

## Folsom Delivers First 1962 Wheat

Herbert Folsom delivered the first load of 1962 wheat from his field in the Spurlock Community to the Stratford Grain Co. elevator at Lantz at 3:30 p. m. Tuesday. The moisture test was 14.5%.

Folsom delivered the first dry load of wheat to the elevator at 5:14 p. m. It weighed 54 pounds to the bushel and had a moisture content of 13.60%.

Harvest is expected to be in full swing by the first of next week.

The slow rain which fell over the territory Thursday night and Friday ranged from 1 to 2 inches, but fields are drying out rapidly and the grain is reported to be maturing in good condition.

The boys plan to go into the feed-lot with the steers the first part of December.

There will be 23 boys feeding steers in the program next year, according to Charley Lamb. They will feed a total of 110 steers.

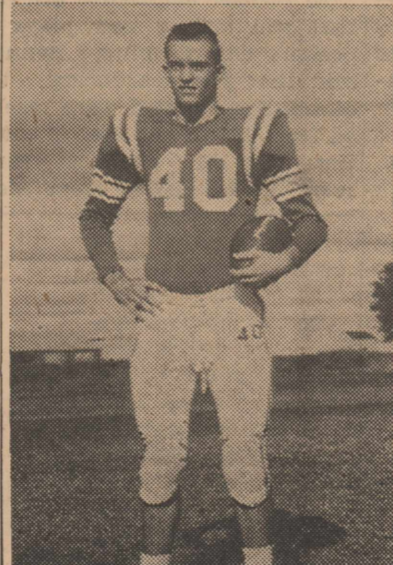

## Democrats Favor State Nominees

Sherman County Democrats cast a majority of their votes for the party nominees in the second primary election held Saturday. Election returns were decisive although a comparative light vote was tabulated.

John Connally of Tarrant County, democratic nominee for governor, polled 190 votes in Sherman County. His opponent, Don Yarborough, tallied 116 votes in the county.

Preston Smith of Lubbock County, democratic nominee for lieutenant governor, polled 245 votes in the county while his opponent, James A. Turman of Fannin County polled 69 votes.

Waggoner Carr of Lubbock County democratic nominee for attorney general, polled 237 votes while his opponent, Tom Reavley of Travis County, received only 76 votes.

Joe Pool of Dallas County, democratic nominee for congressman-at-large, polled 201 votes in the county, and his opponent, Woodrow Wilson Bean of El Paso County, tallied 110 votes.

## Cactus Soldier Is On Duty In Thailand

Army Pvt. Orville L. Gregg, Sunray, is serving in Thailand with the 25th Division's 27th Infantry (Wolfhounds). The 27th Infantry was the first U. S. Army combat unit in Thailand, as President Kennedy announced the movement of U. S. Forces to that country.

Gregg is part of the main body of Wolfhounds who journeyed to Thailand and participated in Air Cobra, a SEATO exercise, late last month. The 27th Infantry remained in Thailand at the invitation of the Thai government to participate in jungle training exercises with units of the Royal Thai Army.

The main body of Wolfhounds are presently being reinforced by personnel of other 25th Infantry Division units from their home base at Schofield Barracks, Hawaii.

Gregg, a jeep driver in Combat Support Company of the infantry, entered the Army in April 1960, completed basic training at Fort Ord, California and arrived in Hawaii in September 1960.

The 20-year old soldier, son of Ralph E. Gregg, Cactus, is a 1959 graduate of Dumas High School.

**Polio Pioneers Blazing New Trail**



In April, 1954, six-year-old Randy Kerr received the first shot launching the giant nationwide field trials of the Salk polio vaccine. Eight years later Randy presents a Salk Institute lapel button to Crystal Brown, 18, a March of Dimes Teen Age Program leader and delegate from Warwick, R. I. at the 32nd National 4-H Conference in Washington, D. C.

Young Randall Kerr, son of Mr. and Mrs. Victor H. Kerr, Oakton, Va., is growing up to the title he has held for eight years—the nation's No. 1 Polio Pioneer.

In April, 1954, he was the first of millions of young school children who participated in the giant March of Dimes-financed field trials which helped prove the safety and effectiveness of the Salk vaccine.

Now going-on-15, Randy is the official leader of today's teen-age Polio Pioneers who are out to build a laboratory wing of the Salk Institute for Biological Studies in San Diego, Calif. To be constructed with funds raised by teenagers representing many schools and youth organizations across the country, the laboratory wing will be an enduring tribute to the youth of America and the historic success of their partnership with science against polio.

"We were just kids when we first got our Polio Pioneer pins,"

says the mature Randy Kerr. "But now we're old enough to realize how much the protection they represented has meant to us and to children everywhere."

A top-notch student majoring in chemistry and math, Randy is completing his sophomore year at the Flint Hill School in Oakton. Like most teenagers, he is far more aware of the giant strides of modern science than many adults.

"Dr. Salk's idea of a center where great scientists can work together for better understanding of the processes of life makes sense," Randy says with youthful positiveness. "Things like heredity and all sorts of disease are complicated. They have to be studied from a lot of different viewpoints if we're going to get the scientific knowledge we need."

The Salk Institute for Biological Studies, scheduled to open in 1963, will be directed by Dr. Jonas Salk. He will be joined by many world-eminent scientists in biology, chemistry,

virology, immunology and genetics, as well as others from such fields as physics and mathematics, to concentrate on finding answers to basic biological questions affecting life, health and disease.

