Gasoline supply increases here says BX official

Base Exchange officials have some good news and bad news for patrons of the Reese Service Station.

The good news is that gasoline allocations will be up in June, meaning that the gas pumps on base will probably be running an hour longer each

The bad news is that the projected allocation for July will be the lowest for Reese since April, only 57,600 gallons.


But, for at least one month, things will be better here. The 72,000 gallons Reese is scheduled to receive in June should allow base pumps to keep running until about 2:30

p.m., says Dan Arias, exchange manager. To date, the pumps have been running dry at about

Exchange station pumps have been closing early since Shell cutbacks in gasoline allocations forced the conservation measures back in April.

Each month's allocation is based on a 20 percent reduction from the total gas sales for the same month last year.

Base officials elected to ration the monthly allocation on a daily sales limit. This has enabled the base station to sell gas all month long. Without the rationing, officials estimate that the station would be out of gas by mid-month.




Airman of Month

There are quite a few others running their air conditioners and I think there should be an equal opportunity for all of us to use them.

Dear Perturbed:

This is a very timely subject and I wish everyone showed the same concern for conserving our limited resources as you. We do not have regulations prohibiting housing area residents from using their heat or air conditioning units. I have asked everyone on Reese to cooperate with the President and conserve our precious and expensive energy. By the way, the Civil Engineering folks are in the

process of turning on all "swamp coolers" in the housing area.

BX gas sales

I was getting gas from one of the pumps at the base service station and I stopped it at exactly one gallon. The price on the pump was 69.9 cents per gallon, and the price on the dial showed 71 cents.

I told the manager and he didn't do anything about it other than put the machine back together after he looked at it.

Dear 69.9 cents per Gallon:

In looking into your complaint, I got an earfull. First you failed to mention that you were asked to use another pump to finish filling up your car; also that you were only charged 69 cents for the gallon from the bad pump.

At any rate you were correct about the pump being faulty. Immediately after you departed, the pump was calibrated and was tested daily for five days to insure proper operation. In addition all the other pumps were checked for proper calibration.

AAFES regulations require all pumps to be

tested and calibrated at least every 60 days or less if there is any indication of malfunction.

I appreciate your interest and my free education.

More on gas

I was wondering why the base service station keeps running out of gas when all the stations in town have sufficient gas, 6 or 7 days a week.

Dear Gassed:

The Shell Oil Company, like all other oil companies, is allocating gasoline to its customers as prescribed by the Department of Energy.

Reese was allocated 80 percent of that purchased in May 1978 which equals 60,400 gallons for May 1979. In order to provide the AAFES customer with gasoline throughout the month, the daily allocation is 2,323 gallons. When this allocation is sold, pumps are closed.

Many of the local service stations have been affected by the allocation and have curtailed hours of operation.

You may rest assured that if we could get more gasoline we sure would.

You can save your life

In 1978 thirty-one Air Force members lost their lives in water related accidents. Four were members of the Air Training Command.

What starts out as a fun time with family or friends sometimes turns to tragedy. Often because of the failure to exercise proper caution.

Some of the activities the 31 victims were participating in were: swimming, pleasure

boating, fishing from a boat, halfway across he slipped off scuba diving, floating in an inner tube and river rafting. Seven deaths involved individuals in the water by themselves and four were described as non-swimmerswho apparently did not plan on having to swim.

A recent accident included an Airman Basic, his wife, child and another couple who were picnicking at a private pond. The airman, a non-swimmer, attempted to cross a channel about fifty feet wide by riding on a friend's back. About and sank. His friend tried to rescue him but failed.

When reading about a drowning accident in which an "experienced" or "nonexperienced" swimmer is the victim, we wonder why the victim did not take time to plan for what he was about to do. Especially, when participating in an activity that could cause him to be seriously injured or killed.

So my message is "prepare yourself and don't extend beyond your personal limit." You could save your own life!

Davis looks ahead

(Editor's note: This is the final installment of a three-part series featuring an interview with ATC's new boss, Gen. B.L. Davis.)

• General, what's your assessment of the current attitude of the American public toward the military?

We went through a bad time, Bob. During an unpopular war we in uniform offered a handy, recognizable target for those who disapproved. Then after the war, many in Congress, undoubtedly reflecting views of some of their constituents, weren't as supportive of the military as before.

