Outstanding Second Lieutenants were Silvanus T. Gilbert III and Ralph D. Crittenden.

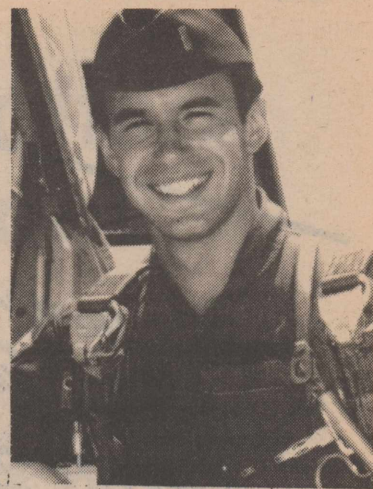
In all, 37 officers received their Air Force pilot wings during Friday's ceremony. Maj. Gen. Charles G. Cleveland, Air Training Command vice

## Golf course woes

I would like to know why the golf course does not reduce the price on green fees after 5 p.m. The courses downtown lower theirs to \$2 after 5, which means that a golfer pays more to play on base than downtown.

## Dear Green Fees:

Our daily green fee of \$2.50 is the lowest in the Lubbock area, as is our ninehole golf cart rental charge.

Anyone who plays regularly at our course also has the option to purchase a monthly membership for \$15, a much lower fee than anywhere else in the vicinity.

With all of these charges below those of other area courses, we would not be justified in reducing our green fees.

## Maintenance load

The Maintenance swing shift in Periodic Inspection is getting the shaft.

We do more work in three hours a day than the day shift does in 12. I would like for someone to look into this situation and make sure that the swing shift doesn't have to do more than its share of the work.

## Dear Getting the Shaft:

You might check your arithmetic — I find it a bit hard to believe that the five swing shift members do more work in three hours than forty-seven people do in a ten-hour day... not twelve.

I might also point out that your crew rarely works overtime, with the exception of your supervisor, while the day shift is frequently called upon to work overtime.

Have you considered asking for a shift change to the day shift? Your concern and enthusiasm might be just what the Maintenance supervisors ordered!

## Hospital appointments

I would like to know why, when you go up to the desk at the hospital to make an appointment, the gentleman tells you that you can't make an appointment there but you have to go the telephone across the hall, pick it up and the same individual will answer it and make the appointment?

## Dear Telephone Appointments:

The Central Appointment Desk was separated from the Information Desk to reduce the waiting time of a patient seeking an appointment. Previously a patient would have to wait in line while the clerk answered questions from patients in the lobby, in addition to phone calls for hospital information. 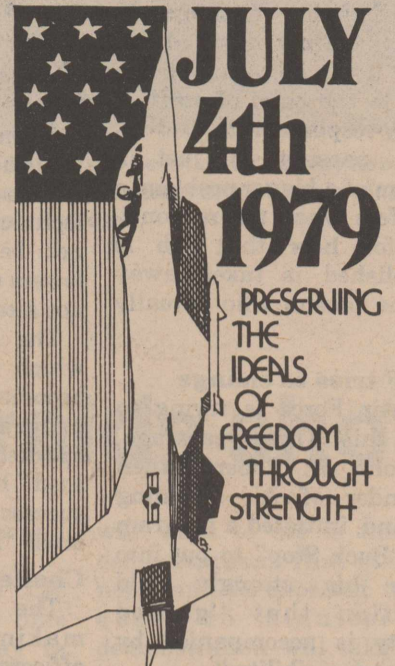

# ATC's Buck Stop still going strong

"Passing the buck" is a popular, time-honored institution. It has been around as long as there have been organizations and chains of command.

"Just following orders, ma'am. If you got a complaint, take it to the chief of staff. It ain't my responsibility."

Buck passing is just a symptom of a bigger problem: a job suffers when the responsibility for how that job is accomplished is taken away from the person who actually does it.

### AF tries to change

The Air Force is trying to change this. Three years ago, Gen. John W. Roberts, then commander of Air Training Command, initiated a program called "Buck Stop" to put into practice his strongly held conviction that "gained authority is accompanied by gained responsibility."

Buck Stop faced then, and still faces today, one inherent problem, a willingness of some to accept authority without accepting the inherent responsibility. Under Buck Stop the decision-making process is reduced to the lowest possible level — to wherever the action is.

General Roberts felt that getting company grade officers into the habit of making decisions and then accepting

full responsibility for the results would help them — and the Air Force — immeasurably in the future when they became senior officers. The same philosophy was applied in the enlisted ranks.