As the No. 1 Polio Pioneer, Randy Kerr will help his teen-age cohorts make plans for fund-raising events to support the \$15 million Salk Institute Building Fund. The fund is sponsored nationally by The National Foundation-March of Dimes, through which the American people totally supported Dr. Salk's polio research.

The starting date for the Salk Institute Building Fund campaign—June 1—coincides with Randy's fifteenth birthday.

"I can't think of a better way to celebrate," he says, "than by joining all the rest of the country's Polio Pioneers to thank Dr. Salk in this concrete way for the protection we've enjoyed. As tomorrow's adults, we can look forward to big dividends from our shares in the Salk Institute."

**SOIL TESTING**  
**STILL ACTIVE**

Through April, the number of soil samples being submitted to the three laboratories operated by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at College Station, Seymour and Lubbock came in record or near record numbers.

During January the laboratories tested 1,589 samples, said W. F. Bennett, extension soil chemist. The total for February fell just short of doubling the January total when 3,020 samples were tested.

During March and April the laboratories handled 4,330 sam-

ples but neither month came up to the February totals, Bennett added. The laboratory at Lubbock handled 1,328 samples in March for its highest single month since it began operations. The March total, 402 samples, was also a new high for the Baylor county laboratory.

Bennett said five counties in the State submitted more than 100 soil samples during March and April. They were Baylor, 212; Houston, 165; Lubbock, 155; Terry, 147; and Harris, 124.

To further emphasize the role that soil testing now plays in present day farming, Bennett said that samples during the March-April period were received from 173 of the State's counties; that 151 samples came from Mexico and 5 from Nica-

ragua to add the international flavor and that samples were also tested from Colorado, New Mexico and Oklahoma.

It isn't too early to make plans for taking and submitting soil samples from soon to be harvested small grain fields, Bennett said. The slack season for the laboratories will mean that results will be returned to the senders within a few days and plans can then be completed for the fall fertilizing and soil improvement and management programs.

If information is desired on soil sampling, Bennett suggests a visit with the local county agent.

 Dies Of Injuries**

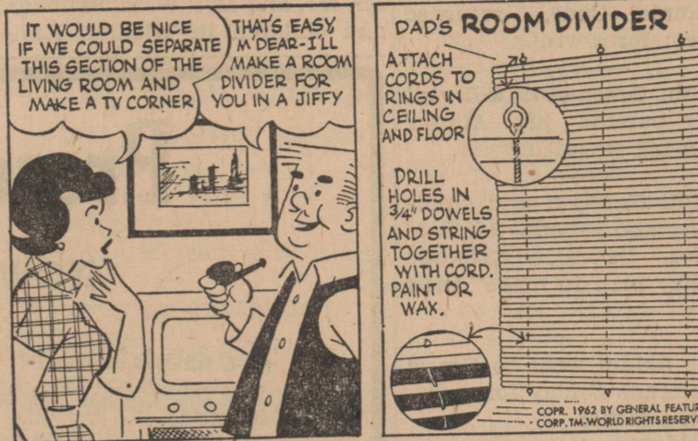

## How To Keep Your Green Thumb Green

(By Paul F. Frese)

Would you like to keep your green thumb green? Then make sure that the flowers, trees and shrubs around your home don't come down with "plant anemia", a yellowing of the leaves caused by an iron deficiency in their diet.

Lack of available iron in the soil is the commonest cause for chlorosis, or leaf yellowing. Iron is an essential element which helps plants manufacture vital green chlorophyll. Without it, leaves lose their healthy dark green color, and plants stop growing.

It is easy to detect iron deficiency in plants. Although

leaves may turn yellow for several reasons, such as for lack of water, iron starved plants typically have leaves with veins that are green while the rest of the leaf turns yellow.

Chlorosis is common to many kinds of plants including azalea, rhododendron, laurel, magnolia, roses, gladiolus, petunias, geraniums, delphinium, chrysanthemums, peonies and other garden flowers, pin oaks, maples, Russian olive, spruce, apple, peach, pear, strawberries, some vegetables such as beans, and also lawns.

Many soils in our county are an unusually poor source of iron, even though soil tests may actually read high in this trace element. Only in recent times did soil scientists discover the reason for this. They found that iron may be locked within soil particles so that plants cannot break the iron loose.

Garden experts, therefore, recommend a spring or summer application of Sequestrene Iron Chelate, available wherever garden supplies are sold. 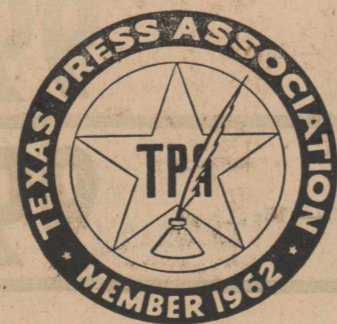

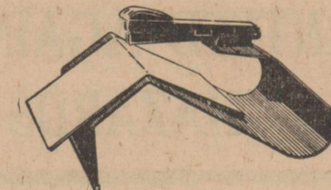
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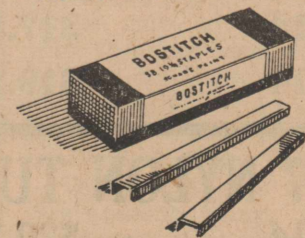
