Reese hosts special orientation

A special orientation about children and what goes into their "growing up" will be held at the Officers' Club April 25.

"Growing up" is the general topic for the human service conclave, a forum on the child. According to Planning Council director Kathryn Powell, the institute is an annual effort to bring together the social welfare and human resource personnel of the community for a learning experience on services, programs and issues current in the field.

This year's presentation concerns the child, the child's environments and the experience of growing up. It runs from 8 a.m. until 2 p.m. Major panel discussion will include "The Child and Self," "The Child and Parents," and "The Child and Society."

Registration for the annual institute is \$4.50 and includes lunch. Sign-ups may be made at the United Way office, 2201 19th Street or by telephone at 747-2711. Reservations should be made before April 20.

Featured speaker for the 1979 Community Planning Council and Interagency Action Council sponsored agency orientation institute will be Jeannette Watson, director of the Early Childhood Development Division of the Texas Department of Community Affairs.

Prior to her current position, Jeannette Watson was the executive director of the Texas Council of Early Childhood Education. She is the author of "Handicapped Children are People, Too," "Pierre the Texas Pelican-Parents Say Thanks," "How Wonderfully God Made Me," and the book that will be the topic of her talk, "Still the Darker Side of Childhood," a thesis on prevention of social problems through intervention in early development.

The Institute is also the site for the distribution of the 1979 edition of the Community Planning Council's Health, Welfare and Recreation Resource Directory.

If 100 riders sign

CITIBUS service starts May 1

Only one thing stands between the success or failure of Reese's attempt to set up express bus service between the base and Lubbock — 100 paid in advance riders.

According to Capt. Gary R. Taylor, chairman of the volunteer working group that set up the program with CITIBUS, express service could become a reality here by May 1.

Here's the package being offered:

• Two 42 passenger buses

(maximum capacity) will circle Lubbock. One bus will run down fourth street and the other will head up Avenue Q to 50th Street, across town to the South Plains Mall and then wind its way to 19th Street and Reese. Each bus will make five major stops along the way.

• Both buses will reach the base by 7:50 a.m., dropping passengers off at the base Theater.

Monthly passes for the express route, which are good

on all regular CITIBUS routes as well, cost \$20 (less than \$1 per day).

"The entire operation depends on getting 100 reservations by April 25," pointed out Captain Taylor. "If we don't have at least \$2,000 dollars by then the busses will not roll."

Captain Taylor also noted that there are several reasons why base personnel should look into the express service. In addition to the obvious savings over driving to work (gasoline prices keep rising), riding the bus will ease transportation problems for one-car families and will help promote the development of the transit system in and around Lubbock.

"It's a good way to show support for the President's fight to conserve energy too," added the captain.

Tickets for the express service are available at the Mathis Recreation Centers. Riders will be asked to designate which route they intend to ride. If the \$2,000 needed to start the service isn't raised by April 25, all money will be refunded to pass holders.

Because the Recreation Center has no way of covering bad checks, only cash or money orders will be accepted for ticket sales

A 26-year-old native of Moberly, Mo., Sergeant Williams is the assistant to the NCOIC of Supply's demand processing branch.






Top grad

For Christians, Easter is the day of days. It's the day we celebrate the verification of our faith in Christ.

When Jesus returned from the dead on that first Easter, his life, ministry, and sacrificial death took on a special significance for all mankind. To his followers it proved what they had believed all along.

To us today, the celebration of that occurrence reminds us that Jesus was not just a carpenter's son with a gift for preaching. He is indeed the Son of God over whom not even death has any authority.

Bunnies and painted eggs are nice, but the resurrection of Christ must be the center of our Easter celebration if we are to capture its true meaning.

Until the coming of Christ, countless generations of human beings had been saying "no" to God. They had decided that their will for their lives was more important than his.

Sin and rebellion were the hallmarks of the human race. So steeped in rebellion was man, that when Jesus came and taught of God's will, most could not accept it. Man had wandered so far from God that he could not comprehand the simple message of loving obedience to a concerned and loving Father.



Throughout his ministry Christ served as a living example for this message of obedience, but nowhere more strikingly than in the Garden of Gethsemane just prior to his arrest and crucifixion. Even when faced with pain and death His prayer was still "Not my will, but Thine be done".

God's response was that Christ was raised from the dead; robbing evil of it's most powerful weapon, death.

All that Jesus did and taught was confirmed by the resurrection. Until that moment, human faith was held in suspense. But, when he appeared to his disciples on that first Easter all doubt was dispelled.

You and I are Easter people because our faith has been verified. We are confident because he in whom our faith rests has been vindicated by God, his father and ours.

Retiree affairs office opens


As far as military retirees are concerned, finding it out is what it's about at the office of retired Lt. Col. Carl T. Floto Jr.

It is the responsibility of each organizational commander to provide the driving force for this campaign and everybody should participate in some way.

Supervisors are expected to actively plan, promote, publicize, and support the base clean up campaign. Building custodians must place emphasis on identification and correction of fire safety hazards and improvement of building appearance. Building custodians should also identify cleaning and maintenance tasks within the facility and within 75 feet of the outside.

