UPT grads get wings today

Thirty-five names will be added to the roll of Air Force pilots when Undergraduate Pilot Training Class 79-04 graduates today.

Wing pinning ceremonies for the fledgling fliers will be held this morning at 10 in the base Chapel.

Guest speaker for today's graduation will be retired Lt. Gen. Richard P. Klocko, director of Personnel Relations at Texas Tech University.

A graduate of Est Point, General Klock led the P-39 equipped 350th Fighter Group into action in North Africa during World War II. He was captured there and held prisoner until April of 1945. Later he was awarded the Silver Star.

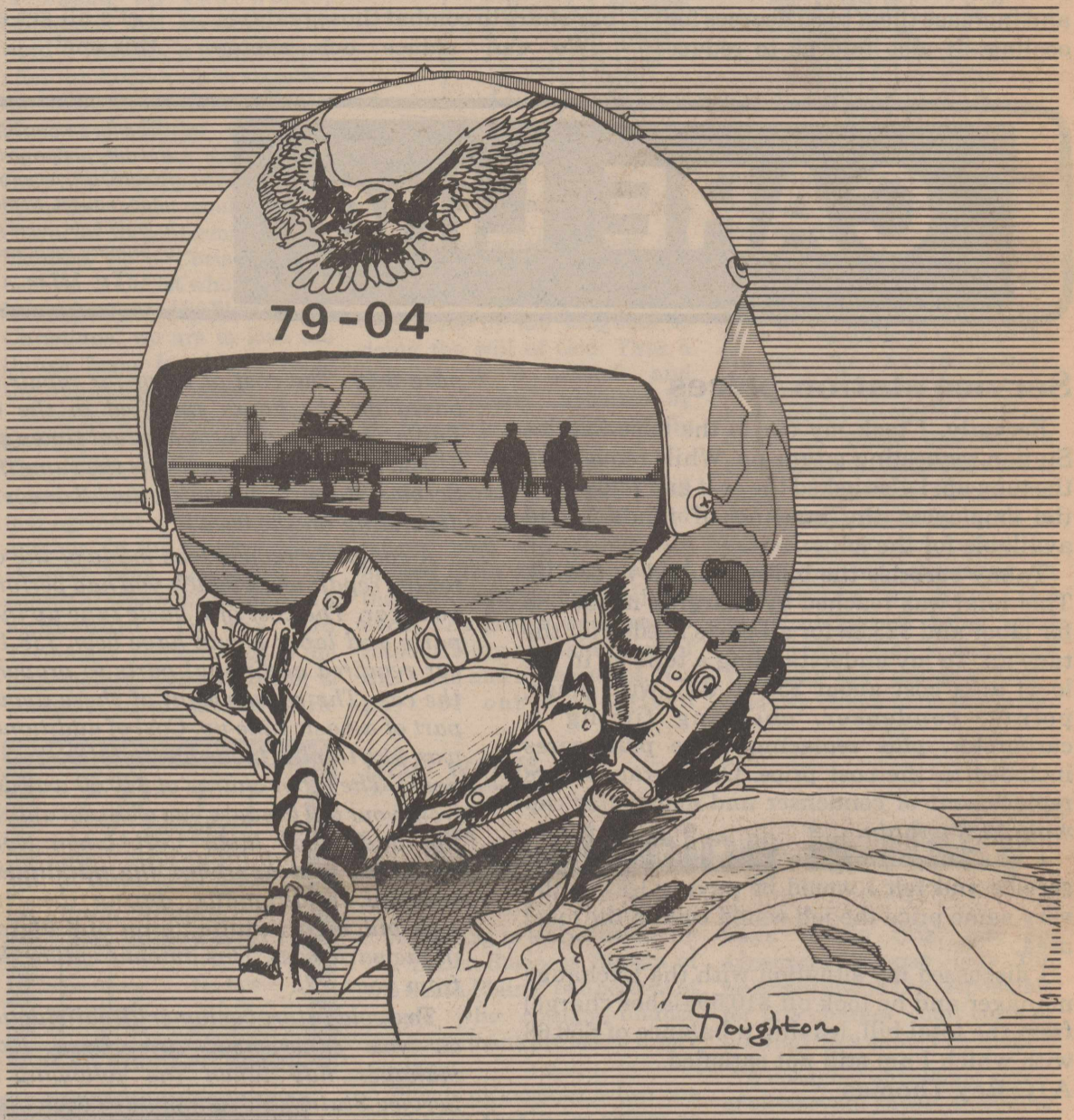
Following the graduation ceremony, the pilots will be

