By every definition of the word, Capt. John R. Hennigan is a winner.

Maybe that's why 64th Flying Training Wing officials have selected him to represent Reese in the Air Training Command 1978 Instructor Pilot of the Year competition.

From his high school days in California through his assignment as a class commander in the 64th Student Squadron, Captain Hennigan has gone beyond what was "required," always looking for ways to improve himself and the system.

Captain Hennigan was graduated with honors from nearly every educational institution he attended. It started back in 1965 when he was graduated from Oxnard High School and continued through completion of study at Ventura Junior College, quartermaster technical training school, Oklahoma University, Officer Training School and Undergraduate Pilot Training.

During Captain Hennigan's last three standarization and evaluation flights he received an outstanding and two excellents.

I work on the flight line. I would like to know why the fliers' helmet hat, the wallet hat with the nylon insert, is unauthorized on this base. These hats are worn Air Force-wide for flight line use and I was informed by T-37 branch supervisory personnel that they are unauthorized.

While the hat you refer to is an Air Force issued item and is authorized for wear by individuals in extremely cold areas, a requirement for its use and wear has not been authorized at Reese. A further check into your

work area shows that this hat would interfere with the wearing of the ear (noise) muffs which are required.

Primarily though, our short winter weather conditions and the cost involved for individual issue do not warrant the authorization of this cold weather headgear. However, I have approved the wearing of the US Navy watch cap from Oct. 1 through March 31 with the utility uniform and special purpose clothing, provided an approved outer garment is worn.

#### No lights

There is a definite safety hazard for night students at building 820, since there are no lights on the outside of the building. I called on this subject last year and they were turned on for a few weeks and then went back off again. And now they are off again, and especially with the construction on the sidewalk out there, it does seem to be a safety hazard.



# Proper records aid tax returns

It's tax time again and although it comes at the same time each year and federal law requires taxpayers to maintain records that will



enable them to prepare accurate tax returns, there are always millions who aren't ready.

They are the ones who wait until the last possible minute, grab facts and figures out of the air, then pray that the Internal Revenue Service overlooks them again this year.

Even if federal law did not require it, maintaining records is still a good idea. Files are beneficial to insure that only the proper amount of tax is paid and for support in event the IRS decides (heaven forbid) to audit "my" income tax rather than the other person's.

Records are helpful in many ways but they must be detailed and maintained for the proper length of time. Memoranda or sketchy records or haphazard personal recollections of an event or deduction are inadequate. Cash or property may

• Identify sources of income. Cash or property may be received from a number of sources, and unless records clearly identify the source, individuals may be unable to substantiate that some part of the income is nontaxable.

• Prevent omission of deductible expenses. An overlooked item of \$25 could cost several dollars in tax

• Take advantage of capital gain and loss privileges.

• Explain itemized reports on income tax returns. Sales slips, invoices, receipts, cancelled checks and other documents always support adequate records and are essential for explanations.

Once the records are accurately compiled,

they should be retained as long as their contents may be material in the administration of any IRS law. As a rule:

• Records that support an item of income or a deduction should be kept until the statute of limitations expires for that return. Usually this is three years from the date the return was filed or due, or two years from the date the tax was paid, whichever occurs later.

• Some records, such as the purchase of a house, must be kept indefinitely. Records of transactions relating to the basis of property should be retained for as long as they are material in determining the basis of original or replacement property.

• Copies of all previous income tax returns should be kept in permanent files. They will aid in preparing future tax returns and in making computations if the taxpayer later files a claim for a refund or amends a tax return.

Remember, too, that besides collecting taxes, IRS is in business to help us. They provide many publications which may be obtained by using the order form in your tax package. Also, they will furnish required forms and assist by explaining difficult portions.

With the proper records, publications, forms and professional IRS advice, you're now on the way to alleviating if not completely eliminating the problems most people encounter around mid-April. If after reading all this, you still wait and again develop the April 15 panics, relax. Since that date falls on Sunday this year, you have an extra day.

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
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# Reese legal office staff offers valuable service

In these days when the entitlements of military personnel are being reduced, it is good to know that service members and their dependents have free access to fully qualified Air Force lawyers.

As part of their duties, military attorneys are responsible for advising and counselling individuals on their legal problems. The purpose of this "legal assistance" program is to raise the level of morale and increase the effectiveness of Air Force members by helping them resolve their problems as easily as possible.