### Interpretation a problem

Interpretation has also been a problem. Individuals frequently use Buck Stop as a means for circumventing regulations or technical orders. This should not be the case. Buck Stop lowers the decision level, it does not alter or loosen standards.

The Buck Stop principle, which began in ATC, has become an Air Force-wide program. Buck Stop has sparked a free flow of new ideas and has fostered many successful initiatives which arose "in the field."

### Challenge builds confidence

The challenge of decision-making motivates young officers and NCOs. It builds confidence and speeds up the maturing process. In the next few years a large and increasing percentage of Air Force officers will be lieutenants. In addition, more and more management positions will be filled by junior NCOs.

As authority and responsibility for decisions is brought closer to the points where they are implemented, the efficiency of the Air Force's mission increases. Buck Stop works.

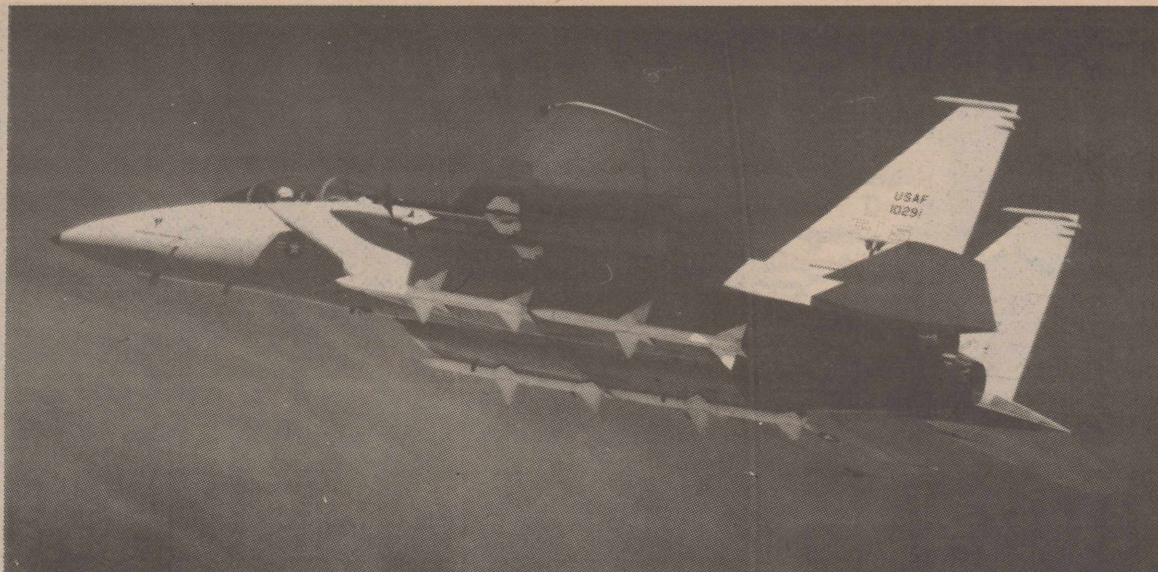

# TAC team heralds show

An aerial demonstration of the F-15 Eagle and static displays of seven other tactical aircraft will be included in a career presentation by a Tactical Air Command briefing team here today.

Today's events start with a 9 a.m. briefing at the base theater. Although aimed at student and instructor pilots, the TAC briefing is open to all

base personnel. A second briefing is set for 3 p.m.

From 10:30 a.m. until 2:30 p.m. TAC will have nine aircraft on static display in front of base operations. The list of aircraft includes the F-15, F-4 and RF-4 Phantoms, F-111, OV-10 Bronco and an A-10. Also on display will be two T-38B models and an O-2.

But what most Reese people

will want to see is the F-15 demonstration. That starts at noon and is expected to last about 15 minutes. The demonstration will take place over the Reese runways, the same as for Open House Thunderbird shows.

The career briefing team is here to give Reese personnel an insight into TAC's aircraft and mission.

