

Sherman County Voters Face Two Vital Elections

Tuesday from 8 a. m. until 7 p. m. residents of Sherman County will cast their ballots in the General Election to select a new governor of the State of Texas and many other offices, plus give their Yes or No to some 14-odd proposed Constitutional Amendments.

The "hot" elections, so far as most Sherman Counties are concerned, lies with three races—one for the Representative of the 18th Congressional District; the 92nd Representative District; and the office of Sherman County Treasurer.

These races pit Republicans against Democrats in two of

the three and in the third—the Treasurer's office—we find one candidate on the ballot and another waging a write-in campaign. Both are Democrats.

The candidates in these races are incumbent Congressman Walter Rogers versus Amarillo Mayor Jack Seale (Republican); for the 18th Congressional District seat; A. C. (Shorty) Hallmark of Dalhart (Democrat) versus Darrell Cathey of Hartley (Republican) for the State Representative, 92nd Representative District seat; and Mrs. Fritz (Sis) Steinberger of Stratford versus Mrs. Madge F.

Lowe also of Stratford (both Democrats) for the Treasurer's office.

Mrs. Steinberger's name was placed on the ballot after the regularly-elected candidate (Mrs. Dorothy Slay) submitted her registration last month. Mrs. Lowe is contesting the candidacy of Mrs. Steinberger via the Write-In route.

Aside from these localized elections of interest, we find for the first time in many years a serious contention on the part of the Republican Party to challenge the nearly 100-year supremacy of the Democratic Party for control of the Texas

State government. Republicans are challenging the Democrats in a number of

seats including that of the Governor.

Contested races pitting Democratic candidates against those of the Republican Party include the following:

Governor—John Connally (D) vs Jack Cox (R).

Lt. Governor—Preston Smith (D) vs Bill Hayes (R).

Attorney General—Waggoner Carr (D) vs T. Everton Kennerly (R).

Congressman - at - Large—Joe Pool (D) vs Des Barry (R).

Railroad Commissioner (unexpired term) Ben Ramsay (D) vs Bernard M. Hanson (R).

Comptroller of Public Ac-

counts—Robert S. Calvert (D) vs Mrs. Mrs. Hargrove Smith (R).

Commissioner of General Land Office — Jerry Saddler (D) vs Albert B. Fay (R).

Commissioner of Agriculture —John C. White (D) vs Harry Hubbard (R).

State Board of Education, 18th District — Herbert O. Willborn (D) vs Mrs. E. D. McKay (R).

State Senator, 31st District —Grady Hazlewood (D) vs L. R. Scotty Ernce (R).

Of the above races, the most interest locally will be on the Rogers-Seale race where odds-

makers are saying that Seale has a good chance of upsetting veteran Walter Rogers and in the Treasurer's race.

Mrs. Steinberger and Mrs. Lowe were both challenged for a time by another write-in candidate, Mrs. Fern Palmer who was to be a Republican candidate. However, Mrs. Palmer asked that her name be taken out of the race for this office two weeks ago. The other two women who have remained active for the office have both campaigned hard for the office.

Polling places in Sherman County will be in the four usual locations.

These are:

Precinct 1 -- Bob Burgess' garage (located about 3 miles south of Lutz on Highway 287. Election Judge George Bradley.

Precinct 2 -- Spurlock Chapel in the Spurlock Community. Election Judge will be Travis Spurlock.

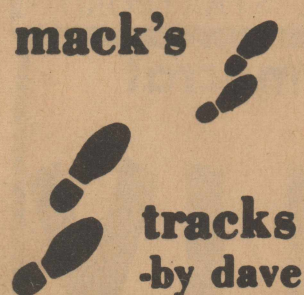
Precinct 3 -- In the Texhoma School in Texhoma. Election judge will be Rennie Hamilton.

Precinct 4 -- County Court Room in Sherman County Court House in Stratford. Election Judge, John Knight.

Aerials the Difference As Sunray Wins 14-6

Stratford's Elks took on the highly touted Sunray Bobcats before the largest crowd to ever see a football game in Stratford last Friday night but finally fell before the District 1A favorites 14-6 as the clock ticked away.

Over 2500 fans were sweat-streaked and hoarse following the game. The teams were pretty evenly matched and it was the kind of a game that could've gone either way right down to the last second.