Cost-free legal service is available for the following groups and their dependents: (1) all active duty military members, (2) members of allied armed forces serving in the United States, (3) retired personnel and (4) certain dependent survivors of service personnel.

Basically, Air Force lawyers can provide consultation and advice on "personal civil legal problems." This means that even though he is not

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
authorized to appear in court on your behalf, a military lawyer can help you with your legal problems other than criminal matters. (Legal personnel at Reese can give you advice on minor traffic violations, even though these are technically criminal actions.)

Advocate, or legal office, at Reese is located in room 209 of bldg. 800 and is open from 8 a.m. to noon and from 1 to 4:45 p.m., Monday through Friday. To make an appointment for legal assistance call ext. 3505. Normally legal assistance is given on Tuesday and Thursday afternoons and on

Monday evenings, but appointments can be made at other times if necessary. Any individual who feels that his situation is an emergency can receive immediate advice.

The staff of the legal office is available to help you with your problems at no cost to you: whereas contacting a civilian attorney may cost you \$50 per hour (or more) for his time. Although it might ultimately be necessary for a military lawyer to refer you to the civilian bar to resolve your problem, it would normally be to your advantage to disucss any legal problem with the base legal office first.

Remember, legal problems are similar to medical problems in that if such problems are not taken care of at the time they first arise, they usually become more serious. Whether you come to the legal office to discuss a will, a power of attorney, a contract or anything else you think is a legal question, bring all the paperwork you have on the subject and discuss the problem freely with the attorney you see. He is your attorney and is required to keep everything you tell him

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# Self-help moves net cash

The "Do-it-yourself" moving program is offered the military member as an alternate means of moving personal property within the United States.


Under this program,

members must go to the Traffic Management Officer, who will order the government-leased truck or trailer or approve the privately-owned truck or cargo trailer to move household goods instead of having the government ship them by commercial means. People moving will pick up the equipment, pack and load household goods, drive to their new home, unload the vehicle and turn it in to the dealer designated in the contract. It's that simple!

The government pays all rental charges and cost of packing material and moving aids. The TMO will assist movers in selecting the proper equipment and sufficient packing material to meet their

If you are using a privately owned truck or trailer, it must be approved by the TMO. Automobiles, station wagons, motor homes, camper trailers, pickup trucks with camper built over the truck bed, or vehicles that have been changed to accommodate passengers cannot be used under the program.

Any member who is otherwise eligible for a movement of personal property at government expense is eligible to move under the do-it-yourself moving program.



This includes persons in receipt of permanent change of station orders, temporary duty, retirement, separation and to those persons moving locally from or to government quarters. An E-4 or below with less than two years service, and moving within the United States on a PCS move, is also authorized to use this program.

If this method of moving household goods is selected and has been authorized by the TMO, the mover is eligible to receive a monetary incentive. The incentive payment is based on costs the government would have actually paid had the household goods been moved by the normal commercial household goods movers. The mover receives 75 per cent of this cost less the charges paid to the rental company for the vehicle, packing and moving

As an example, if it would cost yourself moving program.

the government \$1,000.00 to move goods by commercial van, the mover receives 75 percent or \$750.00 as an incentive payment less rental equipment cost. To be eligible to receive the incentive payment, one must obtain two certified weight tickets. One ticket must show the fare (empty) weight of the truck or trailer and the other the gross weight (loaded) of the truck or trailer. Both fare and gross weights may be shown n the same ticket. No certified weight tickets, no incentive payment!

Participation in the do-ityourself moving program is strictly on a voluntary basis, and in no way is it intended to eliminate the right to choose one authorized mode over another.

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## Financial council seeks counselors

Reese's Personal Financial Management Program Council is looking for volunteers to serve as financial counselors.

According to council chairman Maj. Roy Markle, the group wants to strengthen its counseling program by drawing qualified people into the PFMP.

"Volunteers need only meet two qualifications," explained Major Markle. "Prospective volunteers must possess skilled techniques in personal financial planning and management (through personal experience or formal education) and a desire to help others by sharing their knowledge.'

Major Markle added that a refresher course in counseling techniques, financial services available locally and basic financial management techniques will be provided volunteers. The course will run approximately eight hours.