• What about now?

I've seen a noticeable shift in the other direction in past months. More and more people are apparently becoming aware of what's happening on the international scene and realize that we can't afford to let down our defenses. But I continue to worry on our people's behalf about the potential loss of promised benefits — especially our pay and compensation system. We're working that one hard. I don't want anyone to feel that no one really cares about what happens to them.

• Another subject, General Davis. Based on your extremely broad Air Force background, where would you say our command, ATC, stands in the Air Force scheme of things?

That's an easy one. ATC is the "first" command. It all begins here: Procuring top people — officer and enlisted, pilots, navigators — then giving them the finest training in the world. Unless we do our job well, the Air Force cannot exist. Incidentally, I can tell you from conversations with the Secretary and the Chief that they're just as a ware of this as we are. They are insistent that we not lower our standards one notch.

• Training is — literally — our middle name in ATC. Have you any revolutionary ideas as to the course it should take?

Revolutionary ideas? Not really. Innovative? I hope so. The skils we teach are constantly becoming more complex. And since personnel costs eat up more than 50 percent of the Air Force budget, we have to impart the most knowledge possible in the shortest practical time. So we have to constantly point toward improving our efficiency with new training techniques, methodologies and ideas.

• You've only been commander for a short time, General. Are you happy with what you've found in ATC so far?

Very much so. I'm blessed with a first-class staff here in the headquarters, and everybody knows our ATC instructors are the best there are. But let me add one thought - something I feel very strongly about: innovative ideas don't necessarily come as the result of cerebral flashes of lightning on Mount Olympus and then filter down to the troops. No. Almost invariably the river flows upward. The best new ideas come from the men and women working on the line or in offices - from airmen, sergeants, junior officers. It follows that the smartest supervisors-managers are those who keep that pipeline open while encouraging the flow. I'll supply guidance, of course — that's my job. But by working together, with everybody on every plateau contributing — and listening - we'll make sure ATC remains the finest command in the Air Force.

• General, you're aware, of course, of the rumors that always precede a new commander. My last question is about one that beat you down here: Are you really a "workaholic?"

(General Davis, laughing) — I don't know exactly what the word means, Bob, but I'd guess from your implied definition that I probably am — and, I might add, am enjoying every minute of it.

Funding for the program comes from donations provided by base people and agencies. So




Chief Chock originally started the program at Reese after seeing a similar one during a recent visit to Cannon AFB, N.M.

Taxi rules stiffen

It will no longer be a simple matter of picking up the telephone to get a taxi ride at

According to Maj. Stephen Russo, Chief of Transportation, taxi pickups will now be limited to those who have more than a quarter of a mile to walk, or who are laden with packages or other bulky or heavy items.

This will mean that the shortest possible distance to get a taxi ride will be from the main gate to the flight line. Major Russo stressed that this is a guideline and not to be interpreted to exclude all trips under one quarter mile. Each case will be judged on its own

He went on to explain that taxi service will no longer be provided for trips to official meetings, nor as a supplement to regular distribution runs. In addition, people going to hospital sick call will have to provide their own transporta-

Anders goes home





Civil Engineers labor to repair base runway

The Civil Engineers had to repair 5,200 feet of runway in just 10 days. Despite finding new problems that doubled their workload the job was done — with 11 hours to spare.

According to TSgt. Richard Brewer, superintendent of the Pavements and Grounds Branch assigned the massive repair job, when the project started they expected to have to peel away and replace a section of runway about a yard wide and two inches deep. As the men uncovered the first layer they found a crumbling base and had to cut down another two inches.

That doubled the amount of work that had to be done and the amount of asphalt that had to

be hauled in by dump trucks. In all, 250 tons of the smoldering black asphalt was laid.

On top of that the crews ran into a problem with one of the patch jobs they were doing further up the runway. The heavy rainfall had left a pool of water under a small section of the runway, slowing repair efforts.

As darkness covered the base on May 14, the last of the repair work was completed. Eleven hours later the first T-38 Talon would touch down on the new surface.

It took more than 400 manhours of overtime, working on two successive weekends, but the job was finished in time. And because the Civil Engineers gave that extra effort, our student training remained on schedule. And that's worth talking about.