It was the passing skill of Sunray's John Mark Worst that spelled the difference in the

two teams. On the ground, the Elks were able to move the ball, but unable to get a passing game going, the Bobcats were able to put in a 7-man and at times a 9-man line against the battering ram gains of Doug McBryde.

Throughout the first half, which went scoreless, Stratford kept control of the ball, but unable to punch across the double stripe.

In the third quarter, Sunray got a break and this proved to be the turning point.

Again late in the third, Sun-

ray got loose and scored again. The Stratford score came early in the fourth quarter and were threatening when the horn sounded the end of the game.

The game got off to a fast start when Worst took Dyess' opening kick on his own 5 returned to the 27 where he was jarred by Gary Hudson and fumbled the ball. Phil Dertle pounced on the ball and the Elks took over on the Cats 27.

The Elks moved to the Bobcat 16 where they received a 5-

Stratford Turns Out For Sallie V. Day

Wednesday was Sallie V Day in Stratford!

The occasion was the retirement of Mrs. Sallie V. McAdams, who has served Stratford and Sherman County as Post Master since 1936, and ends a career of some 34 years in the local postoffice.

"We are fortunate to have had the service of such a loyal employee as Mrs. McAdams," said Postal Inspector A. W. Pfanmiller of Amarillo who was on hand for Mrs. Mac's final day on duty.

The town turned out in mass for Mrs. Mac when the clock ticked out the final day of work Wednesday afternoon at 5 p. m.

A crowd numbering in the hundreds gathered in front of the post office, a large banner was stretched across Main Street proclaiming "This is Sallie V Day!" and the Stratford High School Band was on hand to play.

A rousing and sincere tribute to one who has served so long and so faithfully.

The Postal Department recognized Mrs. Mac by awarding her a gold embossed Certificate for "Honorary Recognition for devotion to duty . . . for official commendation from the Post Master General and a cordial expression of esteem

from your coworkers in the Postal Service."

The Certificate was signed by Postmaster General J. Edward Day.

Mrs. Mac came to Stratford

in 1928. She began work in the Stratford Post Office in October of that year as a clerk.

\$300,000 School Bond Issue Vote Saturday

Qualified voters in the Stratford Independent School District will go to the polls Saturday to vote on a bond issue totalling \$300,000 for the purpose of new construction at the Stratford schools.

In addition to the usual year or may for the bond issue, voters will be casting ballots for a second proposition in this election. This issue will be a for or against letting the Stratford Independent School District operate under Texas Senate Bill 116 (maintenance tax).

The maintenance tax will be Proposition 1 on the ballot. This issue is just a provision whereby the school bonds will be easier sold on the market and to provide a more marketable security, according to School Trustee Board President R. J. Hill.

The maintenance tax issue will in no way change any of the present operations of the school, but it is designed to make a provision whereby the maintenance tax for the school district to be limited to \$1.50.

"This device simply sets a limit on the maintenance tax and levels out the district's valuations and is designed to keep taxpayers in a happier frame of mind," Hill adds.

"The maintenance tax issue is such that it is necessary that if it fails to carry, both issues will fail, Hill pointed out. It is necessary that both issues carry Saturday if we are to be allowed to construct the new additions needed in the present school plant."

The \$300,000 bond issue itself is for the purpose of constructing a 450-capacity cafeteria; a new Home Economic Department wing; a new heating

plant and boiler room; convert the present cafeteria into classrooms in the Elementary School and convert present home-making classrooms into classrooms in the High School.

In addition, the bonds would provide monies for the construction of a service drive at the rear of existing buildings to use for loading and unloading busses and also provide monies to be used to get the school grounds in a condition where they will properly drain and to also construct restroom

facilities at the football field area.

This plant, if approved by taxpayers Saturday, will provide ample space and facilities necessary to take care of a system of 700 pupils.

The future classroom addition (see shaded area in the drawings on page 5, Section 2, this issue) will permit future expansion should such a need arise to expand to serve 1,000 students.

The Saturday bond issue will call for an additional 10 cents

to be added to the present bond rate of 30 cents.

The use of this 10 cents will be to restrict the bond payoff to a 12-year period. Otherwise the payoff period would be longer and the district would be penalized by higher interest payments.

Voting will be held Saturday, from 8 a.m. until 7 p.m. in the school cafeteria.

Election judges will include Chester Guthrie, Eugene Wilson, Mrs. Jeannie Davis and Mrs. Irene Wakefield.

