

Either way, the music situation should improve in the near future.







# Don't waste energy

Energy wasting mistakes can be avoided if you consider climate, local building codes and energy-efficient construction when you build or buy a home. In either case, the following energy conservation ideas should help you save on home utility costs.

Consider a square floor plan. It is usually more energy efficient than a rectangular plan.

Insulate walls and roof to the highest specifications recommended for your area.

Insulate floors, too, especially those over crawl spaces, cold basements and garages.

If the base of a house is exposed, as in the case of a mobile home, build a "skirt" around it.

Install windows you can open so you can use natural or fanforced ventilation in moderate weather.

Place your refrigerator in coolest part of the kitchen, well away from the range and oven.

Install the water heater as close as possible to areas of major use to minimize heat loss through the pipes. (AFNS)

# Holidays present danger of fires

The holidays are a special time. Families and friends get together, memories are recalled and made, and gifts are given. But the last gift anyone wants is a fire. Unfortunately, many of the things that make the holidays a happy time, such as trees, lights, candles, ornaments, and gift wrappings, can

- Cut tree base at a 45- to 60degree angle and use a good tree stand with a holding area for
- Buy a small, fresh tree, and leave it outside in water or wet sand until you're ready to decorate it. If you're using an artifical tree, make sure it is
- Use only electrical wiring bearing the Underwriter's Laboratory (UL) seal. Make sure electric toys and appliances bought as presents carry this same seal of approval.
- Do not use flammable decorations.
- Don't put the tree or move furniture where they will block and call the fire department.

exits or hallways leading to exits.

- Place the switch for the lights well away from the tree, and turn off all decorative lighting before retiring or leaving the house.
- Remove all gift wrappings and packing materials promptly and dispose of them outside. Don't "bonfire" them in the fireplace.
- Remove a real tree as soon as possible after Christmas, or whenever it begins to shed needles.
- Place candles well away from draperies, decorations, or other flammables. Above all, don't put them in the tree! Also keep them away from areas where they might be overturned or wherever small children
- Electric trains, race car sets, etc., produce sparks and should not be near the tree.

When entertaining, don't allow smoking near the tree or around decoration and wrappings. Have plenty of large, safe ashtrays available.

Buy a smoke detector as an early Christmas present for yourself and others. If your home already has one, check it frequently, especially before the start of the holiday season.

Most of all, have a fire emergency plan. If fire strikes, clear everyone out of the house



# General Davis discusses ATC's progress, future

(Editor's note: Approximately eight months ago, Gen. B.L. Davis grasped the reins of Air Training Command. Recently, Bob Reed of the ATC Public Affairs Office talked with the general about the current status and future of the command. This is the final installment of Reed's three-part interview with General Davis.)

Reed: How are we doing for money these days, general?

Davis: Things'll still be quite as binding as last year, but we'll still have to play it pretty close to the vest. However, here in ATC we have the best comptroller ship in the Air Force, bar none. And our commanders and staff officers are great at setting priorities, so that if we start running close to the edge, vital functions the fact that they're just as won't suffer for lack of funds.

Reed: General, shortly before you assumed command of ATC you said in a speech that you felt too many Air Force members

looked on their work as a job, instead of the profession it is. Do you still feel that way?

Davis: Yes, regrettably. I think that has a definite bearing on the loss of some of our pilots, for instance. But I see encouraging signs that the climate is changing in the nation's regard for the military - it's climbing again. The cover story of the Oct. 29 issue of Time magazine is a good case in point. It's the best, most

defense needs and the vital role our armed forces play that I've seen in the last 10

Reed: General, in a videotaped interview a few months ago you referred to civilians in the command. During the usual editing that followed we inadvertently cut them - and believe me, we heard about it in our office. Have you any specific remarks you'd like to address to them - to us?

Davis: Definitely. It's tight in FY 80, Bob. Not indisputable that civilian employees have played a most significant role in ATC since it was founded 36 years ago. We couldn't possibly have been so successful in our work without them. Now that I've had a chance to meet and talk with many who work in the command, I can attest to dedicated and committed as our uniformed troops.

Reed: On behalf of all of us, thank you, General Davis. Now for the final question: Seven or eight years ago the Air Force was plagued with some serious racial disturbances. Does any of that feeling still exist, or has the whole ugly thing died a welcome death?

Davis: To be realistic, I'm sure it's not dead beyond rejuvenation, Bob, any more than in any other of the cross sections of our society. But we continue to fight it constantly in ATC with obligatory courses in human relations during basic training, then more at technical training centers, followed by still more at the airman's first duty station.

And times have changed. I'm convinced that most of the youngsters coming in today are freer from prejudice than some who joined in years past. But there are always a couple of generations in most offices and shops, and everybody doesn't always feel the same. So pressures can develop.

