

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

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

Many suggestions and recommendations have been made through the years as to methods and manners of reducing the income tax or abolishing it altogether. The present campaign is to try ___ Stratford, Texas to obtain an increase in the deduction allowed for individuals and their dependents. The present deduction for the average American citizen is \$600 for the individual and \$600 for each dependent. I am happy that this movement has begun. In 1951 I introduced legislation to increase the individual exemption to \$1,000 and to increase the exemption for dependents to \$750. A number of people asked me why I limited the dependents' increase of \$750. My answer was that I had no objection to the bill being amended and increased to \$1,000 for dependents, but in view of the number of dependents that I had, I didn't want the bill to appear as a bill for personal relief simply because I had six children. 

more fish, the favorite of many anglers is a little fellow some folks don't even bother to burden with a creel limit. In many states you can catch all you want, any time of the year. You're right. We speak of the bluegill, that highly cooperative member of the panfish family. Considered by some anglers a poor, country cousin to real "game" fish, the bluegill, ouncefor-ounce is perhaps the gamest battler in the piscatorial arena.

Tackle bluegill with light equipment and you will probably join the chorus who claim he has no peer in his own weight class.

Bluegill thrive in warm waters. They like some rooted vegetation but tend to become stunted in waters of dense weed beds and low fertility. Bluegill do well in farm ponds and are so prolific that fish management officials usually recommend that fish of all sizes be kept by anglers. It takes plenty of fishing to keep a good bluegill pond producing bragging-size fish. Over-population—too many fish for available food sup-

ply—is more often a problem. The bluegill will respond to many kinds of live bait. Crickets, worms, grasshoppers, grubs, small minnows are top producers, but artificial lures are effective as well. Artificial flies and poppers, imitation beetles and bugs are popular with fly fishermen and under most conditions will take as many bluegill as live bait.

The bluegill usually inhabits the same type of territory as that preferred by largemouth bass. Like the bass, bluegill seek cool, deeper waters during summer, although they frequently feed in shallow coves in early morning and late afternoon.