Dr. T. H. Lennerts, Texas Animal Health Commission, has advised the Sherman County Livestock Committee that it will be about November 15 before he would be ready to start testing cattle for Brucellosis in Sherman County.

Dr. Lennerts had previously suggested possibility of coming to Sherman County the latter part of October, but he could not make necessary arrangements for mobile laboratory and technicians to start that soon.

Committee members discussed handling of female cattle movement into Sherman County in regard to the Brucellosis program. Dr. Lennerts advised the Committee that any

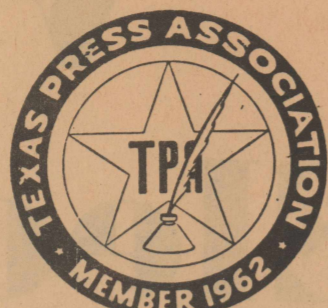

yard penalty and were unable to punch the necessary 15 yards for another first down.
On fourth down, the Elks fumbled and the Bobcats recovered. The Bobcats were unable to move and were forced to punt from their 14.
The Elks took over on their own 42 and fumbled on the first play and Sunray recovered.
At this point Sunray moved downfield to the Stratford 10-yard line in 9 plays but a fourth down effort from the 10 was brought to naught by Hudson and Joe Minkley who redogged Worst and the Elks took over.
The Elks began a long drive which ate up the remaining time in the first quarter and lasted well into the second. Beginning from their own 10, McBryde and Brannan carried most of the weight as the Elks punched their way across midfield and down to the Bobcat 28 where the ball finally went over on downs.
The Bobcats called on Worst and his arm got them out of the hole and up to their own 48 where Worst punted on fourth down.

"We just had a small office down where the bank is now," she recalls. "We worked seven days a week from 7 a. m. until 6 p. m. and met every train that ran."

"Lots of things have changed," Mrs. Mac reminisces. The Stratford Post Office was only a third class office in those days, she says.

Mrs. Mac was named acting postmaster in Stratford in 1936 and was named permanent postmaster duty in February, 1937 and has served in that capacity since that time.

The Post Office has grown under her guidance from one containing 66 boxes to a total of 577 today.

Mrs. Mac came to the Panhandle in 1905 from Missouri, moving first to Amarillo. She moved to Stratford in July, 1928.

She has four children, one son and three girls. They are C. R. McAdams, Jr., Dumas,

Mrs. Alice Gomez, Alexandria, Virginia; Mrs. Mary Foster, Dalhart and Mrs. Rowena Williams, Stratford.
"I've enjoyed my job in Stratford," Mrs. Mac says. "The people have been wonderful to work for."

Wednesday's tribute was fitting for a public servant who has been so faithful to her office for so many years.

Frank Sutton of Stratford was named acting postmaster upon the retirement of Mrs. McAdams.

Other employees in the Post Office include Mrs. Lois Fedric, who began work with Mrs. McAdams in 1938, clerk; Mrs. John Kidwell, substitute clerk and Mrs. Judy Oquin, substitute clerk.

Brucellosis--

**Goose Season
Now Open**

Get out your shotguns and ammo, the goose season is upon us. Shooting hours for this favorite of the waterfowl hunters are from sunrise to sunset on all days including opening day. Hunters who have been disappointed over the near loss of their duck hunting should be cheered that the goose season, Oct. 31 through Jan. 13, is 15 days longer than last year's season.

The limits for geese will be the same as for 1961 with a five per day daily bag limit, and five in possession. This limit may not include, in the alternative, more than (a) two Canada geese or subspecies; (b) one Canada goose or subspecies and one white-fronted goose; or (c) one white-fronted goose. It may include, in addition, three snows or blues, or it will be possible to have five snows and/or blues with no specs and Canadas.