The base financial counseling program operates as follows:

· Major Markle, the base comptroller, serves as the contact for counseling services. • Personnel seeking assistance are teamed with a volunteer counselor who provides the guidance, instruction and encouragement necessary to resolve the immediate problem and to help the client develop a long range personal financial plan. The counselor is not expected to assume responsibility for solving the client's financial problems. Instead, the counselor assists the client in searching for solutions.

"For those interested in helping others, serving as a financial counselor can be a rewarding experience," notes Major Markle.

#### saving by spending

Realizing that sometimes it's necessary to spend money to save money, the Air Force has set aside a \$3 million-plus fund to do just that.

According to Jeanne Yarbrough, chief of the Management Engineering Team here, the fund supports the Fast Payback Capital Investment Program. FASCAP was created in fiscal year 1977 to increase productivity through investment in labor saving equipment while reducing operating and support

More than \$3.6 million has been committed to FASCAP for FY-79. Equipment purchased under the program must save the Air Force money within two years.

The basic requirements for using FASCAP funds to buy equipment are:

• The equipment must save 3149 or 3555.

money through operations and maintenance budget reductions or reduced manpower authorizations and the savings must at least equal the investment within 24 months.


• Items to be purchased must be immediately available for procurement.

• Investment costs include transportation, site preparation, installation and maintenance as well as the purchase

• Savings must be traceable and subject to government accounting office review.

Mrs. Yarbrough added that FASCAP funds are not available for projects under \$1,000 or more than \$40,000; repair parts, or spares.

#### Consumer advice

## Shop with care

(Editor's note: The Lubbock Better Business Bureau's Mal Cleland has provided the Roundup with some tips on consumer shpping for grocery items.)

When it comes to buying food, a penny here and a penny there soon may amount to many dollars. The Better Business Bureau has some tips that may help keep more dollars in the pocket and stretch those that slip away so easily in the supermarket.

Psychologists, statisticians and market researchers have studied consumer buying habits to discover what products sell and why. This information is used by advertisers, packagers and retailers in various ways to influence a shopper to buy one product over another, or to buy a product that originally was not needed.

A store may be arranged so that it is necessary to walk around its perimeter to find necessary items, such as milk, bread or meat, thus exposing the consumer to the end-of-aisle displays. A store may have many rows of a product to keep it in the shopper's view and thus increase sales. Rational decisions become difficult because the shopper has too much information to consider and may become impatient and buy impulsively. To avoid making unwise buying decisions, plan ahead.

#### Time is money

To save money in food stores, time and care must be invested ensure nutritious meals at the best possible price. Make a shopping list. Look at the list and consider the food choices. Could other less expensive foods replace an item, such as eggs, beans, liver or peanut butter in place of a more expensive choice? Scan newspaper grocery ads for specials, particularly those on

Clip coupons and use them, but only if the brand offered is really a good buy. It may be wise to build the weekly menus around the week's specials in the meat market, or to stock up on good bargains if the storage space is available. Avoid impulse-buying but be flexible enough to snap up a bargain.

#### The value of information

Read labels. Look for information on number and size of servings, nutrition, freshness and net weight or volume. Compare prices per unit by looking at the unit price on the shelf. This will tell whether a 12 ounce jar of applesauce at 69 cents is cheaper than a 16 ounce jar at 81 cents. Large containers often cost less but not always. Unit pricing will aid in determining this.

Make price comparisons by in the selection of foods to comparing cost per serving.

# AFOSI agents, airman bust Korean theft ring

A Korean-American robbery ring responsible for the theft of more than \$30,000 worth of construction materials has been uncovered by Air Force Office of Special Investigations agents in Osan, Korea.

AFOSI officials said some \$18,000 worth of the material. aluminum matting used in runway construction, has been recovered. It had been secretly removed from Osan AB through a theft and diversion operation. At least 13 Korean nationals and two Osan airmen are believed to be involved, officials

an airman noticed Korean nationals loading matting onto

Office of Special Investigations agents said the ring leader acted as site manager while leading the massive theft operation. "Thanks to help from the 51st Security Police Squadron and the Korean National Police," the agent said, "nine of the Koreans were caught and their airmen accomplices are now awaiting possible disciplinary action."

An OSI agent at Osan cited the bust as an example of the

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#### 1979 USAF SPORTS SCHEDULE





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

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## Murphy's shot at buzzer lifts Sturon-1 into playoffs



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


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
