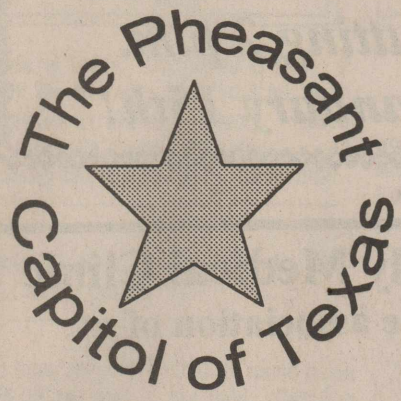

## SCDC Announces Notice of Petition To Expand Local Calling Area

The Sherman County Development Committee, Inc. is currently making available a petition to expand our local calling area to include Texhoma, Coldwater/Conlen, Dalhart and Dumas. This petition is pursuant with the Public Utility Commission Substantive Rule 23.49 (c).

The petition requests the inclusion of the 827,384,249 and 935 exchanges to be included in the 396 local calling area, thereby allowing all calls from the 396 exchange to the petitioned exchange to be local, not long distance calls.

By signing the petition, you are stating your willingness to pay a mandatory monthly per line fee of \$3.50 for residential lines and \$7.00 for business lines. This includes all of the exchanges listed above. This is in addition to your basic services.

Before a local calling area can be expanded, a ballot will be sent to all subscribers in the 396 exchange. At least seventy percent (70%) of the subscribers returning ballots must vote for the expanded local calling area before it can go into effect.

If the ballot passes, the expanded calling fee will be paid by all subscribers in the 396 exchange.

If you are interested in signing the petition to request the ballot, you can find one at the SCDC or Sherman County Judge's office, First State Bank, Elk Pharmacy or you can call Lorie Vincent at 396-2397.

1. You must be a registered subscriber in the 396 exchange to sign the petition.
2. Only one signature per household or business.