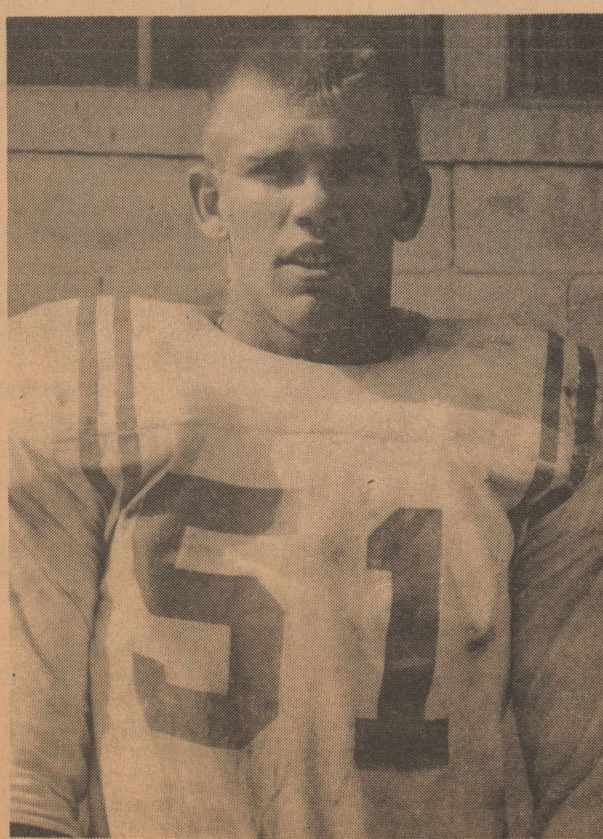

Revived GOPs Making Bid In Governor's Race

The governor's race in Texas this year is likely to be one of the most interesting in modern state politics.

For the first time in many years, the Republican party has a nominee who has earnestly sought the office, so that voters will actually have a choice in the general election, rather than the usual "formality" of endorsing the winner of the Democratic primary.

Three names will appear on the ballot. John Connally is the Democratic nominee, Jack Cox bears the Republican colors, and Jack Carswell's name will

be under the Constitution party column.

John Connally, 45, former Secretary of the Navy, resigned that office especially to campaign for governor of Texas. Connally won the Democratic nomination for governor over five other candidates, being forced into a runoff with Don Yarborough, who waged a spirited campaign.

Connally pulled out all the stops to win the Democratic nomination, showing Texas voters one of the most elaborate campaigns ever. His campaign since the second primary has been sort of an anti-climax.

A graduate of the University of Texas and UT Law School, Connally has maintained a private practice of law in Austin. Along with two brothers, he operates a ranch in South Texas.

He served as administrative assistant in Congress to Vice President Lyndon Johnson and was vice chairman of the Texas delegation to the national Democratic Convention in 1956.

Among the planks in his platform, Connally proposes:

1. Fiscal soundness for the state;
2. Attraction and development of industry in Texas;
3. An education system second to none;
4. Stronger law enforcement;
5. Care for the needs of the aged;
6. Development of the tourist industry;
7. Curtailment of oil imports.

Connally was born on a farm, and has been associated with two of the state's leading industries—cattle and oil.

Jack Cox, 41, is the Republican nominee, and has led the movement to unite Texas conservatives under the GOP. He is receiving support in some instances from liberal Democrats, if for no other reason than to return Texas politics to a true two-party state.

Cox, who ran as a conservative Democratic candidate in 1960, defeated Amarillo's Roy Whittenburg in the Republican primary, which drew a total of 117,000 Texas voters, largest number ever for a Texas Republican primary.

Vice-president of Pico Drilling Company, Cox is a graduate of North Texas State College, with a degree in government.

He was elected to the Texas legislature in 1946, and served three terms. Cox is former Secretary of the Texas Commission on Higher Education and three times received the Valley Forge Freedom Foundation award.

Cox includes the following on his platform:

1. Against "Federal Aid" to education.
2. For bringing new industry

to Texas to provide more and better jobs.

3. Advocates a "Right to Work" law.

4. Strong believer in states rights. Says our independence from Washington control is deeply imbedded in our state's history.

5. For strong two-party system.

6. Economy in state budget.

7. Freedom of Texas farmers and ranchers from "dictatorial programs."

8. Opposed to state income tax, and to increasing any present tax. Favors a constitutional amendment limiting the sales tax to the present two per cent.

