



# **Roberts leaves** ATC in spring

Gen. John W. Roberts, commander of Air Training Command, has been nominated by President Carter to be placed on the retired list in his current grade, effective April 1. Secretary of Defense Harold Brown made the announcement Jan. 15 in Washington D.C. Gen. Roberts successor was not

One of only 13 Four-star generals on active duty with the Air Force, General Roberts assumed command of ATC in August, 1975, while still a Lieutenant-General. In March 1977, he was promoted to full general, at which time his position was elevated to fourstar rank in recognition of ATC's role in National Defense.

Under Robert's command, ATC, in 1978, absorbed the Air University at Maxwell AFB, Ala., and assumed jurisdiction over Goodfellow AFB, Tx. The moves were designed to place all the Air Force's technical

training, professional military education and cryptological training programs under single leadership.

Recognized throughout the Air Force for his interest in the welfare of his people, General Roberts manages more than 116,000 military and civilian personnel. His command ranks second only to Strategic Air Command in terms of total personnel assigned.

There are 15 installations, all of them in the United States, within ATC. There are ATC training detachments at virtually every U.S. Air Force Base in the world. Instructors at these detachments are responsible for keeping operational personnel proficient in their specialties.

General Roberts' military decorations include the Distinguished Service Medal of Merit with an oak leaf cluster

We may not like to hear it but, doing "more and more" with "less and less" has become a way of life for those of us who manage and use Air Force resources.

Dollars authorized by Congress to pay for operating the Air Force and maintaining its facilities have actually declined over the past five years when measured in terms of purchasing power.

It's no surprise then that when we speak of Fiscal Year 1979 being an austere period when a tight money supply and an expanding mission will bring new challenges, managers react with "So what's new?" The fact that we at Reese have continued to meet our mission goals in the face of such austerity is a credit to the dedication of our people and skilled leadership of our managers.

Fiscal Year 1979 will present the same challenges to the Reese

Operations and Maintenance budget that the year will bring to our individual family budgets. Costs are increasing for everything we consume. The cost of parts we buy to keep our airplanes flying have, in some cases, increased by as much as 300 per cent. Materials purchased to maintain and repair our buildings cost more today than yesteday and will cost even more tomorrow. The cost of the utilities we consume will increase by a known \$379,000. The pay raise that most agree was less than needed to offset the rising cost of living, nevertheless will add over \$1,830,000 to the Reese

What does all this mean to those with a job to do and a mission to accomplish? It means we accept the challenge to increase productivity and efficiency while maintaining our high standards of

quality. It means we find ways to reduce and avoid costs and then to share these cost reduction ideas with others.

I challenge each of you to join us in our search for ways of reducing costs. If you have an idea, there are a number of ways to share it. You can use the Suggestion Program and profit from the cost savings. You can submit your idea through the ATC Efficiency Scorecard Program which crossfeeds ideas among ATC bases. If you'd like to discuss an idea or need some help in developing or putting your ideas in writing, contact your supervisor or unit Resource Advisor or call the Comptroller at 3518 for assistance.

Austerity, budget cuts, tight money, more with less—all just ways of saying the same thing. Our challenge is to "Keep Costs in Line During 79."


Reese participated in "Operation Use It

# Prepared for winter?

Are you prepared for winter driving?

Here are a few tips which may assist you in this task:

- Check your windshield wiper blades and tension on the wiper arms.
- Use anti-freeze solvent in the washer system and keep it full.
- Check the battery; clean corrosion from terminals and fill if necessary.
- Flush radiator and fill with proper amount of water and antifreeze.
- Check your brakes and have them adjusted or re-lined if necessary.
- Clear your windshield, windows and lights of ice, snow, frost or mud. You can't avoid hazards you can't see! Winter presents special problems with



visibility, so you will need to take the extra care.

- Deep tread tires are good but snow tires are better. Chains are best of all for ice and snow conditions.
- Make sure your heater and defroster operate properly.
- Change to winter-weight oil if you don't use the multiviscosity type.
- Check all fluid levels: transmission and power-operated units.
- Check the entire exhaust system. Carbon monoxide kills, and a faulty exhaust system could mean disaster.

## Bakke ruling boosts **Affirmative Actions**

by TSgt. Clyde A. McDonald Many of us have been watching the news for reactions to the Bakke case. The overall outcome appears to be a positive one in that it reaffirms the Air Force stand on Affirmative Actions Programs as being a "Quality" not a "Quota" program.

