

Committee tabs Reese 'Employer of the Year'

Col. Monte Montgomery, base commander, is in Austin today to accept the Texas Governor's Committee on the Employment of the Handicapped 1979 Employer of the Year Award on behalf of Reese.

Coincidentally, the award comes as a prelude to National Hire the Handicapped Week, an effort to help employers tap the resources available from the 11 million Americans between the ages of 16-64 who bear the dual burdens of a disability and frequent job discrimination.

For many years the Governor's committee has met

annually in Austin to provide an open forum for discussion of issues relating to employment of the handicapped in Texas and to recognize outstanding individuals and organizations for their contributions to the successful employment of disabled Texans.

Over twelve percent of the civilian employees at Reese have a handicap ranging from heart disorders to amputations. These employees perform jobs such as supply clerks, accounting technicians, tractor operators and sales store checkers.

Reese, like other military installations, has an active handicapped recruitment program conducted through the Veterans Administration and other governmental agencies.

Once the workers are employed they find wheelchair ramps, reserved parking spaces and other conveniences make their jobs at Reese more simple.

Efforts on behalf of handicapped workers at Reese have also earned the base numerous awards in the past. In 1962 and 1971 the Governor's

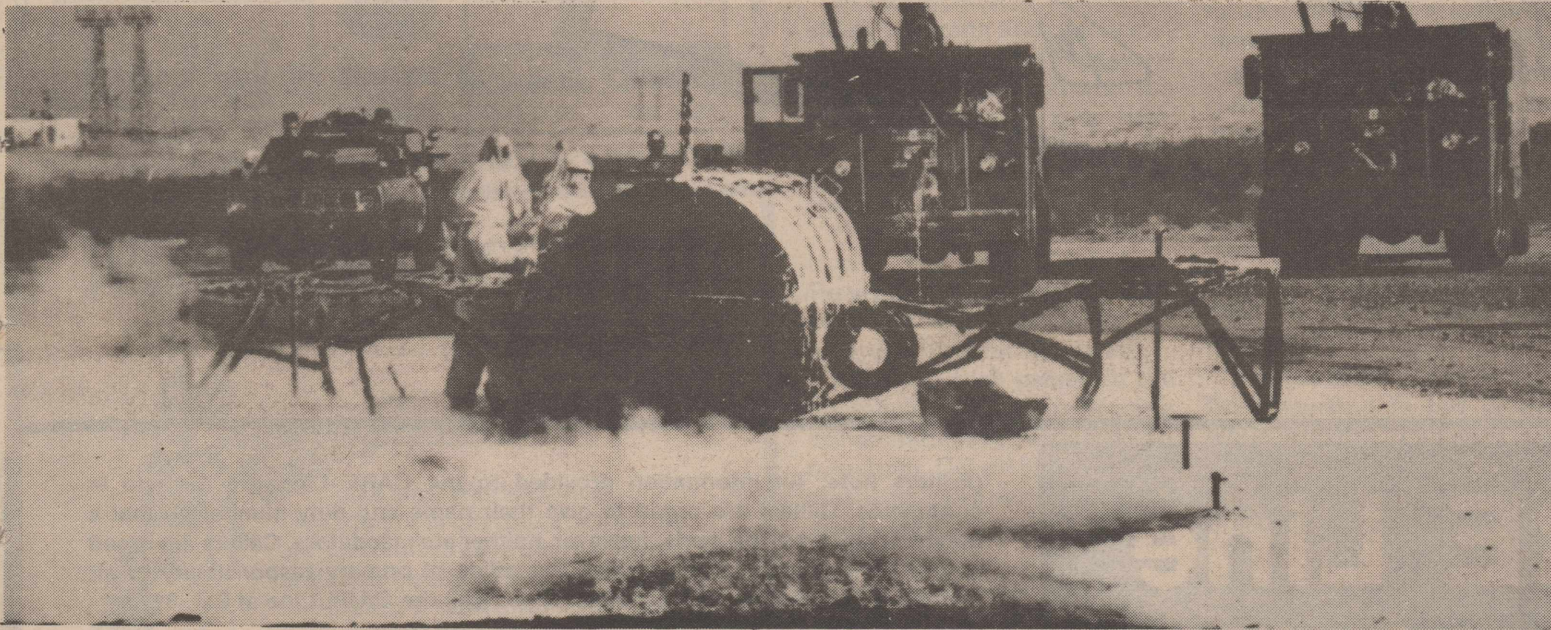

FPW observance kicks off Saturday

Activities for National Fire Prevention Week will start a little early at Reese as base officials plan to kick off the annual observance on Saturday.

Officially scheduled for Sunday through Oct. 13, Fire Department officials elected to get a jump on observances by sponsoring a parade through Reese Village at 1 p.m. Saturday.

Antique fire equipment from Lubbock, Levelland, Wolfforth and Shallowater will be in the parade as will the Lubbock Christian High School marching band. Leading off the parade will be the Texas Tech Red Raider.

