Boren is a life member of the AFA and has served the chapter in the past in the capacity of president, treasurer, and program chairman. He has also held state office as an area vice president for Texas.

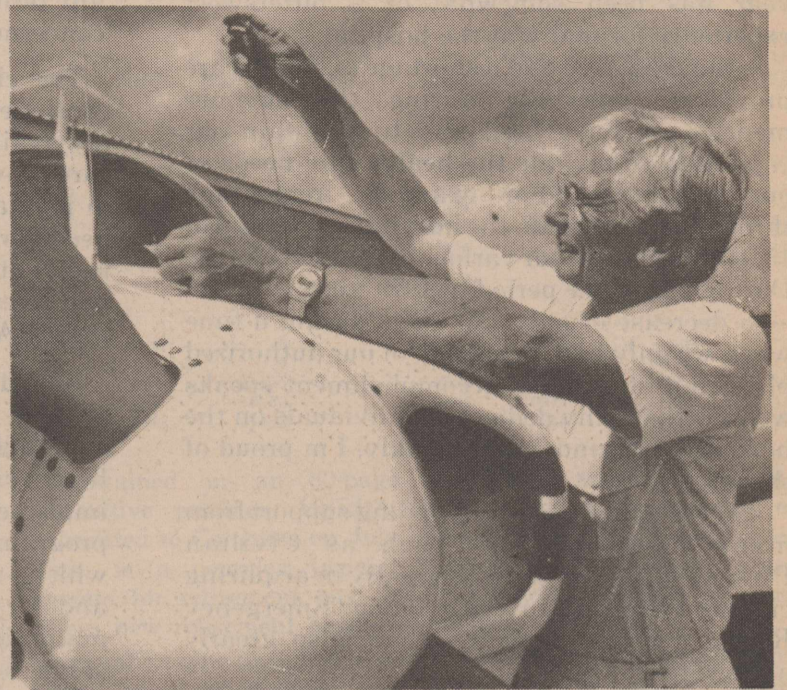
Boren is a native of Belton, Texas who learned to fly at the age of 16. He is a commander of the Civil Air Patrol and is

Carter urges seven percent hike

President Carter has urged congress to support his request for a seven percent October pay raise for 3.5 million military and civilian federal employees.

"Secretary of the Air Force Hans M. Mark applauded the President's action stating, "It is very good news that President Carter has recommended a seven percent pay increase for military personnel and civilian employees. We are grateful to the Secretary of Defense, Dr. Harold Brown, whose strong personal advocacy played a major role in the President's decision."

The original fiscal year 1980 budget had provided for a 5.5 percent pay increase. "The President recognizes, however," a release from the White House stated, "that employees are faced with a higher cost of living than when he submitted his 1980 budget."

By recommending the seven percent instead, the President's action will add a little less than one billion dollars to the \$60 billion already slated for these annual salaries, the White House said.

The law governing federal civilian white collar pay requires that the Bureau of Labor

Statistics conduct an annual nationwide survey of salaries paid private sector employees in jobs similar to the federal ones.

This year the body that evaluates this information found an average increase of 10.41 percent would raise the federal white collar salaries to a compatible level.

The law provides the President authority to propose lower increases because of "national emergency or economic conditions affecting the general welfare." The President cited

Hospital handles problems well

The end of the fiscal year gives many of us the opportunity to contemplate where we've been and where we're going. On reflection, this past year has been somewhat of a bittersweet experience for many at the hospital.

Although we've had a shortage of health care providers, especially during the summer months, we have been able to maintain our capability to provide the health care needs of our population. For example, from June through August 1978, the hospital saw a total of 15,245 patients in our various outpatient clinics. During this same period in 1979 we saw 15,135 — a decrease of only 110 visits during a time when we only had 35 percent of our authorized physician staff. This accomplishment speaks well for the many dedicated individuals on the hospital staff and, quite frankly, I'm proud of them.

We've also received outstanding support from many base agencies, such as Civilian Personnel, who assisted us greatly in acquiring civilian physician coverage for our Emergency Room. For this support we are also greatly appreciative.