The Supreme Court decision did not bar affirmative actions but instead recognized minority status as one variable in the selection process. For example, a company that would like its work force to mirror the population from which it draws employees may screen more minority applicants until its skill requirements and standards are met. In other words, there is no lowering of standards but there is a focusing of recruiting efforts toward attaining a work force representative of the population.

In essence it would appear that Affirmative Actions has

been strengthened by the Bakke decision. The following quote from a memorandum to the Heads of Executive Department and Agencies from President Carter reenforces this opinion: "I want to make certain that, in the aftermath of Bakke, you continue to develop, implement and enforce vigorously, affirmative action programs. I also want to make certain that the administrations' strong commitment to equal opportunity and affirmative action is recognized and understood by all Americans."

In this spirit, we need to pull together to promote affirmative actions. The next time you attend a briefing (Commanders Call, Human Relations Education, etc.) and you hear affirmative actions mentioned, don't tune it out. LISTEN. After all, affirmative actions is the promotion of equal opportunity for all. Isn't that what you want for yourself, your children, your spouse, your friends - - - - ?



# T-38 inspections change

the flightline and into the hanger for fewer inspections, says a maintenance spokesman here, but; each inspection will be more thorough.

According to Second Lt. William J. Schurr, chief of the Organizational Maintenance Squadron's T-38 Inspection Branch, T-38s are inspected for mechanical defects under the "periodic inspection" concept. In the past the birds would receive a periodic inspection every 400 hours with a less intensive hourly post flight inspection sandwiched between "periodic" checks.

Now, the periodic inspections are scheduled for every 300 flying hours and the hourly post flight inspection has been eliminated.

Lieutenant Schurr explained that a periodic inspection is, "... an in-depth look at the aircraft's airframe, electrical and hydraulic systems, engines and flight controls. Any defects are repaired and the aircraft is reassembled and given several more checks before being returned to the flightline. The whole process usually takes about 7 days."


On the flightline itself, the basic post-flight inspection performed every 100 hours in the past, has been moved back to every 150 hours. This inspection supports the daily post-flight checks.

Lieutenant Schurr noted that the new system should save the Air Force money, not only because of the cost-saving value of fewer inspections, but; because aircraft that are being



# **VA loan guarantee** increases 42 per cent

The maximum guarantee for Veterans Administration (VA) home loans has increased from \$17,500 to \$25,000 under the Veterans Housing Benefits Act

The legislation also permits certain severly disabled veterans to obtain a VA grant of up to \$30,000 to buy or adapt a residence to meet their special needs. VA grants for these homes were formerly limited to

The new bill is of special benefit to an estimated 168,000 Vietnam era veterans because it reduces the length of activeduty service required for eligibility for VA home, condominium or mobile home loan guarantee benefits.

The legislation also permits VA to guarantee loans for energy-related home improvements, including installation of solar heating and cooling systems.

It also authorizes VA to guarantee loans for converted condominiums as of July 1, 1979. The agency currently is authorized to guarantee condominium loans in buildings constructed and sold as this type of dwelling.

VA's mobile home loan program was also restructured by the new law, setting a \$17,500 loan maximum and extending the maximum loan term for single-wide mobile homes to 15 years, an increase of 36 months. (AFNS)

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# ATC lauds Civil Engineers

# West says attitude key to improvement

In less than three years, the men and women in the 64th Civil Engineering Squadron have turned a sputtering program into the best the Air Training Command has to offer.

"I remember what it was like when I arrived here in late 1976," commented Maj. Hirum E. West, CE commander. "There wasn't enough communication ... not only outside of the squadron but between branch chiefs as well."

Calling a "time out" on the confussion, Major West laid out the foundation for the "new" Civil Engineering Squadron. Based on open communication and customer satisfaction the squadron has progressed so well that ATC named it the best civil engineering unit in the command for 1978.

"We have a unique situation here," continued Major West. "Sooner or later we deal with everyone on base. From the airman basic living in the dormitories right on up to the wing commander — they all need our help. And we do all we can. One of the keys for the unit's success story is that its people are willing to go that extra step to get the job done."