Since Monday is Columbus Day, on base activities will resume on Tuesday. A Fire Prevention poster contest is scheduled for Reese Elementary School. A \$25 savings bond will be awarded the top entry in each grade. In addition, the "best" of the six individual grade

winners will net its creator another \$25 bond. The contest will be judged on Thursday by members of the Officers Wives Club.

Sunshine Sally, the star of KLBK's locally produced children's show, will join in the Fire Prevention activities at the school.

Also slated for Tuesday will be the judging of the Reese "organizational" poster contest. That is scheduled for 1 p.m.

On Wednesday morning, a parade of Reese's fire fighting equipment will be held on base. At 1 p.m., there will be a rescue demonstration in front of the Base Exchange. The Frenship High School band will perform following the rescue demonstration.

Fire evacuation drills for buildings 70 and 82 will open activities here Oct. 12. There will also be various other demonstrations and fire prevention briefings.



I have asked the housing inspector to consider that the quarters are going to the contractor when he makes his inspections. The windows must be clean but I do not want a "white glove" inspection.

Dear Lights Out

They respond as soon as they can but we must keep in mind that there may be higher priority,

The gym staff would be more than happy to replace the bulbs but they don't have the required scaffolding to do the job safely. Therefore, this job must be handled by the civil engineers.

Washroom woes

Chicago Fire spawns Fire Prevention Week

Fire Prevention Week marks the 69th year that fire safety has been the subject of a national observance.

It all started on Oct. 9, 1911, when Fire Prevention Day was inaugurated. The date of October 9th was chosen because it marks the anniversary of the so-called "Great Chicago Fire of 1871" - the conflagration which killed 250 people and destroyed 17,430 buildings at a cost of \$168 million, and the fire which started people thinking in terms of fire prevention rather than only of fire fighting.

Fire Prevention Day was begun by the Fire Marshals Association (NFPA). The day was first proclaimed by President Woodrow Wilson on the 40th anniversary of the Chicago blaze.

Reese's Fire Department wants you to become a "Partner in Fire Prevention." Fire Prevention can't be a matter of "Let George do it..." Good fire safety planning and practice is, instead, a matter of "togetherness." The individual and the family working to keep their place as fire-safe as possible, following recommendations of the Fire Department.

"Partners in Fire Prevention", the theme of Fire Prevention Week 1979, calls attention to the necessity for everyone to think fire safety.

At home, each person in the household can help by keeping accumulations of burnables at a minimum. Get rid of old papers, clothing, draperies, boxes, nearly-empty containers of



paint and other liquids that might be flammable.

Practice burn prevention in the kitchen by keeping hot pans and small appliances such as coffee makers and broilers out of the reach of young children, so they can't spill scalding-hot liquids or grease on themselves.

Keep lamp and appliance cords in good condition. Use a minimum number of extension cords, don't plug too many cords into any one outlet, and never run electric cords under rugs or across doorways. Walking on them damages the insulation and leaves bare wires which could start a fire.

Do your best to prevent people from smoking in bed or even while relaxing in an easy chair or on the couch. Dozing off while smoking, and accidentally setting fire to bedding and/or

upholstered furniture is by far the leading cause of home fires in which people lose their lives. Before retiring for the night, check behind cushions for smoldering cigarettes that might have rolled there unnoticed. Leave the dirty ash trays for morning, or if you feel you must "tidy up" before going to bed, be sure to dump butts and ashes into an empty metal container, never a plastic wastebasket, and never on top of papers and other trash.

Partnership in Fire Prevention at it's best, means cooperating with your Fire Department by installing automatic fire detectors. These inexpensive units are your best defense against being overcome by smoke and flames before you have a chance to escape safely.

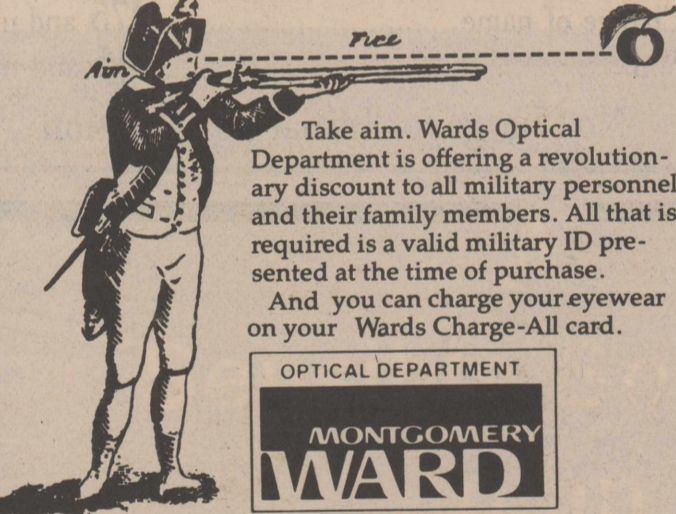

CJR procedure changes

Wing commanders now have the authority to "override" or grant exceptions to career reservation quotas for some first-term airmen, says Reese's career advisor, SSgt. Kenneth Zielinski.

