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Check Vents and Appliances for a Safe Winter

Carbon monoxide (CO) is an odorless gas that is produced when fuels, like charcoal, gasoline, kerosene, natural gas, oil, propane or wood, are burned improperly. Carbon monoxide is not visible and has no odor or taste.

To guard against CO poisoning, make sure you have an adequate supply of fresh air in your home and that your appliances have been properly installed, maintained and used. All heating appliances should be directly vented to the outdoors.

Check your vent pipes. If they are plugged with debris or have gaps, leaks, spaces or spots that have rusted through, have your appliance dealer/contractor revent your appliances.

Avoid using unvented space heaters—they can be extremely hazardous. Never use your range to heat your home. And never burn charcoal indoors or try to cook in your fireplace.

Symptoms of CO poisoning are similar to the flu and include sleepiness, nausea, headaches and dizziness. If you notice any of these symptoms, get fresh air immediately. If fresh air relieves your symptoms, call your appliance dealer/contractor to check your appliances. If symptoms persist, see a doctor.



Check Out The Library



Juvenile readers will be interested in the new science books written by Isaac Asimov. The books are: The Red Planet: Mars, an up-to-date minute examination of perhaps the most mysterious and intriguing planet in our solar system; The Sun and Its Secrets; The Moon our Closest Celestial Neighbor: A distant Puzzle; The Planet Uranus; Death from Space; What Killed the Dinosaurs?; Cosmic Debris; The Asteroids; Our Planetary System and Mysteries of Deep Space; Black Holes, Pulsars, and Quasars.

U.S. Astronaut Sally Ride shares the adventure of outer space in her book To Space and Back. This is an engrossing account of a space journey, from a blastoff to landing, and gives intimate, you-are-there details of life on board the shuttle. Her account is a personal approach to what often seems too far away and is a vivid description of the human side of exploring the unknown.

Ten books in The Baby Sitters Club series will be of interest to middle school readers.

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

Cassie Adams attended the Atomic Energy Merit Badge (AEMB) Workshop in Amarillo during the month of October. Girl and Boy Scouts from a four state region attended the workshop. The following is Cassie's report on the workshop and trip to Albuquerque, Sandia Labs, and Los Alamos.

We learned in the AEMB the history of atomic energy discovery and research, including the scientist involved as well as basic atomic principles.

The first week we had lectures and received books and work books to be used in preparation for the following week's test. We also received an assignment to design and build of hydrogen isotopes. The second week we took our Atomic Energy vocabulary and scientist test and then worked on fulfilling other requirements. During our third week, we presented our hydrogen isotopes models. Afterwards each patrol chose a boy and girl to take the Special Achievement Test. I was chosen to take the test and was fortunate to have the highest girl's score and second highest score overall which entitled me to a scholarship for our trip to Albuquerque, Sandia labs, and Los Alamos.

We were given the opportunity to go to the Albuquerque area where we visited the Department of Energy's Sandia Labs where they were performing experiments on solar energy. Then we visited Los Alamos, the site where the first atomic bomb was constructed and detonated. While there we walked on a bridge that has no metal on it which was used to find out how airplanes react to energy pulses given off by lightning.

Overall this was a great experience and I recognize that I was fortunate to be able to attend.

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (SWBT) has filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) to restructure the current PLEXAR I and II service offerings. This restructure will significantly change PLEXAR I and II services.

The restructuring of PLEXAR I will, among other things: (1) reduce the maximum line size from 30 to 9; (2) obsolete and grandfather certain optional features; (3) eliminate the requirement to subscribe to Feature Package Two in order to subscribe to certain optional features; (4) reduce the nonrecurring and monthly rates of certain features; and (5) increase the nonrecurring charges for the PLEXAR I System Charge (\$2.10 to \$8.00), Call Transfer Disconnect feature (\$3.00 to \$8.00), and Convenience Dialing I feature (\$6.35 to \$8.00). All current PLEXAR I customers will have the option of keeping their current PLEXAR I service, switching to the new restructured PLEXAR I service, or switching to PLEXAR II service with ten or more lines.

The proposed PLEXAR II restructure will, among other things: (1) change the tariffed offering to serve the market segment of 10-74 stations; (2) create two station pricing structures, one for customers with 10-29 stations, and one for customers with 30-74 stations; (3) reduce the sensitivity for the loop portion of the rate to two price bands: 0-2 miles, and beyond 2 miles; (4) offer a PLEXAR II basic station that can be flexibly configured, from a number of standard features, to meet the individual customer requirements; (5) change the way the termination liability is calculated so the customer is responsible for 65% rather than 56% of the present monthly of the remaining monthly payments in the contract; (6) create an option that allows month-to-month customers to convert to long term contracts of at least three years and receive a credit or "contract signing bonus"; and (7) establish a System Subsequent Change Charge which applies per serving central office when changes are made that affect the entire system.

Current PLEXAR II customers will also have the option of keeping their current PLEXAR II service, or switching to the new restructured PLEXAR II service. PLEXAR II customers with at least 75 stations also have the option of switching to PLEXAR Custom service in certain situations.
