Tax Deferral Available For Elderly **Homeowners**

Texans aged 65 or older can postpone paying delinquent and current taxes on their homes. They can take advantage of a tax option called "over-65 deferral" by signing and affidavit at the Sherman County Appraisal District office. The form and more information is available at the Appraisal District office, 402 N. 3rd street in Stratford or call 396-5566.

If the affidavit is on file, an older homeowners cannot lose a homestead because of delinquent taxes. Once a homeowner files an over-65 tax deferral affidavit with the appraisal district, no taxing unit can start or continue a lawsuit for delinquent taxes as long as that person owns and lives in that home. The tax deferral only postpones paying delinquent taxes on the home; it does not cancel

The suggested levels of fiber are not meant for children, the elderly, or people on special diets, due to limited research with these groups. Because high-fiber foods are usually bulky and low in calories, small children, for example, may find it difficult to eat enough to get the calories they need to grow. However, everyone, including small children, should include fruits, vegetables, and grain products in their daily diet.

Some ways to obtain at least 20 grams of dietary fiber are by eating the following amounts of foods:

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

Atmospheric Administration, better known as NOAA, operates the only government radio system that provides weather information and warnings directly into private homes. NOAA weather radio is the official voice of the National repeated every two to five minutes. Therefore, if you tune in during the middle of a broadcast, Stratford High School. just wait a few minutes and the message will repeat.

The tone alert feature on NOAA Weather Radio is activated directly by the National Weather Service. The alert is sounded whenever severe weather watches and warnings are issued. Even without a NOAA weather radio, it is important that you the difference understand between a watch and a warning.

Severe thunderstorm and tornado watches are issued by the National Severe Storms Forecast Center in Kansas City, Missouri. The other type of watch you may encounter this severe weather season would be a flash flood de Hospital. watch. Flash flood watches are Service Forecast Office. Watches generally cover broad areas and or flash floods.

Warnings are generally issued and flash floods. The Warnings weather spotters. Warnings are issued for short periods of time, generally less than a hour for tornadoes and thunderstorms and maybe up to three hours for flash floods. While watches are issued for a large area, warnings are usually issued on a county-by-county basis. A warning means that the severe weather is imminent and you should take action to protect yourself immediately.

Remember when you hear the NOAA Radio Tone Alert..A watch means that severe weather is possible. A warning means that severe weather is imminent or occurring.

As I conclude this series of articles on severe weather, take time to remind yourself and your family of the dangers of severe weather. Be sure all members of your family know where to go and what to do if severe weather threatens at home, at work, and at school. If you should have any questions, contact this office or the National Weather Service Office in Amarillo.