honored at a luncheon at the Officer's Club at 11:30 a.m. At 12:30 p.m., friends and relatives of the grads will be treated to a Red Carpet tour of Reese.

Tonight, a dinner-dance is slated at the Officers' Club. The affair begins at 6:30 p.m. During the dinner portion of the event awards will be presented to "outstanding graduates" by the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce and the local chapter of the Air Force Association.

Drive nears end

Reese sets AFAF mark

With the Air Force Assistance Fund campaign set to end this weekend, Reese people have shattered last year's record by reaching 148 percent of the 1979 goal.

As of Wednesday morning, wing contributions had topped the \$11,300 mark, surpassing last year's total contribution by nearly \$500.

Helping Reese set the new record was a special bowling tournament last week. The officer vs. noncommissioned officer "shoot out" on the Reese lanes netted \$111.27 for the AFAF drive.

Four major organizations have made their final contributions. Maintenance leads that group with pledges of \$3,555, the 1958th Communica-

tions Squadron has given \$357, Resource Management donated \$723 and the Hospital came up with \$521. All four units were well over their established targets.

Operations, the total dollar leader with \$4,464 donated, leads the units still collecting for the drive. Air Base Group has added \$1,572.

Service station prices

Recently, I took my car to the base Service Station requesting a tune-up. While requesting the tune-up, I also asked the cost and told one of the employees the amount of funds I had available for the job.

To my surprise the bill amounted to \$61.18. This total was reached by charging me \$37.80 for labor and \$23.38 for all parts needed for the tune-up. To my understanding a tune-up in the local area cost about \$30 to \$35, with plugs, points, condenser, checking timing & carburetor, plus replacing three plug wires included in the cost price. One garage offers replacement of condenser and distributor cap with its warranty.

I was supporting the Base Exchange with service and felt I would be paying less or the very same price the job would cost in the local area.

I discussed my situation with the Exchange manager and he took off \$10.50 (labor charge) from the total bill, leaving a balance of \$50.68 with which I am still not satisfied.

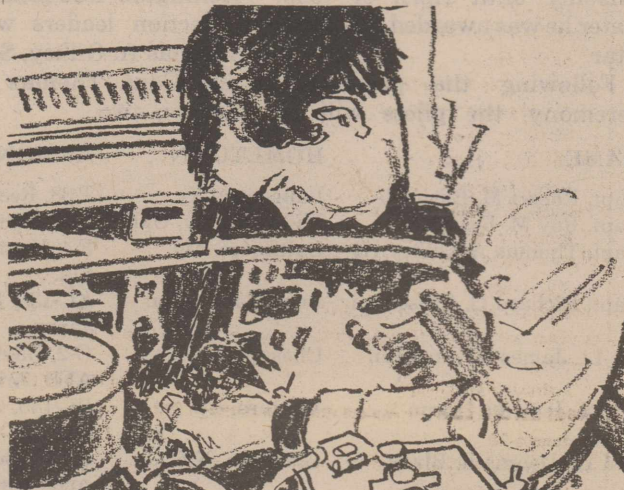
The Base Exchange Service Station repair and tune-up prices are governed by AFR 147-14 and Exchange Service Manual 31-1, Chapter 3,

para 3-13. The cost of labor for repair work is based on the hours specified in the Chilton Labor Guide and Parts Manual times a cost of \$10.50 per hour. The policy is the same in all BX Service Stations; however, the labor cost varies depending on the area.