Finally, the patient population has, for the most part, responded to the situation by reducing unnecessary Emergency Room visits, cancelling appointments so that they can be used for other patients, and making better use of our appointment system. The efficient use of any resource is always in the best interests of all concerned.

The chief determinant of whether we can continue to meet the needs of the base rests with the availability of resources, primarily health care providers. Over the past year we have had to look at alternative methods to provide the necessary care such as use of TDY personnel, use of other DOD medical treatment facilities, and referral to civilian providers of care under the CHAMPUS program.

In addition, we have been constantly looking at our own delivery system, oftentimes adopting new and novel methods of providing health care services. The recently approved and implemented OB-GYN — CHAMPUS test program is a prime example of a method by which, using combined civilian, CHAMPUS, and Air Force resources, we are endeavoring to maintain both the availability and quality of services to the patient population.

We've also worked to increase our own provider staff and new physicians are now arriving for primary care, surgery, flight medicine services, and internal medicine. Their arrival holds a promise of expanded services and a significant enhancement of our current capabilities.

Although the basis of our health care delivery system rests with having adequate numbers of providers to render services, we must also be thinking of changes in our ways and procedures of delivering these services. This is why we have also during the past year looked at methods for improvements in our appointments desk, records room, appointments system, and other areas of the hospital. These changes will be in evidence soon and we believe that they will enable us to provide not only more efficient but more personalized service to our patients.

I think it was Confucius who said, "A long journey begins with but a single step." Over the past year we feel that we have taken several of those important first steps to improve health care delivery at Reese. Certainly over the coming fiscal year we will continue that journey. We may stumble occasionally, but it is my firm commitment to proceed ahead and complete that journey.

Carter proclaims Hispanic Heritage Week

a deep pride in their language and culture, and a sense of justice and compassion which nurtures our democratic system and keeps it progressing. It is important that we recognize these singular benefits and encourage their perpetuation.

This country must continue to provide its many ethnic groups with the opportunity to contribute their ideas, their experience and their energies to the betterment of our society. We must be receptive to the richness of diverse cultures, but we also must work to assure that all Americans benefit in turn from the resulting improvements. With the assistance of our Hispanic citizens and through our own continued commitment, these goals will be achieved.

In 1968, our government formally acknowledged the value

96th Congress studies military retirement plan

(Editor's Note: This is the third article in a series devoted to the status of legislation before the 96th Congress affecting the quality of military life.)

Much attention has been given in recent months to the proposed Uniformed Services Retirement Benefits Act (USRBA) and how it compares with the present retirement system.

USRBA is the result of the Department of Defense's review of retirement recommendations made by the President's Commission on Military Compensation (which was formed by President Carter in June 1977).

Contained in an 80-page legislative package, USRBA, submitted to Congress on July 18th, is a complex two-tier system for retirement pay. It offers new retirement benefits for members who complete 10 or more years of service, but reduces retired pay for members who serve 20 or more years.

It's too early to report on House and Senate views on the proposal since neither have formally tackled USRBA yet. If passed, the new retirement system would automatically apply to anyone joining the armed forces after the effective date of the act.

Presently, only members with 20 years of service earn retirement benefits. Under the new system, members with 10 years of service would be eligible for annuities at age 60. They would also be able to draw cash amounts against future old-age benefits. Maximum withdrawal has been set at 20 months basic pay for members with 15 years of service. Cash withdrawals not repaid would reduce future annuities.

Since the Treasury Department's position on allowing a tax break on early withdrawals is unsettled, members could face heavy taxes on lump sum cash withdrawals.

For persons serving 20 or more years of service, retirement pay would be lower during the first tier. At age 60, or during the second tier, retirement pay would increase to a high annuity until age 65 when it would decrease as a result of a social security offset.

Accompanying this article is a table comparing the present with the proposed retirement pay. Other key features in the proposed retirement plan include:

Highest-Two Annuity Base which calculates pre-old-age

and old-age retirement benefits based on a percentage of member's average basic pay for highest two years of active duty and not on final basic pay as in the present system.

For each of the first 10 years of service, pre-old-age benefits would equal 1.75 percent of basic pay. From 11 through 20 years, 2.0 percent and for more than 20 years, 2.5 percent. The maximum retirement pay would be 76.25 percent.

