after the polls close.

The precinct conventions are held for the purpose of electing the brackets. delegates to the county conventions and adopting their instructions. County conventions will be held Saturday, May 12.

The poll tax of each voter will be stamped Democrat or Republican at the polling place where tax restricts the voter to the precinct conventions of their chosen party where they have a right to voice a vote, and prevents the possibility of a person voting in both primaries or both party conventions.

The restriction of party affiliation ends at the close of the second primary elections.


Although a party pledge appears on each ballot, there is no law which prevents a Republican or Democrat from voting for nominees of the opposite party in the general election.

A voter may cast his vote on the Republican ballot one year and vote as a Democrat the following year. Restricted party affiliation expires with the close of the party primaries.

Referendums for party platforms on three proposed constitutional amendments appear across the lower part of each party ballot. The Republican referendums concern establishing the legality of pari-mutuel wagering on horse racing and the establishment of a state park on Padre Island. Democratic party referendums concern the legalizing of pori-mutuel wagering on horse racing and the abolition of the poll tax as a prerequisite for voting.