"In the past," explained the CE commander, "people would call in with a problem and they'd be told we have to

have a written work request — which we do. Often, that would be the end of it — both the customer and CE would forget it. But now we keep track of our contacts. If we don't get a work request within a few days we call back and see what went wrong. At times our people have done everything but sign the work requests for the customer."

But customer satisfaction isn't the only thing that has turned the Civil Engineer's program around. Last year the squadron faced the pitfalls of inflation with a reduced budget and still managed to chop \$160,000 off the projected figure. Doing more with less became a way of life in CE.

Some examples of how CE squeezed big projects out of limited funding include the construction of Pavements and Grounds facility using Prime Beef teams to erect the basic structure (estimated savings \$80,000), moving and remodeling an old building instead of adding on a new facility at squadron headquarters (saved approximately \$35,000) and use of Comprehensive Employee Training Act personnel to eliminate a 3,000 manhour backlog (saved nearly \$119,000).



past, the individual was never lost in the march ahead. Personal education remains a high priority item in CE.

More than 60 men and women are enrolled in the Community College of the Air Force and 34 are taking off-base studies. The list of professional military education schools attended by CE workers includes Senior NCO Academy, NCO Academy, NCO Leadership School and the Air Force Institute of Technology.

CE people are also active in community programs. Seven of the 16 volunteers that worked with the Camp Blue Yonder program last year were from CE. Others were involved throughout the year in religious activities, the scouting program, Big Brothers and a variety of other civic events.

And CE workers have not gone without recognition for their efforts. Leading up to the squadron's selection as best in ATC, the unit had four men picked as the 64th Flying Training Wing Airman of the Month, one named the Wing NCO of the Quarter and another the Wing Junior Support Officer. TSgt. Bradley Charters, the NCO of the Quarter, went on to become the Wing NCO of the Year and the ATC CE NCO of the Year. A1C David Anderson, one of the Airman of the Month winners, was selected as the Wing Airman of the Year.

And civilians received their share of awards too. Nine of the 143 civilians working in CE received cash awards for their "outstanding" job performance.

Major West pointed out that the blending of the military and civilian workforce into a cohesive unit has probably had as much to do with the unit's success as anything. He noted that this is the best CE workforce he has ever seen.

"Attitude has made the difference for us," concluded Major West. "Our people do a better job because they want to... and that's all it takes."





But, you may run the risk of damaged goods or late delivery. If you exceed your weight allowance, a mover's charge for the extra weight can be expensive.

The Do-It-Yourself alternative to commercial moving lets you move yourself within the continental United States. It's more work; you do it all. However, you and the government can share all savings gained by not using a commercial firm. Officials see this as a big advantage for junior enlisted members with small weight allowances. If you move yourself, you also know your belongings will arrive at their new home when you do.

What about damage on self-moves? Mr. Jim Konkel, Air Force manager for the Do-It-Yourself program, noted that the damage rate has been extremely low. Also, if you can verify that damage wasn't due to negligence, you can file a claim for the damage.

When? How? After you have decided, or even before for that matter, see your traffic management office staff early and give them a chance to serve you better. Your personal property counselor will make all the arrangements for you.

# Minuteman production ends; Air Force eyes MX system

Production of the Minuteman intercontinental ballistic missile, mainstay of the nation's land-based ICBM force, has ended.

The last missile has been completed at a U.S. Air Force facility at Hill AFB, Utah by the Boeing Aerospace Company, which received the Minuteman assembly, test and installation contract in October 1958.

Through the years, the Minuteman system has been one of the major deterrents to nuclear aggression against the United States.

Minuteman was conceived during a critical period of Cold War. The first production missiles were ready for use just six months before the Cuban missile crisis of October 1962.

Since 1967, 1,000 missiles have stood on silent alert in underground silos at six Air Force bases from Montana to Missouri. The nuclear armed missiles can reach targets more than 6,000 miles away. Their silos are dispersed over hundreds of square miles to enhance their survivability.

Despite improvements to the Minuteman system over the

years, there is concern that by the mid-1980s the fixed location of the silos could make the missiles vulnerable to attack.

The Air Force has proposed an advanced ICBM called missile X, or MX, as a follow-on to Minuteman. An option under the MX concept is that a missile would be moved among a number of launch sites to confuse enemy targetting.

A decision to develop and deploy such a system, officials said, has not yet been made. Meanwhile, the Minuteman force continues as a major element. (AFNS)