In the present system members receive 50 percent of final basic pay after completing 20 years of service, compared to the 37.5 percent of the high-two basic pay years with the new system.

At age 60, annuities are calculated at a higher percentage. For the first five years annuities would be 2.0 percent; years five through 10 would earn 2.25 percent and all years beyond 10 would entitle members to annuities of 2.75 percent.

- Severance pay for both enlisted members and officers with between five and 20 years of service who are involuntarily separated. Pay would be 5 percent of annual basic pay for each year of service.

- A grandfather clause that would give all members now on active duty or in service academies the option of choosing either the new or old retirement system. Members choosing the new plan would incur an additional four-year service obligation for the 10 years of service with early withdrawal or old-age benefits.

With a full legislative agenda awaiting action when Congress reconvenes in September, immediate action on USRBA is highly unlikely.

OB-GYN service starts

This week heralds the return of OB/GYN services to Reese.

After a lapse of six years, the reopening of the OB/GYN Clinic on Wednesday was made possible through the approval of a special test program combining CHAMPUS and Air Force resources.

The test program utilizes civilian obstetricians and gynecologists to provide the required medical services while the Reese hospital furnishes all necessary support to allow these physicians to see patients at the base medical facility. While the civilian physicians are paid for their professional

services in accordance with current CHAMPUS guidance; a cost savings will be realized to both the patient and the government by avoiding hospital charges. By providing all support services at the base hospital the patient and CHAMPUS avoid paying these associated charges that would be incurred if the care were rendered in a civilian facility.

To provide the services at Reese, the hospital formalized an agreement with the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology, Texas Tech University School of Medicine to furnish qualified physicians to support the program. These

physicians, although not government employees, are members of the hospital's medical staff and will be conducting regular clinics at the hospital each week day. In addition, they will be covering inpatient GYN and the Obstetrical services.

Appointments for outpatient GYN services may be made by calling the Central Appointments desk as Ext. 3151 or 3488. Patients desiring OB appointments should contact the OB/GYN clinic directly at Ext. 3593. For further information on the program contact Bob Gregorio in the Hospital Registrar Office at Ext. 3521.

CFC opening approaches

With the official start of the Combined Federal Campaign just a dozen days away, CFC officials are ready to conduct the campaign in record speed.

"We (CFC volunteers) are ready to go," said campaign project officer Capt. Ron Bailey Tuesday afternoon. "The campaign starts on Sept. 18 and we hope to have nearly all of the contributions in by Sept. 29."

That's a couple weeks shorter than CFC drives have run in past years. Captain Bailey and his crew plan to use the remaining time to go back and give people who were on leave or temporary duty a chance to give their fair share.

Reese's share of the \$120,000 Lubbock area goal is \$80,000. Last year, Reese people donated more than \$81,000 to the combined campaign.

"A key worker will be contacting everyone on base during the early stages of the campaign," explained Captain Bailey. "Anyone who isn't contact by Sept. 27 should call one of the CFC Loaned Executives."

Each of the major organizations on base has a Loaned Executive. They include: Capt. Ron Bailey — overall base coordinator, Ext. 3256; Capt. Thomas W. Christensen —

Maintenance and Field Training Detachment, Ext. 3424; Capt. (Dr.) Robert L. Crane — Hospital, Property Disposal and Office of Special Investigations, Ext. 3338; and Capt. Douglas Repaal, Air Base Group and the 1958th Communications Squadron, Ext. 3200.

Others are: 1st Lt. Stephen A. Headley — Wing staff, Ext. 3410; 1st Lt. Howard M. Johnson — Operations and Weather, Ext. 3354; and 2nd Lt. Glenn C. Jones — Resource Management, the Management Engineering Team and Base Exchange, Ext. 3299.