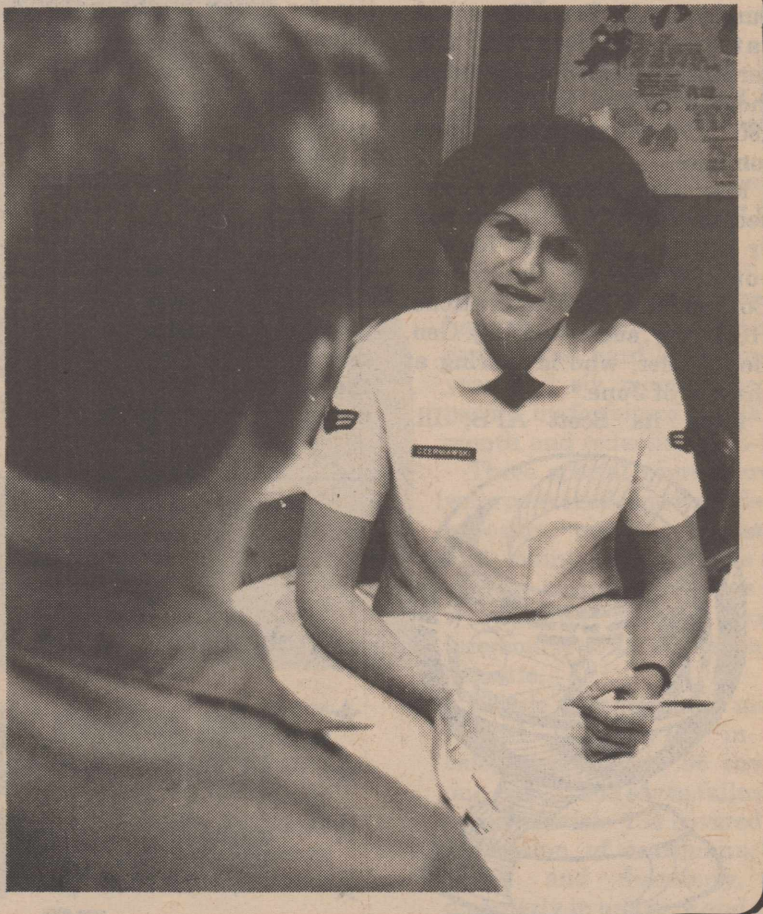

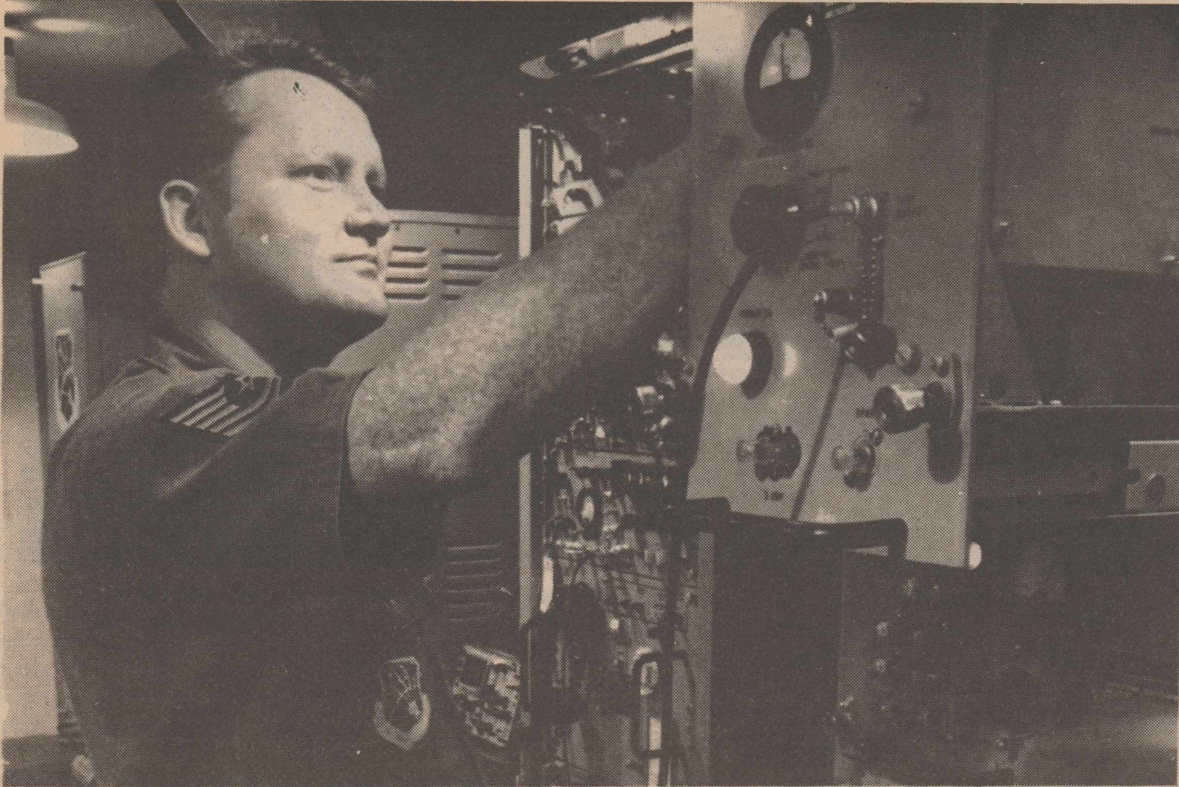

# Communications marks 18th anniversary Sunday

Eighteen years as a major command will be celebrated Sunday by Air Force Communications Service (AFCS) personnel worldwide, including those men and women in the 1958 Communications Squadron here.