"The override provision allows reenlistment-eligible airmen, who would not normally receive a career job reservation in their present specialty, to be issued a special CJR," explained Zielinski.

The provision is to be used in cases of personal hardship or critical manning, or when

unusual circumstances prevented the airman from requesting a CJR in a normal manner.

Previously, override requests were sent to the Airman Procurement Division at the Air Force Manpower and Personnel Center here for approval or disapproval. This change supports Air Force policy of placing the decision-making authority at the lowest possible command level.

To be considered for an override, first-term airmen must be within 120 days of their date

of separation or within 120 days of their date eligible for return from overseas (DEROS), provided they have less than six months remaining after DEROS.

Airmen must also be uniquely and exceptionally well qualified in their career field, and not projected to receive a reservation before they separate.

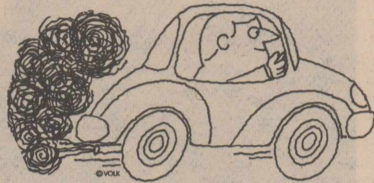

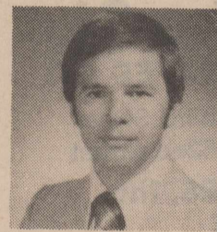

CFC drive bogs down

Unless there is a drastic increase in Combined Federal Campaign contributions Reese will fail to meet its CFC goal for the first time in the drive's history here.

A concerned Capt. Ron Bailey, CFC project officer, revealed Wednesday morning that Reese had reached only \$51,740 of its \$80,000 goal. That, with approximately 80 percent of the expected pledges already turned in.

Reese must collect an additional \$18,260 by the drive's Oct. 31 deadline. The slow collections come as somewhat of a surprise to

campaign officials because this year's target is lower than last year's final CFC tally.

Captain Bailey explained that one of the problems is that some people have been donating less than \$1 for the whole year. "And these are not people who we feel can't afford to give more," said Captain Bailey.

The CFC project officer pleaded for Reese personnel who have not yet donated to give as much as they can and for those who have to reevaluate their pledges. "Several people have contacted me and

increased their pledges already," he said.

All is not dark and gloomy for CFC officials as several units have passed their goals. The Hospital is on its way to a record setting effort joining the Wing Staff, Field Training Detachment, Weather and the Management Engineering Team as goal toppers.

However, Operations, Maintenance and Resource Management are all below 64 percent of their goals. The three units combined target is nearly 70 percent of the wing goal. Air Base Group and the 1958th Communications Squadron also lag far below their unit targets.

"We need help," stressed Captain Bailey. "The only way to reach our goal is if those who are able to give contribute what they can."

Reese has never failed to reach its goal before. 1979 may become a CFC milestone base officials will not want to remember.

AF pay delay possible

For the second straight year, members of the Armed Forces face the possibility of a "payless" payday.

As of noon Wednesday, the 96th Congress had failed to act on the multi-billion dollar defense appropriations bill, leaving the Armed Forces without Fiscal Year-1980 funding.

"As far as the military are concerned," predicted Maj. Roy Markle, base comptroller, "Congress will probably act in time to meet the payroll. The people most likely to be affected will be civilian employees."

Major Markle explained that civilians are due their first FY-80 pay on Oct. 11, four days ahead of the normal military pay date. Since Congress isn't due back in session before Tuesday, there's a chance the civilian pay will be delayed.

But, even if that happens

civilians will still receive at least half of their normal check. The Oct. 11 pay covers the last week in September and the first week in October. Regardless of what Congress does, civilians will be paid on time for their work in September.

"What we plan to do," detailed Major Markle, "is to cut two checks. One for September and another for the first week in October. If Congress acts in time we will mail both checks out together. If not, we will mail the September pay and hold the other check."

The major noted that a decision on whether or not to go with two checks will be made early Tuesday morning.

Once finance officials receive word that Congress has authorized the FY-80 budget, the second checks will be in the mail system within the hour. However, how long it takes for people to receive their checks depends on how long it takes the local postal officials to deliver the mail.

Although civilians appear to be in the most danger of not getting their full pay. Military personnel could be affected too. It all depends on just how quickly the 96th Congress acts. Congress does not have to approve the FY-1980 appropriations bill in order for defense spending to continue as normal. A "continuing resolution" (a Congressional option that allows the Defense Department to continue mission essential spending) can be passed to temporarily handle the problem.

Until the issue is settled, all defense employees should keep close tabs on their finances. If the pay question has not been settled by Oct. 10, the Roundup will outline steps Reese people can take to offset the possible pay crisis.

Last year, Congress's "twelfth-hour" action enabled nearly all defense employees to be paid on time.

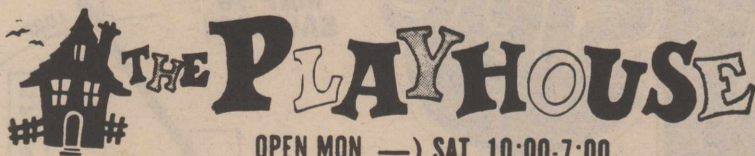