9. Devotion to principle rather than blind "party loyalty."

10. Opposed to any program leading to socialized medicine.

11. For election law reform.

12. For legislation guaranteeing complete legal equality to Texas women.

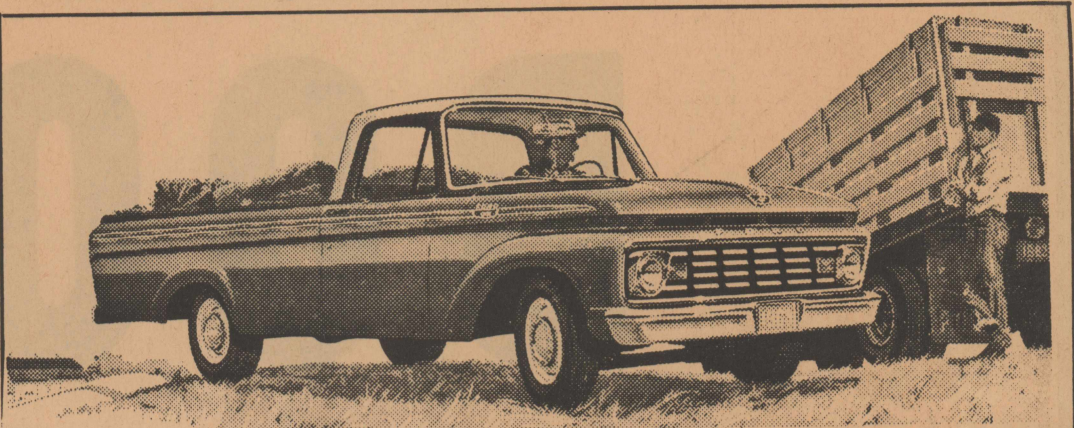
13. For local self-government, as opposed to a Federal Department of Urban Affairs.

Jack Carswell, the candidate for the Constitution party, is a Houston funeral director.

As for his qualifications for the office, in his own words "I meet every qualification as set forth in the Constitution of the State of Texas. I am not a professional politician or a professional lobbyist."