Maj. Gen. Robert T. Herres became AFCS' tenth commander June 22. The former commander of Command, Control and Communications, HQ USAF, succeeded Maj. Gen. Bob Sadler, who is retiring at the end of June.

From its Scott AFB, Ill.,

headquarters, AFCS' 49,000 plus military and civil members manage the communications, air traffic control and data automation processing activities for much of the nation's defense forces. The command has almost 400 units at more than 500 locations around the world.

Locally, the 1958 Communications Squadron, commanded by Capt. Robert A. Allen Jr., plays an important part in supporting the mission of the 64th Flying Training Wing. In providing the essential on-base services for Air Force operation, the Reese Control Tower and Ground Controlled Approach

are responsible for completing over 65,000 operations, the telephone switchboard answered approximately 350,000 calls and the Communications Center sends and receives over 90,000 messages on an annual basis. Behind the operations scene, an elite group of maintenance personnel is tasked with keeping a myriad of electronic equipment in precise condition.

Although the improvement in technology has changed the speed at which we communicate, AFCS has always been the pacesetter in service since its conception.

# Carter picks Mark for AF post

President Carter announced June 21 that he will nominate Dr. Hans M. Mark to be Secretary of the Air Force.

Dr. Mark, who is currently acting Secretary of the Air Force, would replace Mr. John C. Stetson, who resigned May 18.

The president also announced plans to nominate Ms. Antonia Handler Chayes to be Under Secretary of the Air Force and Dr. Robert J. Hermann to be Assistant Secretary of the Air Force. All three nominations are subject to confirmation by the Senate.

Ms. Chayes, who is now acting Under Secretary, was formerly Assistant Secretary of the Air Force for Manpower, Reserve Affairs, and Installations. Dr. Hermann would replace Mr. John J. Martin, who resigned May 31. Dr. Hermann is presently Deputy Under Secretary of Defense for Communications, Command Control and Intelligence.

From 1969 until his appointment as Air Force Under Secretary in 1977, Dr. Mark, 50, was director of the Ames Research Center of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, Palo Alto, Calif.

Dr. Mark is a 1951 graduate of the University of California at Berkeley and earned a Ph. D. in physics from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 1954. Prior to joining NASA in 1969, Dr. Mark was a lecturer research physicist, and administrator at M.I.T. and the University of California at Berkeley. His permanent residence is Los Altos Hills, Calif.

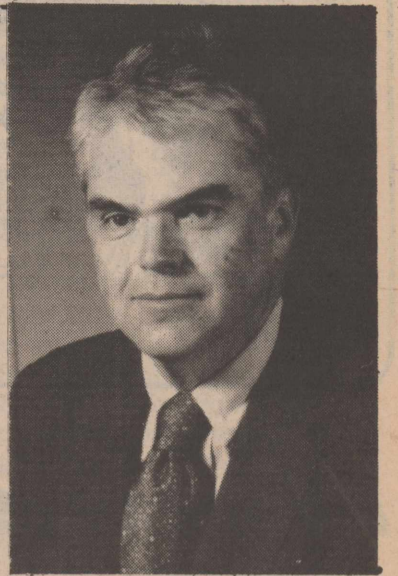
Ms. Chayes, 49, is a 1949 graduate of Radcliffe College and received an L.L.S. from George Washington University Law School in 1953. Her home is in Cambridge, Mass. From 1959 to 1961, she was Executive Assistant to the Dean of Harvard Law School and,

during the next year, worked as a member of the White House Staff. During the next four years she was a consultant to a Baltimore community development firm and a social science advisor to the National Institute of Mental Health.

Ms. Chayes directed education and urban development for the Model Cities Administrations' action for Boston Community Development Program from 1966 to 1968. Then, until 1972, she was successively, Dean of Tuft University's Jackson College and an associate professor of Political Science at that school.

