DOPMA vote awaits Senate action

DOPMA-the acronym stands for the Defense Officer Personnel Management Act, legislation developed to update and standardize officer personnel management among the military services.

Although it may seem like only yesterday to some, DOPMA has been around in some form or another for about ten years, and has been considered by four Congresses, including the present one.

Actually, DOPMA has been resoundingly passed twice by the House of Representatives, but it has continually run into strong headwinds in the Senate. The latest DOPMA legislation is no exception. This year the House has decided to wait for the Senate to vote on the bill before taking action.

The current House version is similar to the one originally

submitted by the Department of tory separation and retirement Defense.

It calls for:

• An all regular career force. • A single permanent promotion system to replace the dual (temporary/permanent) system.

Work starts soon on center

Construction on Reese's new family shopping center is expected to begin before the end of the year, according to Base Exchange and Commissary officials.

The multi-million dollar project, when completed, will house a new Main Exchange, several Exchange concessions and a renovated Commissary.

Exchange officials estimate construction on the "mall" portion of


the facility will start sometime in November. A Civil Engineers spokesman indicated that the renovation of Warehouse 535 (site of the new Commissary) is expected to start in mid-December.

Although the Commissary and Exchange will be combined into one shopping center, the facilities are being constructed by two different agencies. Commissary Service is handling the commissary project while the Army and Air Force Exchange Service is building the new Exchange.

If the weather doesn't slow construction (builders will begin outdoor work during winter months) the entire complex should be completed by the end of next year.

Brotherston reports on Operations

The one question that is most often asked is, "Are we ahead or behind the flying schedule?"

I think this is healthy because it shows interest in how all of us are doing our job. Although our position ahead or behind the time line is a quick indicator of how things are going, I think it is worthwhile to explain how our status is calculated so that we are all talking on the same frequency.

Basically, we are given 49 weeks to train a student pilot. This is a hard and fast constraint which we cannot adjust locally. In managing the students' training, we develop a Training Forecast Schedule (TFS) for each class which essentially pro-rates all of the training activities that students must accomplish each work day within the 49 week period. On any given day, we can calculate how each student, each class, and the entire student body is doing in comparison to the TFS, expressed in days ahead or behind.

Although this sounds pretty simple, there are many variables that affect our ability to stay on the TFS schedule, many of which we cannot control locally. Obviously, weather has the biggest influence on our flying program. Other key factors are the availability of aircraft and instructor pilots, the number of daylight hours, the capacity of our airfield and training airspace, and the number of flying hours that we are allocated by ATC Headquarters (which, by the way, is used to determine our budget, manning, and facility requirements).

Putting all of the parts of the puzzle together, it is not always true to simply say that being ahead is great and being behind is a disaster. For example, we try to stay slightly ahead of the time line during the summer months in order to have a pad going into the winter months when the daylight hours are shorter and the flying weather is generally worse. Being behind or even right on the time line today could cause us serious problems going into the months ahead. Stated another way, we have to view our position on the time line relative to our prospects of maintaining a good position in future.

We are currently in great shape due entirely to the outstanding work being accomplished by both flightline and support personnel. However, I must caution everyone that there are some rather tough challenges ahead. With the increased student population and the requirement for a higher utilization rate on our limited number of aircraft, we will have to manage our resources very carefully. I strongly encourage all of you to keep close track of our position on the time line. It's the best way I know of keeping everyone informed on how well things are going.

I might add that this requirement, in conjunction with the need for additional nursery space, is being considered in the justification for a new facility. We are currently in the process of planning a more modern and spacious base nursery, so please bear with us.

Dryers broke again

A week doesn't go by without one or more of the dryers or washing machines in Barracks 420 not working.

This week all three dryers are not working while all three washers are working. It makes it tough to do your laundry and I feel that they should be kept up a little better.

Dear Washers and Dryers:

Sunday marks Federal Women's Day

Federal Women's Day should be a day to reaffirm the goals of our country and government to provide a chance for everyone to work, to succeed or fail on one's individual abilities.

Federal Women's Day should be increase the numbers of its civilian and military women.

grade, the numbers of higher ranking women are expected to increase.

It should be more than a day to look back on past accomplishments, many as there have been. Women have worked for the government — and the military since this country was a loose collection of colonies.

It should be more than a day to measure how far women have progressed today. The Air Force has always been a leader in equal opportunity. The highest ranking civilian woman in the military today is Under Secretary of the Air Force Antonia Handler Chayes. We are entering a time when the young adults from the baby boom of the 1950s are being replaced by those from the dwindling birth rate of the 1960s. There are fewer young men today, and the numbers are expected to continue to decline into the 1980s.

The solution is at hand, however: expanded use of women. The Air Force is continuing efforts to Presently, 32 percent of civilian employees are women. The majority of them work in generalschedule fields, most in grades 1 through 4, in secretarial or clerical jobs. Historically, few women have pursued careers in the wage-grade area. Wage-grade jobs are now being emphasized to women.

The Air Force also plans to double the number of military women by 1984. While almost 90 percent of enlisted women are E-4s or below, and almost 95 percent of women line officers are company This isn't just a numerical increase. The number of jobs open to women include all officers' career fields and all but four enlisted specialties. Today there are more enlisted women in aircraft maintenance than in personnel and twice as many women in avionics as there are dental assistants.

Increasing opportunities for women are not just a matter of supporting equal treatment. It's sound business.

Air Force chapels help 'boat people'

Chapels throughout the Air Force, including Reese's, are responding to an urgent appeal from the Air Force chief of chaplains office to support relief for the Vietnamese "boat people."

Catholic parishoners at Reese recently donated \$319.41 to the relief effort, according to Installation Chaplain (Lt. Col.) Arnold G. Johnson. A designated offering will also be taken at a Protestant service in the near future. Chaplain Johnson mentioned that those who wish to donate but cannot attend services may send a check to the chapel office.

"Chapel community help is needed now to begin dealing in a responsible and unified way with one of the great moral problems of our generation," the message from the chief of chaplains office stated. "At this moment tens of thousands of refugees from Southeast Asia face a future with nothing to sustain them but a hope of freedom. Hope for them is critical."

The message included an appeal from Terrence Cardinal Cooke: "This is the first time I have ever appealed to you in this fashion. I take this extraordinary step because my experience has been that there is no limit to the generosity of our military people when they recognize that a situation is critical and lives are at stake."

Money contributed in the effort will be channeled to appropriate relief agencies through the chaplains' funds.