A complete review was made of the charges for the repair work which you had performed on your car. The cost of a basic tune-up including parts and labor would have been \$38.18. Your car required additional parts to properly tune the car. The replacement of these items is not part of a basic tune-up. Cost of additional parts was \$12.10 plus labor for installation \$10.50 (1 hour). The labor charge of \$10.50 was deducted from your bill because you were not appraised of the additional labor cost when you were contacted and approved the additional parts required. Additionally, during the review of your bill, an accounting error of \$.40 was made in the parts cost. This amount will be deducted from your bill.

To avoid future customer dissatisfaction such as you experienced, the Base Exchange manager has taken the following action: Service Station personnel have been instructed to be very specific when quoting prices for repair work. The customer is to be made aware of the cost of labor and parts and how the total

bill is computed for work accomplished. If additional work is required to properly complete a job the customer will be contacted and all costs involved will be given for the customer to make the decision. The Service Station personnel have also been instructed to inform



the customer that other sources such as speciality businesses may be cheaper for some jobs.

The Base Exchange Management regrets that you were dissatisfied with the service provided and will make every effort in the future to provide satisfactory service to all customers.

Chaplain's comment

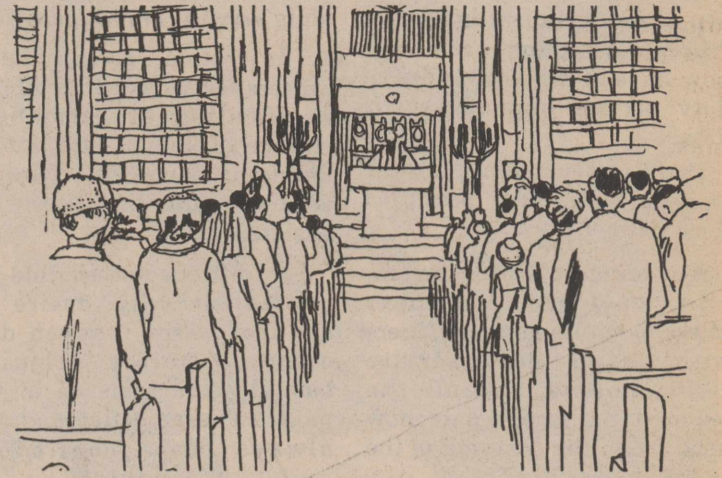

Have you ever heard the statement, "Christians are to be good stewards."

Having heard the statement one might ask, "What does it mean?"

The meaning of the sentence is based on two words: Christians and stewards. The word Christian, a word formed after the Roman style, signifies an adherent of Jesus Christ. The word Christ (Christos) signifies the One who by His Holy Spirit and power indwells believers and moulds their character in conformity to His likeness. So a Christian is a believer in Christ who desires to be conformed to His likeness. As Christians, we are to love the things Jesus loved and value the things Jesus valued.

Now let's consider the word, steward in a biblical context. The Bible teaches that a steward was charged with the management of the property of another. In the Greek world a steward was sometimes in charge of separate branches of a household. In the Old Testament Yahweh, God is the householder. God as Creator is possessor of all the earth. He

BBB warns

Co-signing is risky

According to a brief issued by the Better Business Bureau of the South Plains, 74.6 percent of people who co-sign finance company loans are asked to pay for them.

This is no surprise, when one considers that a co-signer is being asked to assume a risk a professional lender refuses to take. It is important for a person being asked to co-sign to consider several factors.

First of all he should be sure that he can afford to pay the loan. Secondly, he should try to get the lender to agree to restrict or fix the amount the co-signer would owe. The lender does not

have to do this, but an agreement to pay only the principal and not be responsible for late charges, court costs or attorney fees should be sought.

A co-signer should get copies of all relevant papers, including the loan contract, the truth-in-lending disclosure statement, and any warranties. He should also ask that the lender notify him of any delinquencies.

Avoidance of any loan with a pledge on the co-signer's property is advised. Above all, the co-signer should not let himself be pressured into any deals.

Separation policies change for retiring AF officers

Officers electing retirement in lieu of reassignment under the "seven-day option" rule will now have to fulfill their active duty service commitment, if any.

Previously, commitment waivers were often permitted for retirements.

According to Helen Jensen, outbound assignments officer at Reese, retirement for officers with active duty service commitments beyond the required retirement date now must be on the first day of the

month following the active duty service commitment date.