But with all the emphasis I can muster I want to say and please quote me as strongly as you can on this that there's no place for

I wholeheartedly believe in, and insist upon, equal opportunity for everyone, no matter what color, ethnic origin or gender. Our only criteria are merit performance. There will not be a single exception to that principle in my command.





no-notice deployments or recalls. This must be completed by Jan. 31, 1980. Reese personnel officials said Air Force Regulation 35-59 requires that these two groups of people complete statements acknowledging their responsibilities to make advance

Commanders are also tasked to brief all unit members every October on dependent-care responsibilities.

arrangements for dependent

The regulation has two purposes. First, it helps military sponsors understand the need advance arrangements.

This is based on the belief that military people can fulfill their personal obligations to their dependents and their professional obligations to the Air Force only through adequate planning.

Second, the regulation advises supervisors of the Air Force policy. It provides general guidance for remedial action if members don't fulfill military obligations because of inadequate dependent-care arrangements.

The regulation stresses that while the Air Force will help plan dependent care, members are primarily responsible. They must ensure they're available at all times for any military duties, including short- or no-notice deployments, recalls or alerts.



# A look back:

The Air Force was active on many fronts during 1979 as it received approval for the fullscale development of the MX missile, added new aircraft to the inventory, won peopleoriented proposals and assisted in far-ranging humanitarian

Public debate surrounding the Strategic Arms Limitation Treaty woke the nation to mounting concern about military readiness.

"The realities of the growing military threat are beginning to be recognized by the American people," said Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. Lew Allen Jr.

"In this regard," said Vice Chief of Staff Gen. James A. Hill, "1979 has been an important year that may well mark the beginning of a determined U.S. effort to halt this erosion of U.S. military strength vis-a-vis that of the Soviet Union.

"The most prominent factor in this regard has been the SALT II ratification debate in Congress, which has sparked a fundamental reappraisal of U.S. defense posture," General Hill noted.

In terms of strategic force, that posture was improved in 1979 with President Jimmy Carter's decision to begin fullscale engineering development of the MX mobile missile.

The year saw many changes in leadership. At the top, John C. Stetson resigned as secretary to return to private industry. Dr. Hans M. Mark replaced him and Antonia Handler Chayes became the new Air Force under secretary

James M. McCoy came on board as chief master sergeant of the Air Force replacing retiring CMSAF Robert D. Gaylor.

AF improves inventory

America's newest intercontinental ballistic missile will be used in a system of multiple protective structures to ensure the survivability of land-based missile forces.

Other force improvements in 1979 included increased use of new aircraft. The A-10 Thunderbolt II was permanently based in Europe, beefing up NATO capabilities as that alliance marked its 30th anniversary.

As the newest fighter — the F-16 — was being introduced into Tactical Air Command, one of the service's aging war horses — the F-100 Super Sabre — was retired from the inventory. Air National Guard and Air Force Reserve units were also receiving more modern aircraft in 1979.

Fly-before-you-buy competition began in July for selection of an airframe for the Air Force's air-launched cruise missile. B-52s at Griffiss AFB, N.Y., modified with rotary launchers, will be the first to carry the cruise missile when it enters the inventory.

Airlift enhancement emerged as a theme for the coming decade as the "stretch" model C-141B Starlifter was delivered to Military Airlift Command in December, and plans for a new transport, the C-X, began to emerge.

Energy conservation received new emphasis from Air Force leaders as units throughout the force observed the first Energy Awareness Week.

# 1978

People programs

Recruiting efforts paid off as the Air Force obtained 97.9 percent of the annual goal.

Actions taken in 1979 to streamline Air Force operations included inactivating Aerospace Defense Command. At year's end the Air Force was realigning ADCOM resources under TAC, Strategic Air Command and Air Force Communications Command.

In terms of entitlements, 1979 saw debate over a pay raise for Air Force people and a new retirement plan. Air Force Secretary Hans M. Mark and General Allen fought for — and helped win — a seven percent raise.

A new retirement plan was approved by Defense Department leaders and sent to Congress for its consideration. The plan may change the retirement system significantly, but Air Force leaders have pledged that members would have the right to choose between the old and new retirement programs if the new plan is enacted.

Military leaders also spoke on behalf of Air Force people against a parking-fee plan at government installations. When it was finally implemented, only four Air Force installations outside the capital were affected.

AF offers aid

The total force also performed disaster relief and humanitarian missions during the year. Military members provided vital weather information to the National Weather Service when Hurricanes David and Frederic threatened the American coast.

Bluesuit assistance also followed tornadoes near Sheppard AFB, Texas, and F.E. Warren AFB, Wyo. Reese people joined in the relief efforts for those stricken by the Wichita Falls tornado.

The Air Force assisted in evacuating Americans from Iran early in the year. Later, during the crisis at the U.S. Embassy in Tehran, the Air Force helped transport 13 hostages freed in November.

The Air National Guard and Air Force Reserve were active as units airlifted American citizens from Nicaragua and provided help to civilian authorities in Chicago following the crash of a civilian DC-10 in civil aviation's worst single aircraft disaster.

