Local Director Attends Public Hearing In Austin

Lorie Vincent, Executive Director of the Sherman Development County Committee, attended the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs Public Hearing on the 1996 Tax Credit Program Rule changes on April 1st. Lorie was joined in Austin by Winston Sullivan, developer for the Stratford Seniors Community, LP. The hearing addressed many changes proposed to the existing program, All speakers were given the opportunity to address the committee for five minutes. Ms. Vincent made a presentation on behalf of the Stratford Seniors Community, LP, a proposed 24 unit apartment complex for senior citizens. An application for tax credits was made in the fall and did not make the allocation round due to the point status. The application is being updated, revamped, and improved to be ready for the next allocation round. Tax credits for the developer and investors are necessary to keep the housing affordable for our residents.

While in Austin, Ms. Vincent met representatives of Public Utilities Commission concerning the status of improvements to our GTE service and equipment, and also to review the status of our Extended Local Service Petition.

Hazardous Materials Training To Be Offered

The Sherman County Emergency Management Office will be providing hazardous materials training for public sector emergency responders June 11-15, 1996. Classes will be taught by Gary Whitman from the Department of Public Safety (DPS) and Steve Mason from the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). The First Responder Awareness class will be offered June 11 and 12 from 6:00-10:00 p.m. First Responder Operations class will be offered June 13-14 from 6:00-10:00 p.m. and June 15 from 8:00 a.m.-5:00

The First Responder Awareness class is designed for individuals who are likely to witness or discover a hazardous substance release. They are trained to initiate an emergency response sequence, evacuate/cordon the area, and implement the incident command system. The First responder Operations class is for individuals who respond to releases or potential releases of hazardous substances as part of the initial response to the site. They respond in a defensive fashion without actually trying to stop the release (without coming in contact with the hazardous material). Both classes meet OSHA, EPA and NFPA standards. Both courses are eligible for educational and continuing education credit with the following agencies: Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Officers Standards and Education (TCLEOSE), Texas Commission on Fire Protection Personnel Standards and Education, Texas Department of Health, Division of Emergency Medical Services.

More Than 130,000 April 13

It's an all-out war against litter; on Saturday, April 13, 130,000 Community Center. Adopt-a-Highway and Keep Texas Beautiful volunteers will lash out Annual Spaghetti against litter, cleaning state and county roads, city streets and Dinner Coming parks in the eleventh annual "Great Texas Trash-off". Part of Soon!!!!!! Texas Department of (TxDOT's) Transportation's "Don't Mess with Texas: antilitter the nation's largest one-day

cleanups. More than 2,000 Adopt-a-Highway groups--including four in Sherman county-will rid state roads of litter, while Keep Texas groups 84 Beautiful in communities will be sprucing up city streets, county roads and parks. Groups such as Sherman Juvenile Probation, County Sherman County 4-H, Stratford Fire Department Auxiliary, and Stratford Lions Club expect to pick up 7.25 million gallons of litter statewide.

According Doris Howdeshell, director of TxDOT's Travel and Information Division, the combined effort of the Great Texas Trash-Off, Don't Mess with Texas and Adopt-a-Highway has changed behavior about littering and reduced the amount of litter on Texas roads. These antilitter programs also save the state between \$2 and \$4 million a year in litter pickup expenditures.

TxDOT's grassroots partner, Keep Texas Beautiful is a nonprofit, environmental umbrella group consisting of a network of private citizens, communities industries, civic groups, schools and government agencies.

Across The Fence By Debbi & Tana

Container gardening is for everyone! Even the novice can grow beautiful potted plants if they begin with healthy plants and proper soil. A garden is not always a patch of ground in the back yard. Containers, whether wooden, terra-cotta, plastic, metal, or various other planters are like a garden in a box. The convenience of planters means no more bending over to weed. When choosing your container you need to be aware of each planters durability, such as porous terra-cotta planters compared to the glazed Containers. Small plastic and clay pots may require more frequent watering (up to twice 2 day during the hotter part of the summer) due to evaporation of moisture on the outside surface. Porous pots need to be soaked before potting to rehydrate them and to remove any chemical in their walls. Regardless of the type of container you choose, keeping them clean, and disinfected before replanting is also a good idea to discourage pests and disease in new plants. When preparing a container for planting, always make sure a drainage hole is in the bottom or side of the container; also lining the bottom of your containers with mulch, gravel, or coke cans in larger containers will enhance drainage.

To give plants the best home, consider using soil-less mixes rather than garden soil in your planter. Soil-less mixes are bought ready for use at garden supply stores. It is soil-less in that there is no topsoil. Peat moss and various kinds of chopped bark additions to the potting soil will add organic material for better absorption of water. Not only are these mixes lighter than topsoil, they are sterilized to avoid soil-borne diseases, insect eggs, and weeds.

To ensure good growth, start by adding granular or powder fertilizer to the potting mix. Each type of fertilizer has instructions on the package that should give you the correct amount to add to the soil before planting the container. The brand-name fertilizers are the most widely used, as they are easy and convenient to handle, save time as well as effort, and are ideal for average use. The labels of most fertilizers give the percentage of nitrogen (N), phosphorus (P) and potassium (K), showing the relative proportions of each. Most container-grown foliage plants benefit from a fertilizer high in nitrogen, while a combination of potash and nitrogen will suit most flowering plants, improving the quality and texture of the blooms. Never feed plants that are dry without watering them first, and avoid applying fertilizer in strong sun because of the danger of scorching. Always use fertilizer and liquid feed according to manufacturer's directions, and if any concentrated feed is spilt on the plant, wash it off immediately.

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






Buchanan was born on April 23, 1791, in Pennsylvania, and became a lawyer when he was 21 years old. He served as president from 1857–1861.

Ulysses S. Grant

Ulysses S. Grant was elected president by a large majority in 1868 after leading the Union forces to victory in the Civil War. He was a very popular president, and many people considered him a national hero. Grant, born on April 27, 1822, was so successful that he was reelected for another term in 1872. He is most remembered as being a kind and fair man who turned the tide for the Union in the Civil War.


James Monroe

James Monroe was the fifth president of the United States. He was president from 1817 until 1825, during a time known as the "era of good feeling." This was a time when there were very few political problems or disagreements. Monroe was born in Virginia on April 28, 1758.