The option gives eligible officers seven days after official notification of permanent change of station selection to decide if they will retire or separate rather than accept the assignment.

For officers not eligible for retirement who desire to separate, the "seven-day option" policy remains basically the same as in the past. These officers have always been required to

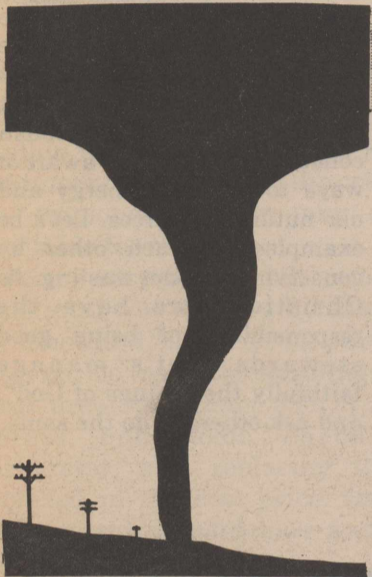
complete active duty service commitments prior to separation under this rule.

Officers must retire or separate within a certain time that varies depending on grade, amount of time until eligible for retirement, duty location (United States vs. overseas), and type of assignment (normal vs. stateside stabilized or rated supplement.

Steady tone

Siren warns of tornado



A three to five minute steady tone on the base siren indicates a tornado warning for Reese.

When the siren is sounded, people should go to a central hallway or closet for protection. Personnel should not go outside.

Once the danger is past, security policemen will sound an "all clear" over the base public address system.

Tornado briefings will be held Monday at the base theater for anyone who wants to know more about what to do when the high winds hit. Briefings will be held at 8:30 a.m., noon, 4 and 7 p.m.

New meal card entitlement bonus for traveling airman

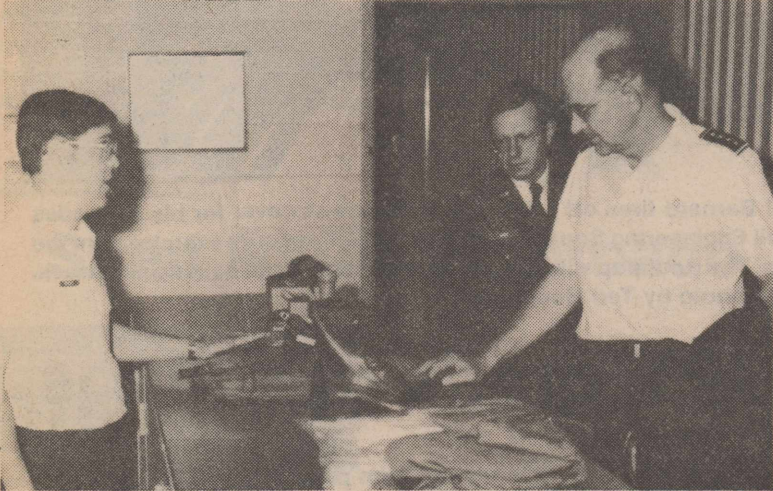
An Air Force policy change permitting airmen with meal cards to dine at government expense in any military dining hall when visiting neighboring bases for business or pleasure will be tested for six months.

Airmen must not be receiving basic allowance for subsistence, or on leave or on a temporary

duty assignment. To obtain a meal at other bases, airmen must inform the dining hall cashier that they are visiting from another base and not on leave or TDY. They must present their meal cards from home installations and their identification cards, sign the dining hall signature record

and proceed through the serving line in the same manner as assigned personnel.

If an airman is more than 200 miles from his home installation, but claims not to be on leave, he may be reported to the home installation for possible investigation regarding his status.