Trackers at the North American Air Defense Command helped keep the world informed when Skylab fell from space in the summer. NORAD radar scopes followed the spacecraft until it touched down in unpopulated Western Australia.






So, yes Virginia — thanks to the Navigational Aids crew — Santa Claus will find his way to Reese again this year.

# Air Force increases training of women

Reese can expect to see more women in training here during Fiscal Year 1980 as Air Training Command expands its undergraduate pilot and navigator training for women.

The FY 80 goal for women entries into UPT is 122 and 29 for UNT. This is a substantial increase over the FY 79 entries of 15 in UPT and seven in UNT. Reese currently has 10 women in training with 12 more total between Vance AFB, Okla., and Williams AFB, Ariz. Nine women are in navigator training at Mather AFB, Calif.

Entry sources for women into both programs will be from the Air Force Academy, extended active duty (cross-trainees), Officer Training School, Reserve Officers' Training Corps, Air National Guard and the Air Force Reserve.


Since the pilot training test program for women began in August 1976, 31 women have graduated and been assigned to a variety of aircraft in noncombat roles. Among them are six ATC instructor pilots at various bases and one T-43 pilot at Mather AFB. The first UPT class with women graduated in September 1977.

Navigator training for women began in March 1977, and since then, 12 have graduated from UNT.


With the expansion program, women will not be restricted to training at a few selected bases. Under the new guidelines, women may be entered into all flying training classes including helicopter training at all flying training bases.





# Reese couple enjoys working on old clocks

With the New Year only days away, Father Time is foremost in many peoples' minds. This seems a fitting time to explore the field of horology.

This field, practiced by one Reese couple, is unique in that it encompasses both art and science. In fact, horology is defined as the science of measuring time and the art of constructing instruments for indicating time.

TSgt. Wayne Powell and his wife Carol cover both aspects of the art/science.

Their interest began in 1971 while stationed in England. Wayne and Carol wanted a grandfather clock and found a rare one-handed clock which they purchased and brought home. Two hours after arriving home, their new prize stopped running.

With no previous experience in working on clocks, Wayne made the decision to try and clean the works in an attempt to get it running. Predictably, he pulled the wrong pin and the entire assembly fell apart. Undaunted, Wayne spent the next two or three days putting the timepiece back together. Since that time he has restored or repaired dozens of clocks. mostly antique.

Carol's artistic talents are put to work restoring the faces of the often badly battered clocks they acquire. Sanding, repainting numbers and often creating whole new scenes to make an antique clock look not new, but cared for, has given Carol more business than she can handle. She is currently restoring a batch of faces sent to her by an antique dealer in Louisiana.

According to Wayne, only one university in the United States offers studies in horology, making it necessary for most aspiring clockmakers to earn their wings the way he did, through apprenticeship. He has

studied under two masters of the craft; Kirk Richards, a German-born horologist he met while stationed in England, and Ben Carter of Alexandria, La.

Wayne hopes to become a certified horologist and open a clock shop in Silver Springs, Fla., upon his retirement from the Air Force.

Carol, like Wayne, has had little formal training for her part of the job. Although she did work for the art director of an advertising agency in Miami for a time, she depends largely on native ability. Her artistic talent has also resulted in the sale of prints of a T-38 breaking through the barbed wire fence that, according to one old story, separates the North Pole from the Texas Panhandle.

Wayne and Carol seldom modify their clocks, preferring to restore them to their original design. One exception to this is a wall clock that Wayne drilled through the face slightly above the junction of the hands and fitted a shaft to the escapement wheel (gear that drives the minute hand). Carol painted a windmill, without a blade, on the face. Wayne then attached a handmade blade to the shaft. The result is a windmill moving in the wind to the precise ticking of the unusual timepiece.

Constructing hand-made parts is not unusual in this sometimes tedious hobby. Wayne is forced by lack of replacement parts to occasionally fashion parts as minute as one tooth of a gear.

This necessary attention to detail, and the hours it requires, constitutes the most serious drawback to horology; finding the time.



# **Guidas attends** advisor meeting

CMSgt. Frank T. Guidas, wing senior enlisted advisor, joined 19 others last week at Randolph AFB, Texas for Air Training Command's Senior Enlisted Advisors Conference.

Eighteen ATC wings and centers were represented at the two-day conference along with representatives from the Reserve Officers' Training Crops and Civil Air Patrol.

CMSgt. Emory Walker, ATC senior enlisted advisor, was host for the event that was called to discuss and work personnel problems and other matters requiring command or Air Force-wide attention.

Also in the area of quarters, a change from the now standard ranch oak motiff in dormitory design was discussed.

Finally, on the same subject, the matter of allowing junior enlisted married personnel priority for on-base quarters was examined.

Good news for women in uniform was announced at the

conference. The women's utility uniform will be available in the

field in February. One area of discussion which may foreshadow a major change in the military justice area was commanders' perogatives when giving an Article 15. The new policy, now