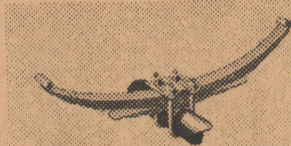

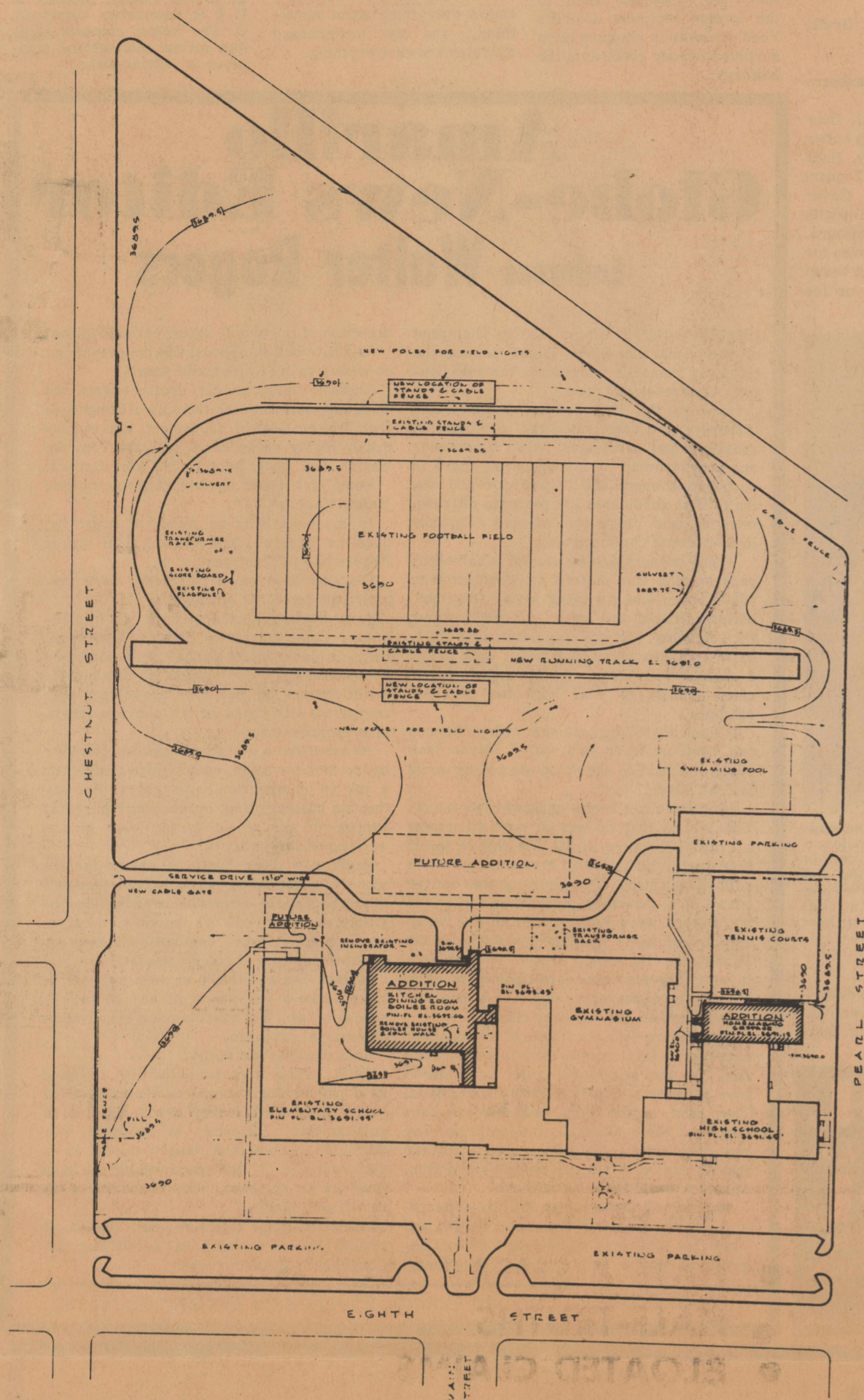

This issue is of paramount importance to the Stratford schools and we trust that the qualified voters in the District will give it their full attention and thought before voting.