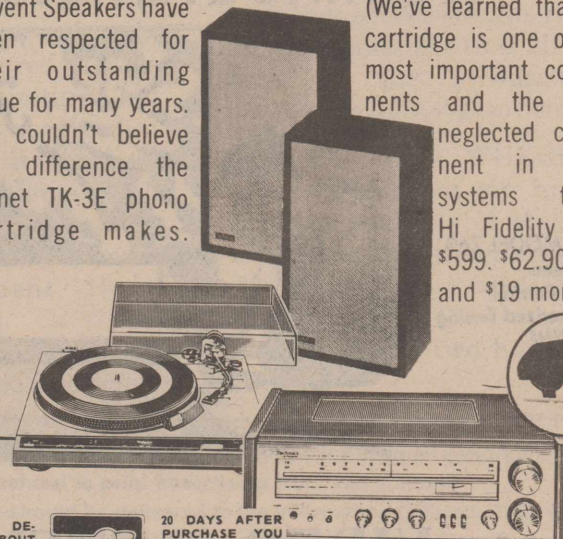

economic conditions in his proposal to congress.

"Pay compatibility for federal civilian employees and the military must be viewed in the light of the current economic situation," the President stated.

"Inflation continues to be the single greatest threat to our economy and is a national problem of foremost concern," he told Congress.

The President noted that the revised pay plan would be within the pay standard being developed by the council on wage and price stability that will apply to all employees in the country in 1980.

In explaining the change he wrote, "We expected significantly lower rates of inflation than we have actually experienced. I believe the loyal and outstanding service given to the country by the government's civilians and military personnel warrants recognition of that changed circumstance and of the new pay standards for 1980."

Top Department of Defense officials including the Joint Chiefs of staff, and Air Force leaders, including Secretary Hans Mark, had earlier requested reconsideration of the 5.5 percent figure.

Exercise classes start

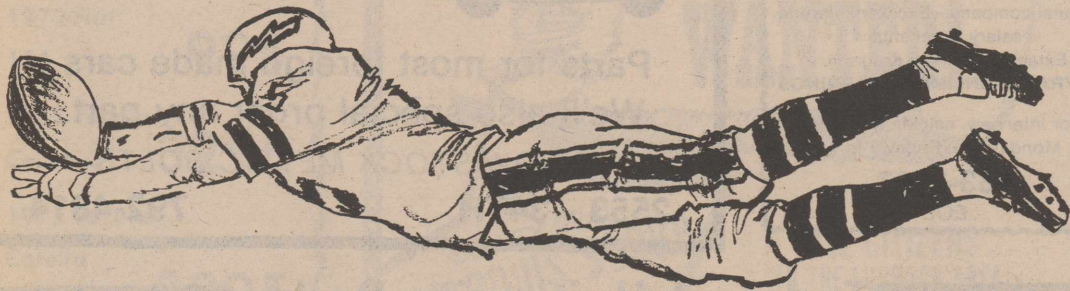
Women all over America are shaping up, and now Reese offers all women on base an opportunity to do the same with two new exercise classes.

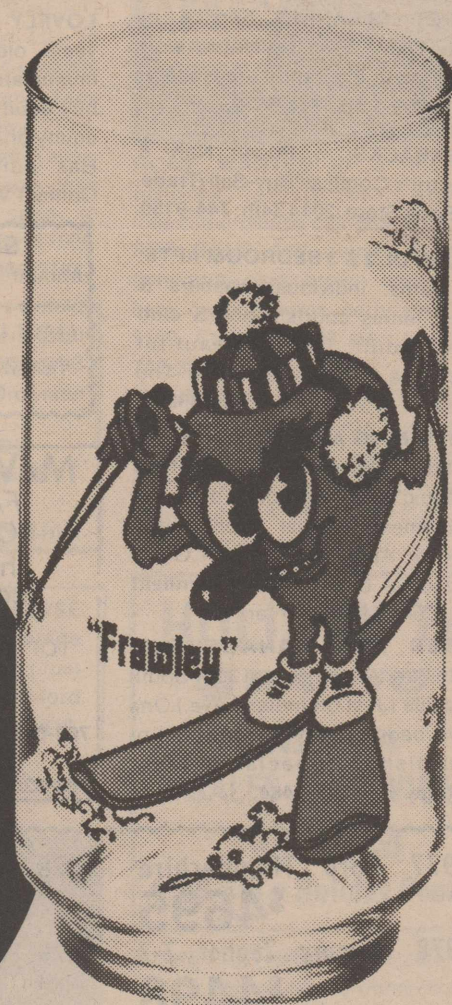