She worked as a law clerk to Judge Charles E. Wyzanski Jr. of the U.S. District Court for the District of Massachusetts from 1972 to 1973 and was a partner in the Boston firm of Csaplar and Bok from 1974 until appointment as assistant secretary of the Air Force in 1977.

Dr. Hermann, 46, served in the United States Air Force from 1955 to 1957. He holds undergraduate, masters and

Ph. D. degrees in electrical engineering from Iowa State University. He completed work on the latter degree in 1963.

## Legal action report

Four court martials were convened at Reese during May resulting in the conviction of four airmen.

One general court martial under Article 132, making false claims and forging and counterfeiting signatures, ended with the stiffest penalty handed out for the month: confined at hard labor for one year and six months, accompanied by forfeiture of \$200 per month and reduction to E-1.

Three special court martials were convened, one for indecent exposure, one for possession and selling of marijuana and one for carnal knowledge and wrongfully having sexual intercourse with a female not his wife.

Article 15s for the month totaled 18 and fell in five categories; Article 86 covered one AWOL and seven failures to repair; Article 134 covered one possession of marijuana, one drunk and disorderly, one disorderly in quarters and three derelictions of duty.

Other Article 15s included four instances of failure to obey a lawful order under Article 92 and one case of damage to military property, a violation of Article 108.

Six people received non-judicial punishment for stealing property which violates Article 121.

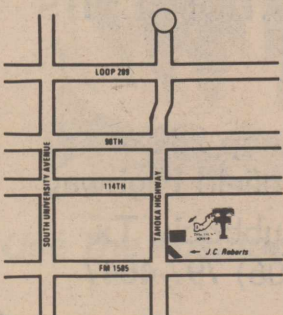

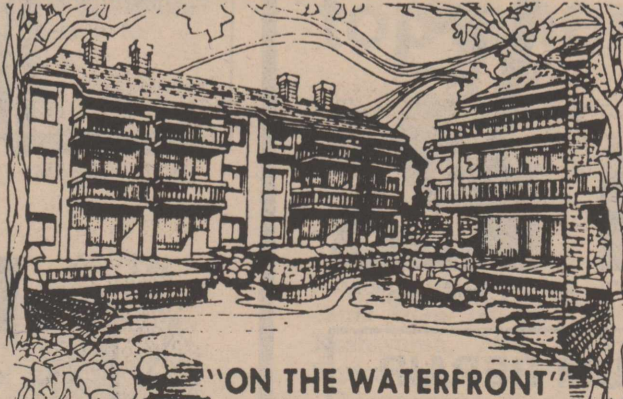

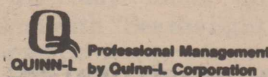

# Reese launches carpool program



As gasoline becomes more scarce and expensive, Reese has added a new twist to an old money saving idea. The result? Computer carpooling.

Reese people can submit their names and the location of their homes to their orderly rooms where they will be collected for key punching.

Using a grid that breaks Lubbock and surrounding towns into small zones, the computer will match those prospective carpool registrants who work the same hours and reside near each other. A list will then be printed for each zone and a copy provided each person on the list. It will then be up to the applicants in each zone to establish their carpools. According to Maj. Roy

Markle, comptroller, studies conducted prior to the recent 25 to 35 percent increase in fuel cost showed that each member of a four-person carpool driving 15 miles one way to work will save up to \$900 a year in transportation costs. He believes a new study would almost certainly show far greater savings, considering the higher cost of gasoline.

Applications should be submitted by July 16 and completed lists should be available on or about July 24.

"How about it? Can you use extra income each month?" asks Major Markle. "By reducing transportation expenses, you give yourself a raise. Computer assisted carpooling could be the answer."

# AF increases OTS enrollment

Enrollments at the Officer Training School will increase sharply this summer and are forecasted to increase through fiscal year 1980.

Five staff sergeants from Reese have been selected since January to attend the school, though none has actually departed yet. They are Charlie C. Mitling, Darphus J. O'Neal, James N. Hone, Dennis Jones, Ernest G. Delapaz, and Hector Machorro.

Last October, the school was

programmed to commission 2,810 new second lieutenants. That estimate has now reached 4,000 and next fiscal year's production goal is 1,000 more.

The added load will eventually place almost 1,700 students in the school at a time.

The need for more classroom space has forced Air Training Command to suspend operations at its Noncommissioned Officer Academy, which is collocated with OTS facilities. The officer school will gain the

use of 10 classrooms and all of the academy's dormitory rooms.