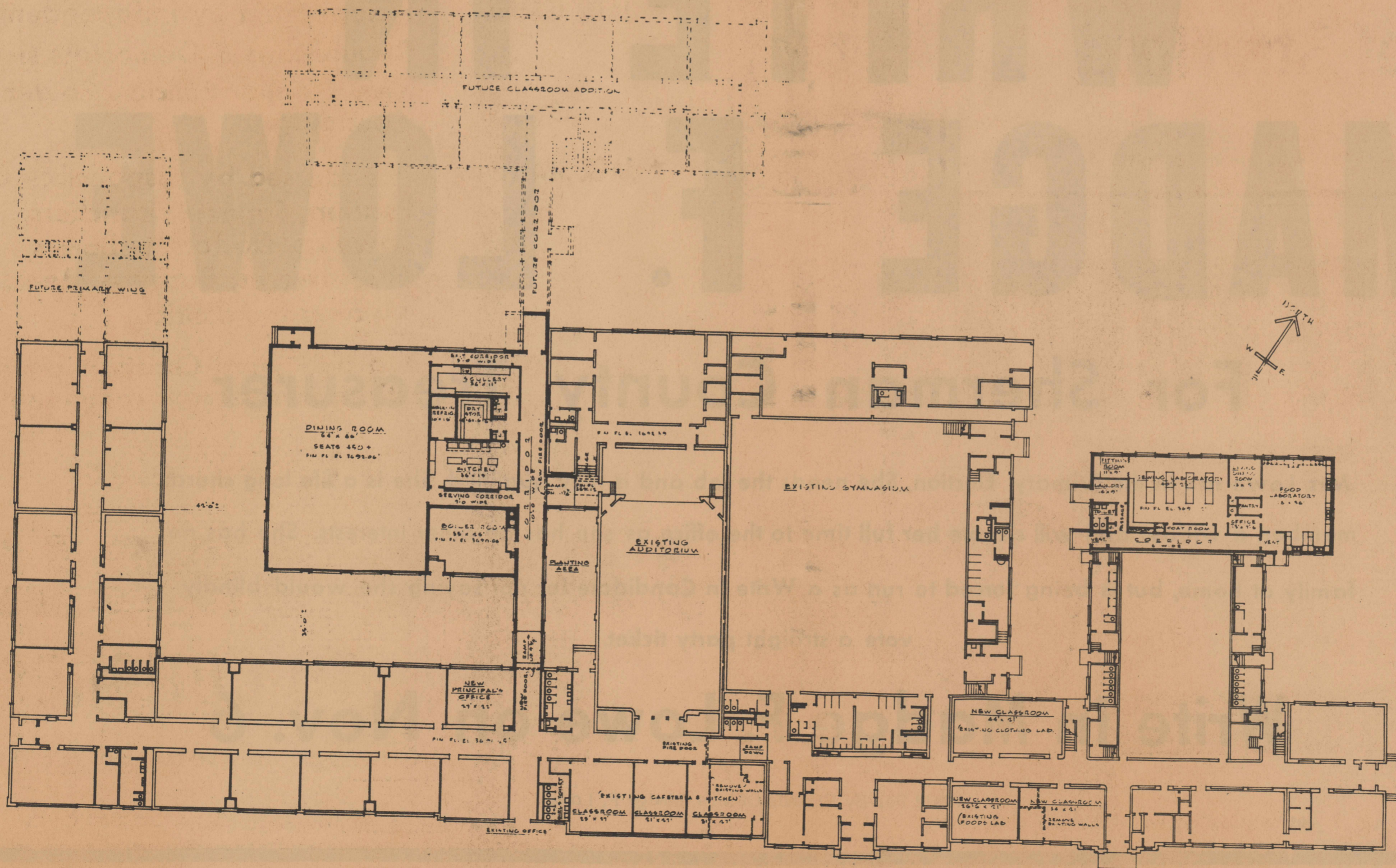

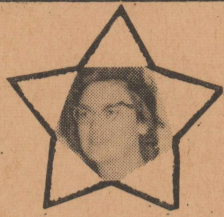

Amarillo Globe-News Editor Endorses Walter Rogers

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Editor Tommy Thompson of the Amarillo Globe-News penned the following remarks concerning the 18th District Congressional race.)

Here in the 18th district some of the kibitzers are questioning the patriotism of congressional candidates. When it comes to our congressman or his opponent, there is no question about who is patriotic and who isn't. Both candidates are patriotic citizens, men of good character and are respected in their home communities.

What I personally want to see is somebody representing this district in Washington to whom I can look as being better informed, better educated, and better equipped to grasp the complex national problems that daily arise in these perilous times. I want to see a man who is cagey enough and sophisticated enough to deal with the Potomac sharpies.

I think that Congressman Walter Rogers can continue to do this, but if Mayor Jack Seale of Amarillo should be elected he would fall far short, I fear.

Jack Seale has been a young man in a hurry. The fact is that he was in such a hurry at a critical juncture in his life that he failed in a basic. He failed to take time out for a college education. This omission was not the result of a monetary pinch. Our mayor and his sisters were heirs to one of the better established home building operations in the Panhandle. He simply chose to skip this four-or five-year chore and cruise through on his manly appearance, his fine smile, his native intellect and his easy charm.

Not having had a college education isn't necessarily fatal to men in business or public life, but the successful under-educated man in these fields is a rarity these days. They have, in the main, been men who have continued their education in an informal way past high school. They have stayed with the mainstream of American thought and action. Has Jack Seale been one of these?

He cruised into a job on the city commission, he cruised into the mayor's job, and while his ship may be hobbing a bit and de-grees off course, he is cruising in the general

direction of the shoaly waters of the Potomac. And how well equipped is this congressional candidate to deal with these shoals?

Another thing, in his cruise toward the Potomac, he must sink the ship of Congressman Walter Rogers, incumbent, who is generally highly regarded in both the Potomac waters and back here in his own district.

Does Jack Seale have more integrity than Walter Rogers?

In his brief stint as mayor of Amarillo, does he have a better record than Walter Rogers has in Congress?

Does he have more judgment, more maturity, more moral courage?

Jack Seale is running for a job in Congress. Congress is the nation's lawmaking body. Is Jack Seale learned in the law? Has he made preparation? Would his measurable qualifications be below or above par when compared with those of the average freshman congressman.

He inherited a going business and he never had to look for a job, never had to qualify for a job in competition with others. But say that his business went broke -- and this could happen to any of us -- for what kind of work could he qualify?

Right now Jack Seale is asking for the vote of about 4,000 public school teachers in the Panhandle, several hundred college instructors, hundreds of lawyers, doctors, accountants, farmers, engineers who have endured the tedium of college education.

If Jack Seale weren't in such a hurry he should take a few years off and go back to school or at least avail himself of our adult educational program.

Jack Seale is the rarity. Most young men propelled by ambition have painstakingly prepared themselves for leadership, whether they are in the field of government, science or business. For example, the hot pilot doesn't qualify as an astronaut. To fly the space vehicle the pilot must be an engineer. This is the day of the fine-honed mind.

As it is, there might be just a few people around who think Jack Seal's candidacy for Congress is presumptuous.