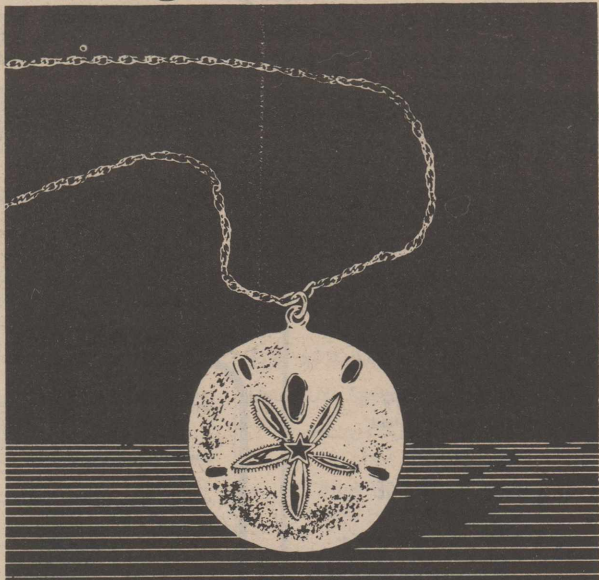

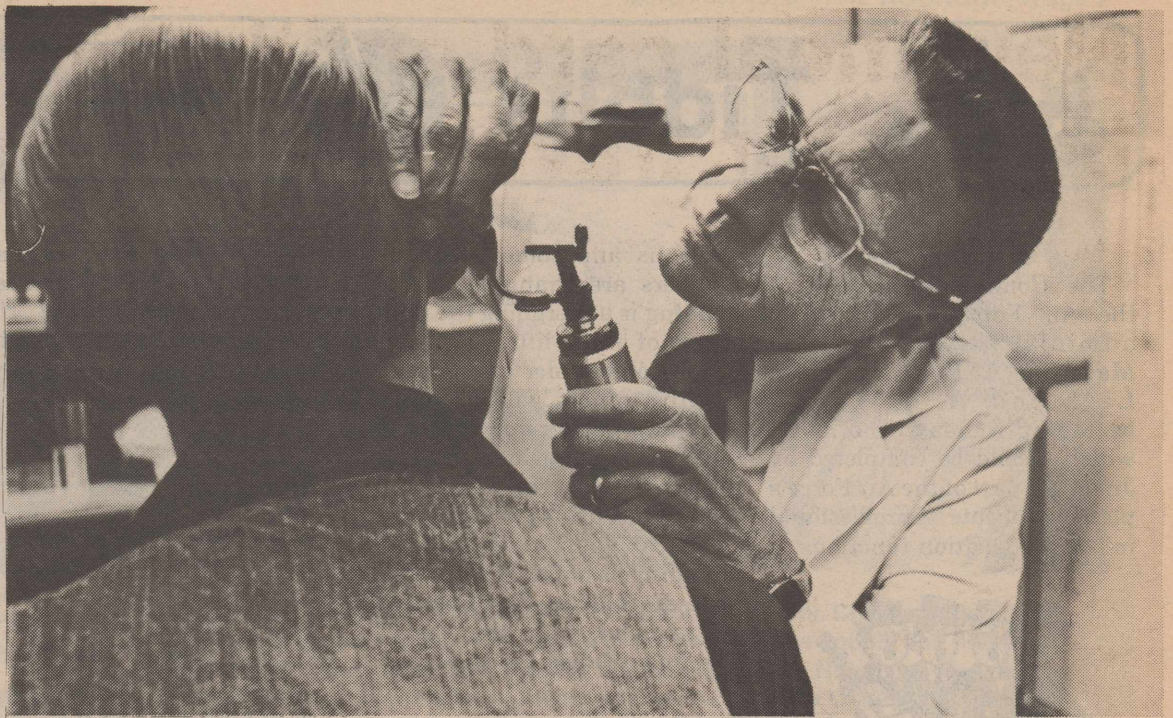

Hospital officials optimistic despite projected shortage

Despite forecasts that Reese's already depleted corps of physicians will slip below 30 percent of its authorized manning by early summer, hospital officials maintain that

"quality" medical care will continue.

"By the end of June we will be down to three doctors," explained Lt. Col. (Dr.) Allen H. Moore, Jr., during a Roundup interview Monday morning. "We won't sacrifice the quality of care — but the range of care available will be more limited."

The base Hospital is authorized 11 doctors. It has been operating with only five for nearly two years. The biggest problem with the summer reductions is that they will leave Reese without a surgeon or a flight surgeon except for Colonel Moore.

