

"This type of clinic has been established in medically underserved areas eligible to vote in a soil and water begins at 11 a.m., Saturday, Oct. 1, across the country," David Clark, Memorial administrator of Hospital, said.

conservation district director to serve in Zones One and Two on the Sherman County Soil and Water Conservation District is scheduled for October 12, 1994. at the Soil Conservation Service, 418 N. 4th. announced Wendell Stacy chairman of the Board. The elections will be held at 7:00 p.m.

State law decrees that to be conservation district director election, a person must own agricultural land within the district where the election is being held. The person must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district and the voter must be 18 years of age or older.

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a soil and water conservation district director must own land in the years of age or older and be actively engaged in farming or ranching. He must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district. Soil and water conservation district director serve four-year terms of office.

The purpose of the Sherman County SWCD, with headquarters in Stratford, Texas is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on agricultural lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers, ranchers and local community entities on conservation matters.

The district board of directors Clark explained that the goal coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purposes.

> All conservation programs managed by the district are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator or other potential users of the SWCD's programs.

Awareness Campaign Seeks To Prevent Discrimination In Hiring


