One is for increase in letter postage. The other is a revolution in the mechanics and techniques of mail and package handling, through automation. 



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

Dixon listed the money-savers in this order. First, taxpayers are urged to prepare their own 1957 returns. By using information that comes with tax forms and with other available booklets. "the average taxpayer can do his own return."
The Revenue representative re

vealed that last filing period the Service made a substantial sav-ing on the cost of assisting indi-vidual taxpayers. Those who strike impassable roadblocks may take advantage of Revenue's Taxpayer Assistance Day-every Monday morning from 8:30 a. m. to 12:30 p. m. Or perhaps a telephone call to Revenue will solve the problem. Revenue's telephone number

Second way to help yourself and Uncle Sam save money is checking and re-checking that 1957 return before dropping it in the mail box. Be certain that both husband and wife have signed, if it's a joint return, and by attach-ing a W-2 form for each job the taxpayer held during the taxable year. You can save money and perhaps, "hurry that refund check if you have one coming."

Third, money saving suggestion by Dixon is to "file that return for fust as soon as possible after January 1, 1958. It's our experience that last minute (April 15) filers are more apt to make costly er-rors."

### Federal Land **Bank Interest** Rate Reduced

A reduction in the interest rate on Federal Land Bank loans was reported this week by Joe Harper, following his return from Houston where he represented the National Farm Loan Association of Haskell at the annual stockholders meeting of the Federal Land Bank

Harper, manager of the local association, said one of the pur-poses of the meeting was to get a report on the condition and operations of the bank. He was impressed by the strong financial condition of the bank, and pleased with the progress which it and national farm loan associations in Texas have made in cutting operating expenses. Some changes were necessary to offset the increased cost of money which the bank has had to pay on the bonds which it sells to secure the funds to make loans. Of special interest to national

farm loan association members, Harper said, as well as all farm and ranch owners, was an an-nouncement which Sterling C. Evans, president of the land bank. made at the Houston meeting. interest to 5 per cent on loans which were closed at a higher rate. Also it will now close additional loans. This is a new practice and enables a borrower with a 4 per cent land bank loan of \$1,000 or more to get an additional loan at 5 per cent on the new money and leave his old 4 per cent loan undisturbed.

North Texas Lake "Turn Over" Due As Water Warms

Soon, lakes in northern Texas will start their mysterious action of "turning over," to be followed in late summer by lakes throughout the rest of Texas. This curious shifting of lake waters, which causes odors noticed by all neichbors and visitors to the lake, is explained by Biologist Kenneth Jurgens in the February issue of Texas Game and Fish, the official publication of the Texas Game

and Fish Commission. "Why Do Lakes Turn Over?" launches its answers with winter and early spring season when the most lake water has even temperature and good circulation, then traces the lake's changes through the rest of the year. For fishermen who have bloat-

ed fish floating on top of the lake in summer, Jurgens explains the stagnated "biological desert" of He says that the lower layer. these fish are so overcome with poisonous gases trapped near the lake bottom that they shoot uncontrollably to the surface and die. The "turnover," when layers begin to blend and change position, occurs as cooler weather begins in late summer and early fall to chill the surface water. Then the fish, as well as the water, enjoy free movement again. Winter stagnation, another oxy-gen-starved period for North Texas lakes, is now coming to an end. North Texas lakes, Jurgens

points out, have two turnovers, but other Texas lakes have only the one following summer stag-Jurgens' article provides helpful background for fishemen who need to know when to fish and where, as well as the answer to the often asked "why" of the lake's be-