"Certain health care fields have not been available here for some time," concedes Colonel Moore. "So the loss of two doctors won't really change much from the patients' standpoint. With the exception of those people who may require surgery, the general impact on patients will be felt in the waiting room."

With fewer doctors available, more emphasis will have to be shifted to the physician's

assistants and nurse practitioners. Unfortunately, Colonel Moore says that both groups are already carrying full workloads.

That brings us right back to an increasing demand on a shrinking staff of doctors.

No permanent replacement for Reese's departing surgeon is expected until at least August. Until then, dependents requiring surgery will have to be referred to civilians under CHAMPUS or transferred to Sheppard AFB, Texas or Wilford Hall at Lackland AFB, Texas, as will active duty personnel. TDY assistance will have to be relied upon for support of the Flight Surgeon's office.

With only three doctors on staff, each of the physicians (including Colonel Moore) will be logging long workweeks. Because of requirements for a Medical Officer of the Day to be at the hospital at night, each doctor will have to pull 32-hour shifts a little more than twice per week.

"I'm not making excuses in advance," said Colonel Moore. "But I hope patients will understand that when they come in for treatment the doctor they see may have been working 30 straight hours and his bedside manner may not be at his best."

Patients having to seek civilian health care will be given a list by the Hospital registrar of physicians in the area that participate in CHAMPUS. However, the last survey taken of the area shows that less than 12 percent of the local health care providers participate in this health care program. Seeing a non-participating provider may cause higher costs to the patient.

"I'm certainly not going to say that the shortage won't cause us some problems," concluded Colonel Moore. "But we were undermanned when we earned the Air Force Outstanding Unit Award too. The staff is committed to maintaining quality health care. We may just need a little more time to provide it than in the past."

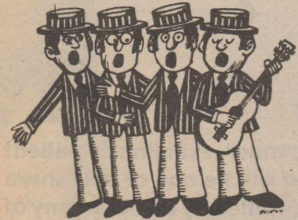

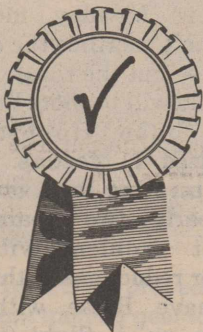
AFA meeting

"Although conservation and prudent management of resources have always been our objective, we must implement known paper conservation measures now and find new ways of doing business with less paper," says a command spokesman.

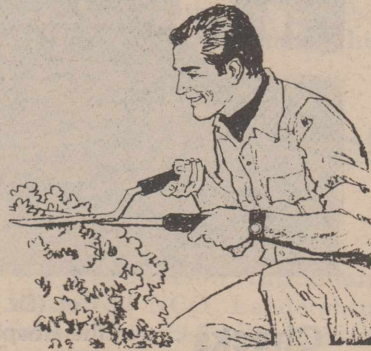

Rodeo clown



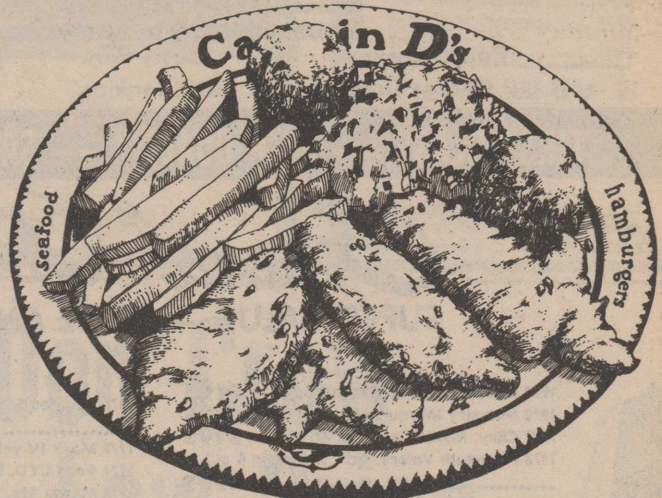
First Lt. Mike Mendes, an instructor pilot at Reese, almost loses his pants to a not so friendly Fido.