The NCO academy will resume operating at a reduced level Oct. 1. Those classes will teach 75 students, compared to a previous level of 135 NCOs.

The Air Training Command sees the action as a "compromise of essential mission elements," rather than a reduced emphasis in professional military education for NCOs.

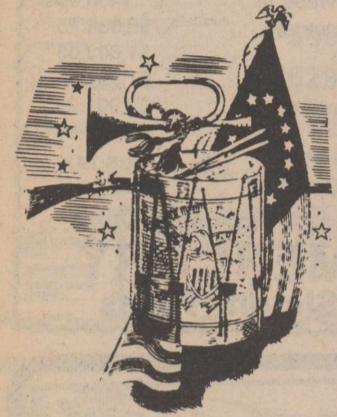
# Tidbits

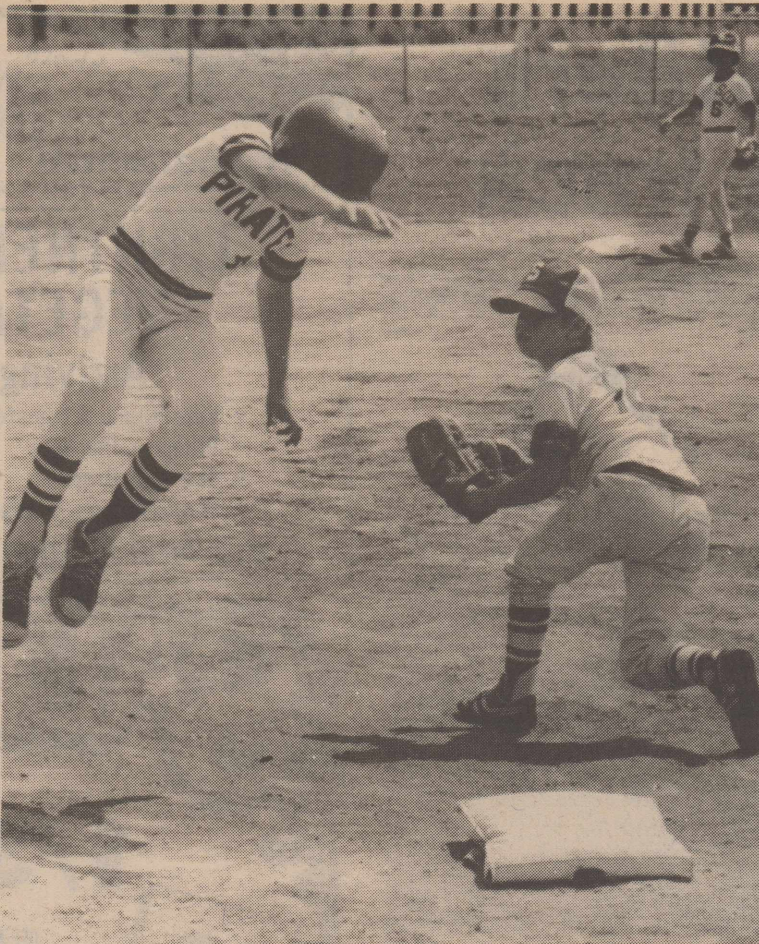
# Pirates chase crown

## Golfers beware

# Pesky kites return

Golfers beware — those pesky Mississippi kites are back again.

"Back and troublesome as ever," notes Golf Course manager Dick Davis. "The kites have already started buzzing players and have actually hit a few."

The kites, distant relatives of the falcon, made their first appearance at Reese last summer, but, didn't become as aggressive until mid July, when their chicks hatched.

"We don't know if they have any chicks yet or not," says Davis. "Odds are they are just protecting eggs."

Tabbed by wildlife officials as a naturally aggressive bird noted for courage and spirit, the kites often "buzz" golfers who's play carries them into the bird's territory. This year the kites seem to have staked claim on the eighth and sixth fairways. However, the birds roam the

entire course and have sent golfers scurrying for cover on other holes as well.

Protected by federal law, the kites are almost certain to remain uninvited guests here until around September when they should migrate south.

Last year, Reese was the only golf course in the area plagued by the kites. But, that's not the story this summer. According to Davis, all of the courses around Lubbock are having the same problems.

"About the best advice I can give," cautions Davis, "is to stay cool if one of the kites starts acting up. Usually, if a golfer just backs off and waits for a while the bird will settle down and let the golfer play through. It also helps to wear a hat, especially a dark colored one."

In addition to those sighted on the golf course, other kites have been spotted near the Officers Club. The same precautions should be followed by people walking in that area.