Do you know How smoke alarms work

Smoke detectors have been installed, or will be installed, in all units in Reese Village.

One for all two, three and four-bedroom houses and two in all five-bedroom units.

The detectors being installed are photoelectric type detectors, which are activated by smoke in the air. It takes about three percent of the air to be filled with smoke to activate the system.

Once activated, the detector will sound an alarm until the smoke clears or the detectors power is shut-off. The detector is active at all times. It runs off 120 volt current and is directly

connected to the house circuit breaker panel. As long as the detectors indicator light is on, the detector will work.

"If you hear the detector execute your "exit drill in the home" plan," warns 1st Lt. Michael Norrie, "get out of the house! After your out, call the Fire Department (ext. 3458), but get out first!"


"It's a real change of pace for me," said Smigielski shortly after his arrival on the South Plains. "I'm a city boy and this is the first time I've been in the wide open spaces."



Class commander draws rare ASTRA assignment

One of Reese's T-38 class commanders is among a select group of 70 Air Force officers picked for an Air Staff Training program assignment later this year.

Capt. Michael L. Chase, class commander for Undergraduate Pilot Training Class 79-05, will leave Reese in October for a oneyear tour of duty at the Air Force Manpower and Personnel Center at Randolph AFB, Tex.

Months ago, nearly 2,000 four to six-year captains volunteered

for an ASTRA assignment. Air Force officials boiled that list down to 70 "up and coming" officers.

A 1974 Air Force Academy grad and recent Distinguished Graduate of Squadron Officer's School, Captain Chase is one of six captains selected for a tour at AFMPC.

"I'm really looking forward to this assignment," said Captain Chase. "Working at AFMPC can be a great opportunity."

ASTRA exposes top flight junior officers to high level management and serves as a career broadening training program.

It will be the first permanent change of station assignment outside Reese for Captain Chase since he was graduated from the Academy. He was a 1975 graduate of UPT Class 76-02 and has served as an instructor pilot here for more than three years.





It is the middle of the night. An accident occurs on the icy roads near Wolfforth. People are injured and emergency medical attention is desparately needed.

An emergency beeper goes off in the home of MSgt. Charles Studler. Aroused from their sleep, Sergeant Studler and his wife, Mary Jane, dress hurriedly and rush to the Wolfforth Emergency Medical Service-Fire Station a few blocks from their home to answer the call.

The Studlers are Emergency Medical Service volunteers. "Whenever they call, you go," said Sergeant Studler. "Sometimes you hate to get out of bed and run in the middle of the night, but that's part of the commitment."

Operating the EMS ambulance is not the only service the Studlers perform for their community. They are both members of the Wolfforth Fire Department.


In volunteer fire work since he was 18, he has helped organize volunteer fire departments in several rural communities. One was near Biloxie, Mississippi. "We started with nothing," he said, "When I left, there was a department with two fire engines and 30 volunteers. It

was just a matter of getting people interested and involved."

Sergeant Studler works in Instument Flight Simulator Maintenance at Reese as a technical advisor. He became involved with the Wolfforth Fire Department while he, his wife, and three children were still living in base housing. The only way he could respond to a fire call was by having other members call him by phone. Finally, the Studlers found a house in Wolfforth.

Wolfforth's fire department may respond to as many as 100 calls in a year and the EMS unit averages 3-4 calls per month. EMS volunteers are divided into three crews which alternate

weekly call duty. Although the Studlers are responsible for being on call only every third week (7 p.m. - 7 a.m. weekdays and noon Saturday until 7 a.m. Monday), they feel it is their duty to respond to a call anytime they can.

Sergeant Studler feels that people in small towns have more of a chance to participate in civic services than those in larger communities.

"We don't have any big government hiring people to fight fires for us," he continued. "We have to do it ourselves."

Helping others is something Sergeant Studler believes in that's why he doesn't mind those middle of the night phone calls



AFAS raises certain loans

The Air Force Aid Society has set aside \$300,000 for interestfree loans and outright grants to help offset the costs of CHAMPUS (The Civilian Health and Medical Program of the Uniformed Services) and Medicare.

The action is designed to help close the gap between actual medical costs and the amount reimbursed by CHAMPUS and Medicare.

Air Force people will benefit in three ways. First, the Aid Society will help with the patient's share of qualifying medical costs.

Second, those who receive care from nonparticipating physicians will be provided financial assistance pending CHAMPUS or Medicare reimbursement.

Third, the Aid Society also will assist when expenses exceed the amount allowable under CHAMPUS and Medicare guidelines.

In announcing the new policy, retired Air Force Gen. Louis T. Seith, director of the Aid Society, said it is one of several improvements planned for the near future.

"Today's Air Force families are faced with so many expenses, they are simply unable to save for unusual situations," General Seith said.

"The Aid Society was originally chartered to help people through unforeseen emergencies. We will do everything possible to fulfill that charter.'

General Seith also stated, "A very similar policy has been adopted for dependent dental care, even though there is almost no CHAMPUS program available for it."







Six intramural teams capture playoff berths


No matter what happens during the final three days of regular season action, the top six teams in Monday's volleyball standings will be in the playoffs.


